BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1908.

New York, July 1, 1908.

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to report as follows for the period of three months just completed:

THE DEPARTMENT AS A WHOLE.

Considerable attention has been given to the system of obtaining medical and surgical supplies, and a conference was held with committees of all the hospitals in order to establish rules under which requisitions for these supplies should be made. Rules promulgated as a result of this conference are found to be satisfactory.

The rules relating to the holding of fire drills in the Department were reconsidered, and it was ordered that a fire drill should be held every week in each of the hospitals of the Department and a report thereon submitted to each meeting of the Board of Trustees.

In January, 1908, the Board of Aldermen established a prevailing rate of wage for Engineers at \$4.50 per day. The grade then existing in the Department was \$4 per day. A request was made for Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$2,379 with which to pay the difference between the established grade and the prevailing rate. This was approved by the Board of Aldermen, but the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reduced the amount to \$1,391, in order that the increased rate should only be paid from June 1, 1908, until parity with other Departments.

The President has been authorized to arrange for the installation of a dental service for the care of the teeth of the children in the surgical wards of Bellevue Hospital. It is intended to appoint a number of dentists to the hospital whose duties will be to visit the institution each day. The children in all the hospitals of the Department are now being supplied with a toothbrush when they enter the hospital and are instructed in its use and given the brush to take home with them when they leave the institution.

Dr. James A. Miller, Director of Tuberculosis Clinic, in a communication dated April 2, recommended that the ferryboat day camp, which was conducted last summer by the Charity Organization Society, but abandoned for lack of funds, be undertaken by the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. The suggestion was approved and arrangements made to organize the camp as part of the tuberculosis service at Bellevue Hospital during the coming summer. The boat "Southfield" was berthed in

front of Bellevue Hospital and under the auspices of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Tuberculosis Clinic of Bellevue Hospital the camp was formally opened in July. Patients suffering from tuberculosis in its incipient stages who attend the Bellevue Hospital dispensary are encouraged to spend the entire day on the boat, where they are given every attention and nourishing diet. The work thus far has been very successful, and from every indication it is believed will accomplish much good to these sufferers. The patients on the boat are under the care of the Attending Physicians and House Physicians who are on duty in the tuberculosis wards of the hospital.

On June 25 bids were received on the supply of 20,000 potatoes, and June 29 a contract was awarded to Robert P. Lawless, who was the lowest bidder, for the sum of \$2,400.

BELLEVUE HOSPITAL.

Pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital are now nearly completed. The work still to be done mostly falls under the contract for plumbing. The condition of the building on June 30 is described by the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, as follows:

"The work of the general contractor is so near completion that after the washing down of floors and cleaning of rooms and toilets, diet rooms and corridors has been done there is practically no other work left for the general contractor except the connecting of some pipes in the cellar, some non-conducting covering of some pipes and the brazing and painting of radiators on two floors.

"The separate contract for the plumbing of Pavilions A and B has been delayed considerably by the non-delivery of certain sinks. It is expected, however, that these will be delivered this week, and this will practically finish this contract.

"The vacuum cleaning contract has been completed."

On May 11 an expenditure of \$750 to the John H. Parker Company for the installation of metal work connections to the air flues in the clinical laboratories of Pavilions A and B was accepted.

The Trustees approved of the expenditure of \$120 for the construction of wire screens behind the bars of the door of the elevator in the new building.

Following advertisement, four bids were received for the furnishing and spring of lighting fixtures in Pavilions A and B. All the bids were rejected, inasmuch as, with one exception, they failed to comply with the specifications. After readvertisement four bids were received for this work and the contract was awarded to the Hays Company, whose bid of \$3,640 was the lowest regular bid received.

On June 1, following advertisement, a contract amounting to \$1,250 was let to Messrs. Hahn & O'Reilly for the painting of Pavilions A and B. The figure quoted by Messrs. Hahn & O'Reilly was the lowest of seven bids received.

The Board decided that no drinking fountains be placed in these pavilions, but that such fountains be provided in all new sections of Bellevue Hospital.

Bids for the supply of furniture, bedding, etc., for the wards of Pavilions A and B were received on June 23, but it was decided to take no action thereon until the necessary releases were obtained from the Prison Department.

Owing to the fact that there was a sufficient balance in the appropriation for the construction of the building to provide for the furnishings and equipment, it was not necessary to ask for an additional appropriation for this purpose, but the Trustees had to request the City authorities to change the wording of the original resolution so as to allow the furnishings to be charged against the appropriation for the building.

Pathological Department.

Good progress has been made with the construction of this building during the quarter and its condition is now reported as follows:

"All exterior walls are completed to the limestone of sixth floor, excepting on the east side, which is already up to the terra cotta cornice. All granite, except the entrance steps on south elevation, has been set. All limestone work has been completed up to sixth floor.

"Steam fitting and vacuum cleaning work has been started."

On June 16, following advertisement, eight bids were received for the plumbing and drainage work required in the Pathological Department and male laboratory, and the contract was awarded to the Wells & Newton Company, whose bid of \$72,580 was the lowest received.

Boiler House.

On May 11 the plans for the boiler house and cooling station of the new Bellevue Hospital were presented to the Board of Trustees, when they were referred to the Building Committee, on whose recommendation a week later it was decided to request an appropriation of \$500,000 with which to proceed with this work.

The Department of Docks has practically finished the extension of the bulkhead from Twenty-eighth street to the south side of Twenty-ninth street, and the work of building and piling for the continuation of the bulkhead west on the north side of Twenty-ninth street to the old building line is now in progress. The filling in of the dock has not progressed as rapidly as desirable, but this is accounted for by the fact that there is very little building in progress in the City at present and consequently there is not much material to be had for filling in.

Training School for Women Nurses.

Very rapid progress has been made upon the construction of the new Training School for Women Nurses during the quarter just closed, and the state of the building is described by the architects, Messrs. Parish & Schroeder, as follows:

"The work on the exterior of the building has so far progressed as to be practically ready for the painting of sashes and frames and the exterior iron work of fire escapes and balconies.

"Within the building, the trimming of door and window openings as well as the room base on the fourth and fifth floors, along with the closet shelving on these floors has been completed and that of the second and third floors is well under way.

"The plastering is nearly completed throughout the building leaving only the forward part of the basement and stair A to be done along with the necessary pointing up.

"The tile floors of kitchen and pantry are under way and that of all toilets and bath rooms is to be begun within a week.

"The various plumbing fixtures are being delivered and will shortly be set in place.

"The electric wire is being drawn in and connected to panel boards.

"The various pumps and apparatus are being connected up."

Most of the windows on the ground floor were changed from clear to ground glass at an additional expense of \$182.

On the recommendation of the architects, an estimate from the John H. Parker Company, amounting to \$298, was accepted for the construction of two bookcases in the general sitting room and erection of two plate glass mirrors in the reception room.

As in the case of Pavilions A and B, there was a sufficient balance in the appropriation for the construction of the training school to provide for the furnishings and equipment, and it was not necessary to ask for an additional appropriation for this purpose. The City authorities, however, had to change the wording of the original resolution so as to allow the furnishings to be charged against the appropriation for the building. The specifications for the furnishing and equipment of the school are now being prepared and the work will be advertised without delay.

Tunnel.

On April 16, following advertisement, bids were received for the construction of a tunnel to carry the pipe lines between the Training School for Women Nurses and Pavilions A and B. The contract was awarded to the Phoenix Construction Company, whose bid of \$8,497 was the lowest received. The architects report on this work as follows:

"The masonry of this tunnel has been practically completed, and we must say this work has been done in a very quick and satisfactory manner.

"Work on the steam piping connecting the Nurses' Home with 'A' and 'B' has been started."

A special report was received from the Conference Committee of the Bellevue Hospital Medical Board recommending that additional operating room space be provided at Bellevue Hospital, and that a rearrangement be made of the isolation ward so as to permit of the better care of the patients treated there. The report was referred to the General Medical Superintendent with a view to arranging steps to have both recommendations carried out if found practicable.



It was resolved to continue for a period of three months the employment of the Charity Organization Society to make investigations of the financial condition of applicants at the dispensary who might be considered able to pay for treatment. The society will be asked to investigate all doubtful cases, the expense involved being 25 cents for each investigation. It is hoped by this plan to prevent imposition on the City.

During the quarter the Medical Board at the request of the Board of Trustees appointed new committees of surgeons, genito-urinary surgeons, and gynecologists to Bellevue Hospital to meet at the office of the architects to go over the plans and to suggest the arrangement of their respective departments in the new Bellevue Hospital.

On May 19, following advertisement, bids were opened for five hundred enameled iron beds for Bellevue Hospital and a contract was awarded to Frank A. Hall, whose bid of \$3,300 was the lowest received.

On the recommendation of Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories, Dr. Bowman C. Conwell was appointed to the position of Pathologist, at a salary of \$1,500 a year.

On June 19, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board, it was resolved to adopt the following rule:

"Any member of the house staff who is taken ill and requires an operation while on duty shall be given a special room and special nursing when in the opinion of his Visiting Physician or Surgeon such accommodation and nursing are desirable."

#### Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 900, as compared with 877 for 1907. There have been 8,348 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 8,440 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 9,295, as compared with 9,344 during the corresponding quarter of 1907.

Twenty-six thousand four hundred and seventy-nine (26,479) visits were made to the Out Patient Department, as compared with 22,511 during the same quarter of last year.

#### GOUVERNEUR HOSPITAL.

On the recommendation of the Medical Board, the house staff of Gouverneur Hospital was increased by one appointment for a term of twelve months and the services of two members of the house staff increased from twelve to eighteen months, six of which will be spent in the Pathological Laboratory.

Much consideration has been given during the past quarter to the overcrowded condition of the dispensary at Gouverneur Hospital. Many remedies have been suggested, but in view of the probable removal of the New York Dispensary to a locality adjacent to Gouverneur Hospital, it has been decided not to take any steps at present toward the enlargement of the Out Patient Department facilities at Gouverneur Hospital.

Through the courtesy of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, who are prepared to assign a second disused ferryboat at the disposal of this Department, a day camp similar to that described under Bellevue Hospital is to be established at Gouverneur Hospital, and arrangements are now being made to have the camp in operation as soon as possible.

A settlement of the contract of Messrs. John R. Sheehan & Co. for the completion of Gouverneur Hospital has at last been secured, the Department of Finance having decided to retain the sum of \$11,538 on account of the defective and incomplete work. The Trustees have requested permission from the Board of Aldermen to complete the contract without public letting.

#### Medical Appointments, Resignations, etc.

The following medical appointments and changes have to be reported:

April 19, Dr. W. H. Steers, Clinical Assistant to Out Patients (medical), resigned.

June 19, Dr. James E. Kelly, Attending Surgeon, resigned; Dr. Max Feldman, Clinical Assistant (medical), resigned.

#### House Staff.

On the recommendation of the Medical Board, the following internes were appointed to Gouverneur Hospital:

Dr. H. Wolff, Dr. H. S. Weigle, Dr. E. C. Astell, Dr. I. H. Wilson (one year), Dr. F. A. Turner and Dr. E. H. Russell. The first named four begin service on July 1, 1908, the other two on January 1, 1909.

#### Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 124, as compared with 114 for the same quarter of 1907. There have been 891 admissions during the quarter,

as compared with 1,028 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 1,033, as compared with 1,132 during the corresponding quarter of 1907.

Twenty-nine thousand two hundred and two (29,202) visits were made to the Out Patient Department, as compared with 24,269 during the same quarter of last year.

#### HARLEM HOSPITAL.

On April 7 a contract was awarded to Messrs. Siebrecht & Son for the furnishing of plants and decoration of the grounds of Harlem Hospital, at a cost of \$658.07. The work is now in progress.

Upon the recommendation of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, it has been decided to change the services at that institution so as to provide for the establishment of a reception ward for children.

The Trustees have also agreed upon the recommendation of the Medical Board to increase the number of Internes at Harlem Hospital from eight to ten.

On May 19 bids were opened for the laying of cast iron floors on the balconies of Harlem Hospital and the contract awarded to John F. Kuhn, whose bid of \$2,373 was the lowest received for the work.

#### Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 124, as compared with 61 for the same quarter of 1907. There have been 1,436 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 994 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 1,546, as compared with 1,038 during the corresponding quarter of 1907.

Twenty-one thousand thousand eight hundred and twenty-six (21,826) visits were made to the Out Patients' Department, as compared with 12,012 during the same quarter of last year.

#### FORDHAM HOSPITAL.

A contract amounting to \$939.34 has been awarded to Siebrecht & Son for the furnishing of plants and the decoration of the grounds at Fordham Hospital.

#### Census.

The average daily census for the quarter has been 106, as compared with 53 for the same quarter for 1907. There have been 391 admissions during the quarter, as compared with 415 during the corresponding quarter of last year. The total number treated has been 705, as compared with 471 during the corresponding quarter of 1907.

Four thousand and seventy (4,070) visits were made to the Out Patient Department, as compared with 2,065 during the same quarter of last year.

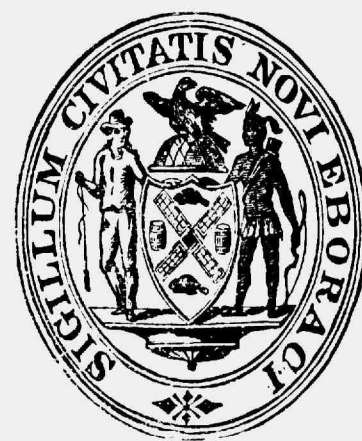
