Owing to the fact that the Budget appropriations for 1910 did not include any provision for salaries or wages of a mechanical force for the Manhattan Bridge, all repairs to that structure must be done by the mechanics attached to the New York and Brooklyn Bridge force, and I am advised that the amount now available for this expenditure, which is properly chargeable to No. 132, being insufficient to provide for the necessary repairs, the transfer previously noted has been requested.

As it appears from the preceding statements that a sufficient unencumbered balance now exists in Account No. 131 to permit of the proposed transfer, I recommend the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached. Respectfully,

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Item No. 177 in this Department's Budget for the year 1910, Bureau of Ferries, Maintenance, allowed the sum of \$84,000 for Wages, Mechanical and Labor force engaged on repairs.

Item No. 178 allowed the sum of \$42,000 for Materials for Repairs and Replacements by Departmental labor.

Item No. 179 allowed the sum of \$100,000 for Repairs and Replacements by Contract or Open Order.

The work of repairing the Municipal ferryboats has been done thus far this year mainly by Department force, this method having been tried in view of the former very unsatisfactory method of having the work done under contract, the contract method being more or less impracticable owing to the uncertainty of the work which it will be found necessary to do.

The effect has necessarily been a larger charge against items No. 177 and No. 178 and a lesser charge against item No. 179 than contemplated at the time of making the Budget allowances.

I request that the sum of \$40,000 be taken from item No. 179, \$25,000 thereof to be applied to item No. 177, Wages, and the remaining \$15,000 to be applied to item No. 178, Materials. Yours respectfully,

The unexpended balance in account No. 179, as shown on the books of the Department of Finance on July 14, 1910, was \$82,872.87. It therefore appears that there is a present surplus in this account to permit the proposed transfer of funds.

The Commissioner states in his communication that the method of repairing the municipal ferryboats by departmental labor has been tried "in view of the former very unsatisfactory method of having the work done under contract, the contract method being more or less impractical owing to the uncertainty of the work which it will be found necessary to do."

This departure from the practice prevailing in previous years will naturally involve greater expenditures for wages and materials and smaller expenditures for contract or open order work. The transfer of \$25,000 to account No. 177 will permit of a continuance of the present labor force for the balance of the current year, and the transfer of \$15,000 to account No. 178 will provide for the purchase of the necessary materials for repair work.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13 to 21 Park row, City of New York, July 18, 1910.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, City:

Dear Sir—The completion of the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir was abandoned several years ago upon the suggestion of the then Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, who had submitted a proposition for the construction of a filtration plant at this location.

The westerly basin was completed and is now in service. It covers an area of 94 acres, and has a capacity of 772 million gallons. The easterly basin was designed to hold 1,100 million gallons. Practically the entire area of this basin, 135 acres, has been excavated. In addition there were constructed a core wall and the superstructures to the gate houses which were provided in the original design of the reservoir.

The easterly basin, which practically runs parallel with Jerome avenue, is in a very unsightly condition. High mounds of excavated material, a lot of dismantled machinery and quantities of timber, etc., have caused vigorous protests from the property owners close by. They have claimed that the value of their property has depreciated in the past five years, and that the City has not been benefited in any way. A number of engineers whom I have consulted are of the opinion that the easterly basin should be completed as originally planned, and that some provision should be made for the construction of the foundation upon which will rest the superstructures of the filtration plant, if at some future time it is thought advisable to erect same.

Extending beyond the basins, the City owns about 70 acres. The Armory Board have petitioned for a portion of this land, which will not be required for the reservoir basins. They propose to erect an armory, and a portion of the superstructure will extend over the reservoir basin. It is necessary, however, in addition to the building of the wall of the reservoir to build a wall to mark off the boundary of the site of the armory. It is estimated by the engineer that this cut-off will cost \$125,000. It has not been definitely decided as to whether this Department will construct the wall, but in any event, I believe this expense should be borne by the Armory Board.

For the completion of the easterly basin, as originally designed, and for the additional work required for the foundations for the filter plant, there will be required the sum of \$2,200,000.

I hereby make application for these funds, to be provided pursuant to section 32, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 220 of the Laws of 1910. Yours truly,

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Hon. Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of July 18, 1910, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize, pursuant to section 32, chapter 490, of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 220 of the Laws of 1910, an issue of corporate stock in the amount of \$2,200,000, to provide means for the completion of the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir.

Letter of the Commissioner dated June 30, 1910, addressed to his Honor the Mayor gives a complete history of the building of the reservoir and his reasons for the above request.

As stated in said communication, the Jerome Park Reservoir as originally designed was divided into two basins known as the Easterly Basin and the Westerly Basin, the latter was completed and is in use by the City and has a capacity of 773,000,000 gallons and a water surface of about ninety-four (94) acres. The easterly basin was to have a capacity of about eleven hundred million gallons and a water surface of about one hundred and thirty-five (135) acres. Nearly the entire area of this site (the Easterly Basin) has been excavated and somewhat over one-half of the required total volume has been excavated. In addition to the excavation of the Easterly Basin, the core wall and the substructure of the gate houses were completed when the work was abandoned by the Aqueduct Commissioners in the Spring of 1905.

At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held May 23, 1906, \$50,000 was appropriated

"To examine in detail the entire Croton Water Shed, the reservoirs and distribution system, with a view to the selection of the very best site for the construction of a filter plant, and to prepare plans and specifications for the proper execution of the work."

—said work was done by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and plans and estimates submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but no action taken by the Board.

It is now proposed by the Commissioner to complete the Easterly Basin of Jerome Park Reservoir under modified plans, so as to serve the purpose of storage for the present and be ultimately utilized to carry out the plans already prepared by the Department for filtering the Croton supply.

The plan suggested consists in lining only that portion of the bottom which is not solid rock, filling in any weak spots or fissures in the rock and preparing the foundations

of such columns to support the roof of the filter beds as may be deemed advisable. The outline forming as closely as possible to that in the plan for the proposed filtration of the Croton water supply.

In the Commissioner's letter to the Mayor, he states that it is advisable to increase the amount of water stored within the City limits for the following reasons:

There are at present three reservoirs within the City limits used for the storage of the Croton water, that is Jerome Park Reservoir, High Bridge and Central Park Reservoir. At high water, the capacity of these reservoirs are as follows:

	High Water Elevation.	Capacity, Million Gallons.
Jerome Park Reservoir.....	131.5	773
High Bridge	209	11
Central Park Reservoir.....	115	1,100

Total capacity of all reservoirs is approximately 1,900 million gallons, equivalent to slightly over six days' supply at the present rate of consumption from Croton sources, 310 million gallons daily. While this is, apparently, a comparatively large storage, the greater part of this water cannot be drawn upon without interfering with the supply in the higher sections of the City.

Assuming that the reservoirs at Jerome Park and Central Park cannot be lowered more than about ten feet and six feet, respectively, without seriously affecting the pressures, the amount of water that is available between the high water line and the reduced levels would be as follows: Jerome Park, West Basin, 304 million gallons; Central Park, 233 million gallons. This capacity is equivalent to a supply of less than two days.

The suggestion of the Commissioner to complete the Easterly Basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir upon proposed modified plans so as to serve the purpose of storage for the present and so constructed that it can be readily converted into a filter plant, I consider it the logical and best way of treating the problem; it will not only do away with a nuisance which has existed for the last five years, but will give increased storage within the City limits which the Commissioner clearly states and shows is necessary, and if it is decided later to build a filter plant at this site, the work done for the storage reservoir will approximately be on the lines of the filter plant; in other words, the building of a temporary reservoir and permanent filter plant on lines proposed will cost a very little more than if the City should only build a permanent reservoir. In the meantime the City has the use of the reservoir.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 32, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 220 of the Laws of 1910, to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$2,200,000, to provide means for the completion of the Easterly Basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir.

The recommendation of transferring a portion of the reservoir site to the Armory Board for the erection of a building for the Eighth Regiment armory is a matter for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to determine the authority of the transfer or assignment of property being conferred upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the Greater New York Charter. Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 32, chapter 490, of the Laws of 1883, as amended by chapter 220 of the Laws of 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding two million two hundred thousand dollars (\$2,200,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the completion of the easterly basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir, under the direction of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, and the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn—16.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the Comptroller's report to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

In the matter of the application of The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 276 of the Laws of 1910, for a determination of the amount of indebtedness incurred by said City prior to the 1st day of January, 1910, for the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of said City to become otherwise indebted, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of article 8 of the Constitution.

Application having been made to this Court by The City of New York, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a determination of the amount of indebtedness incurred by said City prior to the 1st day of January, 1910, for the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of said City to become otherwise indebted, pursuant to the provisions of section 10 of article 8 of the Constitution, and said application having duly come to be heard on the 17th day of June, 1910;

Now, upon reading the petition of The City of New York, duly verified the 1st day of June, 1910, and filed in the office of the Clerk of this Court on said day, and the order of this Court herein made and entered in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the said 1st day of June, 1910; the affidavit of William A. Prendergast, verified the 16th day of June, 1910; the affidavit of Joseph Haag, verified the 15th day of June, 1910; the affidavit of George M. Curtis, Jr., verified the 15th day of June, 1910, and the two affidavits of William L. Brown, duly verified the 7th day of June, 1910, and the 17th day of June, 1910, respectively, all of which affidavits were duly filed in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the 17th day of June, 1910, and the affidavit of William G. Lord, duly verified and filed in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the 23d day of June, 1910, and due proof of the publication of the notice and petition, as required by chapter 276 of the Laws of 1910, and the order of this Court made and entered in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the 1st day of June, 1910, having been made and filed in the office of the Clerk of this Court on the 17th day of June, 1910; and after hearing Hon. Archibald R. Watson, Corporation Counsel, in support of the application, and no one appearing in opposition thereto, and no answer having been filed, and due deliberation having been had thereon, this Court does make the following findings of facts and conclusions of law, viz.:

Findings of Fact.

First—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, by a resolution duly adopted on the 20th day of May, 1910, required the Comptroller of the said City to prepare and submit to said Board a statement showing in detail indebtedness incurred by the said City for rapid transit investment prior to the 1st

day of January, 1910, with the dates of maturity of such indebtedness, the terms of any and all agreements and contracts made by or in behalf of the said City with respect to such investment, the gross revenue received therefrom, the interest paid and to be paid by the said City on said indebtedness, the annual installments necessary for the amortization thereof, and the current net revenue derived from said investment. Pursuant to such resolution, the Comptroller did prepare and submit to said Board such statement, and thereupon the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment did, by resolution, duly adopted on the 31st day of May, 1910, direct that application be made to this Court for a determination of the amount of indebtedness incurred by said City prior to the 1st day of January, 1910, for the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, which may be excluded in ascertaining the power of said City to become otherwise indebted under the provisions of said section 10 of article 8 of the Constitution of the State of New York.

By a resolution duly adopted on the 1st day of June, 1910, the said Board duly approved the petition herein and adopted the allegations made therein as its findings in the premises.

Second—Pursuant to the contract made and entered into under date of February 21, 1900, between The City of New York, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, and John B. McDonald, and various supplemental, amendatory and modifying contracts, a rapid transit railroad was constructed by and at the expense of The City of New York which was and is known as the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad.

By the contract for construction and operation, dated February 21, 1900, between The City of New York, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, and John B. McDonald, the said McDonald agreed, for the sum of \$35,000,000—and, in addition, the sum of \$1,000,000 for terminals and \$500,000 for real estate—to construct the Manhattan and The Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad. The said contract provided that the contractor should deposit with the Comptroller bonds and cash aggregating \$6,000,000 for the construction, and a further continuing bond of \$1,000,000 for rental and also for construction, and that the City should have a first lien on equipment as further security for the faithful performance by the contractor of the terms of the contract. Said contract also provided that upon default of the contractor the City should have the right to complete the road and hold the contractor liable for any excess of cost of the completion of such construction and equipment over the amount payable to the contractor therefor under the terms of the contract, or to make a new contract, and recover all damages the City might sustain thereby from the contractor, or after the road was completed to take possession, and, as agent of the contractor, operate the road, or make a subcontract, or terminate the contract, or might enforce its lien upon the equipment, or use the remedies of a landlord, or make a new lease and bring suit for rental due under the said contract. The contract further provided that no change should be made in the contract except by written instrument duly authorized by the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners or their successors and consented to by the contractor and his sureties; that no claim should be made against any member of the said Board personally; that the contractor should not be taxable on his interest under said contract or on equipment; that the contract should not be assigned without the written consent of the said Board; that no City official should be interested in the contract with the contractor, and that all necessary legal provisions should be deemed included in the contract. The said contract contained full specifications for the construction of the said subway, and further provided that the contractor should furnish the equipment necessary for operation.

In and by said contract The City of New York leased the subway, when completed, to the contractor upon terms as follows:

"The Contractor hereby agrees to equip, maintain and operate the railroad during the whole of said term. The said term shall be fifty (50) years, and shall run from the date on which Section I. of the railroad shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation. Provided, however, that, if the railroad shall include Sections II., III. and IV., or any of them, the term of the lease as to each of such sections so included shall begin on the date or dates on which it shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation, and shall end at the said first mentioned term of fifty years.

"The contractor shall surrender possession of the railroad at the end of the said term of fifty years, or at the earlier termination of this lease, as herein provided.

"The contractor shall pay to the City rental for the railroad, which rental shall consist of the following:

"(1) An annual sum equal to the annual interest payable by the City upon all bonds which shall be issued by it in order to provide means for construction. The amount of such interest shall be ascertained as of the time when the railroad shall be declared by the Board to be ready for operation; but it shall be increased from time to time by the amount of the annual interest payable by the City for all bonds which, after the date when the railroad shall be so declared to be ready for operation, shall be issued in order to provide means for construction. The amount or amounts payable under this subdivision shall not be subject to decrease by reason of the refunding by the City at lower rates of interest of any of the bonds issued as aforesaid. Bonds issued in order to provide means for construction shall be deemed to include bonds issued to pay interest on bonds theretofore issued pursuant to this contract, under the provisions of section 34 of the Rapid Transit Act; but shall not be deemed to include bonds issued to pay for rights, terms, easements, privileges or property other than lands acquired in fee.

"(2) A further annual sum which shall be equal to 1 per centum upon the whole amount of the said bonds (with the exceptions above mentioned), except that the annual payment in excess of such interest shall, for each year during the period of five (5) years from the date at which the payment of rental shall begin, be such sum not exceeding such one (1) per centum as shall be equal to the excess of the profits of the contractor for such year in the operation of the railroad over five (5) per centum upon the capital of the contractor invested in the enterprise, and, except further, that for each year during a second and immediately succeeding period of five (5) years, there shall, in lieu of such one per centum, be paid one-half (½) of such one (1) per centum, and, in addition, an amount not exceeding one-half (½) of such one (1) per centum which shall be equal to the excess profits of the contractor for such year in the operation of the railroad over five (5) per centum per annum upon its capital invested as aforesaid.

"The rental shall begin as to each section with the date of the declaration of the Board that such section is ready for operation, and shall be payable at the end of each quarter, on the first days of January, April, July and October."

The said contract further provided that during the first ten years the contractor should, at the time each payment of rental is due, furnish to the City a statement showing the profits derived by the contractor from the operation of the road, and after the expiration of the said ten years, should, at the time each payment of rental is due, deliver a statement showing the gross receipts from the road.

The contract further provided that the contractor should run local and express trains at certain intervals, should keep the road and stations in good condition, and use electricity or some other power involving no combustion as motive power, should at all times provide sufficient rolling stock, should keep the equipment in good order, the City retaining its lien on all new equipment, and should charge not exceeding five (5) cents for fare.

The contract contained a further provision, as follows:

"Upon the written demand of the contractor or its lawful assignee, delivered to the Board not more than two (2) years and not less than one (1) year before the expiration of the term of this lease, the contractor shall be entitled to a renewal hereof, for the term of twenty-five (25) years. Such renewal lease shall be in the same form as this lease, except that, in lieu of the term or terms of duration of this lease, such renewal lease shall be for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date of the expiration of this lease, and, except further, that such renewal lease shall contain no provision for a renewal, and, except further, that the amount of the annual rental shall be an amount not less than the average amount of the annual rental for the ten (10) calendar years of the lease next preceding the contractor's demand for renewal, and that the amount of such rental, subject to such minimum limit, shall be agreed upon between the Board and the contractor or its assignee; or, if they shall not agree, then the amount of such rental shall, subject to such minimum, be fixed by arbitration, or if either party shall object to arbitration, or if the terms of procedure shall not be agreed on, or if the arbitration shall fail, then by an appropriate suit or proceeding in the Supreme Court of this State."

Agreement dated February 21, 1900, modifying foregoing contract with respect to security to be furnished by the contractor.

Agreement dated June 23, 1900, modifying foregoing contracts by changing the route where said subway should be constructed in and about Fort George.

Agreement dated January 10, 1901, modifying foregoing contracts by changing route under City Hall Park.

Agreement dated May 2, 1901, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for construction of additional tracks and sidings.

Agreement dated April 10, 1902, modifying foregoing contracts with respect to the operation of trains.

Assignment of lease dated July 10, 1902, by John B. McDonald to the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, consented to by the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for The City of New York.

Agreement dated July 21, 1902, modifying foregoing contracts by changing route in and around Bergen avenue.

Agreement dated January 16, 1903, modifying foregoing contracts by adding an extension from near 142d street and Lenox avenue northerly.

Agreement dated July 16, 1903, modifying foregoing contracts by adding a branch or spur extending from a point on Broadway northerly from 125th street to the ferry house at the foot of W. 130th street.

Agreement dated July 16, 1903, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for construction of connection with Manhattan Elevated Railroad in and about Westchester avenue.

Agreement dated November 24, 1903, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the surrender and cancellation of continuing bond and surrender of securities deposited upon the giving of a continuing bond for the prompt payment by the contractor, or assignee of the lease, of the amount of the annual rental specified in the contract for construction and operation and the faithful performance of all the conditions, covenants and requirements thereof.

Agreement dated March 24, 1904, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the construction of additional side tracks north of Fort George.

Agreement dated November 3, 1904, modifying foregoing contracts so as to provide for rental to be paid by the contractor for operation of parts of route, while remainder was under construction.

Agreement dated December 1, 1904, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the return of the cash and securities held by the Comptroller, notwithstanding the railroad had not then been in all respects completely constructed and equipped.

Agreement dated July 9, 1906, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the installation of outlet chambers and fan houses.

Agreement dated November 1, 1906, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the construction of the railroad beyond Broadway and E. 230th street.

Agreement dated April 5, 1907, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for station entrance at 3d avenue and 149th street.

Agreement dated June 27, 1907, modifying foregoing contracts with respect to extra work for ventilation and cooling.

Agreement dated June 27, 1907, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the construction of additional tracks north of 96th street.

Agreement dated December 12, 1907, modifying foregoing contracts by changing the provisions thereof with respect to arbitration.

Agreement dated June 1, 1908, modifying foregoing contracts by providing that the City should pay damages awarded to property owners on Park avenue, and that the same should be considered as part of the cost of constructing the subway.

Agreement dated April 21, 1909, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for additional station facilities at 181st street and St. Nicholas avenue.

Agreement dated August 3, 1909, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for additional station at Intervale avenue.

Agreement dated August 9, 1909, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for additional station at 191st street.

Agreement dated November 30, 1909, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the construction of station at Zoological Park.

Agreement dated January 18, 1910, modifying foregoing contracts by providing for the lengthening of station platforms.

Third—The said railroad was, has continued to be and is now being operated by the Interborough Rapid Transit Co., to which was assigned, with the consent of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, so much of the said contracts as provided for the maintenance and operation of said rapid transit railroad, including the equipment thereof and the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said road or roads in said contracts described, and all rights with respect to such maintenance or operation, or included in the leasing provisions of such contracts.

Fourth—The City of New York has issued its bonds to pay indebtedness incurred under said contracts prior to January 1, 1910, as follows:

The Secretary presented the following resolution from the Board of Education requesting the issue of \$300,000 corporate stock, pursuant to section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to provide means for the erection of a school building on the site of Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, to take the place of Public School 15, at Westchester avenue and St. Lawrence avenue, The Bronx, together with a report of the Comptroller recommending the approval of said request.

(There were also presented resolutions of the East Bronx Property Owners' Association, etc., protesting against the erection of any more portable houses for Public School 15, The Bronx, and a resolution of the Board of Aldermen urging an appropriation as above recommended.)

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that it is in receipt of the following communication:

"New York, July 7, 1910.

"Hon. JOHN GREENE, Chairman, Committee on Finance:

"Dear Sir—I have the honor to advise you that at a meeting of the Committee on Buildings held on the 5th inst., it was ordered that the Committee on Finance be requested to present a resolution to the Board at its next meeting asking the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$300,000 for the erection of a school building on the site on Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, to take the place of Public School 15, at Westchester and St. Lawrence avenues, Borough of The Bronx. The site mentioned has been available since May 1, 1907.

"This matter was considered at a meeting of the Board of Education held on June 22, 1910 (see Journal, pages 1148 and 1150), when a resolution was adopted to the effect that the provision of funds for the erection of a new building to replace Public School 15, Borough of The Bronx, should be regarded as paramount to any other school needs of that Borough.

"Under date of June 23, 1910, a communication was received from the Comptroller, reading as follows:

"I am in receipt of a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, directing my attention to the necessity of having the school building (P. S. 15) located on the line of St. Lawrence avenue at the intersection of Westchester avenue, removed immediately after the end of this school session, about July 1.

"Kindly state if this action will be in accordance with your plans regarding this building."

"The Committee on Buildings has been informed that the contractor for the street opening, threatens to sue the City for damages arising from the fact that he is prevented from prosecuting his work because of the failure to remove Public School 15.

"The Board of Aldermen on June 21, 1910, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Education be requested to hire the necessary buildings in the neighborhood of Public School 15, in the Borough of The Bronx, at once, so as to have them in readiness at the reopening of the school in September."

"Unfortunately, compliance with the request of the Board of Aldermen is impracticable, as there are absolutely no premises in the vicinity which can be utilized for school purposes.

"Numerous and earnest protests against the further occupancy of Public School 15 have been presented to the Committee on Buildings from the Local School Board of District 26, residents in the vicinity and physicians, one of the last mentioned being Dr. Daniel Lewis, who states: 'It has been my duty to inspect many country schoolhouses throughout the State, but I do not recall one of them as intrinsically bad as the school at Westchester, New York City (Public School 15).'

"The Committee on Buildings has given the matter very careful consideration, and recommends, as the only solution of the problem, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to provide at once the necessary funds for erecting a school building on the above mentioned site on Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, Borough of The Bronx, and to act upon the matter, if possible, without referring the same to the Board of Aldermen. Respectfully yours,

The following resolution is offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be, and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of corporate stock to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), pursuant to section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, for the erection of a school building on the site on Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, to take the place of Public School 15, at Westchester and St. Lawrence avenues, Borough of The Bronx.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of an appropriation of \$300,000 for the erection of a school building on the site of Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, The Bronx, to take the place of Public School 15, at Westchester and St. Lawrence avenues, requested by the Board of Education and adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the meeting of July 29, 1910, subject to the approval of the Comptroller, I report as follows:

This matter has been before the Comptroller for some time, on two references, namely, on a resolution from the Board of Aldermen requesting this Board to appropriate funds for the erection of a building, to contain sixteen class rooms, on property owned by the City on Beach avenue, Borough of The Bronx, and a resolution from the United East Bronx Property Owners' Association protesting against the erection of any more portable buildings for Public School 15, The Bronx, which were referred to the Comptroller at meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held April 29 and June 10, 1910, respectively.

The present appropriation and the aforesaid resolutions refer to the same matter, namely, Public School 15, located on Westchester avenue, at its intersection with the line of St. Lawrence avenue, which is only now being opened, and just south of its junction with Beach avenue. This school now occupies an antiquated ten-room brick-stone structure, which was erected in 1875, with an addition thereto in 1887. The neighborhood is growing rapidly, with the result that three portable buildings, having about forty sittings each, are already in use to accommodate the overflow of pupils, and three more have been provided for in the corporate stock budget at the request of the Board of Education.

The City owns a site near by at Randolph, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, and the Board of Education requested funds in the sum of \$339,535 for the construction and equipment of new Public School 47, to take the place of Public School 15.

This item was not included in the approximate \$5,000,000 allowance agreed upon, and so was not provided for in the corporate stock budget.

As stated in the resolution of the United East Bronx Property Owners' Association, portable buildings on the site of Public School 15, which is just on the border of a large swamp, are a menace to the children's health, and besides, this whole school premises is so unsanitary and inadequate to the needs of the neighborhood that a new building has become fairly imperative. Furthermore, the present building known as Public School 15, is on the line of St. Lawrence avenue, and the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of The Bronx, in a communication as of April 13, 1910, requests me to have this encumbrance removed at the earliest possible moment, so that the contractor may have no claim for delay on this account.

In view of these conditions existing, I regard the appropriation for the erection of a school building in this locality as an emergency matter which properly should have been included in the corporate stock budget. As it was not included in that budget I now approve of the authorization of corporate stock for a new building to replace Public School 15, as proposed by the Board of Education. Respectfully,

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Comptroller, recommending the amendments of resolution adopted February 11, 1910, which authorized the purchase at \$3,000 of property on 79th street, between 11th and 12th avenues, Brooklyn, for use of the Fire Department, by authorizing the purchase of said property subject to the restrictions contained in the deed from Hoik E. Campbell and Eliza B. Campbell, his wife, to Charles W. Emerson, dated September 8, 1891, and recorded September 17, 1891, in Liber 2067 of Conveyances, page 224, in the Register's office, Kings County.

City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, July 25, 1910.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of February 11, 1910, adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to purchase, at a price not exceeding \$3,000, a plot of land, 60 by 100, on the easterly side of 79th street, distant 180 feet northerly from the intersection of the easterly line of 79th street and the northerly side of 12th avenue, etc., in the Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Fire Department. Contracts were prepared, approved as to form, and duly executed by the vendor and the City of New York, as represented by the Comptroller.

A communication was sent to the Lawyers' Title Insurance and Trust Co., asking that a search of the premises in question be made. Upon the return of such search from the Lawyers' Title Insurance and Trust Co., known as No. 135,792, and under date of May 12, 1910, said closing report of the Title Co., together with an executed contract, was sent to the Corporation Counsel for the usual letter as to its marketability.

It developed, however, that said search contained a covenant, in a deed from Hoik E. Campbell and Eliza B. Campbell, his wife, to Charles W. Emerson, prohibiting the erection of any building or part of building within 10 feet of the line of the street or avenue upon which such building fronts. The Corporation Counsel advises that under such covenant the vendor could not give the City a general warranty with full covenants for the granting and assuring to the City of New York the fee simple of the said premises, free from all incumbrances.

This Department thereupon and under date of June 6, 1910, communicated such facts to the Hon. Rhinelander Waldo, Commissioner of the Fire Department, stating such conditions and asking if the acquisition of the property in question, with said covenant, would in any way interfere with the plans of his Department for the erection of a fire house, having in view the fact that the property to be acquired, with said restriction, would in reality leave a plot 60 by 90 to build upon.

Under date of June 28, 1910, Fire Commissioner Waldo, in a communication addressed to this Department, stated that the restriction contained in said deed would not interfere with the plans as laid out for the erection of the building by the Fire Department.

In view of the above conditions, I would respectfully recommend that the resolution adopted February 11, 1910, be amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the selection, by the Fire Department, of the following described property located on 79th street, between 11th and 12th avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of said Department.

All those three certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of 79th street, distant 180 feet northerly from the intersection of the easterly side of 79th street and the northerly side of 12th avenue; running thence easterly parallel with 12th avenue 100 feet to the centre line of the block between 78th and 79th streets; running thence northerly parallel with 79th street 60 feet; running thence westerly again parallel with 12th avenue, 100 feet to the easterly side of 79th street; running thence southerly along the easterly side of 79th street 60 feet to the point or place of beginning; together with all the right, title and interest of the owner of said premises, of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof;

—subject, however, to the restrictions contained in the deed from Hoik E. Campbell and Eliza B. Campbell, his wife, to Charles W. Emerson, dated September 8, 1891, and recorded September 17, 1891, in Liber 2067 of Conveyances, page 224, in the office of the Register of the County of Kings, and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the above described property, at private sale, at a price not exceeding three thousand dollars (\$3,000), said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form.

Coal of quality superior to the standard analyses herein contained shall be paid for as coal conforming to the standard, except that the tonnage of such delivered shall be corrected for moisture in excess of the percentage of moisture as specified in the standard analysis for the particular kind and name of size of coal specified in the schedule.

Method of Sampling.

Amount of Gross Sample—For all deliveries for which separate payment is to be made, and samples are to be taken by hand, such samples shall be taken as follows: Where deliveries are made in amounts of 100 tons and less a sample of 200 pounds shall be taken; where deliveries are in excess of 100 tons a sample of one-tenth of 1 per cent. of the gross quantity delivered shall be taken. The gross samples of the coal delivered will be taken at the point of weighing by the official representative of the head of the Department, the representative of the Comptroller, and the contractor and his representative, if he so desires.

Samples for the Determination of Moisture Content—Samples for the determination of the moisture contained in the coal delivered will be taken at the point of weighing and immediately collected in moisture-tight receptacles to be furnished by the City.

The moisture contained in the coal delivered shall be determined from the samples taken as above described at the point of weighing within twenty-four hours. Where such samples are kept longer than twenty-four hours before the determination of moisture content they shall be preserved in a temperature not greater than 40 F.

Method of Analysis.

A portion of the gross sample taken as above described shall be analyzed upon its receipt at the laboratory. The percentage of moisture, ash, volatile sulphur and volatile combustible matter shall be determined by proximate analysis, and the heating value shall be determined by testing in an oxygen bomb calorimeter. The remaining portion of the sample shall be preserved in careful and proper custody to prevent tempering, in case check analysis is required.

Check Analysis.

The percentage of moisture determined in the original analysis shall be final, notwithstanding the results that may be obtained in the later analysis of the same sample. If the contractor questions the accuracy of the original analysis of the coal supplied by him he may request the making of a second analysis of the remaining portion of the identical sample of coal previously analyzed. In the event that the original analysis is made by a laboratory established by the City or any of its Departments, this second or check analysis shall be made by the same laboratory making the original. The result of this second or check analysis shall be deemed final and will determine the gross tonnage on which payment will be made under that contract for all coal represented by the sample so analyzed. If the results of the second or check analysis agree with the results of the original analysis to within any of the following amounts—heating value, fifty (50) British thermal units; volatile sulphur, one-fourth of 1 per cent.; ash, one-half of 1 per cent.; volatile combustible matter, 1 per cent.—then the contractor shall pay to The City of New York the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for such second or check analysis, which amount will be deducted from a subsequent payment made under this contract. If the second or check analysis shows results varying from the results obtained from the original analysis by amounts greater than enumerated above in any particular, then the City shall pay the expense incurred by reason of such second or

check analysis. Excepting for moisture, all deductions, if any, will be based on the results of the second or check analysis.

Weighing.

The weights of coal delivered shall be determined in the following manner: Coal shall be weighed at the point of delivery wherever stationary scales for this purpose are provided by The City of New York. Where such scales are not provided, coal shall be weighed at the point of delivery, either on portable scales to be provided by the Department and to be conveyed to the point of delivery at the contractor's expense, and maintained by him in perfect condition, or shall be weighed at the point of loading from barges, cars or coal pockets into wagons, on scales furnished by the contractor. The weights in every instance shall be taken by a properly qualified weighmaster, and are to be approved by a representative of The City of New York.

Sealing Coal Wagons—When coal is delivered in wagons or other vehicles and is not weighed at the point of delivery as above described, then the wagons or other vehicles in which such coal is conveyed to the point of delivery shall be properly sealed by an authorized representative of the.....Department in a manner which will ensure against loss or abstraction of the coal therein contained from the time of weighing to the time of delivery, when the coal shall be removed by an authorized representative of the.....Department.

Corrections of Gross Tonnage.

Corrections for Moisture—If the moisture present in the coal sample be in excess of the limits specified in the standard analyses for the particular kind and size of coal represented by the said sample, the gross tonnage of coal determined in the manner prescribed in clause.....shall be corrected for the percentage of moisture in excess of the allowed limit by an amount directly in proportion to such excess percentage of moisture. For example, if broken coal as delivered contains six (6) per cent. of moisture, being two (2) per cent. in excess of the maximum amount specified herein, a deduction of two (2) per cent. of the gross weight of such delivery shall be made.

Corrections for Ash—The gross tonnage of coal after correction for excess of moisture shall be reduced at the rate of one (1) per cent. for each per cent. of ash in excess of the standard analysis specified herein for the particular kind and size of coal delivered. The percentage of ash will be computed to the nearest tenth of a per cent.

Corrections for Deficiency in British Thermal Units Per Pound—The gross tonnage of coal after correction for excess moisture shall be reduced at the rate of one (1) per cent. for each one hundred (100) British thermal units below the standard heating value specified in the standard analyses for the particular kind and size of coal delivered. The deduction for deficient heating value will be computed to the nearest fifty (50) units.

Corrections for Excess of Volatile Sulphur—The gross tonnage of coal after correction for excess of moisture shall be reduced at the rate of five (5) per cent. for each one (1) per cent. of volatile sulphur present in excess of the standard analysis specified herein, for the particular kind and size of coal delivered. The percentage of sulphur will be computed to the nearest tenth of a per cent.

Corrections for Excess of Volatile Combustible Matter—The gross tonnage of coal after correction for excess of moisture shall be reduced at the rate of two (2) per cent. for each one (1) per cent. of volatile combustible matter present in excess of the standard specified herein for the particular kind and size of coal delivered. The percentage of volatile combustible matter will be computed to the nearest tenth of a per cent.

Aggregate Deductions in Gross Tonnage—After the corrections for excess moisture shall have been made as herein specified, all percentage in deductions as above described to be made on account of a deficient number of British thermal units per pound, and an excess percentage of ash, volatile sulphur and volatile combustible matter will be aggregated and totalized, and will be deducted as a whole, and payment will be made only for the balance of the gross tonnage at the price bid per gross ton furnished, delivered and stored and trimmed (if so specified in the schedule).

Excess Clinker or Prohibitive Amount of Smoke Shall be Cause for Condemnation of Deliveries of Coal—All coal delivered under this contract, in addition to conformance with the standard analyses and other requirements herein contained, will be required to show, after a test of reasonable duration, that it does not produce excessive clinker or a prohibitive amount of smoke. When in the opinion of the head of Department or his designated representative the coal delivered from any one mine or group of mines shows in actual use that it produces excessive clinker or a prohibitive amount of smoke, its future delivery from such mine or mines shall, on notification from the head of Department or his designated representative be discontinued, and other suitable coal delivered.

Demurrage—Demurrage on this contract will be paid to the contractor only where delay in receiving the coal is caused by the inability of the City to receive the coal after it is ordered and delivered. In cases where previous deliveries of coal have been unsatisfactory, no allowance will be made for demurrage due to delay caused by preliminary inspection or analysis. In cases where allowed the demurrage will be made at the actual cost to the contractor as shown by proper documentary evidence.

Special Contract Provisions to be Included in Contracts for Purchase of Coal.

1. Bids for coal as delivered should be based upon a price per gross ton of 2,240 pounds avoirdupois.

2. The total amount of any bid will be determined by multiplying the price bid per ton for each class of coal to be delivered by the total tonnage of each class provided for in the contract. (In certain cases it may be desirable to provide for the awarding of contracts on the basis of the lowest price for points of delivery, or, on the basis of the total amount bid for each class of coal, as, for example, for egg, stove, buckwheat, etc. This is a matter, however, that may be left to the discretion of the contracting department).

3. Determination of the weight of coal actually delivered shall be made as follows: From the tonnage of coal delivered, deduction shall be made in the manner set forth in clause.....for deficiency in the number of British Thermal Units per pound, and for excess in the percentage of moisture, ash, volatile sulphur, volatile combustible matter, as determined on analysis when compared with the standard coal analyses as contained in the specifications, for each of the several classes of coal to be delivered. Coal furnished which contains a percentage of ash, volatile sulphur and volatile combustible matter lower than, and British Thermal Units per pound in excess of, the maximums and minimums established by the standard analyses contained in the specification for each class of coal, shall be deemed to be equal to the standard for the particular name of size and kind of coal delivered, and will be paid for on the gross tonnage delivered corrected for the percentage of moisture in excess of the maximum allowed in the specifications.

4. The amounts of coal required, and the size and quality thereof, and the points of delivery, are set forth in the schedule which forms a part of the contract.

5. The price bid for coal shall include all charges for furnishing and delivering, and for storing and trimming (where stated in the schedule) at such points as are designated in the schedule given in the contract, and at such times and in such quantities as may be ordered in writing by the (head of the department) or proper person designated by him to issue such orders.

6. The contractor will be held responsible for the delivery of the full weight of coal ordered until it is stored and trimmed (where stated in the schedule) at the point of delivery.

7. Wherever requested by the (head of department) or his representative to do so, the contractor shall furnish to the department copies of the original bills of lading, giving the weight of coal consigned and the date or dates of shipment, together with the name or names of the mine or mines from which such shipments of coal were taken.

8. If any of the coal delivered under this contract proves unsatisfactory in regard to clinker or smoke, or appears to contain a percentage of small sized coal, dust or impurities in quantities greater than is allowed by the specifications herein contained, and made a part of the contract, the (head of department) or person designated by him shall make such inspection or test of the coal as he may deem necessary, and in case the said.....condemns the coal, the remainder of the delivery shall forthwith be removed at the expense of the contractor, and coal which is satisfactory and in accordance with the specifications shall be furnished and delivered instead.

9. In case examination or analysis of coal before delivery shows that the coal does not conform to, or is inferior to the standard analysis for the particular name of kind and size of coal specified in the schedule contained in the specifications, any demurrage or other expenses caused by the delay incidental to such examination shall be paid by the contractor.

SPECIFICATIONS FOR FORAGE.

Barley.

Extra No. 3 Western Barley, grading New York Produce Exchange, shall be sound, plump, clean, free from other grains, and weigh not less than 44 pounds Winchester standard.

Bran.

Bran—To be wheat bran of the highest grade, best quality, coarse, fresh, and free from dirt and other impurities.

Corn.

Corn—To be No. 2 yellow corn, grading New York Produce Exchange; shall be sound, dry, clean and contain not more than 5 per cent. of white and red grains; not kiln dried.

Ground Corn—Shall be ground from No. 2 yellow corn, grading New York Produce Exchange; shall be sound, dry, clean and contain not more than 5 per cent. of white or red grains; not kiln dried; without adulteration.

Hay.

No. 1 Timothy Hay—Shall be timothy with not more than one-eighth mixed with clover or other tame grasses, properly cured, good color, sound and well baled; bales to be what are known to the trade as "large" bales.

Oats.

Clipped Oats—Shall be No. 2 white clipped oats, grading New York Produce Exchange.

Unclipped Oats—Shall be No. 2 white oats, grading New York Produce Exchange. Crushed Clipped Oats—Shall be crushed from No. 2 white clipped oats, grading New York Produce Exchange.

Crushed Unclipped Oats—Shall be crushed from No. 2 white oats, grading New York Produce Exchange.

Oatmeal.

Oatmeal shall be of the highest quality, packed in barrels weighing not less than 200 pounds.

Oilmeal.

Oilmeal—Shall be of the highest quality.

Salt.

Coarse Salt—Shall be first quality, unadulterated.

Fine Salt—Shall be first quality, unadulterated.

Rock Salt—Shall be first quality, in large lumps.

Straw.

No. 1 Straight Rye Straw—Shall be in large bales, clean, bright, long rye straw, pressed in bundles, sound and well baled.

In formulating proposals, the various departments, bureaus and offices shall affix the following to each specification:

(a) Sample of the above as specified shall be furnished before the opening of bids. (b) The successful bidder shall, after the award of the contract, submit to the Bureau of Audit of the Department of Finance a sample of sufficient size and quantity, similar to the sample submitted with his bid, for the use of the Department of Finance, for distribution to the several points to which deliveries are to be made under the contract.

(c) Payments will be made on the basis of the net weight of forage delivered. Respectfully submitted,

McDonald and the Interborough Rapid Transit Co., relative to the depression and alteration of the top of the roof of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad constructed under contract No. 1 on 4th avenue, at 21st street and 24th street, Manhattan, to provide space for the installation of high pressure fire service mains.

(On July 1, 1910, this matter was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board.)

Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith proposed agreement between John B. McDonald, the Interborough Rapid Transit Co. and this Department, in relation to the reconstruction of the tunnel roof of the 4th avenue subway, Borough of Manhattan, at the intersection of 21st and 24th streets and 4th avenue. At these locations it was found necessary to reconstruct the tunnel so as to provide space for the high pressure fire service mains. The said agreement has been examined and approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel. Yours very truly,

Agreement, made the day of May, 1910, between The City of New York, hereinafter called the City, acting by its Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, party of the first part, and John B. McDonald, of The City of New York, hereinafter called the Contractor, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Interborough Company, parties of the second part:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1900, the City, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation

of a Rapid Transit Railroad in The City of New York and otherwise, as therein mentioned; and

Whereas, By written instruments bearing date the 10th day of July, 1902, the Contractor duly assigned unto the Interborough Company the right and obligation to maintain and operate the said Rapid Transit Railroad for the term of years specified in the contract, and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the contract; and

Whereas, The said Rapid Transit Railroad has been constructed beneath the surface of 4th avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and is now being maintained and operated by the Interborough Company under the leasing provisions of the contract; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York is about to lay certain City water mains through 21st and 24th streets crossing 4th avenue, and the laying of said water mains renders it necessary that the roof of said Rapid Transit Railroad in said 4th avenue at 21st and 24th streets be altered and depressed for the purpose of a pipe crossing for said water mains; and

Whereas, The Public Service Commission for the First District has duly granted permission to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York to alter and depress the roof of said Rapid Transit Railroad as hereinafter provided, if John B. McDonald, the contractor under the contract hereinbefore referred to, and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, shall consent thereto; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York has requested the parties of the second part hereto to consent to said proposed changes in the Rapid Transit Railroad, and the parties of the second part are willing to consent thereto upon the terms and conditions hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, it is agreed as follows:

First—The parties of the second part hereby consent that the City may alter and depress the top of the roof of the said Rapid Transit Railroad in 4th avenue at 21st and 24th streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of a pipe crossing for the City water mains, on and subject to the following conditions: That no part of the work or construction hereby consented to shall extend below the bottom of the present roof beams of the said Rapid Transit Railroad; that the location of flat arches in the roof of said Rapid Transit Railroad for the purposes of said pipe crossing shall be as indicated on Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity drawing B-564; that the method of construction of such flat arches shall be in accordance with plan B-102 of the high pressure service of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of the City; that the said work shall be done subject to the direction and approval of the Chief Engineers of the Commission, and of the Interborough Company; that all of the said work shall be done by the City or by its contractors, at the expense of the City; and that the regular operation of said Rapid Transit Railroad shall not in any way be interfered with.

Second—The City agrees that the work of altering and depressing the top of the roof of the said Rapid Transit Railroad shall be done as hereinbefore provided, and that said work shall be wholly at the expense of the City; and it agrees to indemnify and save harmless the parties of the second part, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns, against and from all suits, actions, costs, counsel fees, expenses, losses, damages, judgments or decrees, brought or obtained, amounts paid and liability incurred, or in any way arising in consequence or by reason of the said work.

Third—The City also agrees that, in making the changes in the Rapid Transit Railroad hereby consented to, it will not do anything by which the safety and stability of said Rapid Transit Railroad may be endangered, nor by which the regular operation of said railroad shall be prevented or in any way interfered with, and that the structure of the Rapid Transit Railroad in 4th avenue shall be maintained at all times during the progress of said work in a proper and safe condition for the maintenance and operation of said Rapid Transit Railroad; and that it will repay to the Interborough Company any necessary expense incurred by it for the purpose of protecting the operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad during the progress of the said work.

It is expressly agreed that this instrument shall take effect if and when and only when the following approval and consents shall have been duly obtained, to wit:

1. The approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York.

2. The consents as subjoined of Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, the Empire State Surety Company, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company and Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland.

In witness whereof, this instrument has been executed for The City of New York by its Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the said John B. McDonald has hereto set his hand, and the said Interborough Rapid Transit Company has caused its corporate seal to be hereto affixed and attested by its Secretary, and these presents to be signed by one of its Vice-Presidents, all on the day and year first above written.

Gentlemen—Under date of June 27, 1910, Hon. Henry S. Thompson, Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval a form of agreement between The City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and John B. McDonald and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, relative to the depression and alteration of the top of the roof of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad constructed under Contract No. 1, on 4th avenue at 21st street and at 24th street, Borough of Manhattan, to provide space for the installation of high pressure fire service mains crossing 4th avenue.

From an investigation that I have caused to be made by the Chief Engineer of this Department, I report that the roof of the subway on 4th avenue at 21st and at 24th streets, is within four (4) feet of the street surface. The trolley tracks of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company occupy most of the space between the surface of the street and the roof of the subway. In order to complete the high pressure fire service system being installed in the locality, it is necessary that 20-inch service mains crossing 4th avenue pass between the tracks of the surface cars and the roof of the subway. This can be done only by depressing the top of the roof of the subway and installing flat arches to support the pipes and the street.

The agreement is in form identical with one approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 24, 1910, relative to depressing the top of the roof of the subway at Reade street to permit the installation of 24-inch high pressure water mains.

Permission to make the alteration has been granted by the Public Service Commission. The agreement has been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel and in order that work may be commenced there now remains to be gotten only approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The contractors installing the service mains have practically completed all work under their contract with the exception of the work dependent upon this agreement.

I therefore recommend that the proposed form of agreement between The City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and John B. McDonald and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, relative to the depression and alteration of the top of the roof of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad constructed under Contract No. 1, on 4th avenue at 21st and at 24th streets, Borough of Manhattan, to provide space for the installation of high pressure fire service mains, be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as requested. The Secretary presented the following communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District requesting, and report of the Comptroller recommending, an issue of \$44,000 corporate stock for extra work under Contract No. 2 for the construction of Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, and \$446,000 corporate stock for extra work under Contract No. 1 for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad.

(On June 24, 1910, this matter was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board.)

State of New York, Public Service Commission for the First District, New York, June 21, 1910.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District, in January of this year, with the approval and consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, and pursuant to an appropriation made by it, entered into agreements modifying Contract No. 1 for the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, and Contract No. 2 for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, so as to provide for the lengthening of station platforms. Work under these agreements is now in progress. These platforms, when lengthened, will accommodate ten-car express trains and six-car local trains, as against the eight-car express trains and five-car local trains accommodated by the station platforms at present. It is expected that these changes will increase the capacity of the subway nearly 25 per cent.

The Commission, in order that the full benefit of the lengthening of station platforms may be realized, has now prepared plans for additional means of entrance and exit at the Atlantic avenue station and the Fulton and Dey street station on the Brooklyn-Manhattan Railroad, and at the 14th street station, the Grand Central station, the 103d street and Broadway station, the 110th street and Broadway station, the 168th street and Broadway station and the 149th street and 3d avenue station on the Manhattan-Bronx Railroad. At some of these stations, notably the 14th street station and the Grand Central station, the present means of entrance and exit are already over-taxed, so that additional facilities would be desirable, irrespective of the question of increased capacity resulting from the lengthening of the platforms. The additional facilities which it is now proposed to provide at the above named stations consist of additional elevators and entrances and exits at 168th street, and of new exits, entrances and mezzanine floors at the other stations, with certain other necessary rearrangements at the Grand Central station. These will all be urgently needed in order to provide for the efficient handling of the increased passenger traffic in the subway when the longer trains are operated.

The present entrances and exits were designed to distribute and dispose of the traffic to and from the present platforms. With the increased capacity resulting from the lengthening of the present platforms it will not only be necessary to have more means of entrance and exit, but whatever new entrances and exits are provided should be so arranged as to carry off the passengers leaving the subway expeditiously, and properly to distribute the passengers entering the subway over the lengthened platforms so that every car may receive its full share of the traffic. The benefits to be anticipated from the operation of longer trains cannot be fully realized unless the passengers are distributed evenly throughout the trains. The present entrances and exits cannot be expected to produce these results, however, as passengers would have to walk some distance from the present entrances to reach the lengthened portions of the platforms and would have to walk equally far, of course, from the lengthened portions of the platforms to reach the present exits. With the additional facilities which the Commission now plans to install, however, the increased traffic can be properly handled. Passengers entering the subway will be more evenly distributed over the new and longer platforms, and passengers leaving the subway will be more expeditiously disposed of.

The Commission is informed by its Chief Engineer that the additional facilities planned can be constructed at an expense not exceeding four hundred and forty-six thousand dollars (\$446,000) for Contract No. 1, and forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000) for Contract No. 2, making a total of four hundred and ninety thousand dollars (\$490,000) for the entire railroad. These facilities can, of course, be constructed at less expense now, as they can be built in conjunction with the work of lengthening station platforms, than they could later, when that work has been completed. The cost of providing these facilities as extra work will be added to the cost of the subway and be a part of the amount upon which interest and sinking fund charges are required to be paid by the contractor in the case of each contract.

The Commission has had tentative plans prepared showing the proposed additional facilities. A set of these plans is transmitted herewith for your information. These plans are entitled as follows:

Gentlemen—In communication dated June 21, 1910, the Public Service Commission for the First District, by its Acting Chairman, Hon. E. M. Bassett, makes requisition upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the authorization of bonds of The City of New York, to be issued and sold by the Comptroller, to the amount of four hundred and forty-six thousand dollars (\$446,000), to provide means to meet the requirements of extra work under Contract No. 1, being the contract for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx rapid transit railroad, and to the amount of forty-four thousand dollars (\$44,000) to provide means to meet the requirements of extra work under Contract No. 2, being the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan rapid transit railroad.

From an investigation that I have caused to be made by the Chief Engineer of this Department, I report that the extra work contemplated, as stated in the communication of the Public Service Commission, includes additional exits and entrances at the Atlantic avenue station and the Fulton and Dey street station on the Brooklyn-Manhattan railroad, and at the 14th street station, the Grand Central station, the 103d street and Broadway station, the 110th street and Broadway station, the 168th street and Broadway station and the 149th street and 3d avenue station, on the Manhattan-Bronx railroad.

The reasons as set forth by the Public Service Commission for the extra work are as follows:

1. That the lengthening of the station platform, which work is now in progress, will increase materially the usefulness of the subway.

2. The present entrances and exits of the subway are not designed for stations permitting the use of ten train cars, which will be possible when the work of lengthening the station platforms is completed, and are, therefore, lacking in necessary capacity and location best suited to the distribution of traffic.

3. That the work done at the present time in conjunction with the lengthening of the platforms may be performed at much smaller cost than at any time hereafter.

An examination of the plans for the extra work in question shows clearly the advantages to be derived in building additional entrances and exits to the stations listed above. There is no doubt, in order that the City and the public may derive the fullest benefit from the subway, the work should be commenced.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 37, chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and a requisition from the Public Service Commission, duly made by its Chairman, under and pursuant to a resolution of said Commission, adopted June 21, 1910, authorize the Comptroller to issue, from time to time, as may be required, corporate stock of The City of New York, as follows:

"For the purpose of extra work under Contract No. 2, for the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, and in accordance with the following plans submitted by the Public Service Commission, entitled:

"Atlantic avenue station, proposed extension of platforms. Drawing No. 1074/2.

"Contract No. 2. Fulton street station, proposed additions, stairway, southwest corner of Dey street and Broadway, Drawing No. 1058/2, an amount not exceeding \$44,000.

"For the purpose of extra work under No. 1, for the Manhattan-Bronx rapid transit railroad, and in accordance with the following plans, submitted by the Public Service Commission, entitled:

"14th street station, proposed changes and platform extension. Drawing 10092.

"Proposed addition to Grand Central subway station, File 1. Drawing No. 10207.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen--We transmit herewith for the consideration of your Board three resolutions bearing upon the work of your subcommittee on the Budget exhibit for the present year.

The first resolution directs that the departmental estimates be printed in the City Record as received from the Departments. These estimates are not required by law to be printed, but the demand for those documents by civic bodies and by individuals making a study of the administrative cost of government of The City of New York, and also the use to be made of these printed estimates in the departments, justifies their publication as recommended.

Your Committee has gone carefully into the matter of the expense of a Budget exhibit which will be of value to the public and to the City departments, and find that the cost will approximate \$25,000. It is necessary that the administration of this fund shall be placed in the hands of some one member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and we have concluded that the President of the Borough of Manhattan, with his large administrative office staff and other facilities for handling the contract and order work, should be designated to take charge of this part of the work. We, therefore, submit a resolution requesting a transfer to replenish the contingency account of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and also a resolution designating the President of the Borough of Manhattan to act for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the letting of contracts and other financial matters in connection with the Budget exhibit. Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby designates the President of the Borough of Manhattan to enter into all contracts and make all agreements on behalf of said Board for all the expenses to be incurred preliminary to or in connection with the Budget exhibit to be held in The City of New York during the month of October, 1910, and that a sum not to exceed \$25,000 shall be expended under the direction of the said President of the Borough of Manhattan for the purposes of the Budget exhibit out of the contingent account of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as replenished by the transfer made on this date.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond, suggesting, and report of the Comptroller recommending, that

all departments and offices of the City Government prepare, as far as possible, their Budget estimates for the year 1912 upon the basis of cost data and work requirements, in addition to the regular Budget schedules, and that preference in the matter of appropriation of funds shall be given to such departments and offices as may comply with these conditions:

Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, New Brighton, N. Y., March 9, 1910.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Sirs--I beg to call to the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a matter of policy concerning appropriations and budget estimates which I believe to be of fundamental importance in the administration of City business. As a result of my observations it seems that the tendency of the segregated budget is altogether too negative in effect, simply limiting expenditures, not promoting efficiency. It certainly is rather absurd to expect economy in expenditures when economy and efficiency means practically the same thing. The real question is: "What results do we produce?" not "What do we expend?"

I therefore would suggest that appropriations hereafter be considered and authorized upon the following bases:

A. Lump sum or departmental appropriations shall be allowed when founded upon unit cost data and work requirements.

B. In any department or office where such cost data is available several salary grades for the same class of work shall be established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so that the head of a department or office may increase or decrease wages within such specified limits, basing such action upon predetermined standards of work and efficiency records.

C. Each head of a department or office in which fundamental cost data are available shall have direct responsibility in the expenditure of appropriations, the results attained, as shown by cost records, however, being checked by some independent authority, such as the Commissioners of Accounts or the Department of Finance.

Should appropriations be granted upon the foregoing principles, the modern methods of advanced planning, standardization of duties, prompt rewards and punishment of employees for results accomplished, cost recording, cost checking and resulting economy in the expenditure of appropriations will obtain. The head of a department or office, instead of requesting larger appropriations will desire to secure greater efficiency with limited expenditures. Employees will be directly interested in securing economy, as their wages will depend upon the efficiency of the department or bureau in which they work. Salary questions will be automatically adjusted when standards of work are fixed and if prompt decreases as well as increases in salary depend entirely upon the efficiency of the individual, heads of departments or offices will have power to secure results and employees will have some incentive to better their condition. The old difficulties with lump sum appropriations will disappear when work costs and work data are available and subject to check by an independent authority. Wages will be paid for work performed instead of hours of labor, and every inducement will be offered to economize in the purchase of supplies, payments for repairs to plant and all other charges which tend to increase unit costs of work.

Instead of the present repressive methods brought about on account of the segregated budget, affirmative, progressive procedure would result when work accomplished, instead of hours of labor, formed the main basis in the appropriation of funds, in the payment of salaries and in the resulting unit costs of work performed.

As most of the bureaus in my office possess work cost records, extending over a period of years, I would ask the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize a test of this system for providing appropriations in the Borough of Richmond. For the purpose of securing a fair trial of this procedure, I beg to request the co-operation of the Commissioners of Accounts and the Department of Finance, to the end that budget appropriations may be arranged for the year 1911 based upon previous work cost data and future work requirements.

For the purpose of considering the possible effect of such a method and determining the feasibility thereof for the whole City, it seems to me desirable to start at once on the basis proposed, and to initiate this system in the preparation of general budget estimates for the ensuing year, it is necessary to establish the principles and details of the forms for submission to the Board in time for ample discussion. I therefore present the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be requested to co-operate with the President of the Borough of Richmond in examining into and reporting on the advisability and feasibility of basing all maintenance appropriations upon work cost data.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen--In the matter of a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of March 9, 1910, which was referred to the Comptroller and to the Mayor for reference to the Commissioner of Accounts, I beg to submit the following preliminary report as the result of a conference with the Commissioner of Accounts and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

This communication suggests the adoption of a policy affecting the present form of budgetary appropriations, in that it contemplates authorizing such appropriations in "lump sum" form (as distinguished from the present segregated form) when supported by budgetary estimates based upon suitable cost data and work requirements.

It further contemplates according the head of a department or office an independence of action not now obtained under the segregated form of Budget, and proposes that such head be empowered to increase or decrease the salaries of his subordinates within limits fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for each class of work in so far as such action is not inconsistent with the civil service law.

It also provides that the test of efficiency of administration be made by an independent office, through systematic inspection of the record of the results accomplished in the departments to which lump sum appropriations are granted.

It concludes with a resolution requesting an examination of and report on the advisability and feasibility of basing all maintenance appropriations on work cost data.

The proposition submitted by the President of the Borough of Richmond presents many features of interest, some of which are evidently of great value fundamentally, in securing economy in the expenditure of appropriations and resulting efficiency in the public service. The practical application of such a new policy, however, involves so many matters demanding careful consideration that it does not appear to be possible to prepare a comprehensive report on this subject in time to permit its application, if desirable, to the general departmental appropriation in the 1911 Budget. Such a report will be submitted to your Board at the earliest possible moment, and in ample time to allow for the consideration of its application to various departments or offices in the 1912 Budget for test purposes.

It is, however, the consensus of opinion of those to whom this matter has been referred, that it is eminently desirable and entirely feasible that all maintenance appropriations in the 1912 Budget should be based on cost data and work requirements in addition to the usual salary schedules and supply or repair estimates. To this end it is recommended that the resolution herewith transmitted be adopted. Respectfully,

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Sirs—In pursuance of section 659 of the Laws of 1910, entitled "An Act in Relation to the Inferior Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction in The City of New York," defining their powers and jurisdiction and providing for their offices, it will be absolutely essential for the proper establishment of the necessary procedure to carry this law into effect to increase the staff of Justices, Clerks and other employees, and for that reason I ask that immediate action be taken, under the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, to establish the various grades of the positions named below. The law provides that there shall be branches of the Children's Court in each Borough, and also further provides that on and after the 1st of September next there be no more Policemen employed in the various courts. So that in order to be ready to properly administer these courts, we will have to be in a position to appoint the several employees somewhat before that date.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under the provisions of chapter 659, Laws of 1910, entitled "An Act in Relation to the Inferior Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction," it will be necessary to establish additional grades of positions for appointees already made and to be made by the Chief Justice and the Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions of The City of New York.

There are a number of mandatory positions provided for in the new law, which practically reorganizes and consolidates the Courts of Special Sessions and the Children's Courts. I am informed by the Chief Clerk of the Court that there is urgent need for the establishment of grades of positions, as an enlarged clerical force will be required on or before September 1 for the proper organization of the court and the transaction of business.

It would appear to me, however, that until more definite information as to the minimum number of additional Clerks Probation Officers, Interpreters and other subordinates whose services will be actually required is furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, only such grades of new positions should be established as are of a mandatory character or the establishment of which is a present necessity.

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—In the matter of providing funds for the salaries of additional Justices, Clerks and other employees of the Court of Special Sessions and to meet other additional expenses of the Court in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 659, Laws of 1910, entitled "An Act in relation to the inferior courts of criminal jurisdiction in The City of New York," I would report as follows:

Chapter 659, Laws of 1910, practically reorganizes and consolidates the Courts of Special Sessions and the Children's Court of the First and Second Divisions. Under its provisions the courts are discontinued as separate division courts and are merged into one Court of Special Sessions of The City of New York.

The new law contains many provisions of a mandatory character requiring the providing of large sums of money to pay the salaries of additional Justices, Clerks, Probation Officers, Court Attendants and other additional employees. Funds will also have to be provided to meet the cost of establishing additional parts of the Court of Special Sessions and for the establishment of Children's Courts in each of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond.

At a meeting of the Justices held June 13, a schedule of proposed salaries for new positions and proposed increases in the salaries of employees of the Court of Special Sessions and Children's Courts, now in office, was adopted. The schedule shows that sixty-two new positions have been decided upon as necessary for the proper conduct of the business of the Court of Special Sessions and its various parts. The annual cost of salaries for the proposed additional positions totals \$130,970. The increases proposed for employees now in office amount to \$32,750. The annual expenses of the Court of Special Sessions and the Children's Courts, based on the June payroll, would amount to \$187,550.

From and after September 1, Police Officers cannot be detailed as Attendants or Probation Officers at the Court of Special Sessions or the Children's Courts. The new law provides for the appointment of civilians to those positions and the payment of their salaries.

Inasmuch as the Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions has not decided upon the appointees for the positions of Clerks, Attendants, Probation Officers and other subordinate employees, and also for the reason that no estimate has been submitted of the cost of equipping additional court rooms, I am of the opinion that at this time an appropriation of \$30,000 will be sufficient to pay the necessary expenses of the Court until it is permanently organized and equipped for the transaction of business.

In view of the facts herein stated I would recommend favorable consideration of the resolution hereto attached. Respectfully,

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, during the year 1909, authorized the increase and established the grades for Chief Engineer at \$5,000 and Superintendent of Parks at \$4,000 per annum, but, owing to the fact that the Budget for 1910 was made prior to the establishment of the grades, no provision was made in the Budget for their payment.

To meet the proposed increase, the Commissioner requests that the amount necessary, \$2,000, be transferred from the account entitled No. 851, General Maintenance, Salaries and Wages, Mechanical Force, in which he has an unexpended balance, and that the schedule be modified by eliminating the line items Foreman of Mechanics, at \$1,800, and Steamfitter, at \$1,255.50, inserting in lieu thereof Steamfitter, \$55.50, and by increasing the allowance for Blacksmiths \$1,000, making it read \$4,660.

For the past few years the horseshoeing was done on contract by an outside blacksmith, at an annual cost of \$5,000. The present Commissioner is having all shoeing done by departmental labor, and has shown this year a saving of about \$1,000.

It is to be noted, however, that this increased compensation which was approved by the Board of Aldermen on July 19, 1910, unless previously approved by his Honor the Mayor, will not become effective until approximately the end of the present month.

I am advised that this fact has been called to the attention of the Commissioner's representative, who has stated that, if a sufficient amount is transferred to permit the increased compensations to be paid to the employee in question from August 1, 1910, it will be agreeable to the Commissioner.

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District, relative to, and report recommending, approval of change of contract plan for that part of Section 3, 4th avenue subway under Ashland place, and a portion of 4th avenue, and for the widening of Ashland place, Brooklyn:
(On May 20, 1910, this matter was referred to the Chief Engineer of the Board and the Comptroller, upon a requisition of the Public Service Commission.)

State of New York, Public Service Commission for the First District, Tribune Building, 154 Nassau Street, New York, May 19, 1910.
To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

In response to your request that substantial changes in subway construction be approved by you in advance of their being carried into effect, the Commission desires to submit for your approval a proposed change in the portion of the 4th avenue subway under Ashland place, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The routes and general plan for the 4th avenue subway provide in respect to this portion:

"The railway to be constructed in section 11-E-1, including the spur or connection with Lafayette avenue, may, if necessary, occupy private property, to be acquired for the purpose on either or both sides of Ashland place."

The east line of the subway as indicated on the contract drawings for the 4th avenue subway extends close to the building line on the east side of the street and the west line of the subway extends a distance of about 15 feet into private property on the west side of Ashland place, from Fulton street to Hanson place.

It has been deemed advisable to shift the subway about 10 feet to the west for the following reasons:

The Brooklyn Academy of Music, which is one of the most important buildings in the Borough of Brooklyn, occupies the site on the southerly side of Lafayette avenue, extending from St. Felix street to Ashland place, and running along both of these streets for some distance. This building is very heavy and is of the cantilever type of construction, and it is feared that even a slight accident might result in substantial damage to this building. The officers of the Academy are also fearful that even if the subway is constructed without damage to the building, the use of the opera and concert halls may be very seriously interfered with if there be any vibration due to the operation of the road. It is not expected that if there is any vibration it will be serious, but that is a matter which cannot accurately be predicted. If, however, there should be the damage during construction or during operation, the type of the Academy Building is such that the City, under the Joralemon street decision, might be required to answer in substantial damages. In order to construct the subway as originally designed, it would be necessary to permanently occupy a strip on the west side of Ashland place about 15 feet wide; to temporarily occupy in most cases the entire lots on that side of the street and to demolish all the buildings. As in any event it would be necessary to demolish the buildings, it has seemed to the Commission that in the end a saving might be effected by shifting the line about 10 feet to the west in order to avoid the Academy Building, and take some additional land, which the Commission is advised by its expert would cost about \$46,730. If any damage were done to the Academy, either through construction or operation, it would probably exceed this sum. The Commission is advised by its Chief Engineer that if this change is made there is very little likelihood of damage to the Academy Building. The contractor for this section has thus far refused to make any allowance to the City by reason of such a change, but under the contract, if an allowance should be made to the City the Chief Engineer may make a deduction from the contract price, subject to review by arbitration.

The Commission would also ask your consideration of another element of this question. There has been from time to time suggestions that Ashland place should be widened to about the same width as Lafayette avenue and Fulton street. If such a course be in accordance with your wishes, it would seem that this would be a good time to make the improvement. It will probably be necessary to take the strip on the west side of Ashland place in fee as the subway there has not been designed to carry heavy buildings, reserving, however, to the owners the right of light, air and access so that a claim cannot be made that the remainder of the lots are shut off from access to the street. As the buildings will all have been demolished, the expense of taking the additional 10 feet and throwing it into the street will be reduced to a minimum, and while proper protection will be afforded to the tunnels, the City will also have the advantage of a street 75 feet in width, instead of 50 feet, as at present.

A slight change is also made in the location of the station between Pacific and Bergen streets in making it parallel with the centre line of the street.

Transmitted herewith is a blue print entitled "Proposed relocation of subway between Fulton street and St. Marks place," which shows the present plan and the proposed change. Respectfully yours,

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Department of Education requesting and report recommending the amendment of resolution adopted February 11, 1910, which authorized issue of \$1,132,000 corporate stock for construction of elementary school buildings in Manhattan and Brooklyn, by transferring \$25,000 of the amount allowed for Public School 95 to the amount allowed for Public School 165:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance has received the following communication:
"Hon. JOHN GREENE, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Education:

"Dear Sir—I beg leave to call your attention to the fact that when bids were opened yesterday for the general construction of new Public School 165, Lott and

Hopkinson avenues and Amboy street, Borough of Brooklyn, the lowest bid was that of James MacArthur, in the sum of \$219,447.

"The Committee on Buildings was unable to award the contract for the reason that the amount appropriated by the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 11, 1910 (see Journal, page 406), was \$200,000.

"At the time the estimate was made in April of last year it was intended to erect a thirty-two classroom unit building, but the Board of Superintendents, in making its recommendation in February of the present year, desired a larger building, totaling up to thirty-nine classroom units, this being in view of the great increase in population in the vicinity, where there are some 2,800 pupils on part time.

"This recommendation was decided to be advisable, as well as economical, and the same was approved, with the hope that the expense might somehow fall within or very close to the amount of the appropriation.

"The resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 11 of this year, and in which was embodied the \$200,000 for the above-numbered school, also included an appropriation of \$416,000 for new Public School 95, Borough of Manhattan; \$216,000 for new Public School 19, Borough of Brooklyn; \$300,000 for new Public School 167, Borough of Brooklyn.

"Contracts have been let upon the last three, upon which there is a saving of something like \$117,000.

"We have been steadily at work on the revision of plans as to types, sizes and materials, some of the results being seen in the cost of Public School 95, Manhattan, on Clarkson and W. Houston streets, between Varick and Hudson streets, which was let (see Journal, Board of Education, page 1282) for \$353,300, the lowest bid ever obtained for a building of its size and type. We have, therefore, a surplus of some \$62,700 on this building.

"On behalf of the Committee on Buildings, I therefore request that the Committee on Finance present a resolution to the Board of Education at its meeting to-day asking the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take the steps necessary to reduce the amount of corporate stock for new Public School 95, Manhattan, from \$416,000 to \$391,000, and to increase the amount for Public School 165, Brooklyn, from \$200,000 to \$225,000.

"It is deemed advisable to ask for a larger sum for the last mentioned building than the amount of the lowest bid, \$219,447, so as to provide for contingencies which may arise in connection with the foundations and other like matters, and thus avoid future requests for transfers on this building. Our specifications and contracts provide for extra depths of excavations and foundations where needed, to be paid for at a fixed cost per cubic foot, and there should be, therefore, some money aside beyond the actual fixed sum of the contract. The lowest bid received for construction was \$219,447, or \$19,447 in excess of the amount available. The contracts for the three other buildings provided for by the issue of corporate stock have been awarded at figures which indicate a saving of about \$117,000, the contract for School No. 95 being awarded for \$353,300, a reduction of \$63,700 from the amount provided. In order to provide for the deficiency which exists in the allowance made for School No. 165, request is made that \$25,000 be transferred from the issue of corporate stock authorized for School No. 95 to the amount authorized for School No. 165.

The Comptroller presented the following communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District requesting, and report recommending the issue of \$12,000 corporate stock for extra work under contract No. 1, for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, in connection with the removal of exits and entrances to the Times Square Station, now on the south side of 42d street, just east of Broadway, to the southwest corner of Broadway and 42d street, etc.

(This matter was referred to the Comptroller earlier in the meeting.)

Public Service Commission for the First District, New York, July 21, 1910.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District is advised that at a meeting of your Board held on June 3, 1910, a resolution was adopted directing the President of the Borough of Manhattan to construct the roadway of 42d street, in the Borough of Manhattan, between the westerly line of Park avenue and the easterly line of 8th avenue, to the width of 55 feet, and to construct the sidewalks to the width of 22.5 feet from the curbline. The Commission, in anticipation of the action of your Board in this matter, has for some time been considering the advisability of removing one of the entrances to the Times Square Station of the Manhattan-Bronx Subway, which is affected by the widening of 42d street, and is at present located on the south side of 42d street, just east of Broadway, to the southwest corner of Broadway and 42d street, connecting it with the southbound platform of the Times Square Station by a passage under Broadway. A copy of a tentative plan for the removal of this entrance, which the Commission has prepared, is transmitted herewith. This plan is entitled "Proposed change of stair to Times Square Subway Station on south side of street west of Broadway," dated June 8, 1910, and numbered File No. 1, Drawing No. 10205.

This entrance will, of course, have to be removed from its present position in any case on account of the change in 42d street, and in the judgment of the Commission the best position from an operating standpoint to which to remove it is the southwest corner of Broadway and 42d street. If it is placed at that location there will be means of entrance and exit to and from the Times Square Station on each of the four corners of 42d street and Broadway. As matters stand at present, persons desiring to pass between the subway and the southwest corner of 42d street and Broadway have to cross either 42d street or Broadway, on both which streets the vehicular traffic, especially at the hours when the theatre crowds are entering or leaving the subway, is very heavy. The crossing is particularly bad in winter, when there is snow upon the ground. As the two platforms of the Times Square Station are connected by an underground passageway it will be possible from this new entrance and exit to reach either side of the station. Furthermore, it is anticipated that this entrance will be of considerably greater service at the proposed new location than if it were merely moved nearer to the south building line of 42d street, since there is already an entrance on the east side of Broadway, just south of 42d street, to accommodate passengers at that point.

This matter has been taken up with the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, which has agreed to do the work as an extra under Contract No. 1, the contract for the Manhattan-Bronx Subway. The Interborough Rapid Transit Co. will, of course, in that case, have to pay the interest and a sinking fund charge upon the bonds issued to meet the expense of this improvement, whereas if the work should be done by the Borough authorities at the expense of the City as a part of the work of widening 42d street, the City would not be reimbursed for any expense to which it might be put in removing the stairway.

The Public Service Commission for the First District therefore, pursuant to the provisions of section 37 of the Rapid Transit Act, being chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, as amended, and pursuant to chapter 429 of the Laws of 1907, as amended, hereby makes requisition upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York for the authorization of bonds of The City of New York to be issued and sold by the Comptroller, to the amount of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000), to provide means to meet the requirements of extra work under Contract No. 1, being the contract for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad.

Gentlemen—In communication dated July 21, 1910, the Public Service Commission for the First District, by its Chairman, Hon. William R. Wilcox, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$12,000, to provide means to pay for extra work of removing one of the entrances to the Times Square Station of the Manhattan-Bronx Subway, located on the south side of 42d street, just east of Broadway, to the southwest corner of Broadway and 42d street, connecting it with the southbound platform of the Times Square Station by a passage under Broadway.

From an examination that I have caused to be made by the Chief Engineer of this Department, I would report:

The necessity for the change is two-fold. First: The widening of 42d street by the Borough President of Manhattan, authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 3, 1910, necessitates the removal and relocation of said entrance. Second: The present location of the entrance is so far east of Broadway

that the crowds entering and leaving the subway chose the more direct outlet to Broadway, the entrance upon Broadway just south of 42d street, thereby congesting traffic at that point.

The proposed change will eliminate to a great extent the present congestion by providing an entrance much nearer Broadway, directly in line with the great flow of traffic at this station.

If the appropriation requested is made, the work contemplated can be done in conjunction with that of providing additional entrances at various other stations of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration; and interest and Sinking Fund charges upon the bond issued will be paid by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company; whereas, as pointed out by the Public Service Commission, if the work is done by the Borough authorities as a part of the work of widening 42d street, the City will not be reimbursed for any expense to which it might be put in removing the stairway.

I therefore recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 37, chapter 4, Laws of 1891, as amended, and a requisition of the Public Service Commission duly made by its Chairman under and pursuant to a resolution of the said Commission adopted July 21, 1910, authorize the Comptroller to issue from time to time as may be required corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding \$12,000, for the purposes of extra work under Contract No. 1, being the contract for the construction of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad, said extra work to include the removal of exits and entrances to the Time Square Station now on the south side of 42d street, just east of Broadway, to the southwest corner of Broadway and 42d street, together with a passage under Broadway connecting it with the southbound platform of said station, as shown on plans submitted by the Public Service Commission entitled, "Times Square Station. Notice is hereby given that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning intends during the coming winter season of 1910-1911, under the authority of section 541 of the Greater New York Charter, to hire for the purpose of removing snow and ice from the streets of The City of New York, such and so many horses, carts, or other vehicles of various sizes and capacities, as well as machines or other devices suitable for the purpose, at agreed rates or prices per load, per gang, per length of haul; the rate or price to be made for each different class of vehicle or device hereinafter described.

The compensation will cover the furnishing of the vehicle with horse and driver, or, if a motor vehicle, the motor power and operator.

Vehicles will be classed as follows:

Class "A"—Two-wheel ash or coal carts and single-horse express wagons or other vehicles having a capacity approximately of 1.5 cubic yards, water measure.

Class "B"—Bottom dumpers, sand trucks, and dirt trucks, with sideboards, or other vehicles having a capacity approximately of 2.5 cubic yards, water measure.

Class "C"—Bottom dumpers, brick trucks, and four-wheel ash trucks, or other vehicles, having a capacity approximately of 3.5 cubic yards, water measure.

Class "D"—All vehicles having a greater capacity than 3.5 cubic yards, water measure. Vehicles of this class will be measured and payment will be made per cubic yard, water measure.

All vehicles must be of proper pattern, subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or his representative. All vehicles must be of such a pattern as to permit of dumping quickly.

Bids for each class of vehicles must be made for length of haul, as follows:

Less than ¼ mile, between ¼ and ½ mile, between ½ and 1 mile, between 1 and 1½ miles, between 1½ and 2 miles.

Points of dumping will be designated from time to time and may be varied at the discretion of the Commissioner or the Inspector of Snow Removal, and each contractor must hold himself in readiness to dump at any point designated from any section within the district bid upon. The point of dumping may be at the pier or bulkhead line, upon vacant property, into sewer manholes, or at other points as may be secured by the Department of Street Cleaning.

The length of haul will be determined by estimation from the map commencing at the centre of gravity of the district and measured to the designated point of dumping.

Computation of the work to be paid for will be made daily.

The contractor, as a condition of his being entitled to receive these rates, and as a consideration therefor, must have ready at the loading point for the winter of 1910-1911 at least twenty (20) vehicles within two hours after the Commissioner of Street Cleaning has ordered the work to begin. And such gangs of vehicles shall be kept continuously working day and night, in specified districts, until notified by the Commissioner to stop the work, and the contractor must provide for the substitution of horses and drivers or motor operators so as to comply with the provisions of the Labor Law.

The work of loading the vehicles will be done by laborers employed by the Department of Street Cleaning, and when so loaded the vehicles shall be driven to

the dumping point designated by the loading foreman of the Department and there unloaded and dumped as directed by the dumping foreman of the Department.

The contractor shall on demand by the Commissioner dismiss without delay from his service on this work, any agent or employee who by disorderly, quarrelsome or disobedient conduct or incompetency in his manner of doing the work may lessen the efficiency of the said work.

The contractor shall have at all hours of the day and night a representative at some place designated by him before the work begins upon whom the Commissioner or his representative may serve notice as to increase of force, discharge of drivers or stoppage of the work whenever he may deem it necessary. And the contractor will provide and maintain at his own cost and expense an office conveniently located in the Borough of Manhattan and will provide and maintain telephone service at all hours of the day and night.

The hiring provided for in this notice will be done by the Commissioner after receiving bids from the owners or agents of the owners of said vehicles and devices, and the bids will be received by gangs of districts as given in the "Schedules of Snow Removal of the Department of Street Cleaning for 1910-1911," and bidders will be allowed to bid for one or more gangs as they may elect.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The following named persons appeared in opposition to the filling of the position through competitive examination, and urged that the same be made exempt; Hon. Willard H. Olmsted, Justice of the Court of Special Sessions; Hon. George J. O'Keefe, Justice of the Court of Special Sessions; Hon. John F. Hylan, City Magistrate, Second Division; Hon. Maurice Connolly, City Magistrate, Second Division; Hon. Alfred E. Smith, Assemblyman, from the Second District; Hon. James J. Hoey, Assemblyman, from the Thirteenth District.

Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in favor of the proposed examination, and urged that the position be retained in the competitive class. Dr. Charles F. McKenna, representing the St. Vincent de Paul Society, appeared in favor of examination. Edward M. Michelbacher, an Attendance Officer in the employ of the Board of Education, requested that the position be filled through competitive examination. Hon. Isaac Franklin Russell, Chief Justice, Court of Special Sessions, and Homer Folks, Esq., President of the State Probation Commission, also addressed the Commission. There being no further appearances, the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved: Francis M. Costello, from the position of Topographical Draftsman, at \$1,350 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, to a similar position at \$1,500 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx. Jacob Sendach, from the position of Topographical Draftsman at \$1,350 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx. David S. Moseson, from the position of Topographical Draftsman, at \$1,350 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, to a similar position at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Reinstatements, the following reinstatement was approved: John J. Hanlon, Clerk, in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens, at a salary of \$1,050 per annum, he having resigned from a similar position (Clerk, 3d grade), without fault or delinquency on his part, on March 7, 1910.

The Secretary presented, with a request for instructions, a requisition from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated July 7, for a list from which to appoint 15 Laborers in Nassau County. It appeared that there was a preferred list for the position of Laborer in Nassau County, made up of men who had been laid off on July 7, 1909, and whose eligibility for reappointment had expired on July 7, 1910, the day on which the requisition had been made, but one day before it had been received at the office of the Commission. After careful consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to certify the preferred list.

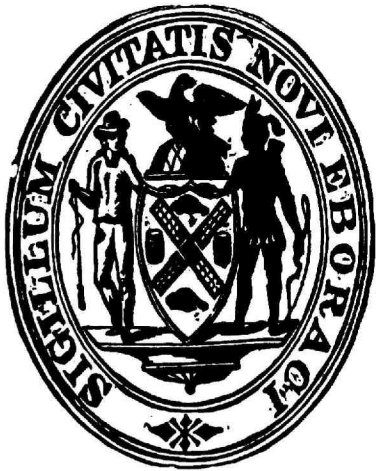

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
