January 6. Frederick A. Reid (65814)—

To maintain a boat house and float at the foot of Voorhis lane, Sheepshead Bay, Borough of Brooklyn; rental to be at the rate of \$5 per month, payable monthly, in advance, to the Dock Master.

January 6. Citizens' Steamboat Company (65761)—

To berth Steamer "Saratoga" on the north side of the West Seventeenth street pier, North river; rental to be at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

The following permits were granted:

January 4. New York City Railway Company (65829)—

To construct a manhole adjacent to terminal tracks in front of ferry house, foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to provide for repair of switch rods.

January 4. Kane & Wright (65787)—

To dredge in front of the bulkhead between Forty-sixth and Forty-seventh streets, East river.

January 4. New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company (65766)—

To maintain submarine cable across the Harlem river, east of the Fourth avenue railroad bridge, in accordance with plans submitted, and to drive piles and to fill in behind same at the ends of the bridge for the protection of the cable.

January 4. Consolidated Gas Company (65826)—

To repair and lay gas mains along the water front of the Borough of Manhattan wherever necessary, the permit to continue until July 1, 1906, unless sooner revoked.

January 4. Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York (65827)—

To repair its ferry properties in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn whenever necessary, the permit to continue until July 1, 1906, unless sooner revoked.

January 6. Goodwin Brothers (65851)—

To dredge at the dumping board foot of Sixtieth street, East river.

January 4. Old Dominion Steamship Company (65764)—

To place small dirt bin on marginal street adjoining shed south of Pier 26, North river, during pleasure of the Commissioner.

January 6. Old Dominion Steamship Company (65854)—

To make general repairs to Pier 26, North river, when necessary, the permit to continue until July 1, 1906, unless sooner revoked.

January 6. Old Dominion Steamship Company (65706)—

To place sand or sawdust at the approach to Pier 26, North river, for the protection of horses.

January 6. Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (65581)—

To erect a pier for a McMyler car dumper at St. George, Borough of Richmond, in accordance with plans submitted.

January 6. Central Feed Company (65625)—

To extend private sewer across marginal street at the foot of Seventieth street, East river, the consent of the Bureau of Sewers to be first obtained, and the sewer to remain thereat during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

January 6. John N. Robins Company (65229)—

To construct a crib bulkhead and pile platform near the foot of Otsego street, Erie Basin, Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

January 6. Thomas Crimmins Contracting Company (65717, 65663)—

To maintain a powder house on the marginal street at a point 150 feet north of Sixty-fourth street, East river, during the pleasure of the Commissioner, the structure to be maintained thereat under the supervision of the Bureau of Combustibles of the Fire Department and to be used by said Bureau as desired.

Contracts No. 969, for coal; No. 971, for ice, and No. 946, for duplicate parts for ferryboats, were ordered readvertised January 5.

Contract awarded, January 6, to O'Brien Brothers, the lowest bidders, subject to the approval of the American Bonding Company of Baltimore as surety by the Comptroller.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted:

From the City Clerk (65847)—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 26, 1905, and approved by his Honor the Mayor, December 30, 1905, establishing the positions of Pilot at \$1,200 and \$1,650 per annum, of Clerk at \$720 and \$960 per annum, and of Engineman at 56 1/4 cents per hour. Filed January 5.

From the Comptroller—

1 (65707). In relation to the occupation of water front property by the Fulton Market Fishmongers' Association between Piers old 22 and old 23, East river. Notified January 4 that the property was vacated by the association in January, 1905; Comptroller requested to turn over to this Department the rental collected by him for the bulkhead between Piers, old 23 and old 24, East river, from June 2, 1905, the date on which the City took title to the property, to July 31, 1905.

2 (65687). Stating that a claim has been filed by James J. Corcoran for loss of horse at the foot of Douglas street, Brooklyn. Notified January 4 that a proper backing log was maintained at the bulkhead and that the Department does not consider the City responsible for the accident.

3 (65769). Stating that a claim has been filed by James Douglas for a release of the City's interest in lands under water in the vicinity of Spuyten Duyvil, Hudson river, Bronx Borough. Notified January 4 that the land under water in question is owned by the City, under the Blanket Grant of 1888.

4 (65843). Stating that his certificate has been attached to Contract No. 957, Class II., for rip-rap stone. Filed January 5.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1 (59993). In relation to the extent of the City's ownership in and to the lands and lands under water in Jamaica Bay, Borough of Queens. Filed January 4.

2 (65819). In relation to claim of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company for damage to the derrick lighter "Thomas H. Bowers" at the foot of West Sixteenth street, North river. Filed January 4.

3 (65844). Stating that employees in the non-competitive class may be permanently removed, except where such employees are protected under the Veteran Laws. Filed January 5.

4 (65858). Transmitting copy of report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessments in the proceeding for the acquisition of the private rights in and to Pier No. 18, East river, with copy of Supreme Court order confirming same. Voucher ordered drawn January 5 for the payment of the claim.

From the Post Office Department, Railway Mail Service (65715)—

In relation to the transportation of the mails over the municipal ferry between the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. Notified January 1 that the City will carry the mails on the municipal ferry between the Borough of Manhattan and St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, and will provide accommodations at St. George for the distribution of the mails for the term of one year, the charge therefor to be at the rate of \$2,433.20 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Cashier.

From the New York Harbor Line Board (65788)—

Transmitting blue prints showing modification of pierhead line for part of the southerly shore of the East river at Bowery Bay, near Steinway, Borough of Queens, approved by the War Department December 18, 1905. Filed January 4.

From the Pennsylvania Railroad Company (65724)—

Accepting offer of the Department of December 16, 1905, for a new lease of water front property and ferry franchise at the foot of Twenty-third street, North river, for a term of five years from January 1, 1906, at a rental of \$27,499 per annum for the wharf property and \$1 per annum for the franchise, the lease to provide for

two renewal terms of five years each at an advance of 5 per cent. per annum on the rent for each renewal term. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested January 4 to authorize the granting of the lease.

From the Morris & Cummings Dredging Company (65665)—

Requesting extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 872 for dredging on the North river. Extension granted January 4 to and including September 15, 1906.

From the Union Ferry Company (64958)—

Declining to pay the sum of \$328.28, the amount of unpaid interest in the settlement of the claim of the City against said Company for rent for ferry franchises. Corporation Counsel requested January 4 to collect the amount.

From the Knickerbocker Canoe Club (64385)—

Requesting a lease of water front property at the foot of One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, North river, for boat-house purposes. Application denied January 4.

From Wynant B. Wardell and Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company (65839)—

Asking the removal of sunken canal boat from the slip at the foot of Twenty-fifth street, South Brooklyn. Notified January 4 that the Department has no jurisdiction in the matter and that the work of removal must be done by them as owners of the adjoining property.

From John J. Kenny, Attorney (65718)—

Asking that James Kiley, formerly employed by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, be re-employed by the City in the Staten Island Ferry service. Notified January 5 that chapter 533 of the Laws of 1905 did not provide for the retention of the services of Porters employed by the ferry company.

From the Manhattan Phonograph Company (65856)—

In relation to rent to be charged for the privilege of maintaining phonograph at the St. George terminal of the Staten Island Ferry. Rent fixed January 6 at the rate of \$72 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier.

From Whitestone Improvement Association (65765)—

Asking that a pier be constructed at the foot of Eleventh avenue, Whitestone, Borough of Queens. Requested January 6 to submit facts showing the necessity for additional wharfage facilities in the vicinity.

From G. Knoche (65842)—

Requesting a reduction in rent charged for land under water covered by platform near the foot of Eighty-third street, East river. Denied January 6.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1 (65754, 65753). Recommending the removal of sheds on Piers, old 13 and 14, East river. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested January 4 to have the sheds sold and removed as soon as possible.

2 (65811). Recommending that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise the Department as to its rights in connection with the placing of filling by the owners of property between One Hundred and Fortieth and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, Harlem river, Borough of Manhattan. Corporation Counsel so requested January 4, and Superintendent of Docks directed to prevent the placing of any filling, pending the receipt of the opinion.

3 (65834, 65836). Reporting that contract No. 938, Class I., for cobble was commenced December 25, 1905, and that Contract No. 99 for ice was completed December 31, 1905. Filed January 4.

4 (65845). Reporting that Contract No. 956 for coal was commenced December 14, 1905. Filed January 5.

5 (65841). Recommending that steps be taken for the acquisition of property required for ferry terminal purposes between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn. Board of Estimate and Apportionment requested January 6 to authorize institution of proceedings for the acquisition of the property.

6 (65875). Recommending that the Union Ferry Company be directed to brace its ferry racks to the reinforcing piles adjoining Piers 13 and 17, East river. Company so notified January 6.

7 (B. O. 3630). Reporting that the New England Navigation Company does not intend to lay water connections to Pier, new 20, East river, under the permit granted September 29, 1905. Permit revoked January 6.

8 (65869). Submitting specifications and form of contract for obtaining 2,000 tons of anthracite coal. Approved January 6 and ordered printed as Contract No. 972.

9 (65870). Recommending that a contract be advertised for obtaining 10,000 barrels of Portland cement. Contract ordered advertised January 6 as Contract No. 973.

10 (65871). Recommending that a contract be advertised for obtaining sand and broken stone. Ordered advertised January 6 as Contract No. 974.

11 (65872). Recommending that a contract be advertised for obtaining cobble and rip-rap stone. Ordered advertised January 6 as Contract No. 975.

From the Auditor (65708)—

Reporting failure of the Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York to pay rental for its ferries between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn. Corporation Counsel requested January 6 to take the necessary steps for the collection of the unpaid rents.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief in accordance with his recommendations except where otherwise noted:

January 4 (65696). To repair the pier foot of Twenty-sixth street, East river, as requested by the Department of Public Charities.

January 4 (65833). To repair Dock Masters' offices whenever necessary until December 31, 1906, upon requisition from the Superintendent of Docks, at a cost not to exceed \$25 in each case.

January 4 (65786). To repair the north side of pier, foot of West Forty-eighth street, North river, where damaged by the tug "Wyomissing," as per report of Superintendent of Docks, the cost of the work to be reported for collection from the Philadelphia and Reading Transportation Line.

January 5 (65848). To order dredging under Contract No. 881 at the bulkhead platform foot of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Harlem river.

January 6 (65725). To order dredging to a depth of 30 feet at mean low water in the half slips adjoining the pier foot of Thirty-fourth street, North river, as per request of the lessee of the pier.

January 6 (65877). To do such preliminary work, including driving of test piles and the taking of borings, as may be found necessary to obtain data relative to the river bottom and for the preparation of studies, etc., in connection with the municipalization of the South Brooklyn Ferry.

January 6 (65873). To repair the pier foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river.

January 6 (65876). To repair structure located at the foot of Fourteenth street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, and to remove same to the ferry terminal at St. George, in the Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Bureau of Ferries.

January 6 (65874). To repair recreation structures along the North river, from time to time, as may be found necessary, during the year 1906, at a cost not to exceed \$1,000 in the aggregate.

January 6 (65867). To repair the recreation structures along the East and Harlem rivers, from time to time, as may be found necessary, at a cost not to exceed \$1,000 in the aggregate.

Every furnace employed in the working of engines by steam in any building shall be constructed so as to consume the smoke arising therein or therefrom.
