The report of the President was adopted.

The Secretary was authorized to make a contract with Miss C. S. Sutcliffe for the tabulation of the Commission's roster and its report for the year 1905, together with the tables and statements of the work performed in the various bureaus, to be forwarded to the State Commission in compliance with the law.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the heads of the City Departments, and call their attention to the following provisions of Clause 6 of Civil Service Rule XI:

Every person selected for appointment shall be required to fill out and sign, in the presence of the appointing officer or his representative, an identification sheet, repeating the essential facts stated by him at the time of examination, which shall be forwarded to the Commission with the notice of appointment, and filed with the appointee's application papers, —and to request that each head of a Department designate one person as his representative, before whom every appointee shall be required to fill out and sign, in his own handwriting, the official declaration sheet before being assigned to duty.

The following matters which had been laid over from previous meetings of the Commission were then considered:

(a) Recommendation of the Labor Clerk that the Commission rescind its action of December 13, 1905, in granting the request of Thomas F. S. Halpin that his name be restored to the list for Plumber, for the reason that the candidate had not signed his appeal himself, but had same signed by some person unknown to the Commission.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Civil Service Commission, taken December 13, 1905, in restoring the name of Thomas F. S. Halpin to the eligible list for Plumber, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

(b) Request of Patrick J. Flaherty that he be restored to eligibility for appointment from the list for Deputy Superintendent of Hospitals. The candidate's name appeared on the list, but on May 15, 1903, for the reason that he had just been dismissed from the position of Storekeeper in the Department of Public Charities, he was disqualified.

After consideration of the matter, the request was denied. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Flaherty, and inform him that he would not be barred, however, from entering any examination conducted by the Commission in future.

(c) Report of the Chief Examiner, submitting a statement of the experience possessed by the persons whose names appear on the existing eligible list for Assistant Engineer.

The communication was ordered continued on the calendar.

(d) Protest of James Coyle against the action of the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, in transferring him from the position of Head Gardener at a salary of \$1,800 per annum to that of Gardener at \$1,200 per annum, and the action of the Civil Service Commission in approving such transfer, on the ground that he was a veteran volunteer fireman.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Coyle and state that the action of the Commission in his case was perfectly regular, and that whether he was transferred to the position formerly held by him or not depended upon the head of his Department; that if at any time such transfer were requested, it would be allowed by the Commission, under the provisions of paragraph 3 of Civil Service Rule XIV.

(e) Request of the Commissioner of Public Charities, under date of December 28, that the Commission conduct an examination for promotion from Nurse to Supervising Nurse, in order that a vacancy in that position may be filled. It appeared that there were five names on the list for promotion to Supervising Nurse in the Department of Public Charities, which list had been certified and returned with the statement that all five persons had declined appointment.

The matter was again laid over.

(f) Communication from the Chief Examiner, dated December 18, submitting the experience sheets of several candidates in the examination for Prison Keeper, in which experience sheets the candidates had in one way or another revealed their identity, and requesting instructions from the Commission as to whether the said sheets should be rated.

After consideration of the matter the Chief Examiner was instructed not to rate the said papers, in view of the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII, paragraph 10,

and also of the explicit instructions given the candidates at the outset of the examination regarding the necessity of not revealing their identity in any way.

(g) Application and examination papers of William J. Stone, candidate for Fireman, which had been under investigation by Examiner Byrne, owing to certain irregularities that were detected in same.

The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

Communications were presented from the Chief Examiner, dated December 29, recommending that the appeals of the following-named candidates be denied, there having been no errors or mistakes of marking pointed out:

John E. Nelson, promotion to Sergeant.

William E. Warden, Gas Inspector.

Patrick J. O'Reardon, promotion to Sergeant.

The recommendation of the Chief Examiner was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeal of Andrew J. Casassa, candidate for Gas Inspector. It appeared that the candidate after completing one of his examination papers, discovered that the other side of the paper had been written on and marked with lead pencil by some person other than himself; that upon appealing to the Monitor in charge of his section he was informed that it would be necessary to rewrite said page, and that owing to the time lost in doing so he had been unable to complete his examination in the given time. The Chief Examiner stated in his report that so far as the candidate's answers went it had been reported to him that they were of a high order of merit, but that it did not seem to him that the copying of one sheet of answers accounted for his having failed to answer as many as three questions; that one of the Examiners had reported to him that she did not think the time taken in copying the sheet would have more than sufficed to answer one additional question, and apparently if he were given credit for that one question on the same basis as was warranted by the marking which he received on the questions that he did answer, his name would, in all probability, be placed on the eligible list. After careful consideration of the matter, it appearing that the time lost by the candidate was the fault of one of the employees of the Commission, the Secretary was instructed to request the Chief Examiner to give the candidate as fair a rating as possible on the unanswered questions; to state that the Commission would leave the method of rating the paper to him, and for him to use his best judgment in the matter.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeal of Herman H. Wolf, candidate for Roundsman, for a rerating of his seniority in said examination. It appearing from the report of the Chief Examiner that the appeal was without merit, the same was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeal of John McAuliffe, candidate for Roundsman, for a rerating of his seniority in the said examination. It appearing from the report of the Chief Examiner that the appeal was without merit, the same was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeal of E. S. Conklin, candidate for Gas Inspector, that the papers submitted by him in that examination be rated. It appeared from Mr. Ireland's report that the candidate's papers had not been rated for the reason that he addressed a communication to the Chief Examiner, which was deemed a violation of the rule prohibiting candidates in examinations from revealing their identity; that he had not made known the contents of said communication to the examiners who rated the papers in that examination, however, and that they were in no way aware of the candidate's identity. The Chief Examiner stated further that the candidate's papers were of a high order of merit, and that inasmuch as he seemed to have acted from entirely proper motives and under a misapprehension of the rules, he would recommend that the papers be rated. The recommendation of the Chief Examiner was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the cases of Detective Sergeants Arthur E. Gloster, Herbert Graham, Andrew Delaney and Daniel J. Farrell, candidates for promotion to Captain, who were unable to be present for the mental examination on the day set by the Commission. It appeared from a communication transmitted by the Chief Clerk of the Police Department that Detective Sergeants Gloster and Graham were unable to appear, for the reason that they were detailed on special duty in Chicago, Ill., and that Detective Sergeants Delaney and Farrell were confined to their homes by sickness. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Chief Clerk of the Police Department and state that, under the provision of Civil Service Rule VII, the Commission was without power to grant a special examination or re-examination unless it could be shown that the candidates' failure to appear for the general examination was due to a manifest error or mistake for which the Commission was responsible; or that such failure was due to compulsory attendance before any court or other public authority having the power to compel such attendance; that, under the rules, Messrs. Delaney and Farrell could not be granted a special examination for promotion to Captain, as their failure to appear for the regular examination was not covered by the foregoing rule, and to request, with reference to the cases of Messrs. Gloster and Graham, that the Commission be furnished with the date on which said persons were sent to Chicago, and by whose authority.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeal of John A. McGrath, candidate for promotion to Sergeant, stating that the same had no merit. It appeared that the candidate appealed for credit for a medal and honorable mention awarded him, on the ground that they were awarded after he was promoted to Roundsman, but that the records show that the said medal and honorable mention were conferred on the candidate on the day before he was promoted to that rank and while he was still a patrolman. The appeal was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 2, with reference to the appeals of John H. Thompson and John Carroll, candidates for promotion to Captain of Police, stating that, in his opinion, the candidates' appeals were not entitled to any consideration. It appeared that the candidates left the examination room on the morning of the examination before handing in their second paper, and that when they found that the same should have been completed before leaving they immediately returned to the examination room and requested to be allowed to complete the same, which was denied. The Chief Examiner stated in his report that explicit instructions were given to the candidates at the outset of the examination, from three different parts of the room, so that all candidates could hear, that there were to be four papers in the examination, and that they were to be allowed a recess only after handing in their answers to the second paper. The order in which the papers were to be presented to them was stated at the same time, and paragraph 4 of the instructions furnished to all candidates, to which their attention was called, stated as follows:

"Candidates must observe that each question sheet is received in proper order and be sure that none of the question sheets have been omitted. They are held responsible for all errors and omissions."

After consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidates and state that, in the opinion of the Commission, the instructions given them were very plain, and if they did not follow the same their appeals could not be considered at this time.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 3, with reference to the appeal of candidate No. 206 in the recent examination for promotion to Captain of Police, that an extra sheet handed in by him after one set of examination papers had been completed and presented to the Chief Examiner, be rated. The Chief Examiner stated in his report that as the extra sheet handed in by the candidate was not presented to him until the candidate's fourth set of papers had been completed, he had given instructions that same was not to be rated. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidate and inform him, in view of the Chief Examiner's report, his appeal that the said paper be rated as part of his examination could not be granted.

A communication was presented from Dr. Houghton, Medical Inspector in the employ of the Commission, dated January 3, requesting that his salary be fixed at \$2,100 per annum, the maximum of the grade for which he qualified by examination, and stating that on July 28, 1904, the Civil Service Commission increased his salary from \$1,500 to \$1,800, but that the same never went into effect, for the reason that the latter grade had not been fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen. The matter was laid over.

Communications were presented from the Secretary of the Board of City Magistrates of the Second Division, dated January 3 and January 5, requesting that the following-named persons be granted a non-competitive examination to qualify them for provisional appointment as Probation Officers in that Court, under the provisions of

Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3, pending the establishment of the eligible list for that position:

—and that the Civil Service Commission certify the pay-rolls of the aforesaid persons for services rendered as Probation Officers in the City Magistrates' Court, Second Division, from November 30, 1904, to the present time. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Board of City Magistrates of the Second Division and state that, under the law, the Commission was without power to certify the pay-rolls of the persons now serving in that court as Probation Officers, from November 30, 1904, as requested, as such persons were not appointed in conformity with the Civil Service law, but to state further that the Commission would conduct non-competitive examination at the earliest possible date to qualify the persons nominated for employment pending the establishment of the new eligible list, according to the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3; that upon said persons qualifying they would be certified as eligible for temporary appointment, and that their pay-rolls would be certified by the Civil Service Commission from the date of such appointment.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Education, dated September 28, requesting approval of the restoration to duty of Mary Vail, Janitress, whose name had been off the pay-roll since June, 1905, pending the hearing of charges. In view of the fact that the Board of Education had reconsidered its action and desired to restore her to duty, the reassignment was approved.

A communication was presented from President Cromwell, dated December 26, requesting authority to appoint Harry V. Berry and George J. Corbett, provisionally, as Topographical Draughtsmen, pending the establishment of the new list for that position. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to request the Chief Examiner to conduct a non-competitive examination of the candidates, according to Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated December 29, stating that he had rescinded his action of December 21, 1905, in accepting the resignation of Harry G. Hose, a Probationary Fireman who was assigned to Engine Company 1, and whose resignation was caused by injuries received in the performance of his duties. The action of the Fire Commissioner was approved.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated December 28, requesting approval of the leave of absence, without pay, granted Albert P. Hess, Stenographer and Typewriter, from October 1, 1905, to January 1, 1906. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the said leave of absence was granted because of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Bridges, dated December 29, requesting approval of the reassignment to duty of John J. McDonough, Bridge Keeper, who had been absent from November 1, 1905. It appearing from the certificate furnished that the said absence was due to illness, the reassignment was approved.

The request of the President of the Borough of Queens, under date of December 30, for approval of a leave of absence without pay, for one year from December 30, 1905, granted Preston B. Seaman, Topographical Draughtsman, was denied.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of City Magistrates, Second Division, dated December 30, requesting that, in the event of the Commission's being unable to certify a list of Interpreters having a knowledge of Yiddish, Slavish, Polish, Russian and German, an eligible list of that character be prepared, and that in the meantime a provisional appointment in that Court be authorized. The request was denied and the Secretary was instructed to certify the existing eligible list for Interpreter, with the request that the Board of City Magistrates endeavor to make a selection from same.

A communication was presented from the Clerk of the Court of General Sessions, dated January 3, requesting that an examination be held for promotion to the position of Assistant Court Clerk in that Court, such examination to be limited to the Record Clerks serving in same. The request was granted and the Chief Examiner was requested to proceed with the examination at the earliest possible date.

The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment, in accordance with Civil Service Rule III., to be held at the office of the Commission on Wednesday, January 10, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from Mr. John J. Halley, No. 446 Warren street, Brooklyn, dated December 28, requesting that the Commission reconsider its action in disqualifying him for appointment from the eligible list of Measurer. The Secretary stated that the records show that the candidate passed the examination for that position and obtained a place on the list; but having been dismissed from the position of Inspector of Tenements on August 31, 1905, he was disqualified for appointment to the new position. 

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
