THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

[From Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen of May 23, 1905.]

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

No. 1982.

Communication from the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen in relation to the Budget and the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation for the year 1905.

City of New York—Department of Finance,
Comptroller's Office,
May 23, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in any year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking funds of The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from City purposes.

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget, in detail, for the year 1905.

Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget, as well as the amount of county charges and expenses paid during the year 1904 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds, which amounts together are to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.

Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 and 910 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the fifteenth day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said City.

Grout, Comptroller of The City of New York, in compliance with section 900 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, do hereby certify to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York that the aggregate amount of the Budget for the year 1905, duly made and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, as altered, modified and amended by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment by resolution adopted May 12, 1905, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of the Greater New York Charter as amended by chapter 373 of the Laws of 1905, to be raised by tax in said year, is one hundred and nine million eight hundred and seventeen thousand five hundred and ninety-three dollars and three cents (\$109,817,593.03), a copy of which Budget is hereto annexed.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."
8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:
For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day..... \$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week..... 2 00
For delinquent children, per annum..... 110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum..... 110 00
For inmates in homes for fallen and friendless women, per annum..... 110 00
*For maternity cases, per case..... 18 00
*For homeless mothers, nursing infants, per month..... 12 00
To hospitals for medical treatment, per day..... 60
To hospitals for surgical treatment, per day..... 80
To hospitals for chronic, incurable or infirm patients, per day..... 30

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

In the course of the discussion Mr. Backus stated that he was compelled to withdraw by reason of an important engagement, and asked to be recorded as voting in favor of the majority report of the Joint Committee on Changes in the Course of Study, and his request was granted by unanimous consent.

Mr. Warburg moved that the resolutions attached to the minority report of the Joint Committee on Changes in the Course of Study be amended by striking out the words "the first two years" and inserting in lieu thereof "the first year."

Mr. Lummis offered the following as an amendment:

Resolved, That the school day be shortened in the first two years to three and one-half hours, and that the course of study be modified, for the purpose of meeting such reduction, by lessening the time now allotted to sewing, drawing, games, hygienic exercises, study and unassigned time, and that an afternoon period of one and one-half hours be established, at which attendance may or may not be obligatory, as may hereafter be decided, for the purposes of informal instruction in music, hygienic exercises, instructive games, etc., in the larger play or assembly rooms of each school.

Mr. Wingate moved to substitute for the resolutions attached to the minority report and the amendments offered by Messrs. Warburg and Lummis, the resolutions attached to the majority report.

Mr. Schmitt raised the point of order that the motion offered by Mr. Wingate was not in order.

The Chair ruled that the point of order raised by Mr. Schmitt was not well taken.

The President put the question whether the Board would adopt the motion offered by Mr. Wingate, and it was decided in the negative by the following vote:

BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections held Thursday, May 18, 1905, at 12 o'clock M. Present—Commissioners Voorhis, Page and Dady.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on the 15th inst. were read and approved.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor of The City of New York, dated the 15th inst., requesting that the Commissioners of Accounts be furnished each month with a statement showing any changes in the rate of salary paid to any of the employees of the Board of Elections and also the total amount of the monthly and all supplemental salary pay-rolls. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board for compliance therewith.

From Philip M. Dow, Supervisor, Enumeration Bureau, Kings County, without date, requesting to be furnished with a map of each Assembly District in Kings County. Filed, having been complied with.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted, Commissioners Voorhis and Dady voting in the affirmative and Commissioner Page in the negative, viz.:

Whereas, Senate Bill No. 1376 (Int. No. 469), entitled "An act to amend the Election Law generally," is reported to have been passed at the recent session of the Legislature of this State, and is awaiting the approval of the Governor prior to its becoming a law; and

Whereas, Numerous and serious objections exist to said bill becoming a law, such as the requirement of 400 additional election districts in this City, involving the obtaining and leasing of a corresponding number of polling places, and their equipment with booths, ballot boxes and other election materials, the appointment and services of 3,200 additional election officers, and the consequent exemption of that large number of qualified citizens from service as jurors, the manufacture and cost of 1,600 additional books of enrollment, the employment of a large number of inexperienced and irresponsible persons in the correct selection, transfer and entry of many thousand names of qualified electors in such additional books with the next ensuing period of less than forty days, the entailing upon the Board of Elections of an expenditure of more than two hundred thousand or nearly a quarter of a million dollars, and for which expenditure no provision has been made in the appropriation to the Board for the current year, and likewise the providing by the Secretary of State of several thousand additional books of registry, challenge oath books, and copies of the Election Law, for use in the additional election districts so created; and

Whereas, No general desire and no necessity exists therefor, and no public demand has been made for the proposed increase of election districts, and the consequent addition of over 25 per cent. to the present election expenses of this City, with no material benefit to be derived therefrom; therefore be it

Resolved, That his Excellency, Governor Frank W. Higgins, be and hereby is respectfully requested by the Board of Elections of The City of New York, to withhold his signature of approval from said Senate Bill No. 1376 (Int. No. 469) for and in consideration of the reasons above stated, and such other and additional reasons as may appear on a further consideration thereof.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions be transmitted to his Excellency the Governor, for his careful and favorable consideration.



NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
