The Secretary presented a communication from the Counsel to the Commission regarding the jurisdiction of the Commission over the Municipal Ferry operated between Manhattan and Richmond, and, on motion, duly seconded, it was ordered that

the letter be filed, and that a copy be sent to the complainant. The communication was as follows:

November 12, 1907.

*Public Service Commission for the First District:*

GENTLEMEN—I am in receipt of the copy of the letter to the Commission dated September 6, signed by Frank Rutherford, which raises the question whether the Municipal Ferry operated between Manhattan and Richmond is subject to the jurisdiction of this Commission as common carrier.

I have referred this matter to Mr. Harkness with the request that he make a full digest of the provisions of the Act which may have a bearing upon its construction in this respect, and also that he examine and report upon the authorities which are in point. I have received from him an elaborate report upon the subject, which I herewith transmit to the Commission.

I concur in the conclusion reached by Mr. Harkness, that the definition of common carriers contained in section 2 of the act is meant to exclude all common carriers not therein specifically designated. The word "includes" might be held to extend the definition and not limit it; but taking into consideration all of the other provisions of the act, together with the apparent uselessness of this designation, unless it is meant to enumerate the kinds of common carriers who are subject to the provisions of the act, I have reached the conclusion that the word "common carrier" is so limited.

In this connection, I wish to call your attention to the fact that pipe-line companies were originally enumerated within the agencies included in the term "common carrier," but were subsequently stricken out before the bill was enacted into law. This is indicative of an intention on the part of the Legislature to exclude all agencies except those therein enumerated.

I also herewith transmit to you a letter which I have received from Mr. Stevens, the Chairman of the Commission for the Second District. He suggests that if the question of the meaning of the word "common carriers" comes before your Commission, we communicate with the Commission for the Second District before reaching a final decision, and I would suggest that such a communication be made.

The Secretary presented a communication from Hon. Bird S. Coler, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, suggesting changes in the Brooklyn loop line; and, on motion, duly seconded, the letter was ordered on file.

Commissioner McCarroll—"The matter has been gone over by the Chief Engineer, and has been a subject of careful consideration by him. It has already been recommended by the Commission, as he submitted it some time ago."

The communication was as follows:

BROOKLYN, December 5, 1907.

*The Honorable, the Public Service Commission:*

GENTLEMEN—Among the propositions presented to your Commission in a report of the Consulting Engineer of this office submitted on July 29, 1907, the matter of an increase in the height or headroom of the Brooklyn tunnels is, I understand, now being considered, and has been referred to your Chief Engineer for a determination in the new forms of contracts to be readvertised.

The matter seems to me to be of importance in its bearing upon the electric equipment and other features of broad importance in the use and operation of the future subways, and I would invite your attention to that feature of the proposition which had to do with the open contracts for construction now under way for the Centre Street Subway, where a head room of 14 feet from base of rail is provided.

As this "Brooklyn Loop Line," or Centre Street Subway, and its connections to the bridges will necessarily be a part of the operating line extending over the bridges and by Fourth avenue to Fort Hamilton and Coney Island, as well as the Lexington avenue connections designed, and such river tunnel construction as may be found necessary to utilize the Brooklyn trackage provided to its full limit, it would seem that the headroom should be the same throughout and that you may deem it advisable to have steps taken to modify these construction contracts on the "Brooklyn Loop Lines," allowing uniform overhead installation throughout the systems named and any extensions therefrom which may follow in Manhattan and Brooklyn.

Third Avenue Elevated.

It is hereby  
Ordered, That a hearing be had on the 20th day of December, 1907, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, or at any time or times to which the same may be adjourned, at the rooms of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, State of New York, to inquire whether the regulations, equipment, appliances and service of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company in respect to transportation of persons in the First District are unjust, unreasonable, improper or inadequate, and whether said company does not run trains enough or cars enough, or with sufficient frequency, or possess or operate motive power enough, reasonably to accommodate passenger traffic transported by it or offered for transportation to it, and if such be found to be the fact, then to determine whether it is reasonably necessary to accommodate and transport the said traffic transported or offered for transportation, and is and will be just, reasonable, proper and adequate to direct that the service of said Interborough Rapid Transit Company be increased and supplemented at the points and times and in the particulars following, that is to say:

*Third Avenue Elevated Line.*

1. South bound at Thirty-fourth street station, from 6:30 to 9:30 a. m., daily except Sundays, by an increase of 91 cars, or by an increase from 875 cars to 966 cars.

2. North bound at Forty-second street station, from 4:30 to 7:30 p. m., by an increase of 139 cars, or by an increase from 799 cars to 938 cars.

And if any such changes, improvements or additions be found to be such as ought to be made as aforesaid, then to determine what period will be a reasonable time within which the same should be directed to be executed.

All to the end that the Commission may make such order or orders in the premises as shall be just and reasonable; further

Ordered, That the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company be given at least ten days' notice of such hearing by service upon it, either personally or by mail, of a certified copy of this order, and that at such hearing said company be afforded all reasonable opportunity for presenting evidence and examining and cross-examining witnesses as to the matters aforesaid.

This matter, coming on upon the complaint of John E. Thompson, bearing date September 7, 1907, and the answers thereto of Union Railway Company of New York City dated October 21, 1907, of Interborough Rapid Transit Company dated October 18, 1907, and New York City Interborough Railway Company dated November 11, 1907, and the report of the hearing had herein on November 15, 1907, November 19, 1907, and November 23, 1907, and it appearing that said hearing was held by and pursuant to an order of the Commission made and entered the 30th day of October, 1907, and returnable on said 15th day of November, 1907, and that said order for hearing was duly served upon said Union Railway Company of New York City and said Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and that said hearing was held by and before the Commission on the matters in said complaint, said answers and said order specified on said November 15, 1907, November 19, 1907 and November 23, 1907, Mr. Commissioner Eustis presiding; Oliver C. Semple, Esq., Assistant Counsel, appearing for the Commission, and Mr. Edward A. Maher, president, and Mr. A. T. McCabe, attorney, appearing for said Union Railway Company of New York City, and Mr. E. P. Bryan, president, and Mr. A. A. Gardner, attorney, appearing for the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, and the said New York City Interborough Railway Company having filed its answer to said complaint and also voluntarily appeared upon the said hearing by Alfred Skitt, its president, and A. A. Gardner, its attorney, and consenting to be subject to the said order for hearing with the same force and effect as if named therein and as if the same had been served upon it;

Now, By the said complaint and the said answers thereto and after said hearing thereon, it being made to appear to this Commission that the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company, New York City Interborough Railway Company and Union Railway Company of New York City are common carriers of passengers, operating lines of railway in the streets of The City of New York; that through a connecting point at the One Hundred and Eighty-first street station, on St. Nicholas avenue, of the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company on its subway route, a continuous route for transportation of passengers over the lines of the said three defendants between One Hundred and Tenth street on Broadway, in Manhattan and Westchester, both in The City of New York, has been by said defendants created and offered to the public for use and has been by it used; that said Union Railway Company of New York City and New York City Interborough Railway Company are street surface railroads having franchises and tracks and operating as such in The City of New York, subject to the provisions of the Railroad Law, Article IV, including the transfer provisions thereof; that said Union Railway Company of New York City and New York City Interborough Railway Company have, in respect of their separate tracks and franchises in said city an operating contract or agreement for the use by each of the tracks and franchises

of the other, with a fare of five cents (5¢) to each passenger and a right to such passenger to receive at specified places from each company and use for transportation on the other company's tracks and cars a transfer slip for a continuous trip within said City; that by the terms of a contract in writing between the said Union Railway Company of New York City and New York City Interborough Railway Company, bearing date May 8, 1906, it is also provided that the obligation of the Union Railway Company of New York City to give transfers shall be binding on such other lines of railroads above the Harlem River to which the Union Railway transfers passengers for a single fare of five cents (5¢); that by the terms of a contract in writing between the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company and New York City Interborough Railway Company, bearing date April 29, 1905, every passenger upon any line of the New York City Interborough Railway Company may buy for three cents (3¢) in addition to the regular five cent (5¢) fare a coupon ticket entitling him to transfer and to continue his trip upon the line of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (the subway) from said One Hundred and Eighty-first street station on St. Nicholas avenue, and conversely a passenger on the subway of said Interborough Rapid Transit Company may for eight cents (8¢) buy from the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company a special coupon ticket under which he is carried on its line and at said One Hundred and Eighty-first street station may transfer thence to said New York City Interborough Railway Company and be carried on the latter line without further fare, and that it is further provided by said contract that the same shall apply to all extensions of the lines of either party thereto and to all lines which either party may acquire as part of its railway system; that the complainant in this case is aggrieved by the fact that in traveling from his home to Westchester by the line of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (the subway) from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Eighty-first street, thence by the said New York City Interborough Railway Company to Aqueduct avenue, thence by said Union Railway Company of New York City to Westchester, he is carried by the said defendant companies for the sum of eight cents (8¢) represented by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company's said eight-cent (8¢) special coupon ticket, and a transfer slip from the New York City Interborough Railway Company to said Union Railway Company of New York City; whereas on the return trip from Westchester to the same point at One Hundred and Tenth street and Broadway, over the same routes and lines operated by said defendants subject to the obligations aforesaid, he is required to pay ten cents (10¢), namely, a fare of five cents (5¢) to the said Union Railway Company of New York City for carriage over the Union Railway, and by transfer over the New York City Interborough Railway Company, and a further sum of five cents (5¢) upon the Interborough Rapid Transit Company (the subway), and he is refused by the said New York City Interborough Railway Company a coupon ticket for three cents (3¢) offered by him as a passenger on its cars under transfer slip from said Union Railway Company of New York City, to which he had as aforesaid paid five cents (5¢) for his fare;

And it further appearing that under the obligations of said New York City Interborough Railway Company and said Union Railway Company of New York City, as street surface railroads, and under their said agreement and under the terms of the said contract between said Interborough Rapid Transit Company and New York City Interborough Railway Company, applicable to extensions and acquisitions of the latter, the regulations and practices of the said defendants as affecting rates charged for transportation of passengers as aforesaid in charging ten cents (10¢) from Westchester to One Hundred and Tenth street, Manhattan, and eight cents (8¢) from One Hundred and Tenth street, Manhattan, to Westchester, over the same route, are unjust, unreasonable, unjustly discriminatory and unduly preferential and in violation of law, and that it will be just and reasonable to determine that the maximum fare and rate to be observed and enforced as the amount to be charged for the service to be performed by said defendants for the transportation of persons in the First District between said points as aforesaid shall be fixed as hereinafter set forth;

Therefore, On motion of Abel E. Blackmar, Esq., Counsel to the Commission, it is

Ordered, First—That the maximum rate to be charged by said Union Railway Company of New York City, New York City Interborough Railway Company and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for service to be performed by them in the carrying of each passenger from Westchester over the route of the Union Railway Company of New York City to Aqueduct avenue, thence over the route of the New York City Interborough Railway Company to One Hundred and Eighty-first street on St. Nicholas avenue, and thence over the route of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to One Hundred and Tenth street, Manhattan, be the sum of eight cents (8¢).

Second—That this order shall take effect on the 15th day of December, 1907, and shall continue in force from and after said date so long as the charge of eight cents (8¢) is made and required of each passenger by the said defendants for service performed by them in carrying such passenger from One Hundred and Tenth street, Manhattan, over the route of the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company to One Hundred and Eighty-first street on St. Nicholas avenue, thence over the route of the New York City Interborough Railway Company to Aqueduct avenue, and thence over the route of the Union Railway Company of New York City to Westchester; and it is further

Commissioner Bassett presented the following report of the Committee on the Brooklyn Bridge, which was ordered on file:

This Commission has co-operated with the Bridge Department in an endeavor to bring about a better movement of the surface and elevated cars on the Brooklyn Bridge, especially in the rush hours. A report for the month of November, 1907, received from Bridge Commissioner Stevenson, attached hereto, shows that the movement of the surface cars over the Brooklyn Bridge in the month of November has been better than ever before in the history of the bridge. During the hour between 5 and 6 p. m. an average of 298 cars proceeded over the bridge as against 264 cars, average, one year ago at the same time. On some days when conditions were most favorable 320 cars crossed the bridge in this hour. Last year the number never reached 300. A proportionate increase is shown for the hour between 6 and 7 p. m.

The reasons for this increase of carrying ability are well stated by Bridge Commissioner Stevenson as follows:

"First—Prohibiting overloaded trucks from bridge during this period.

"Second—More numerous arrival of cars to bridge during early part of period, due to Livingston street operation and cut offs in connection therewith.

"Third—Better movement of cars into lower terminal, due to taking care when loops are vacant all the day over from north to south roadway.

"Fourth—Intense interest of railroad company, from general superintendent to inspectors in the field.

"Fifth—Active and intelligent co-operation of police, from Captain to Patrolmen, in keeping overloaded trucks off the bridge, patrolling roadways and handling crowds in loops, especially the first four loops."

The elevated trains are carrying more passengers across the bridge in the rush hours than ever before without increased discomfort. Both the Bridge Department and this Commission have brought about a multitude of minor improvements that are producing results. The congestion, however, is great both on the trains and surface cars. But it would appear that the travel can be taken care of in a fairly orderly manner until the Battery tunnel shall begin operation.

No milk which is watered, adulterated, reduced or changed in any respect by the addition of water or other substance, or by the removal of cream, shall be brought into the City of New York, or held, kept, sold or offered for sale at any place in said City; nor shall any one keep, have, sell or offer for sale in the said City any such milk.

The term "adulterated milk," when so used in this code, means:

First—Milk containing more than 88 per centum of water or fluids.

Second—Milk containing less than 12 per centum of milk solids.

Third—Milk containing less than 3 per centum of fats.

Fourth—Milk drawn from animals within fifteen days before or five days after parturition.

Fifth—Milk drawn from animals fed on distillery waste, or any substance in a state of fermentation or putrefaction, or on any unwholesome food.

Sixth—Milk drawn from cows kept in a crowded or unhealthy condition.

Seventh—Milk from which any part of the cream has been removed.

Eighth—Milk which has been diluted with water or any other fluid, or to which has been added, or into which has been introduced, any foreign substance whatever.

Ninth—Milk the temperature of which is higher than 50 degrees Fahrenheit, or which contains an excessive number of bacteria.

The provisions of this section shall not be applicable, however, to modified milk or skimmed milk held or offered for sale under permits therefor from the Board of Health, pursuant to the rules and regulations of said Board.
