DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held February 16, 1888.
Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.
The minutes of the executive meeting held February 10, 1888, were read and approved.
The report of Dock Master respecting the obstructions on bulkhead at Ninety-sixth street, North river, was referred to executive session.
The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7470, respecting the application of the New York, Lake Erie and Western Railroad Company for lease of one-half of Pier 8, East river, with permission to make certain improvements thereat, was referred to executive session.
The following communications were received, read, and
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From Comptroller of the City:
1st. Assenting to and approving of the deduction of \$50 from amount due Duncan A. Gillies

under Contract No. 255. The action of the President in notifying the Engineer-in-Chief was approved.

2d. Desiring to be informed if any changes have been made or are contemplated at ferry landing foot of Roosevelt street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Respecting the settlement of claim with private owners for dredging at Pier 14, East river. The Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

From Department of Street Cleaning:

1st. Reporting obstructions on Pier 46, East river. The Secretary directed to advise that the obstruction was removed on February 14th instant.

2d. Stating that permission had been granted to Brown & Fleming to use a part of the dumping-board at Nineteenth street, North river, and to John A. Bouker to use a part of the dumping-boards occupied by said Department at the foot of East Twenty-second street, East river.

From C. P. Huntington, lessee:

1st. Requesting permission to erect shed on Pier, new 37, North river, in accordance with plans and specifications.

2d. Requesting permission to place gangway bridges on Pier, new 37, North river, as shown on plan submitted.

3d. Requesting permission to place spring piles, a continuous chock and beveled fender on the sides and along the end of Pier, new 37, North river, as shown on diagram submitted. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Charles H. Tweed, Attorney Southern Pacific Company—Respecting merchandise on bulkhead between Piers, new 36 and 38, North river, and stating that it will be removed as rapidly as possible.

From West Shore Railroad Company—Requesting permission to repair Pier 5, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

From Peter Donnelly—Requesting berth at pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, for loading manure. The action of the President in issuing a permit to continue during the will of the Board, was approved.

From John Keating—Requesting permit for a temporary derrick on Pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

From A. B. Johnson & Co.—Requesting permit to erect an office building on the easterly line of First avenue, near the foot of East Ninety-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

From Department of Public Works—In reference to proposed exterior street from Sixty-fourth to Eighty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending February 11, 1888.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7482, furnishing the information desired by the Comptroller respecting ferry landing foot of Roosevelt street, East river. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

4th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7481, in reference to the application of C. P. Huntington, lessee of Pier, new 37, North river, for permission to place gangway-bridges on said pier. Permission granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with the plans submitted.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 7451, dredging required in the slip between West Thirty-eighth and West Thirty-ninth streets, North river, and recommending that the owners of both halves of the bulkhead be directed to dredge to fifteen feet depth at mean low water in front of their bulkheads, and that owners of Pier at West Thirty-ninth street be required to dredge to make fifteen feet depth at mean low water over half slip on south side of said pier.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7009, that he has been unable to secure any evidence as to who damaged the cluster of piles at Pier 59, East river.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7444, that he had directed and superintended changing termini of cable crossing and erection of cable boxes at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, Harlem river.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7418, that he had supervised dredging in the half slip adjoining the lower side of Pier 62, East river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7091, that he had supervised dredging at the easterly end of ferry bridge at the foot of Ninety-second street, East river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7462, that he had superintended repairing Pier 16, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7424, that he had superintended removing canal-boat sunk in slip between Piers, new 37 and 38, North river.

From Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master—Reporting dredging required westerly side of Pier 10, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From P. J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting sunken canal-boat at Thirty-ninth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Secretary to notify the owners to remove was approved.

From P. Curley, Dock Master—In reference to boilers on the bulkhead between Piers, new 28 and old 39, and also respecting the new made land between Piers, new 35 and 41, North river.

From P. J. Brady and E. Abeel, Dock Masters—Reporting that carts of the Department of Street Cleaning dumped snow on Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, and snow mixed with dirt off the bulkhead between Piers 18 and 19, East river. The action of the President in sending copies of said reports to the Department of Street Cleaning, was approved.

From David W. Bogert, Dock Master—Reporting spring pile loose on south side Pier, old 33, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7464, respecting the proposed improvement of ferry premises foot of Whitehall street, East river, by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, was,

On motion, referred back to the Engineer-in-Chief for further examination and report.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7468, respecting the acquiring of certain bulkhead or wharf property on the Harlem river, between Ninety-second and One Hundred and Ninth streets, was,

On motion, referred to Commissioner Marshall.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board on the 5th day of January, 1888, giving permission to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to occupy certain land under water belonging to the City, be amended to read, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to occupy a certain area of land under water belonging to the City of New York, amounting to eight thousand five hundred and ninety-eight square feet, situated between Piers, old 27 and old 28, North river, and at present covered by a platform, said permission to continue only during the will and pleasure of the Board of Docks, provided that the said company shall agree to pay, as compensation for the occupancy of such land under water, the sum of twenty-five cents per annum per square foot, to begin on January 1, 1888, payment to be made to the Treasurer of the Board of Docks at the expiration of every three months or for such time as the said New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company may occupy the premises referred to; and provided that all structures erected on said land under water shall revert to and become the property of the city on the revocation or termination of this permit; and further provided that the said New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company shall file an assent in writing within ten days from the date of this resolution to all the terms and conditions thereof.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7479, respecting the application of C. P. Huntington, lessee of Pier, new 37, North river, for permission to place spring piles, chocks and fenders along the sides and end of said Pier, was

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to C. P. Huntington, lessee of Pier, new 37, North river, to place temporary spring piles, chocks and fenders along the sides and end of said pier, the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, it being expressly agreed and understood that the said spring piles, chocks and fenders are to be and remain thereat only during the pleasure of this Board, and to be removed whenever ordered by the said Board; provided the said C. P. Huntington shall within five days from date hereof file in this office an agreement in writing to remove the same whenever ordered to do so by this Department.
