

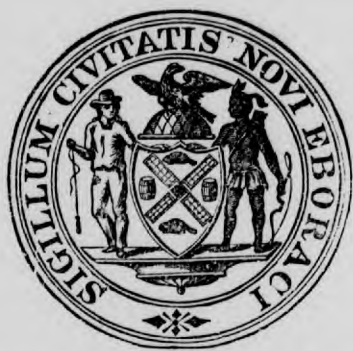

The Board met this day.

Report of Standing Committee.

From the Sanitary Committee—

Report upon alleged poisoning of persons engaged in the manufacture of artificial flowers, from lead and picric acid.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to reply to the communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated May 31, 1878, and to inform him that all fences constructed in accordance with the provisions of any ordinance of the Common Council, by or under the direction of the Department of Public Works, will be approved by this Board.

Resolved, That the consent of this Board be and is hereby given to the construction of a picket fence on and around the vacant lots in the block interlying Fifth and Madison avenues, Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets, New York City.

Resolved, That section 196 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 196. That it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee, or tenant of any vacant, sunken, or excavated lot in the City of New York, to keep the same at all times clean and inoffensive, and to provide around the same a proper fence so as to effectually prevent the throwing or depositing therein or thereupon any garbage or offensive thing whatsoever, and also to prevent persons passing from falling into such excavation.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Committee upon alleged poisoning of persons engaged in the manufacture of artificial flowers, from lead and picric acid, be forwarded to Coroner Moritz Ellinger.

Resolved, That copies of the reports of Sanitary Inspectors, upon the condition of certain street pavements, etc., be forwarded to the Department of Public Works, for the necessary action, as follows:

Resolved, That the application for relief from orders on premises south side of One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street and Madison avenue, be and is hereby denied, and the orders be enforced.

Resolved, That Order 4,216, on 253 and 255 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, be and is hereby extended to July 1, 1878.

Resolved, That the application for sewer in East Broadway, from in front of premises No. 5 westerly to and connect with the sewer in Oliver street, be and is hereby respectfully referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, with the request that for sanitary reasons a sewer be constructed in said street.

Resolved, That permit No. 761, to render fat at No. 90 Ninth avenue, be and is hereby revoked.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Post upon the condition of manure dumps at the foot of West Fifth and Fifty-seventh streets, be forwarded to the Police Department for the necessary action.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent on the filling in at the foot of East One Hundred and Fourteenth street, be forwarded to the Police Department with the request that the sanitary ordinance which prohibits the use of garbage as filling material, be enforced by said Board.

Resolved, That all permits to bring rough (unrendered) fat into New York be revoked.

Resolved, That the services of Samuel A. Goldschmidt, Ph. D., be and are hereby continued for one month longer.

Resolved, That the Counsel and Attorney be directed to discontinue all suits against citizens for non-compliance with orders, without cost, on proof from the Sanitary Bureau that the orders have been complied with.

Resolved, That C. E. Colby be and is hereby appointed Chemist to the Board during the absence of Elwyn Waller, at a salary at the rate of seventy-five dollars per month.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Works be respectfully requested to grant a permit to this Department to use water for washing wagons at the Disinfecting Depot, 128 Worth street.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be, and is hereby authorized and directed to issue a temporary permit to James Brooks, foot of West Fifty-fifth street, to burn shell lime, to be revoked by him upon evidence that a nuisance is created by transacting the business.

Resolved, That section 198 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 198. That on and after the 10th day of May, 1878, no cows or cattle shall be led or driven through or along any of the streets of that portion of the City of New York bounded by Fifty-seventh and Sixty-fourth streets, Tenth and Eleventh avenues, exclusive of these boundary streets and avenues, without a permit in writing from this Department, and in strict accordance with the routes, hours, and terms prescribed and designated therein.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following correction in the Register of Births:

Albert Reimond Wiedner, born May 13, 1874, in place of Albert Reimond Widner, the same being a clerical error.

Resolved, That the usual vacation of two weeks be granted to each of the officers and clerks of this Board, and that the Secretary, Sanitary Superintendent and Attorney be and are hereby authorized and directed to so arrange the vacations of the subordinates, respectively, that the business of this Department shall in no wise be interrupted, or its efficiency impaired by such leaves of absence.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby directed to communicate with the Department of Docks respecting the present dangerous condition of the night-soil dock at West Twenty-eighth street, to horses and carts on account of the rotten condition of the planking, and to respectfully request that the same be repaired.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 8, 1878. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,758, as follows, viz.:

4 public buildings, 679 tenement-houses, 209 private dwellings, 121 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 69 stables, 31 slaughter-houses, 25 fat-rendering establishments, 4 fertilizing works, 1 dyeing establishment, 4 public sewers, 6 manure dumps, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 lime kiln, 3 soap factories, 1 oil dock, 50 sunken and vacant lots, 48 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 145 waste-pipes and drains, 165 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 2 piggeries, 1 cesspool, 1 violation of the Code, 2 glycerine works, 1 stock yard, 1 dumping ground, 13 other nuisances, together with 57 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 664.

During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 100 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

144 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 28 houses, 28 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One person sick with typhoid fever, and one with scarlet fever were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending June 8, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 434 burial permits for city deaths, 13 for bodies in transit, and 39 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 434 deaths, 149 marriages, 507 births, 39 still-births, 13 applications for transit permits, and 55 returns from coroners. There were 40 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage and 33 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, June 8, 1878, 434 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city. This is a decrease of 20 as compared with the mortality of the preceding week, and 4 more than the number of deaths reported for the corresponding week of 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending June 1, was 431, which is 43.6 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 20.71 per 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,082,180.

During the week measles caused 5 deaths, scarlatina, 17; diphtheria, 19; whooping cough, 9; and typhoid fever, 1. The following diseases caused 20 deaths and upward during the week, viz.: Phthisis pulmonalis, 81; pneumonia, 35; diarrhoeal diseases, 32; diseases of the nervous system, 42; diseases of the heart, 20, and Bright's disease and nephritis, 26; compared with the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 16; diphtheria, 3; croup, 1; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 11; bronchitis, 10; pneumonia, 35; aneurism, 1; alcoholism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; while whooping-cough increased 4; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 17; inanition, 2; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; diseases of the heart, 4; marasmus and scrofula, 8; nervous diseases, 18; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; premature and preterm births, 1. From the returns of 37 of the principal foreign cities which this Bureau has been favored with during the past week, it will be seen that the death-rate of this city was lower than 30 of them. There were no deaths reported from small-pox in 24 cities of the United States, while in 13 of the foreign cities the fatality from this disease was 253. The 2 most fatal contagious diseases in Philadelphia were scarlatina (13), diphtheria (7); in Brooklyn, diphtheria (7), scarlatina (6); in London whooping cough caused 116 deaths; in Liverpool measles caused 13 deaths; in Dublin 15 deaths were caused by small-pox; in Paris 29 deaths were from diphtheria, 22 in Berlin, and 18 in Vienna; 116 deaths from small-pox occurred in Calcutta, 43 in London, 16 in Bombay, 8 in Vienna, 9 in Madras, 23 in Warsaw, and 14 in St. Petersburg.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 74 were in institutions, 215 in tenement houses, 136 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 88 were on the first floor, 131 on the second, 86 on the third, 35 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth; 428 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 45 were stated to be single, 113 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 212 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 427 deaths and still-births, or 90.27 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 7; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 178; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 51; Greenwood (undenominational), 32; Lutheran (undenominational), 72; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 24; Woodlawn (undenominational), 17; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 4; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending June 1, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 2; Third, 1; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 2; Seventh, 13; Eighth, 12; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 18; Eleventh, 20; Twelfth, 30; Thirteenth, 15; Fourteenth, 17; Fifteenth, 3; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 25; Eighteenth, 22; Nineteenth, 70; Twentieth, 40; Twenty-first, 29; Twenty-second, 33; Twenty-third, 6; Twenty-fourth, 6.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 8, was 62.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.818, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,026, and the total amount of rain-fall was .11 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
