18,700 feet (3.331 miles) of overhead wire were removed from various streets and avenues.
3,025 certificates for interior wiring were issued.
Certificates were granted for the installation of 98,373 new incandescent lights, 718 arc lights, 24 generators of a total of 430 k. w. capacity, 1,420 motors of a total of 7,497½ h. p. capacity. 13,495 inspections were made on above work.

A new map of the streets and parks of Manhattan, on a scale of 400 feet to the inch, has been completed as far north as One Hundred and Tenth street, showing all arc lights and gas lamps.

3,653 meters have been approved, tested and sealed during the quarter.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES,
BUREAU OF REPAIRS AND SUPPLIES, NOS. 13 TO 21 PARK ROW,
NEW YORK, October 20, 1899.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending September 30, 1899:

CRIMINAL COURT BUILDING.

The usual orders were renewed for cleaning glass in doors and windows. Plumbers' and carpenters' supplies, supplies for cleaning purposes, and engineers' and electrical supplies were furnished. Two barrels soap powder, 1 barrel engine oil and 1 barrel disinfectant also furnished. To clean the marble figures in the above building, a galvanized iron tank with steam gauge, pipe, cocks and air-pumps complete was furnished. One Moss & Dexter valve receding outfit No. 6 was furnished and set up complete. The large iron gates at entrance doors of above building on Centre and Elm streets were entirely overhauled and repaired, and put in first class order. At Boilers 3 and 4 the centre walls and side walls were taken down and rebuilt, side and bridge walls were relined, and new brick archways, where required, were built. The following repairs were made to elevators:

No. 1. New gear wheel and spindle of cut-off furnished.
No. 3. New cable of cut-off furnished.
No. 5. Main piston and valves repacked.
Supreme Court, Criminal Term—One 16-inch electric motor fan properly installed was furnished and put in complete.

Court of Special Sessions—A supply of law books, 2 New York city directories and 4 tin boxes were furnished; 2 galvanized iron were placed as directed on ventilators in above court.

Court of General Sessions of the Peace—A supply of law books was furnished. In Parts II. and III. of above court the ceilings and side walls were washed off, ceilings painted and decorated and side walls painted four coats, best quality Atlantic lead ground in linseed oil being used. All woodwork in above rooms were cleaned off and polished.

Coroner's Office—1 medical register, 1 business directory and 1 city directory were furnished. Civil Service Commission—A supply of law books, 2 dozen "Shannon" binding cases with indexes, and 2 six-drawer cabinets with index cards furnished.

District Attorney's Office—1 Remington typewriting machine, 1 roll-top typewriter desk, 1 revolving typewriter chair, 5 city directories, 3 Brooklyn directories, 3 copartnership and 3 directories of selected names were furnished.

COUNTY COURT-HOUSE.

The usual orders for steam supply were renewed. Cleaning and engineer's supplies, including soap powder and machinery oil, furnished. The order for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above building were renewed. The 4 large water-tanks in cock-loft of above building were scraped, cleaned and painted.

Supreme Court—In Part IV. of above court ceiling, walls and ironwork were washed off, ceiling kalsomined, tinted in colors, panels decorated, walls and ironwork painted two coats of best quality paint. All woodwork was cleaned off and varnished and dado painted in panels, grained and varnished. Two quarters of New York "Law Journals" were bound in sheep and black cloth; 19 city directories were furnished.

Surrogate's Court—6 city directories and 1 business directory furnished; 7 electric-motor fans, with necessary wiring, etc., complete, were furnished and put up.

County Clerk's Office—A supply of law books furnished.

CITY HALL.

The usual orders for supplying steam to above building and cleaning glass in windows and doors were renewed. Cleaning supplies were also furnished. Worthington pump in above building was entirely overhauled and repaired, new parts replacing defective and worn parts, 1 directory for reporters' room was furnished.

President of Borough of Manhattan—One window shade and 1 circle top was furnished and put up. Also 1 window-shade repaired. About 13 feet of mahogany partition, similar design and height of present partition, was furnished and erected in above office, and door was placed in partition to connect the two rooms.

City Clerk's Office—Two electric-motor fans with wiring, etc., complete, were furnished and installed in above office, 1 Remington No. 7 typewriting machine furnished and two newspaper racks with files furnished.

Mayor's Office—Two city directories, 1 Brooklyn directory and 1½ dozen clean towels, weekly, furnished.

BROWN STONE BUILDING.

The order for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above building were renewed and the usual cleaning supplies were furnished. In boiler room of above building arches and bridge walls were rebuilt, sides of furnace were relined and arches and back walls were taken down and rebuilt. 11 grate bars, 1 dead plate, 1 ash hole, 1 hand-hole plate and 2 arch plates were furnished and set in place as directed. Window shades of above building were repaired.

HALL OF RECORDS.

Order was renewed for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above building, and the usual cleaning supplies were furnished. Six dozen bottles of typewriter oil, 50 oil cans, and volume 1 and 2 of Atlas, Borough of Manhattan, 3 city directories, 2 business directories, and 2 Brooklyn directories were furnished.

HARLEM COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies, including soap powder, disinfectant and machinery oil, were furnished.

WEST FIFTY-FOURTH STREET COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies, including soap powder, disinfectant and machinery oil, were furnished.

The two pumps in above court-house were entirely overhauled and repaired and put in first-class order.

SEVENTH DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies, including soap powder, disinfectant and machinery oil, were furnished.

One dozen large earthenware cuspidors were furnished. Closets, urinals, sinks, etc., were removed from top floor of above court-house to first floor, and same reset and properly connected.

THIRD DISTRICT COURT-HOUSE.

Seventeen grate bars similar to those in use were furnished and set in grate under boiler as directed.

MARKETS.

Fulton—At Tower, Fulton and South streets, the gutters and valleys were relined and painted and slate roof repaired. Old skylight over Stand 8 was removed and replaced with new 5 feet 6 inches by 5 feet 6 inches galvanized-iron skylight with louvers all around, 2 feet 6 inches high with hip skylight over top, glazed with ¼-inch glass. Old skylight was entirely overhauled and repaired. Defective tin on roof of above market was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

West Washington Market—The steel rolling shutters at above market were entirely overhauled, repaired and put in first-class order.

ARMORIES.

Eighth Regiment—The following supplies were furnished: 800 pounds moth exterminator and 2 barrels cleaning compound; 5 gallons Miller's harness dressing; ½ dozen quarts mucilage, Carter's; 3 great gross parlor matches, Swift & Courtney's; 6 cases roll toilet paper, cross cut, 100 rolls to case; 2 dozen long-handle iron snow shovels; 12 dozen goblets; 10 gallons lard oil, best grade; 6 wrenches (engineer's), 6, 8, 10, 12, 15 and 18 inch; 10 gallons cylinder oil, best quality, and 10 gallons machine oil.

Ninth Regiment—The following supplies were furnished: One dozen balls Asbestos valve packing, ¼-inch (1-pound balls); 1 dozen packages flat wire brads, ½ inch to 2 inches; 1 sectional ladder, 40 feet (8 sections); 1 case roll toilet paper, 100 rolls to case (cross-cut); 50 pounds manila wrapping-paper, assorted; 1 hose reel; 10 gallons Jarboe's patent water paint; 6 quires desk blotting paper, 24 by 20 inches; 3 barrels washing soda and 1 barrel disinfectant. The lamps, iron railing, guards and gates around the above Armory were cleaned off, sandpapered and painted two coats of best quality paint. The wooden doors on Fourteenth street and Fifteenth street sides of above Armory were scraped and varnished. The ironwork on east and west sides of roof of above Armory were painted.

Twelfth Regiment—The following supplies were furnished: Twelve gallons Brilliant polish, 1 set of copper funnels, 12 dozen scrub cloths, 6 dozen wire urinal protectors, 2 rubber-tire hand trucks, 6 dozen nickel toilet-paper fixtures, 6 dozen mops, 2 gross pint bottles of ammonia, 12 cases toilet paper, 1 dozen chamois skins, 500 pounds flake camphor, 1 box Bon Ami, 6 dozen balls of twine, 3 barrels sal soda, 3 Wrigley augers, 200 yards of canvas, 1 barrel disinfectant, 500 pounds moth exterminator and 1 hand wagon.

Sixty-ninth Regiment—One barrel disinfectant, 200 pounds moth exterminator, 5 gallons signal oil, 5 gallons sperm oil, 5 gallons black varnish, 1 large varnish brush, 2 small varnish brushes, 3 five-gallon cans were furnished, defective tin of gutters and balconies on roof of above building was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Seventy-first Regiment—Ceilings and walls of main hallways on first and second floors, extending to third landing, were cleaned down, ceilings were prepared and tinted, walls painted four coats of best quality paint. Woodwork of doors, wainscoting, stairs, etc., scraped, bleached, filled, painted and varnished. Water tank on roof was repaired, scraped and painted. Gas apparatus for turning gas on and off at the various company rooms was overhauled and repaired.

Squadron "A"—The following supplies were furnished: 10 dozen Turkish bath towels, 20 by 40 inches; 12 1-pound cans white paint, Devoe's; 500 rolls toilet paper, cross-cut (1,000 sheets to roll); 1 barrel Marvin's wax-oil finish for floors, 3 barrels disinfectant and 650 pounds moth exterminator. About 150 tons of decayed and useless tan-bark were removed from ring of above armory. About 700 square feet of rubber was furnished and laid as directed on runway leading from stable to ring of above armory. Reflectors in ring were lowered as directed; steel plates, iron plates and angle irons were furnished and placed as directed in rifle range. Axles, wheels, handles, bolts and braces were furnished and put on feed-box at above armory.

First Battery—1 barrel disinfectant, 200 pounds moth exterminator, 100 feet ¾-inch rubber hose, 1 wooden reel, 1 dozen feather dusters, 1 dozen metal brushes, 2 dozen towels and 6 varnish brushes furnished.

Second Battery—1 complete set of carpenter's tools, with chest furnished.

First Signal Corps—The following supplies were furnished: 2 gallons sperm oil, best grade, and 50 rolls of toilet paper. Ceilings and walls of corps rooms were washed off, repaired and kalsomined. All woodwork was cleaned and varnished and steam radiators rebronzed. For the purpose of a store-room for above corps a partition was furnished and erected in attic.

First Naval Battalion—The following supplies were furnished: 30 gallons lard oil, 10 gallons cylinder oil, 3 dozen fire bricks, 1 2-inch tube expander, 1 barrel kerosene oil and 1 brass anchor. The United States steamship "New Hampshire," armory of above battalion, was towed to summer rendezvous off Tompkinsville, Staten Island, and while there was overhauled and repaired. Seams of deck were calked and made water-tight, woodwork of deck repaired. Plans, drawings, blue prints and specifications were made and drawn for addition to cabin, state-rooms, berth, etc., in above ship, and said work, as called for in specifications, etc., was completed in a satisfactory manner. The outside and inside of above ship were painted, and, at the end of summer season, ship was towed to its present quarters, foot of East Twenty-eighth street.

MUNICIPAL COURTS.

First District—Order was renewed for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above court.

Third District—A supply of law books, 1 city directory and 1 revolving desk chair furnished.

Sixth District—1 city directory furnished.

Ninth District—A supply of law books, 1 city directory and 1 business directory furnished.

CITY MAGISTRATES' COURTS.

Seven copies Laws of New York, 10 copies Cook's Criminal and Penal Code, 1 copy Consolidated Act, 7 copies Charter of Greater New York and 7 city directories were furnished for use of Justice of above courts.

Third District City Magistrate's Court—Entire basement, 2 prison pens, south and east rooms, coal vaults and areas were cleaned off and whitewashed 3 coats of "Parian Enamel Whitewash," 17 window-shades, made of best quality nonpareil shade-cloth, hung on "Harts-horn" spring rollers, were furnished and put up.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

Eight city directories, 1 roll top desk, and 1 revolving desk chair were furnished. Two 16-inch electric motor fans, with the necessary wiring, etc., complete, were furnished and installed in above department.

Receiver of Taxes—2 36-drawer "Lang" document files furnished. A new ceiling of ¾-inch North Carolina pine with heavy building paper lining, bed mouldings, etc., was put up in above office.

DEPARTMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

Five city directories and 2 Brooklyn directories and 1 5-foot 6-inch roll-top desk furnished.

CITY PAYMASTER.

Order was renewed for cleaning glass in windows and doors of above office. One 24-inch exhaust fan and 4 16-inch electric motor fans with necessary wiring, etc., complete, were furnished and installed. 17 elliptical guards, made of ¾-inch flat steel, 2-inch mesh, with pickets and scroll all finished in gold bronze were furnished and put in place as directed.

CITY CHAMBERLAIN.

One city directory and 4 Lang steel document file cases were furnished. An increase in the supply of clean towels weekly was ordered.

BUREAU OF EXPERT ACCOUNTANTS.

Three cocoa mats and 1 typewriter desk furnished. An iron railing, 3 feet 1 inch by 3 feet 4 inches, with necessary gate, hinges, etc., complete, was furnished and put up.

CLERK, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

One letterpress and stand, 2 rugs, 30 by 64 inches, and 1 roll typewriter desk furnished.

COUNTY JAIL.

Six barrels of lime, 150 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch rubber hose and 1 hose-reel furnished. Plumbing work of bath tubs, closets, urinals, basins, etc., throughout the building was entirely overhauled and repaired. A 48-inch iron sink, properly connected, was furnished and placed in yard. One Ericsson pumping engine and 1 water-heater, including pipe fittings, etc., complete, to connect with supply pipes throughout building, was furnished and put in as directed in above building.

DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

One city directory, 1 Brooklyn directory, 1 Queens directory, 1 Richmond directory, 1 business directory, 1 book-rack, 50 desks for use of inspectors, 70 stools, 24 bent wood chairs, 6 revolving desk-chairs, and 3 36-drawer "Lang" steel document file-cases were furnished.

BUREAU OF MUNICIPAL STATISTICS.

One directory of City of New York furnished.

BOARD OF ASSESSORS.

One Brooklyn directory furnished.

COMMISSIONER OF JURORS.

A supply of law books was furnished.

COMMISSIONER OF ACCOUNTS.

2 city directories were furnished.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

2 city directories, 1 large combination steel case and 1 36-drawer Lang steel document-file case, 1 revolving desk-chair and 2 roll-top desks furnished.

SUPREME COURT (APPELLATE DIVISION).

9 city directories were furnished.

CORPORATION COUNSEL.

8 city directories, 1 wardrobe, 1 typewriter desk, 2 armchairs, 1 6-foot roll-top oak desk, 5 "Bank of England" chairs and 1 36-drawer Lang steel document-file cases were furnished.

Bureau for the Recovery of Penalties—1 copartnership directory, 1 city directory and 1 Brooklyn directory furnished.

Bureau of Street Openings (Law Department)—2 roll-top desks and 2 revolving chairs furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF CHARITIES.

19 city directories and 1 Brooklyn directory furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

17 city directories, 5 Brooklyn directories, 4 business directories and 1 copartnership directory furnished.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Fifty-fifth street and Sixth avenue—The furniture, books, papers, apparatus, etc., were removed from previous to present quarters. Previous to occupancy all the plastering of walls and ceilings of the different floors of above building were repaired. Pigeon hole cases were taken down, removed and set up as directed, new material to complete same being used. A pigeon hole map case, built in accordance with plan, was furnished and put up in basement, 1 electric pump was furnished and put in and connected with supply tank, and an order was given for a supply of electric current to operate the same. Steam pump was properly connected to supply tank. Gas pipes throughout building were removed and altered as directed, waste pipes, supply pipes, sewer pipes and leader pipes were cleaned out, blow-off tank and steam pipes connected with same repaired. New panel partition on first floor of above building was shellaced, varnished 4 coats, rubbed down and polished. All old woodwork was cleaned and touched up. Old boiler tubes in boilers were removed and replaced with new 3-inch tubes. About 1,000 yards of plain "A" linoleum was furnished and laid on second and fourth floors of above building. Window shades of best quality nonpareil shade cloth, hung on "Hartshorn" spring rollers, were furnished and placed on windows as directed, and under main skylight on fourth floor a skylight shade of best quality nonpareil shade cloth, made in three parts hung on "Hartshorn" spring rollers, was furnished and put in place. 12 benches with perforated seats and backs, 12 bent-wood cane bottom chairs, 3 office chairs and 3 revolving high chairs furnished. The usual cleaning supplies, including 1 barrel disinfectant, 1 barrel soap powder, were furnished. 100 feet rubber hose, with nozzle, couplings and reel complete, also furnished, and the order for cleaning glass in doors and windows was renewed.

Vaccination Station, No. 68 Elm Street—Ceilings and walls on second floor of above building were washed off, prepared and calcimined and all woodwork was cleaned and painted.

PRESIDENT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

Six mahogany arm chairs with leather seats and backs, 1 cocoa mat, 1 3-gallon porcelain-lined water-cooler, 1 stand, 1 letter copying press and 1 stand furnished; 2 Remington typewriting machines were entirely overhauled and repaired and left in perfect working order; a large table was cut in two and refinished, new cloth, gimp and legs being furnished; an iron railing, 5 feet 9 inches by 9 feet 6 inches, with gate, lock, springs, hinges, etc., complete, and finished in gold bronze was furnished and put up in hallway, and a glass sign made of French plate glass, quartered oak frame, burnished gold letters and carmine background, was furnished and placed in hallway, as directed.

DEPARTMENT OF STREET CLEANING.

One Manhattan typewriting machine, 1 5-foot roll-top desk, and 1 quartered oak cabinet furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

Order for an extra supply of clean towels weekly; 2 gallons Marvin's floor polish; 1 city directory and 1 Brooklyn directory furnished; 1 wash-basin was furnished and properly connected in above office.

DEPARTMENT OF SEWERS.

One wooden sign, lettered "Chief Clerk's Office," was furnished and put in place as directed, and 1 eight-foot double pedestal quartered oak desk was furnished. Railing in room 1310 was altered as directed, 32 feet of new railing being added, and in front of doorway at No. 1315 a wicket gate complete, finished in gold bronze, was furnished and put up.

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY.

About 236 feet of stationary upright desks, secured to partition supported on legs, top and front of desks of quartered oak, balance of whitewood, with joints and angles doweled and glued, having one coat of best wood-filler, shellaced, varnished, rubbed down and polished, and constructed in accordance with plan, was furnished and put in place. New panel partition was shellaced, varnished, rubbed down and polished as directed. Floors of rooms 2401, 2402, 2403 and 2404 were shellaced. 15 window awnings with necessary pulleys, ropes, etc., complete, were furnished and put up on windows of above department. 1 Remington typewriting machine, 1 roll-top typewriter desk 2 5-foot 6-inch roll-top desks, 1 dozen oak chairs (cane seats), 1 oak high chair, 4 city directories, 2 Brooklyn directories, 1 business directory and 3 copies of the Session Laws of 1899 were furnished.

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS.

One city directory and 1 business directory were furnished. 2 filing cabinets for maps, constructed in accordance with plan, were furnished and put up as directed.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS, LIGHTING AND SUPPLIES.

A supply of rubber stamps, note paper, envelopes and printed forms furnished, and 3 copies Hendrick's architectural engineers and mechanical directories of the United States also furnished. Deputy Commissioner's Office—A wash-basin, with the necessary pipes, fittings, etc., properly connected, was furnished and put up.

General Office—A supply of law books, 1 city directory, 1 business directory and 1 Brooklyn directory furnished. 4 window shades, hung on Bassett fixtures, were put up in above office.

Bureau of Lamps and Gas—1 Tucker filing case complete was furnished.

Electrical Bureau—1 city directory and 11,000 blank forms for use of above Bureau were furnished.

Bureau of Repairs and Supplies—A supply of coal and wood for heating, etc., and a supply of ice, sponges, soap, brooms, mops, dusters, mops, brushes, etc., were furnished to the different public buildings, courts and offices in care of this department. The order for use of horse and wagon was renewed and order for replacing worn out and defective parts of Welsbach lights in

the different buildings, courts and offices was also renewed. Among the many items of repairs made not otherwise specially referred to, are plumbing, steam-fitting, gas-fitting, mason work, plastering, painting, carpentering, glazing, electrical work, ironwork, etc., and for the use of the mechanics in the employ of this department, a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., was furnished. Contract and specifications were drawn for furnishing material and labor required for the installation of a plumbing and drainage system, plunge and shower baths for the Seventh Regiment, and, after being duly advertised, awarded at public letting to lowest bidder. This work has been commenced and is progressing favorably. One dozen self-acting letter files, 1 6-inch roll-top desk, 1 city directory and 4 cylindrical shaped tin boxes for plans were furnished.

Free Floating Baths—To shut off the view of spectators there was erected on roof of bath at foot of east Twenty-fourth street a galvanized iron awning frame, together with awnings, rollers, and necessary fixtures complete. The usual orders for lumber and small supplies were renewed. The anchors and chains on East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street Bath, East Fifty-first street Bath, and Battery Bath, were recovered, removed and stored at Corporation Yards.

The baths were towed from their respective berths on East and North rivers to their winter quarters, where they will be overhauled and repaired for the forthcoming bathing season. The baths were opened June 12 and closed September 17, 1899.

The season just closed was what might be termed a poor bathing season, inasmuch as no continued very hot weather prevailed; still the number of bathers that availed themselves of the privilege shows how great a necessity the public baths are. Herewith is a comparative statement of the number of bathers during the bathing season of 1898 and 1899:

MUNICIPAL BUILDING.

Department of Taxes and Assessments—3 sets of skids were furnished and set as directed.

Department of Highways—2 6-gallon water coolers were furnished.

President of the Borough of The Bronx—1 city directory and a supply of law books were furnished.

Board of Public Improvements—One set of skids were furnished and set as directed; about 22 feet of iron railing, 6 feet high, with gate, springs, hinges, lock, etc., complete, all finished in gold bronze, was furnished and put up as directed; 7 pigeon-hole cases, 1 chest and 2 supports made of oak and white wood in accordance with plan, was furnished and put up as directed; 1 letter-copying press, 1 stand, 1 dozen office chairs and 1 toilet cabinet with a supply of clean towels weekly furnished.

Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies—Coal and wood for heating, etc., and brooms, dusters, mops, soap, sponges, chamois, sapolio, etc., for cleaning, were furnished for use at the different public buildings, courts and offices in care of this Department. Repairs were also made to carpentering, painting, plumbing, ironwork, etc., of the several public buildings in above borough in care of this Department.

Hon. HENRY S. KEARNY, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

SIR—In compliance with the directions contained in your letter of the 3d inst., I herein submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for the quarter ending September 30, 1899:

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts on vouchers for gas and electric currents supplied to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., and for lighting and maintaining public lamps.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the appropriation for "Lamps and Lighting," 1899, showing vouchers drawn during the quarter, amounting to thirty thousand three hundred and seventy-seven dollars and seventy-eight cents (\$30,377.78), with liabilities for the quarter of two hundred and ninety-two thousand four hundred and fifty-seven dollars and twelve cents (\$292,457.12). These liabilities consist of claims of the various gas and electric companies for the lighting and maintenance of the public lamps, and for gas to the various public markets, offices, armories, etc., for the months of July, August and September, which claims cannot be audited for the reason that contracts have not as yet been executed for said work.

Exhibit "C" is a summary of the lamp account, and this shows the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued during the quarter; eighty-four new gas lamps, eight new Welsbach naphtha lamps, and fifty-two new electric lamps have been lighted; thirty-one gas lamps have been relighted, and thirty-nine gas lamps discontinued. The total number of lamps lighted on September 30 was twenty-five thousand and fifty-eight gas lamps, fifteen hundred and eighty-one naphtha lamps, four hundred and forty-nine Welsbach naphtha lamps, and four thousand four hundred and forty-two electric lamps, making a total of thirty-one thousand five hundred and thirty lamps.

Exhibit "D" is a statement showing the candle-power of the gases supplied to the city by such of the gas companies as are within reach of the photometric stations.

The following statement will show the average amount of impurities found in the gases of the several gas companies, as determined by E. G. Love, Ph. D., the Gas Examiner at the laboratories of this Department.

SIR—In accordance with your instructions, I submit herewith a statement of the transactions of this office for the quarter ending September 30, 1899.

Men have been employed outside in checking the number and location of street lamps lighted or extinguished and of all lamps shown on the maps previously compiled.

The new map of the streets and parks of Manhattan, on a scale of 400 feet to the inch, has been completed as far north as One Hundred and Tenth street, showing all arc lights and gas lamps, the latter designated as Consolidated, Standard or Equitable; ordinary lamps, single or double Welsbach or fire-alarm.

Additions to and changes in the map of Manhattan are noted as follows:

The map of Queens has been changed to show 7 gasoline lamps changed to gas, 13 new gas lamps lighted and 496 arc lights discontinued. These arc lights were in Lighting District No. 5, including Hollis, Queens, Springfield, Rosedale, Aqueduct and the surrounding country, and have been discontinued because the contract dated December 17, 1897, has been declared invalid by the Court of Appeals.

Inspection has been continued of the lighting in public buildings, and, from time to time, twenty-four-hour charts of gas pressure secured, to ascertain that a uniform pressure was being maintained.

The saving in consumption of gas in the principal public buildings is shown in the following table comparing the consumption of gas for the third quarter of 1899 with the average of the corresponding quarters of the years 1894 to 1897, inclusive, 1898 being omitted as a period of partial change:

The Armories in the Borough of Manhattan have used during the quarter 1,665,700 cubic feet of gas, or an increase of 7% per cent. over their average for the corresponding period of the years 1894-1897. This is attributed to the extra requirements in preparation for the Dewey celebration.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with letter dated October 3, 1899, I herewith submit a detailed statement of the business transactions of the Bureau of Meter Tests, for the quarter ending September 30, 1899.

On July 1 the number of new meters on hand to be tested was 63. During the same month there were received 539, for August 1,546 and for September 1,752, making a total for the quarter, including special tests, of 3,900, ranging in capacity from 3-light to 100-light. 3,653 were approved, tested, sealed and badged as correct, with my official seal. 6 were rejected and returned for repairs and adjustment.

Forty-two special tests were made upon request of gas companies or consumers, of which 10 were found to register fast, 21 were found slow, and 11 were found correct; all of which certificates were issued bearing my official signature.
