#### THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

[From Proceedings of the Board of Aldermen of May 23, 1905.]

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

Communication from the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen in relation to the Budget and the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation for the year 1905.

City of New York-Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, May 23, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in any year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking funds of The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen as

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county as distinguished from City purposes.

#### FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of immates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their funancial inability to provide for such immates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriatons are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City immates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been mad

ally the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Manaeers."

8. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various class; so inmates as tellows: For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 35 cents per week for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. Whereas, Numerous and serious objections exist to said bill becoming a law, such as the requirement of 400 additional election districts in this City, involving the obtaining and leasing of a corresponding number of polling places, and their equipment with booths, ballot boxes and other election materials, the appointment and services of 3,200 additional election officers, and the consequent exemption of that large number of 3,200 additional election officers, and the consequent exemption of that large number of qualified citizens from service as jurors, the manufacture and cost of 1,600 additional books of enrollment, the employment of a large number of inexperienced and irresponsible persons in the correct selection, transfer and entry of many thousand names of qualified electors in such additional books with the next ensuing period of less than forty days, the entailing upon the Board of Elections of an expenditure of more than two hundred thousand or nearly a quarter of a million dollars, and for which expenditure no provision has been made in the appropriation to the Board for the current year. and likewise the providing by the Secretary of State of several thousand additional books of registry, challenge oath books, and copies of the Election Law, for use in the additional election districts so created; and

Whereas, No general desire and no necessity exists therefor, and no public demand has been made for the proposed increase of election districts, and the consequent addition of over 25 per cent. to the present election expenses of this City, with no material benefit to be derived therefrom; therefore be it



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the cast of two householders or
