Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending October 18, 1873:
WEDNESDAY, October 15, 1873, }
9 1/2 o'clock, A. M. }

In pursuance of notice, the Commissioners and the Comptroller met for the purpose of publicly opening proposals for the stone and mason work, and also for the iron, carpenter's and painters work, of the out-set arch.

The several proposals received having been opened and read the Comptroller retired, and the Board organized in regular session at 10 o'clock A. M.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, stating that the Department had authority to designate a salary to be paid to the treasurer.

On the advice of the Counsel to the Corporation, the President was authorized to detail a sufficient force of the Park keepers to forcibly eject Mr. E. Herbert from the High Bridge Hotel.

A donation of a young lion by Thomas C. Durant, Esq., was accepted. The sidewalk of Stuyvesant Square, at Livingston place, between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets, was directed to be relaid and improved. The work now in progress at the Five Points Park was directed to proceed, in accordance with the proposed change of grade of said Park.

The Treasurer submitted a report showing a balance to the credit of the town of Kingsbridge of \$1,394 46, and to the credit of the general fund of \$32.

The landscape gardener was directed to examine the trees and planting in Tompkins Square, and to report a plan for their improvement.

The matter of granting permits to take photographs, sketches, &c., on the parks was referred to the President with power. On the report of the landscape architect, and as recommended therein, 4,000 young trees were directed to be purchased and grown in the nurseries of the Department for future use, the cost of same to be charged to construction.
