## BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, October 4, 1876.

The Board of Education held a stated session, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, on Wednesday afternoon, 4th inst., at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—William Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Fuller, Goulding, Halsted, Kane, Kelly, Klamroth, Place, Schell, Traud, Walker, West, Wetmore, and Wilkins—16.

Absent—Commissioners Caylus, Dowd, Hazeltine, Mathewson, and Vermilye—5.

The minutes of the preceding stated and special sessions were approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several wards :

From the Eighth, Ninth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, and Twenty-third Wards, asking to excuse absence of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Trustees of the Fifth Ward, for additional teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Tenth and Seventeenth Wards, relative to pianos. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

From the Fourth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-fourth Wards, relative to furniture for class-rooms, etc. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

From the First and Fifth Wards, asking for additional teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Seventeenth Ward, relative to steam heating apparatus for Grammar School No. 19. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

From the Sixteenth Ward, relative to the appointment of a Janitor for Grammar School No. 11. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Thirteenth Ward, relative to the employment of married women as teachers. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

From the Fourth Ward, to have roofs of school buildings examined and repaired. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Seventeenth Ward, nominating teachers for Evening Schools. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Sixteenth, Nineteenth, Twenty-third, and Twenty-fourth Wards, asking for appropriations to pay sundry bills, for work on school buildings, etc. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Folger, J.—The views expressed in the kindred case of *The People vs. Tappen* are decisive of this. No moneys can be taken from the City Treasury, save by the check of the Chamberlain upon the warrant of the Comptroller, countersigned by the Mayor. No such warrant can be so signed and countersigned, save upon vouchers for the expenditure of the amount named therein. The papers do not show that any vouchers of that sort were presented to the Comptroller. He was not therefore compelled to draw and sign a warrant.

Reports from Standing Committees were presented, as follows :

By Commissioner Place, from the Committee on Nomination of Trustees, nominating Mr. Germain Hanschel for Trustee of Common Schools in the Twelfth Ward. Adopted.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nautical School, stating that Wm. H. Whittle, one of the pupils on the School-ship St. Marys, on the 26th of September, overboard, from the foremast cross-tree, and was rescued by two of his shipmates, who jumped overboard and saved him from drowning. The Superintendent submitted the following resolution :

Whereas, Alexander Wadsworth and A. R. Warren, pupils of the Nautical School in charge of this Board, did, on the 26th of September last, in the harbor of Newport, promptly rescue from drowning Wm. H. Whittle, an associate in said school, who was seriously injured while performing his duties, by a fall from the foremast cross-trees of the ship St. Marys ; there-

Resolved, That this Board highly appreciate the bravery and promptitude of Alexander Wadsworth and A. R. Warren, pupils of the Nautical School, in rescuing their disabled comrade from drowning in the harbor of Newport, and hold them worthy of recognition by the friends of humanity, in this and other communities, for the manliness of their action.

Commissioner Klamroth moved to add the following :

That the two pupils of the Nautical School on board the St. Marys, referred to in the Committee report, be commended for their noble and manly conduct, in the name of the Board of Education, before the assembled school, by the Chairman of the Committee on Nautical School, and a copy of these resolutions be presented to each of the two pupils named in the Committee report.

The report and resolution were unanimously adopted.

Commissioner West presented the report of the Committee on By-Laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to establishing a school for truants. Adopted.

Also, relative to certain bills of 1869, 1870, 1871, and 1872, recommending payment.

Also, recommending payment by the Comptroller of the claim and judgment in the case of G. W. Butt for \$132.68. Adopted.

Commissioner Baker presented a report from the Auditing Committee, recommending payment of sundry bills for incidental expenses. Adopted.

Also, recommending payment of bill of John B. McLean, for printing. Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, nominating Miss Mary S. Ketcham for Principal, and Miss Jane E. Beecher for Vice-Principal of Primary School, Grammar School No. 31. Adopted.

Commissioner Traud presented the report of the Committee on Warming and Ventilation, recommending the appropriation of \$756, for heating apparatus, etc., in the Nineteenth Ward, referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Kain presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, stating teachers for the Evening School in the Nineteenth Ward. Adopted.

Commissioner Beardslee presented reports from the Finance Committee, as follows :

Adverse to paying certain bills for the Nineteenth Ward by special appropriation. Adopted.

To appropriate \$168 for a tank for Grammar School No. 64. Adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and, under chapter 477, section 1, Laws of 1875, to complete the storage reservoirs, and to maintain, now under construction in Putnam County, and to secure the right to draw from the natural lakes in Putnam and Westchester Counties, to assist in maintaining a full supply and wholesome water for the City of New York, and to make such excavations, dams, and he may deem necessary or expedient in drawing water from and protecting said lakes ; to make such surveys and examinations as he may deem necessary to make intelligible reference to the Mayor and Common Council of the City of New York, in reference to procuring a never-failing supply of pure and wholesome water for the City of New York ; and the action heretofore taken by the Commissioner of Public Works to secure a supply of water from the natural lakes in Putnam and Westchester Counties is hereby ratified, approved, and concurred in.
