Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Synopsis of Proceedings.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on June 4, 1912. Present, Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. O'Keeffe, Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused, Messrs. Drummond, Farley and Sachs.

The minutes of the meeting of April 16, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved. Bills, amounting to \$116,596.51, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Dr. Booth, Junior Physician on the Fourth Medical Division of Bellevue Hospital, has been operated upon for appendicitis and is making a satisfactory recovery.

Miss Noyes and Miss Nash has been granted a leave of absence of one week, dating from June 1, to attend a meeting of the Training School Superintendents in Chicago.

The work of Bellevue Hospital has been interfered with several times recently by reason of the lack of police protection and our inability to obtain the same promptly.

A few days ago an intoxicated woman created a disturbance in ward 17. The officer assigned to the prison ward has orders not to leave the ward, and on this occasion it was 35 minutes before an officer could be obtained from the precinct.

In the interval, the 25 patients in the ward, 2 seriously ill, were subjected to the excitement and disturbance of this woman's loud, boisterous and profane talk. On June 1, an intoxicated woman created a disturbance in the admitting office, where we had a repetition of the situation. Men, women and children, who were waiting for examination and admission to the hospital, were obliged to listen to the abusive and profane language of this woman. Incidents such as this may arise at any time, and it would seem desirable to request the assignment of an officer to Bellevue Hospital, in addition to those assigned to the prison ward.

In view of the report of the recent investigation of the Harlem Hospital Dispensary and the present lack of rules governing dispensary histories, together with the overcrowded condition existing at each of the out patient departments, it would seem desirable to make some definite regulations regarding the reception and treatment of patients who come from without the hospital ambulance district.

This could be done by referring those patients from outside the ambulance district to a dispensary in the neighborhood from which they come.

The lack of accommodations for patients and pupils at the School for Midwives has become so acute that if the work is to progress additional accommodations must be provided. It is possible to obtain two apartments in the house adjoining the present school, 221 E. 26th st., at an annual rental of \$600, provided this Department will make all necessary alterations and replace the same at the expiration of the lease.

Permission is requested to dispose of a quantity of used dishes that were given to the hospital some time ago by the Hotel Belmont. The condition of these dishes is such that they cannot be used in the hospital.

In reference to the request of the Riverdale Health League for the establishment of an emergency hospital in the Kingsbridge district, a study of the admissions, etc., at Fordham Hospital for the past year shows that nearly 400 calls were received from the vicinity of Pelham and City Island, while about 100 were received from the Kingsbridge section. It is therefore apparent that the eastern section of this hospital district is equally in need of relief. The principal difficulty seems to be the delay in the arrival of the ambulance at the point from which the call was sent. As the accommodations are sufficient at Fordham Hospital to care for these calls, it is recommended that the horse ambulances be replaced with motor ambulances, and that a request for revenue bonds to the extent of \$8,000 be made for this purpose.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to request that the police

order referred to by the General Medical Superintendent be revoked, or that an officer be assigned to Bellevue Hospital.

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to limit the treatment of patients in the outpatient departments, as far as possible, to those resident in the ambulance districts; and it was resolved to authorize the appointment of John J. Crowley as Investigator at Harlem Hospital.

It was resolved to request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to lease the two apartments at 221 E. 26th st., for the use of the Training School for Midwives, and to request the issue of revenue bonds not exceeding \$300 to pay the rent for the remainder of the present year.

Authority was granted to dispose of the dishes furnished to Bellevue Hospital by the Hotel Belmont.

It was resolved to request the issue of \$8,000 revenue bonds for the purchase of two automobile ambulances to be attached to Fordham Hospital, to be stationed during the day in outlying parts of the ambulance district; and it was further resolved that an ambulance should be stationed at once at Van Cortlandt Park during the day, if such a need is indicated.

Reports of Committees.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee submitted communications from Dr. A. Sophian, dated May 17, and from Dr. G. A. Fried, dated May 25. These communications were placed on file. Upon the recommendation of the Conference Committee, it was resolved to create an additional place of Physician to Out Patients and Assistant Visiting Physician to Harlem Hospital, and to appoint Dr. Gustave A. Fried to fill the place.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee reported upon the nominations of Dr. Vetter and Dr. James, and it was resolved to appoint Dr. Philip J. Vetter, Jr., as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, and Dr. Charles S. James as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients (nose and throat).

Mr. Robbins, of the Committee of the Month at Gouverneur Hospital, reported upon the claim of Samuel Fine, as attorney for Elias Raff, and submitted a report of an investigation made by the Executive Committee of Gouverneur Hospital. The report showed that the patient received proper treatment and refused to go to the hospital. The claim was denied.

The President reported that he had conferred with the Commissioner of Public Charities in regard to the proposed transfer of the new morgue, and that Commissioner Drummond had agreed to take over the morgue, but wished to have the transfer made formal, for which purpose the Corporation Counsel would be consulted. The transfer, however, could not be effected until an appropriation for the additional employees required to care properly for the new morgue is secured. This report was approved.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Committee on Officers and Employees, stated that a request had been received from the General Superintendent of Training Schools for an increase in salary to Miss Georgia Daggett, Head Nurse in ward 38, and to Miss Mary Miller, Nurse in Charge of the Maternity Service at Bellevue hospital. After hearing a statement of the circumstances from the Committee it was resolved to authorize an increase to Miss Miller from \$600 to \$720, and to deny the request in regard to Miss Daggett.

The President submitted a bid received on June 4, for the supply of x-ray plates, and upon the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, it was resolved to accept this bid, and to authorize the award of a contract to E. B. Meyrowitz accordingly.

The President submitted two bids received on June 4, for planting trees at Bellevue Hospital, together with a communication in regard thereto from the F. W. Kelsey Nursery Company, dated June 3. After consideration, it was resolved to reject these bids, and to authorize the General Medical Superintendent to obtain separate bids for cutting holes in the sidewalk and for planting trees at Bellevue and Harlem Hospitals.

The President submitted a list of bids received on June 4, for the supply of coal. Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, it was resolved to ac-

cept the lowest bids received on lines 890, 892, 894 and 897, and to reject all bids received on the other line numbers. In this connection, a communication from the Comptroller's office in regard to the basis of payment for coal purchased in the open market was presented.

The Building Committee presented a communication from McKim, Mead & White, stating that it was inadvisable to ask steel contractors to prepare plans for steel work of new buildings, and giving the reasons therefor.

Communications.

A communication was received from the City Superintendent of Schools in regard to the day camp "Westfield." The President and Mr. O'Keeffe made reports of inspections of the day camp, which they had made in consequence of this communication, and submitted statements received from the Supervising Nurse of Gouverneur Hospital and the Purchasing Agent in regard to the delay in securing supplies. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to secure new beds, a new awning and new linen at once for the day camp.

A communication dated May 31 was received from Dr. Goldwater, Chairman of the Committee on Hospital Bureau of the American Hospital Association, requesting the Trustees to approve of the adoption of a bill introduced in the United States Senate, empowering the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service to establish a hospital bureau. It was resolved to approve this bill and to urge its adoption.

A communication dated June 3 was received from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting a complete set of the plans of the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital. It was stated that Dr. Goldwater had requested that a complete separation should be made between the duct system connecting the sink rooms and toilets and the group of ducts which terminate in the wards. It was resolved to direct the Architect to provide for this, and to approve the plans with this exception, with the understanding that an alternate should be provided for the installation of a vacuum cleaning plant and for wainscot tiling in the bath rooms, toilets, etc., so that these may be installed if sufficient funds are available.

A communication dated May 31 was received from J. H. Freedlander, transmitting communication from Pattison Brothers, Consulting Engineers for the new Harlem Hospital, stating that an additional \$25,000 will be required to meet the cost of increasing the water supply and refrigeration in the power house, which will be involved by the extension of that hospital. The Secretary was directed to express regret that this was not foreseen when the estimate was submitted by the Architect on January 4, and to state that an appropriation of \$25,000 will be made the subject of a special request or included in the Corporate Stock Budget for 1913-1914.

Reports were presented from Louis C. Frees, Inspector of Construction, dated May 25 and 31, stating that the brick used in pavilions L and M and the piles supplied for pavilions I and K were not in accordance with the specifications. The President reported that he had sent copies of these reports to the Architects, and replies dated May 27 and June 1 were submitted. Referred to the Building Committee and President with power.

A communication dated June 3 was received from Louis C. Frees, reporting upon the claim of the P. J. Carlin Construction Company. A copy of this report was ordered to be sent to the Comptroller.

A communication dated May 20 was received from Anderson-Martin Electric Company, transmitting assignment to the Century Gas and Electric Fixture Company of the sum of \$605. Consent was granted to this assignment, without guarantee as to amount and expressly subject to any claim, setoff, or equity which The City of New York now has, or may hereafter have, against the moneys or any part thereof covered by said assignment.

The minutes of meetings of the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School held on May 3 and 17 were presented and placed on file.

A communication dated May 20 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution adopted by that Board on May 16, directing that the approval of the Borough President be obtained before contracts for new buildings or the acquisition of land are awarded. This communication was placed on file.

A communication dated May 31 was received from the General Superintendent of Training Schools, submitting a statement showing the proposed distribution of the sum allowed for lecturers for 1912. It was resolved to approve for the current year of the division shown therein, provided the total cost does not exceed the appropriation available, namely, \$800; and it was further resolved to request the Comptroller to authorize the payment of Dr. Gregory and Dr. Hill for their services as Lecturers.

A communication was received from Dr. A. M. Shady, presenting a report of

the tuberculosis clinic at Harlem Hospital for the year 1911. The report was accepted with thanks, and authority granted to print and circulate it as in previous years.

A communication dated May 31 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, returning the specifications for the installation of radiographic apparatus in the new pathological building, with the request that it be submitted to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for approval.

A communication dated June 4 was received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, recommending that an advertisement be authorized for bids for forage for the remainder of the year, and showing the quantities required. This recommendation was adopted.

A communication dated June 4 was received from the Contract Clerk and Auditor, recommending that a request be made for the transfer of \$7.23 within the appropriations for 1911. This recommendation was adopted.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a statement of the estimated deficit in the appropriations for the current year, amounting to \$60,000. It was resolved that the statement be referred to the Finance Committee with power to ask for revenue bonds for this or such other amount as may be considered advisable by that Committee.

A communication dated May 27 was presented from McKim, Mead & White, relative to the subdivision of the contract for pavilions I and K, and involving a question as to the amount of Architects' fees. Referred to the Building Committee with power.

A communication dated June 4 was presented from Dr. M. S. Gregory, Resident Alienist, drawing attention to chapter 121 of the laws of 1912, requiring the Trustees to send ambulances for insane patients, and asking that additional ambulance facilities be provided therefor. This communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent with directions to make temporary arrangements at once to meet the situation so far as practicable, and to report on the additional ambulance facilities required.

Unfinished Business.

A communication dated May 20 was presented from Dr. James J. Walsh, Dean of the Fordham University Medical School, outlining a plan which was agreeable to the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital and which would meet the request of the college for better facilities for clinical instruction in Fordham Hospital. The plan provided that future appointments should be made only after a definite agreement with the candidate that he is to do teaching. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the arrangement outlined in the letter of Dr. Walsh, was approved, and it was resolved to request Dr. Walsh to submit suggestions in regard to the adoption of a rule governing the number of students to be admitted at one time and their hours.

Reference was made to the request of Dr. Blum that an Assistant Chaplain be appointed at Gouverneur Hospital, referred to in the minutes of January 2, 1912, funds therefor having been provided by the Board of Aldermen. This matter was referred to Mr. Stern for report.

The President stated that he had received a report from the Social Service Bureau in regard to the request of the Gramercy Neighborhood Association that a nursery be established for the children of mothers admitted to Bellevue Hospital. The report stated that the Bureau could not establish such a nursery, and the President submitted a copy of a letter which he had sent to the Association on this subject. The action of the President was approved.

New Business.

The President referred to the lack of regulation governing the absence of members of the house staff, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to prepare and submit rules on this subject.

The President referred to the need of screens and awnings throughout the hospitals, and of protecting guards on the loggias, and also to the presence of flies in the wards. The General Medical Superintendent reported that these matters were receiving attention on his part.

Synopsis of Proceedings.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, June 18, 1912. Present, Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees.

The minutes of the meeting of May 7, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved. Bills, amounting to \$22,232.67, were approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The following Nurses were sent to the Minturn Hospital suffering from diphtheria: From Bellevue Hospital, Hilda

Nylund, on June 10; from Harlem Hospital, Anna Hallahan on June 11, Jeanette Frazer on June 12, and Jennie McCormick on June 13.

A revision of schedules is asked for to permit of the following increases in salary, no additional funds being necessary: Miss Hyland, \$100, title changed to Dietitian; Mr. Dugan, Clerk, \$150; Miss Conlon, Stenographer, \$150; Miss Martin, Hospital Clerk, \$60; Miss McEneny, Hospital Clerk, \$120.

Action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The transfer to the Minturn Hospital of the Nurses named in the report was approved.

The proposed revision of schedules and the recommendations for increases in salary connected therewith were referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in the help at Bellevue Hospital for the two weeks ending June 1 and 8, and as these had already been reviewed by the Committee on Officers and Employees, they were approved.

Reports of Committees.

Mr. Robbins, on behalf of the Building Committee, reported upon the question of the subdivision of the contract of the John H. Parker Company, and submitted communications received from the Architects dated June 10 and 12, and recommended that the list received with the second letter referred to be adopted. This recommendation was adopted.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital recommended the creation of two additional places of Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician and the appointment of Dr. Frank Erdwurm and Dr. J. Ogden Woodruff to fill these places. The recommendations of the Conference Committee were adopted.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Solomon Beck as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients. This report was approved and Dr. Beck appointed accordingly.

Communications.

A communication dated June 1 was presented from Dr. Thomas F. Maguire, resigning from the place of Visiting Physician to Fordham Hospital. The resignation was accepted.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital held on June 4 were presented, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignation of Dr. Mark Cohn as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients was accepted; the nomination of Dr. Charles D. Bles as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients was referred to the Conference Committee; the statement in regard to the compulsory absence in court of members of the house staff was referred to the General Medical Superintendent; and it was agreed to sanction the offer of the Medical Board to inoculate against typhoid fever all employees of Fordham Hospital and to commend this action of the Medical Board.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital held on June 1 were presented. Dr. Edward Woods was dismissed from service on the house staff for leaving the hospital without consent, action to date from May 2, 1912; the resignation of Dr. Joseph B. Kantor as Assistant Physician to Out Patients was accepted; and the nomination of Dr. Samuel Moskowitz was referred to the Conference Committee.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital held on June 1 were presented. The statement therein in regard to the nursing service of the hospital was referred to the Joint Committee on Nursing Efficiency for recommendation and to the Committee on Officers and Employees for consideration in connection with the Budget for 1913; the nomination of Dr. Reece and the promotion of Dr. Osgood were referred to the Conference Committee.

Communications dated June 14 and 18 were received from Dr. Arthur M. Reich and Dr. Clarence J. Dalton, respectively, applying for the place of Resident Physician to the Children's Service at Bellevue Hospital. These applications were referred to the First Division for recommendation.

The minutes of a special meeting of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital held on June 17 were presented, together with a report of the Executive Committee, recommending the dismissal of Dr. DeSautelle for accepting money from a patient in Harlem Hospital, as referred to therein. On motion it was resolved to dismiss Dr. William T. DeSautelle from the house staff of Harlem Hospital, and to approve of the assignment of Dr. McKinley to the surgical service in place of Dr. DeSautelle and of the advancement of Dr. Somerville to ambulance surgeon from July 1, provided their terms of service are not shortened thereby.

A communication dated June 13 was received from the Corporation Counsel, stating that the Third Avenue Railroad Company had paid in full the claim of \$163 for

damages to an ambulance repaired by Charles Barry, and referred to in the minutes of February 20, 1912.

A communication dated June 17 was received from Philip Mertz, Inspector at Bellevue Hospital, requesting to be retired on a pension under chapter 669 of the Laws of 1912. It was resolved to endorse this application, and to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that Mr. Mertz be granted a pension.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of special Nurses, who had been authorized at Bellevue Hospital from June 5 to 18, and at Harlem Hospital from May 13 to June 15. The appointment of these Nurses was approved.

A communication dated June 11 was received from the Anderson-Martin Electric Company, transmitting assignment made by them in favor of I. P. Frink, amounting to \$898. Consent was granted to this assignment, without guarantee as to amount and expressly subject to any claim, setoff, or equity which The City of New York now has, or may hereafter have, against the moneys or any part thereof covered by said assignment.

A communication dated June 7 was received from R. F. Almirall, stating that, anticipating favorable action by the City on the request for funds for the extension of Fordham Hospital, he had proceeded with some drawings, and requesting that Dr. Goldwater be asked to confer with him in order to facilitate the completion of the plans. It was resolved to authorize Mr. Almirall to proceed with the plans and specifications for this work, and to ask Dr. Goldwater to confer with him for that purpose, provided that the Trustees or the City authorities will in no way be responsible for the services of Mr. Almirall unless an appropriation for the extension of Fordham Hospital is secured.

A communication dated June 5 was received from the Comptroller in regard to the payment of overtime to per diem employees, and stating that under no circumstances will overtime to these men be paid.

A communication dated April 30 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution authorizing the issue of revenue bonds amounting to \$337,500 to pay the salary of a Hebrew Chaplain for Gouverneur Hospital for the remainder of the present year.

A communication dated June 4 was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of resolutions amending the salary schedules for the month of May, and establishing the grade of Resident Physician (alcoholic wards), at \$600.

A communication dated June 6 was received from the four Engineers in charge of the day service in the hospitals of the Department, requesting an increase of salary. This request was referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees for consideration in connection with the Budget for 1913.



It shall be the duty of the Commissioners or managers of the principal, superintendent, or physician, of each and every hospital, public institution or dispensary, in this city, to report to the Department of Health, in writing, the full name, age and address of any person suffering from any one of the infectious diseases included in the list appended, with the name of the disease, within twenty-four hours of the time when the case is first seen:
 A—Communicable: Typhoid fever, influenza, lobar pneumonia, broncho-pneumonia, infectious diseases of the gastro-intestinal canal (dysentery, cholera morbus, cholera infantum, summer diarrhoeas of infants).
 B—Parasitic diseases of the skin: Scabies, tinea tonsurans, impetigo (contagious), favus.
 Note—In this list of diseases reporting is required by the Department of Health in order that data may be obtained for general and special investigation of the modes and sources of infection and as to the prevalence and distribution of these diseases. The Department of Health does not purpose to exercise a sanitary surveillance in these cases, but desires information with a view to the ultimate removal or improvement in the conditions which now foster them. Notification is required in certain of these diseases because of the liability to their extension among the children in schools.

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Municipal Building, Court House square, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 14th day of August, 1912.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in the City of New York, on the 22d day of October, 1912, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment or to either of them the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may, at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and ceilings of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, stinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All turrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as consulting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or householders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
