

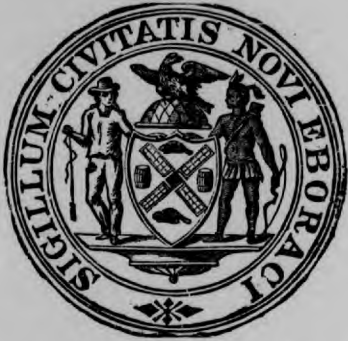

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks, held Friday, January 14, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—President Cram and Commissioners Murphy and Meyer.

The minutes of the meetings held January 6 and 6, 1898, were approved.

Daniel Lord, attorney for Oceanic Steam Navigation Company (Limited), Cunard Steamship Company (Limited) and Wilson Line of Steamers, appeared and presented an application requesting that the sheds on the five new piers now being constructed between West Eleventh and Gansevoort streets, North river, be built by the City, the companies to pay an additional rental to be agreed upon.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer.

The application of James Thedford for permission to occupy premises foot of West Seventy-seventh street, North river, for the storage of coal, was referred to the Treasurer and Commissioner Meyer to examine and report.

The application of the Albany Day Line for permission to berth steamer at the foot of West Forty-sixth street, was referred to the Treasurer with power.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 17730, submitting cost of relaying pavement north of Pier, new 13, North river, \$59.47, was referred to the Treasurer for collection from the Consolidated Gas Company.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Department of Sewers, to place a trap in the deck of each of the Piers at the foot of Rivington and Grand streets, East river.

Shanley & Ryan, to dredge at the temporary platform foot of Delancey street, East river.

The following permit was granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Department of Street Cleaning, to dump clean snow and ice from the bulkhead between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river; bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, North river, and bulkhead between Jackson and Corlears streets, East river, provided the consent of the owners is obtained.

The following permits were granted under the usual terms:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to make general repairs to Piers, old 8, 12, 13, 14 and 15, North river, during the ensuing six months.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to land two reels of wire on the bulkhead at West Forty-fourth street, North river.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Finance Department—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 613, for preparing for and building cribwork bulkhead extension at Riker's Island, East river.

2d. Requesting that the weekly pay-rolls be transmitted to the Civil Service Supervisory and Examining Boards not later than the Monday morning following the term of service. Secretary directed to state that said request will be complied with.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. In relation to the lease of ferry premises foot of Ninety-ninth street, East river, to the New York and College Point Ferry Company.

2d. Advising that the Board of Docks has no authority to make a reduction in the rental paid by the New York and Texas Steamship Company for the easterly half of Pier 20; westerly half of Pier 21, and bulkhead between, East River.

3d. Inclosing communication from Seward Baker, Special Counsel, relative to the ownership of strip of land along the westerly shore of Pelham Bay, and suggesting that this Board enter into possession thereof by erecting a fence around same and placing a watchman in charge.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to take possession of the property, erect a fence around same and to place a watchman in charge in accordance with the opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation.

4th. In relation to applications made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for grants on the Long Island shore, on the East river, opposite Blackwell's Island, and also in Hell Gate, opposite Ward's Island, and transmitting forms of terms and conditions to be incorporated in riparian grants. Secretary directed to transmit said forms to the Commissioners of the Land Office and to request that same be embodied in future grants.

5th. Transmitting certified copies of bills of costs in three proceedings for the acquisition of property for the improvement of the water front between Bank and Bethune streets, North river; between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, North river, and between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, Harlem river, and requesting that requisitions be drawn in favor of the persons named therein. Chief Clerk directed to prepare requisitions.

6th. Advising that all wharfage in the City of Brooklyn due prior to January 1, 1898, should be transmitted to the Comptroller of the City of New York as soon as collected.

From the Health Department—In relation to the box sewer system now in use by this Department, with report of Engineer-in-Chief thereon.

From the Police Department—Reporting dangerous condition of the bulkhead between Jackson and Corlears streets, East river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the owners of said bulkhead that if repairs thereto are not made within ten days, the premises will be fenced off by this Department.

From the Supervisor of the City Record—Requesting list of employees in this Department, together with position, residence and compensation of each, for publication in the CITY RECORD. Secretary directed to furnish.

Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the Borough of Brooklyn—Stating that said Department has a number of maps, plans, etc., relative to piers and docks which will be transmitted to this Department on proper requisition.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request that same be transmitted to this office at once.

From W. E. Belknap, Engineer of the Wallabout Improvement—Inclosing lease of the temporary offices used by him at Wallabout Market, Borough of Brooklyn, which expired January 6, 1898, and suggesting that said offices be retained.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise whether it is proper for this Board to enter into a lease of said premises.

From George B. Marx and Henry Schnier, sureties—Consenting to the extension of time to January 3, 1898, on Contract No. 599, for furnishing and delivering small cobble and rip-rap stones.

From the Civil Service Reform Association—Stating that notice of all appointments, removals or change of salaries in this Department should be transmitted to the CITY RECORD within one week after they are made. Secretary directed to state that all laws have been, and will in the future, be complied with by this Board.

From R. H. Hood—Calling attention to error in Item No. 1, of the Engineer's Estimate of Quantities, on Contract No. 622, for building recreation structure on Pier, new 43, North river, together with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief thereon.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to furnish the additional timber to said contractor.

From Borden & Lovell—Requesting cancellation of charge for the use of land under water at the easterly end of Pier 28; bulkhead southerly thereof, and on the south side of Pier, new 18, North river.

On motion, the charge for land under water for platform south of Pier, old 28, was cancelled from January 4, 1898; for land under water for extension to Pier, old 28, from January 4, 1898, and for platform and shed north of Pier, old 28, from December 20, 1897.

From Moore & Packard—Stating that temporary launching way at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, Harlem river, has been removed.

On motion, the permit granted October 21, 1897, was revoked.

From Cornelius O'Grady—Requesting an extension of time on Contract No. 610.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of paving in the vicinity of Piers, new 22 and 23, North river, under Contract No. 610, Cornelius O'Grady, contractor, be and hereby is extended to January 8, 1898, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From Willard Hawes & Co.—Requesting permission to place gate in the fence on the Pier foot of East Eighth street.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Willard Hawes & Co. to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, the south side of Pier foot of East Eighth street, provided that the consent of the owners is first obtained, and provided also that the said Willard Hawes & Co. and the said owners file in this Department a written agreement, to be approved by this Board, to indemnify and save harmless the Department of Docks and Ferries and the City of New York from all claims for damages arising from said occupancy.

From the Erie Railroad Company—

1st. Requesting permission to extend ferry-rack on the south side of Pier, new 20, North river.

On motion, permission was granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by this Board.

2d. Requesting permission to erect a two-story shed on the bulkhead between Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Erie Railroad Company, to erect and maintain during the pleasure of the Board, a shed on the bulkhead extending from the southerly side of Pier, new 20, to the northerly side of Pier, new 21, North river, extending fifty feet inshore from the westerly side of said bulkhead, in accordance with the statutes in such cases made and provided, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by this Board; said shed to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Commissioner Meyer—Reporting on the request of Jere Pangburn, Jr., that Barrow street, Pier 43, be left open to commerce. Secretary directed to transmit copy of report to said Pangburn.

From the Secretary—In relation to the reported discharge of the Dock Masters heretofore employed along the water front of the Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise this Board whether it has authority to appoint Dock Masters in the places of those discharged.

From the Assistant Dock Superintendent—Report for the week ending January 8, 1898.

From Dock Master Harrison—Reporting the building of a ferry rack and the widening of the landing platform on the westerly side of the Staten Island Ferry without a permit.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Engineer and Superintendent of Public Buildings of the United States, that permits must be obtained from this Board before any work along the water-front is proceeded with.

From Dock Master Bancker—Stating that the steamers "Peekskill" and "Fannie Woodall" have stopped landing at Pier, old 42, North river. Permits revoked, to take effect at once.

From Dock Master Gerry—Reporting that the steamer "Rosendale" discontinued her trips from the Pier foot of East Thirty-first street on the 8th instant. Permit revoked, to take effect January 8, 1898.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the week ending January 8, 1898.

2d. Submitting letter from W. E. Belknap, Engineer of the Wallabout Improvement, in relation to the construction of a recreation shed on the Pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to supervise the work along the water-front of the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and to have surveys made where necessary.

3d. Submitting plans of the proposed changes in the lines of piers from Little West Twelfth to West Twenty-second street, North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board deems it advisable to discontinue or change the lengths, widths and locations of the nine piers from between Little West Twelfth street and West Twenty-second street, North river, from the lengths, widths and locations thereof, as made by the Board of Docks May 20, 1897, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 14, 1897, as follows:

The proposed change in lines involves the substitution of eight piers in place of the nine piers shown on the present plan. The southerly pier of this series is to be at a distance of 200.55 feet northerly along the said bulkhead line from the northerly side of the pier at Bloomfield street, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund June 14, 1897. It will extend from the bulkhead line established in 1897, to the aforesaid pierhead line parallel with and 200 feet distant northerly from the said pier at Bloomfield street, with a width of 60 feet and with a length on the northerly and southerly sides of 802.22 feet. The next pier northerly of the said southerly pier of this series will lie 360 feet northerly along the bulkhead line from the northerly side of the said southerly pier. It will be 60 feet wide, and will extend from the said bulkhead line established in 1897, and at right angles therewith, westerly to the aforementioned pierhead line, and will be 800 feet long. Between these two piers four ferry slips will be provided with a bulkhead platform 200 feet in width extending parallel with the said bulkhead line, and from the northerly side of the southerly pier of this series to the southerly side of the next northerly pier.

The next five piers to the northward will each be 125 feet wide and 800 feet long, and will extend from the bulkhead line established in 1897, and at right angles therewith, westerly to the aforesaid pierhead line parallel with each other, and with intervening slips 250 feet wide. The northerly pier, within the said limits of the proposed change, is described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the southerly side of West Twenty-second street, where the bulkhead line established in 1897 intersects the same, running thence southerly along said bulkhead line 44.57 feet; thence westerly and at right angles with said bulkhead line 800 feet to the pierhead line as modified by the Secretary of War May 18, 1897; thence northerly 60 feet along said pierhead line; thence easterly 501.22 feet on a line parallel with and distant 60 feet northerly from the second mentioned course; thence northerly and parallel with the said bulkhead line 100 feet to the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of West Twenty-second street; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation and along the said southerly side of West Twenty-second street 320.31 feet to the point or place of beginning.

All of which is shown on the plan submitted herewith, in duplicate, by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby requested to consent to and approve the change in the length, width and location of the piers between Little West Twelfth street and West Twenty-second street, North river, as above set forth.

4th. Reporting dangerous condition of Pier 19, East river, and recommending that same be fenced off from further use until such time as a new pier is built thereat. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Recommending that the State Prison authorities be requested to furnish a catalogue or list of such supplies and materials as they can furnish or propose to furnish for the ensuing year, and that other material not contained in said proposed catalogue or list be purchased from other parties, and that the Comptroller be requested to allow the bills therefor to take the usual course without the necessity of further certificates from the prison authorities. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that repairs be made to Bloomfield street Pier 58; to pavement adjoining the West Fifty-fifth Street Pier; bulkhead between West Seventy-ninth and Eightieth streets, North river; approach to Pier foot of East Seventy-sixth street, and to Piers foot of East Ninety-first and Ninety-fifth streets. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the lessee be directed to repair the northerly side of Pier 61, East river. Recommendation adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to proceed with the improvement of the water front under the new plan at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending January 12, 1898, amounting to \$22,319.87, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The first division of the Fire Department shall consist of the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Battalions, under the command of a Deputy Chief of Department (with Headquarters at No. 155 Mercer street), who will have charge of and be responsible for the work of the force at fires occurring within the following boundaries, to wit: All stations lying on and south of Thirteenth street, between the East and North rivers.

"Sec. 2. The second division of the Fire Department shall consist of the Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Battalions, under the command of a Deputy Chief of Department (with Headquarters located at No. 165 West Twenty-ninth street), who will have charge of and be responsible for the work of the force at fires occurring within the following boundaries, to wit: All that part of the city lying north of Thirteenth street and on and south of Forty-third street, between the East and North rivers.

"Sec. 3. The third division of the Fire Department shall consist of the Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Fourteenth Battalions, under the command of a Deputy Chief of Department (with Headquarters at No. 235 West Fifty-eighth street), who will have charge of and be responsible for the work of the force at fires occurring within the following boundaries, to wit: All that part of the city lying north of Forty-third street, between the North and East rivers and Long Island Sound.

"Sec. 4. During the absence of the Deputy Chief in charge of the first division, the Deputy Chief in charge of the second division will locate at the Headquarters No. 155 Mercer street, and perform duty in the first division during the absence of the Deputy Chief in charge of that division.

"During the absence of the Deputy Chief in charge of the second division, the Deputy Chief in charge of the third division will locate at the Headquarters, No. 165 West Twenty-ninth street, and perform fire duty in the second and third divisions.

"During the absence of the Deputy Chief in charge of the third division, the Deputy Chief in charge of the second division will perform duty in the second and third divisions, without changing quarters."

"The Deputy Chiefs will notify each other of any absence from duty."

"During the absence of the Chief of Department, the executive duties will be assumed and performed by the Senior Deputy Chief of Department, who will also be in charge of the School of Instruction, and through whom all papers relating to the same will pass for approval or otherwise."

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Delivery will be required to be made from time to time, and in such quantities as may be directed by the said Commissioner.
