Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby directed to pay over to the Trustees of the Police Pension Fund, the sum of \$7,902 (receipts), in pursuance of section 3, chapter 389, Laws of 1878—all aye.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized and directed to pay \$10 for renewal of license of Anton Adler, Pilot of Police Steamboat, for one year, from April 4, 1882.

Resolved, That the proposal of the Scovill Manufacturing Company, to furnish buttons for police uniform coats and vests, be and is hereby accepted, said buttons to be sold in the Department of Clothing and Equipment for account of said company, and the proceeds accounted for to them by the Clerk in charge of said Department.

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be and he is hereby directed to advertise for proposals for fitting up Union Market building for the Eleventh Precinct Station-house, such advertisement to specify that no estimate for a sum in excess of \$6,000 can be considered.

Resolved, That the Committee on Repairs and Supplies report the name of a proper person to be designated and appointed by the Board as Superintendent of the work of building a side-wheel steamboat for the Police Department, in accordance with the contract and specifications for the same made with James D. Leary, February 14, 1882; also to report the amount of compensation to be paid said person.
