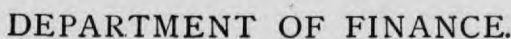

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, October 9, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called and the following members were present and answered to their names :

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holaban, presided.

The minutes of the meeting of October 2, 1901, were approved as printed.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON WEST ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH STREET.

Hearing was opened in the matter of the petition for relieving the property-owners of the assessment for the widening of West One Hundred and Tenth street, between Fifth and Seventh avenues, Borough of Manhattan.

After hearing Mr. Walter H. Martin and Hon. A. A. Van Wyck in support of the petition, on motion of the Commissioner of Bridges, the following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That so much of the resolution relating to the opening and widening of One Hundred and Tenth street, from the circle at Fifth avenue to Seventh avenue, and that part of the westerly side of Lenox avenue between One Hundred and Tenth street and Avenue St. Nicholas, adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 24th day of December, 1897, as provides "that one-half of the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby," is hereby amended so as to read "that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be borne and paid for by The City of New York."

I.—That the opening, widening and extension of One Hundred and Tenth street, from Fifth to Seventh avenues, was not petitioned for by any of your petitioners.

II.—That the property of your petitioners is not in any way benefited by this improvement.

III.—That if any benefit is derived from the widening of said street, such benefit is confined to the abutting property on the line of improvement.

IV.—That the area of benefit is one entirely in the opinion of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment and there is nothing to show on what that opinion is based.

V.—That the idea of widening said street was principally for the purpose of extending Cathedral parkway.

VI.—That said street is a connecting link with Central Park and Riverside drive or Park, and must be considered as part of those parks and a pleasure drive.

VII.—That no additional facilities for reaching any of your petitioner's property have been created by the widening of One Hundred and Tenth street.

VIII.—That One Hundred and Tenth street is the first public street north of Fifty-ninth street, a distance of more than two and a half miles, and that owing to this fact this widening was a necessity, the benefit of which inures to the public in general.

Wherefore your petitioners pray that the entire assessment as levied be canceled and made a general public tax.

"Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 990 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, directs that upon the 16th day of October, 1901, the title to each and every piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of said East Seventeenth street, from Albemarle road to Beverly road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, so required, shall be vested in The City of New York."

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond recommending that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to a strip of land about 25 feet by 200 feet in the proposed extension of Amos street and adjoining Centre street, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Richmond, I have to state that a map or plan showing the locating and laying out of Amos street, from Centre street to Bay street, was filed by the Board of Public Improvements on March 11, 1901.

Amos street, before the filing of the map, was 25 feet wide from Centre street easterly for 200 feet; from there to Cross street it was 50 feet, and from there to Bay street it was 40 feet.

The filed map lays out Amos street at a uniform width of 50 feet.

The Local Board of the Borough of Richmond recommended that the widening of Amos street from 25 to 50 feet, which extends over only 200 feet easterly of Centre street, be legally opened, being under the impression that the remaining 25 feet are City property.

I have not been able to find any record that Amos street or any part of the same was legally opened or dedicated, and recommend therefore that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to the full width of Amos street for the requested distance of 200 feet from Centre street easterly.

There are buildings on the land to be acquired.

Papers in the matter are herewith returned.

This order has not been complied with. All efforts have failed to find owner or responsible persons for service of said order, and this Department has exhausted all means at its command to enforce same.
