

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all wester of mater.

mitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permitted in the first of that purpose. All first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.
Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneres or other buildings are strictly prohibited.
The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

DUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAI in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559. Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 920 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1883, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

18t. All eyracharges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1889, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters.

June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and reactions arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through

by meta-incasual building, or such part thereof as is supplied through metametaincase in the returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars [83] is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, he returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

In the manner as other charges for water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all

House-owners are further notified that whenever their
