

# THE CITY RECORD.

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### BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's office, at 2 P. M., on Wednesday, August 4, 1880.

The following members were present, viz.:—Edward Cooper, Mayor; John Kelly, Comptroller; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

Absent—James F. Wenman, President Department Public Parks.

The minutes of the meeting held May 18, 1880, were read and approved.

A call signed by all the members of the Board for the present meeting was read and ordered on file.

A certified copy of chapter 159, Laws of 1880, was then read and ordered on file.

Messrs. Franklin Edson, Alexander E. Orr, and William R. Foster, Jr., appeared on behalf of the Produce Exchange, and explained the necessity of closing Marketfield street and opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., August 5, 1880.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met pursuant to adjournment in the Mayor's office at 2 P. M., Thursday, August 5, 1880.

All the members were present except James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks, who was unavoidably absent.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by closing all that portion of Marketfield street, on both sides of which the New York Produce Exchange has acquired title to the land to be used by said Exchange for a new building, the said portion of Marketfield street being that part of said street commencing at Broadway and extending easterly from Broadway to a straight line, which is the prolongation in a southerly direction of a straight line drawn through a point on the southerly side of Beaver street, which is one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and a half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Broadway and Beaver street, and through a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, which is one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway, and propose, in accordance with the authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street, in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the city of New York," to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to close the said portion of Marketfield street, and to close the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Mayor offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open a new street to extend from Beaver street to Marketfield street, the westerly side of said new street to be a straight line extending from a point on the southerly side of Beaver street one hundred and fifty-four (154) feet two and one-half (2½) inches easterly from the southeast corner of Beaver street and Broadway to a point on the northerly side of Marketfield street, one hundred and forty-seven (147) feet ten (10) inches easterly from the northeast corner of Marketfield street and Broadway; the easterly side of said street be parallel with and twenty-five (25) feet easterly from its westerly side so that the said new street will be of the uniform width of twenty-five (25) feet; and the said Board, in pursuance of authority conferred by chapter 159 of the Laws of 1880, passed April 28, 1880, entitled "An Act to facilitate the erection of a new building by the New York Produce Exchange in the City of New York by authorizing the closing of Marketfield street, and the sale of a lot of land and building on Stone street in said city, the property of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York," propose to alter the map or plan of the City of New York so as to lay out and open the said street, and to lay out and open the same.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the aforesaid resolutions stating the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement in respect to closing a portion of Marketfield street, and in respect to opening a new street from Beaver street to Marketfield street, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that full notice of the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Resolved, That the Mayor be requested to transmit a copy of the aforesaid resolutions to the Board of Aldermen and to cause their publication in the CITY RECORD.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the said resolutions, which were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, all future meetings of the Board were directed to be called by order of the Chairman.

The meeting then adjourned.

### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

*Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held August 6, 1880.*

Present—Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman of Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Dock Department, one hundred and fifty

thousand dollars (\$150,000) Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties; the said amount being the balance of the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated June 2, 1880, for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

On motion, the resolution was adopted, all the Commissioners present voting in the affirmative.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 31, 1880. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,619, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 777 tenement-houses, 46 private dwellings, 45 other dwellings, 5 manufacturing and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 50 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 1 public sewer, 47 sunken lots, 90 yards, courts, and areas, 126 cellars and basements, 117 waste pipes and drains, 145 privies and water-closets, 16 street-gutters, 4 dangerous stairways, 4 chimneys, 1 cesspool, 12 other nuisances, together with 59 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 681.

During the past week 174 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 109 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

155 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 37 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 37 houses, 37 privy sinks, together with clothing and bedding.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 2,557 privies, 125 yards, 169 cellars, 152 garbage boxes, and 121 3-10 miles of street gutters.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 514 births, 44 still-births, 120 marriages, and 625 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 31, 1880; this shows a decrease of 72 births, and 16 deaths, and an increase of 9 still-births, and 19 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 24 births, 2 still-births, 17 marriage, and 11 deaths. Compared with the mortality during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; scarlatina, 1; whooping cough, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 24; cancer, 1; bronchitis, 4; heart diseases, 3; aneurism 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; premature and preterm births, 3; suicide, 1; drowning, 5; while the deaths from small pox increased 3; diphtheria, 4; croup, 3; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 40; pneumonia, 2; convulsions, 1; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, rheumatism and gout, and meningitis and encephalitis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 114 were in institutions, 320 in tenement houses, 177 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 131 on the first, 170 on the second, 116 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 622 were stated to be residents of New York City and 3 non-residents; 47 were stated to be single, 131 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 387 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 625; still-births, 44; bodies in transitu, 38; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 66 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 514 births, 120 marriages, 44 still-births, 625 deaths, 38 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 33 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 1 transcript of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 31, 1880, was 72.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.927, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 955, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.51 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 590 deaths and still-births, or 94.40 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 271; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 41; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Lutheran (undenominational), 93; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 43; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 12.

The actual mortality for the week ending July 24, 1880, was 649; this is 49 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 129.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.84 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,211,872.

AN ACT in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay, to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Section 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Section 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Section 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold.

Section 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment; provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Section 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Section 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
