

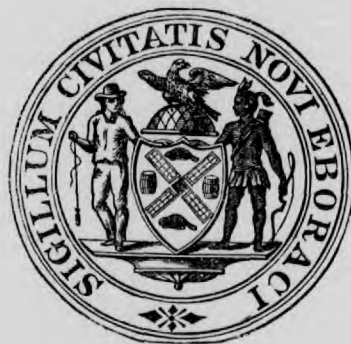

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held at the Mayor's Office, November 29, 1879.

Present—The Mayor and Comptroller.

A quorum not being present, on motion, adjourned to Tuesday next, December 2, 1879, at 1 o'clock P. M.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held December 2, 1879.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Nicholas Haughton, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held October 24 and October 31, 1879, were read and approved. The Mayor submitted a communication from the Commissioners of Docks, dated November 20, 1879, transmitting the following requisition for the issue of \$250,000 Dock Bonds, viz.:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by subdivision 11 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue 'Dock Bonds of the City of New York' for the amount of (\$250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks."

Whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of the act, chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time as he may deem necessary, to meet the requirements of the Dock Department, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) Dock Bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties; the said amount being on account of the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated November 20, 1879, for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

On motion, the resolution was adopted, the Mayor, Comptroller, Chamberlain, and Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen voting in the affirmative.

The following petitions were received and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller, viz.:

Petition of Jesse Baldwin, for "Correction Deed" of two lots of land on the easterly side of Fourth avenue and Fifty-fourth street, the common seal of the City of New York not being affixed to the deeds for said lots.

Petition of James F. and Mary Freeborn, executor and executrix under the last will and testament of William A. Freeborn, deceased, for deeds confirming the title of said William A. Freeborn to certain lands and premises, as set forth in said petition, purchased from the Corporation of the City of New York; the deeds of said lands and premises not being signed by the Mayor of the city.

Petition of Franklin Woodruff, for release of quit rent reserved on grant of land between high and low-water mark, on the Brooklyn shore, to Philip Livingston, August 15, 1764; the sum for the commutation of said rent having been paid to the city.

Petition of the Mercantile Safe Deposit Company, for deed of release and to confirm title to property on Sixty-first street, between Madison and Fourth avenues.

Notice of expiration of lease of premises Nos. 19 and 21 Elizabeth street was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

The Mayor submitted a communication from the Commissioners of Docks, transmitting the following preambles and resolutions, adopted November 13, 1879:

Whereas, The N. Y. Central and Hudson R. R. Company made application to this Board to reclaim certain lands under water between Sixtieth and Sixty-fifth streets, North river, for the improving of the terminal facilities of the company at that point; and

Whereas, This Department granted permission to said company, under date of May 28, 1874, to reclaim said premises, and to erect a bulkhead within the established bulkhead line of 1868, with the privilege of building two piers, one at Sixty-third, and one at Sixty-fourth streets, North river, extending westerly to the established exterior pier line of 1868; and

Whereas, The said company have now an application before this Board to extend the said terminal improvements northerly to Sixty-sixth street, and to erect another pier at Sixty-fifth street, North river, extending westerly to the said exterior pier line; and

Whereas, The plan for the location of piers on the North river, north of Sixty-first street, has never been adopted or established by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or by this Department; therefore

Resolved, That the plan for the location of the piers at the foot of Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, and Sixty-fifth streets, North river, as adopted by the Commissioners of Docks this date, be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

(Plan of location of piers, as above, filed.)

After a brief discussion of the subject, the following resolution, submitted by the Mayor, was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the accompanying communication from the Dock Department be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, with the request that he inform the Sinking Fund Commissioners, by Thursday next, whether subdivision 3 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, or other provisions of law, authorize this Board now to adopt the plan of proposed piers, as specified thereon.

On motion of the Mayor, the subject of leasing the plot of ground now occupied by Fulton Market, and the rebuilding of the market was taken up for consideration.

On motion, laid over to next meeting.

On motion, adjourned to Thursday next, 4th inst., at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Board of Health met this day.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That in response to the verbal communication of Commissioner MacLean of the Board of Police, this Board is of the opinion that section 98 of the Sanitary Code was not adopted with a view to prevent the reasonable or usual use of the public streets in the construction of buildings, or to interfere in any respect with the functions of the Department of Public Works in the issue of permits as provided by the city ordinances.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of November, 1879, when approved by the Finance Committee shall be duly signed by the President and Secretary and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Resolved, That requisition be and the same is hereby made upon the Comptroller for the following sum of money, which is required to enable the Board of Health to pay to the Board of Police the amount of the salaries of thirty policemen detailed to the service of the Board of Health, pursuant to the provisions of section 5, chapter 504, Laws of 1879; salaries of thirty policemen from November 1 to November 30, 1879, inclusive, thirty days, \$2,958.60.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of one hundred and eighty-two dollars and ninety-four cents from the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1879, entitled "Fund for Small-pox Hospital and Care of Contagious Diseases," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the same title of appropriation for the year 1878, which is insufficient.

Resolved, That the following orders be and are hereby suspended, as follows:

Premises 259 West Forty-seventh street, until April 1, 1880.

Premises 857 Sixth avenue. Referred to Sanitary Superintendent for examination by Sanitary Engineer.

Premises 505 West Fifty-fourth street, until inspected by President and Commissioner Janeway.

Premises 771 Ninth avenue, until inspected by President and Commissioner Janeway.

Premises 22½ Catharine street, until inspected by President and Commissioner Janeway.

Premises 632 Tenth avenue, until inspected by President and Commissioner Janeway.

Resolved, That George W. Gay be and is hereby appointed Assistant Sanitary Inspector, at the rate of \$60 per month, and assigned to duty on the Tenement-house Corps.

Resolved, That the application of Anthony McQuade, to construct the light-shafts on the first floors of the four houses on the south side of Seventy-fifth street, between Third and Lexington avenues, and also to connect the cold air-boxes from the bottom of said light-shafts before reaching the street, be and is hereby granted.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Births:

Maiden name of mother DeBruyn, the same being omitted: father's birth-place La Guayra, Venezuela, instead of Holland, the same being clerical errors.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 193) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses proposed to be built on the northeast corner of Broadway and Thirty-seventh street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Messrs. D. & J. Jardine, provided the balcony designated thereon between the buildings be one story only in height, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 297-3) for light and ventilation of five tenement-houses proposed to be built on the south side of Fifty-seventh street, 125 feet west of Ninth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by T. G. Smith, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 297-4) for light and ventilation of five tenement-houses proposed to be built on the south side of Fifty-seventh street, 125 feet west of Ninth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by T. G. Smith, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 212-2) for light and ventilation of three tenement-houses proposed to be built at Nos. 460-464 West Twentieth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by James P. Niblo, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 313) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, sixty-two feet east of Eighth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Alva S. Walker, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 314-1) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 240 West Thirty-fourth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Joseph M. Dunn, provided fifteen feet of the lot be left in the rear, without diminishing any of the air shafts designated thereon, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 314-2) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built at No. 240 West Thirty-fourth street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Joseph M. Dunn, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 317) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses on the west side of First avenue, fifty feet south of Fifty-third street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Michael Murray, provided each of the air shafts be made at least two feet wide, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 318) for light and ventilation of two tenement-houses proposed to be built at Nos. 260 and 262 West Forty-seventh street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by William Graul, provided the light shafts be at least two feet wide, with twelve square feet area for each house, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 319) for light and ventilation of the tenement-house proposed to be built on the northeast corner of Fifty-sixth street and Fourth avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Messrs. Thom & Wilson, be and is hereby disapproved.

Resolved, That the plan (No. 320) for light and ventilation of five tenement-houses proposed to be built on the south side of East One Hundred and Fourth street, 220 feet east of Lexington avenue, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by John C. Burne, be and is hereby approved.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 22, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,939, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 924 tenement-houses, 143 private dwellings, 105 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 14 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 1 garbage dump, 12 manure dumps, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 4 lodging-houses, 1 railroad tank, 17 sunken and vacant lots, 1 stream, 1 dyeing establishment, 1 public sewer, 1 fertilizing works, 57 cellars and basements, 14 waste-pipes and drains, 239 privies and water-closets, 74 yards, courts, and areas, 22 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, together with 34 other nuisances, and 70 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 897.

During the past week 70 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 44 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

150 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 54 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 52 houses, 52 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 471 births, 45 still-births, 164 marriages, and 471 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 22, 1879. This shows a decrease of 23 births, 97 marriages, and 32 deaths, and an increase of 7 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 45 births, 35 still-births and 10 deaths, and a decrease of 2 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 1; whooping cough, 1; puerperal diseases, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 19; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 9; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; apoplexy, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; premature and pretermatural births, 5; surgical operations, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 9; diphtheria, 10; croup, 5; erysipelas, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; convulsions, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; suicide, 1; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, heart diseases, gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis was the same as that reported for past week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 96 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 150 under two years; 198 under five years, and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age were 19 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 42.04 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 63 were in institutions, 268 in tenement houses, 120 in houses containing 3 families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 96 on the first, 125 on the second, 90 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 465 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents. 49 were stated to be single, 124 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 244 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 471; still-births, 45; bodies in transitu, 26. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 42 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 471 births, 164 marriages, 45 still-births, 471 deaths, 26 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 22 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 22, 1879, was 37.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.85, the mean humidity was 86, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,434, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.45 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
