

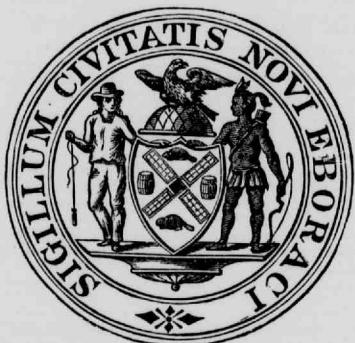

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
WEDNESDAY, October 31, 1877—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of the following call:

OFFICE OF THE MAYORALTY,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT—CITY HALL,
NEW YORK, October 29, 1877.

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Wednesday, October 31, 1877, at 12 o'clock M., for the purpose of transacting such business as may come before said Board.

The minutes of the meeting held October 23, 1877, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 31, 1877.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

After a careful scrutiny of every item of the Departmental Estimates and such reductions as appeared to be judicious and practicable, without impairing the efficiency of any branch of the city government, the Provisional Estimate has been adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1878.

The total amount of the appropriations made for 1878, are \$901,884.35, less than those for 1877, as shown by the following comparative tabular statement of the appropriations for all purposes in the Final Estimates for 1877, the amounts of the Departmental Estimates for 1878, and the amounts of appropriations allowed in the Provisional Estimate for 1878, viz.:

Assuming that the assessed valuations will remain unchanged in amount, and deducting \$2,500,000 for the estimated revenues of the General Fund for 1878 from the amount of the appropriations of the Provisional Estimate, and adding a sufficient amount for deficiency in the product of the taxes, the proximate rate of tax for the year 1878 may be now estimated not to exceed 2.55 per cent. The rate of tax for 1877 is 2.65 per cent.

And offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by section 112, of chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, and the amendments thereto, do, by the affirmative vote of all the members, hereby make the following Provisional Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the city and county of New York, in each Department, and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit: for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-eight (1878), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the city and county, which becomes due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the city and county of New York, in said year, to wit:

That no permit for driving cattle in the City of New York shall be granted to any person, save upon the condition that all such cattle shall be distinctly and legibly marked with a mark, sign or symbol approved by the Sanitary Superintendent, so as clearly to indicate the ownership thereof, and it shall be the duty of every person applying for, or using a permit to drive cattle in said city, to file with the Sanitary Superintendent a correct statement of the mark, sign or symbol employed by him, under the provisions of this ordinance.

Resolved, That the proposed ordinance on cattle driving, be made the special order for next meeting, Wednesday, November 7, and that all interested be invited to be present.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 20, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,803, as follows, viz.: 7 public buildings, 870 tenement-houses, 158 private dwellings, 39 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 41 slaughter-houses, 4 tripe-houses, 2 bladder dyeing establishments, 2 garbage and manure dumps, 1 bone and rag house, 1 dumping ground, 6 public sewers, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 48 yards, courts, and areas, 83 cellars and basements, 135 waste-pipes and drains, 157 privies and water-closets, 70 street gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 5 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 1 cess-pool, 10 violations of the Code, 50 other nuisances, together with 23 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 695.

During the past week 105 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 67 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

56 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 43 houses, 43 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One person sick with fever was removed to Hospital.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,804, as follows, viz.: 7 public buildings, 766 tenement-houses, 189 private dwellings, 35 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 21 stores and warehouses, 31 stables, 1 market, 63 slaughter-houses, 2 piers, 1 public sewer, 4 manure dumps, 3 lard rendering establishments, 46 milk inspections, 3 roadways, 1 dumping ground, 30 sunken and vacant lots, 57 yards, courts, and areas, 63 cellars and basements, 159 waste-pipes and drains, 123 privies and water-closets, 79 street gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 dangerous chimney, 1 piggery, 21 violations of the Code, 34 other nuisances, together with 32 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 634.

During the past week 90 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits have been issued to the consignees of 93 vessels, to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

87 permits have been granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the ninth day of October, 1877, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional sections and amendments of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 189. Whenever a nuisance in any place at or upon any premises in the City of New York, shall have been found or declared by resolution of the Board of Health to exist, and an order shall have been made directing the owner or lessee of such premises to make suitable and necessary repairs or improvements, or to abate the said nuisance, such repairs or improvements shall be made, and such nuisance shall be fully abated in the manner directed by the Board of Health, within five days after notice thereof.

Section 190. All sinks, basins, and stationary tubs in every hotel, lodging, tenement, or boarding-house in the City of New York, shall be provided with proper stretch traps directly under each sink, basin or stationary tub, so connected with the waste or soil-pipe, and so constructed as directed or approved by the Board of Health, and with the traps so adjusted as to prevent the escape therefrom of foul odors and gases.

Section 191. All privy vaults in the yard of any house in the City of New York, within twenty feet of any dwelling, shall be ventilated by means of an eight-inch earthenware pipe, laid at least six inches below the surface of the yard, from the said vault to the nearest wall of the building of the greatest altitude at or upon said premises, and there connected with a vertical metallic shaft of like diameter extending not less than two feet above the roof of such building. And every privy vault in the City of New York shall be ventilated in this way, unless a permit in writing specially excepting such vault, from the requirements of this ordinance be granted, and it be otherwise ordered by the Board of Health.

Section 192. Privy-vaults shall be ventilated and shall be constructed or repaired; and manure-vaults shall be covered, provided with drains, and built or repaired in the City of New York in accordance with directions from and orders made therefor by the Board of Health.

Section 193. The waste or soil pipe in every tenement or lodging house in the City of New York shall be ventilated by extending the same by means of a pipe of the same size to a height of not less than two feet above the roof of the building, or pursuant to the terms of a permit in writing from the Board of Health.
