#### Sanitary Bureau.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 8, 1887:

There were 6,613 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 242 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police.

There were 248 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 86 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 10 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 53 permits.

The certificates of 747 births, 71 still births, 268 marriages and 633 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 8, 1887. This shows an increase of 84 births, 23 still-births and 24 marriages, and a decrease of 44 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 125 births, 15 still-births and 55 marriages, and the same number of deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 2; scarlatina, 1; whooling cough, 1; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 9; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrheal diseases, 17; manition, 3; cancer, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; bronchitis, 2; papolexy, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; while the deaths from crysipelas increased 2; heart diseases, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; Brights disease and nephritis, 15; premature and pretranatural births, 4, and suicide, 3. The number of deaths from small-pox, diphtheria, croup, alcoholism, rheumatism and gout, surgical operations and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 149 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 190 under two years, 248 under five years, and 40 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 29 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 39.18 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Deaths reported from Small-pox, Measles, Scarlatina, Diphtheria, Membranous Croup, Whooping Cough, Tiphus, Typhoid, Cerebro-Spinal, and Malarial Fevers, in Institutions, Tenement and other Dwellings, with Average Age, Floor, and Ward where the Death occurred, and the Hour of Death, for the week ending October 8, 1887.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 136 were in institutions, 338 in tenement-houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 113 on the first, 155 on the second, 85 on the third, 70 on the fourth, 39 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 620 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 13 non-residents; 84 were stated to be single, 180 married, 82 widowed, and the condition of 287 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 633; still-births, 71; bodies in transitu, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 747 births, 268 marriages, 71 still-births, 633 deaths; 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 146 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 93 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 8, 1887, was 60.3 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 20,749; the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 859, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.05 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 704 deaths and still-births, or 88.78 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 245; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 103; Greenwood (undenominational), 29; Lutterand (undenominational), 25; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 29; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 21; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending October 1, 1887, was 685; this is 26 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and 90.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.86 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,493,026.
