By Alderman Folks—

Resolved, That, O. Grant Esterbrook, temporary Vice-Chairman, be and he is hereby elected permanent Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for the remainder of the term of 1912 and 1913.

The Chairman pro tem, called Alderman Folks to the chair.

Alderman Folks put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt said resolution.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—Aldermen Becker, Bedell, Bolles, Boschen, Bosse, Cole, Coleman, Cummskey, Cunningham, Curran, Diemer, Dotzler, Dowling, Downing, Donnelly, Dunn, Eagan, Eichhorn, Fink, Folks, Gaynor, Gelbke, Gilmore, Hamilton, Hannon, Igstaedter, Kenney, Lieberman, Loos, McCann, McCourt, McGarry, Marks, Martyn, Molen, Moore, Morrison, Muhlbauer, Mulligan, Nugent, O'Connor, O'Neil, O'Rourke, Pendry, Post, Pouker, Reardon, Schmidt, Shipley, Smith, Stevenson, Velten, Walsh, Weil, Wendel, Weston, White; President Miller, by Thomas W. Whittle, Commissioner of Public Works, and President Pounds—59.

And Alderman Folks declared that Alderman Esterbrook was duly elected Vice-Chairman of the Board for the remainder of the term 1912-1913. The Vice-Chairman expressed his appreciation of the confidence reposed in him by the Board and accepted the office.

No. 4612.

By Alderman Stevenson—

Resolved, That Leo V. Doherty, of 95 St. John's place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, be and he is hereby elected member of the Board of Aldermen for the 51st Aldermanic District, in the place and stead of Ardolph L. Kline.

The Vice-Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt said resolution.

Which was unanimously decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

The Vice-Chairman appointed Aldermen Stevenson, Nicoll and Reardon a committee to escort the newly elected Alderman before the proper authority to take the oath of office.

Subsequently the committee returned with Alderman Doherty.

The Vice-Chairman introduced Alderman Doherty to the Board, and assigned him to a seat.

In connection with the above resolution Alderman Dowling asked for the reading of the following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

No. 4613.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, September 29, 1913.

Board of Aldermen:

Sirs—I am in receipt of the following resolution adopted by your honorable Board on September 23, 1913:

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he is hereby respectfully requested to render to this Board, prior to the date of its next meeting, his opinion with respect to the following matters:

"First—Does there now exist a vacancy in the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York from the 51st Aldermanic District, by virtue of the fact that the former representative, Hon. Ardolph L. Kline, is now acting as Mayor of The City of New York?"

"Second—Does there exist in this Board a vacancy in the office of Vice-Chairman by virtue of the fact that the former Vice-Chairman, Hon. Ardolph L. Kline, is now acting as Mayor of The City of New York?"

The solution of the foregoing questions depends in the main upon the construction of the provisions of section 23 of the Greater New York Charter, which are as follows:

"Whenever there shall be a vacancy in the office of Mayor, or whenever, by reason of sickness or absence from the city, the mayor shall be prevented from attending to the duties of his office, the president of the board of aldermen shall act as mayor and possess all the rights and powers of mayor during such disability or absence. In case of a vacancy he shall so act until noon of the first day of January succeeding the election at which the mayor's successor shall be chosen. It shall not be lawful for the president of the board of aldermen, when acting as mayor in consequence of the sickness or absence from the city of the mayor, to exercise any powers of appointment to or removal from office, unless such sickness or absence of the mayor shall have continued thirty days; or to sign, approve or disapprove any ordinance or resolution unless such sickness or absence shall have continued at least nine days. The board of aldermen shall elect a vice-chairman to preside over its meetings, who shall possess the powers and perform the duties of the president of the board of aldermen, when the president is sick, absent or under suspension, or while the president of the board of aldermen is acting as mayor, or when a vacancy occurs in said office, and who shall, during such time, be a member of every board of which the president of said board is a member by virtue of his office."

In the last paragraph of this section it is expressly provided that during the vacancy or temporary absence in the office of President of the Board of Aldermen, the Vice-Chairman of said Board shall possess all the powers and perform all the duties of that office. There is no express provision for the succession of the Vice-Chairman to the office of Mayor, but among the duties and powers of the President of the Board of Aldermen, expressly conferred upon him, are the powers and duties of the Mayor in the event of a vacancy in the office or a temporary absence of the officer. The statute does not in terms distinguish between the consequences of a temporary absence of the officer and a vacancy in the office referred to, but this does not preclude a construction of the statute which will result in the recognition of such distinction, if that construction appears, upon reasonable grounds, to meet the real legislative intention.

I might add that in the consideration of the questions propounded, it is not necessary that we should inquire further than is sufficient for the proper application of the controlling provisions of law in the precise circumstances which have arisen—that is to say, the resignation of the incumbent of the office of President of the Board of Aldermen creating not a temporary absence, but a vacancy in said office, followed by the death of the Mayor, also creating not a temporary absence but a vacancy, which emergencies have arisen pending a mayoralty election to be held within the next two months, at which a Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen and other municipal officers are to be chosen by the electorate of the whole City for the regular official term prescribed by law.

Several theories have been suggested:

First—That in the circumstances described the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen would become Acting President and Acting Mayor, and perform, until the election and qualification of persons to fill such vacancies, the combined duties of the office of Mayor, the office of President of the Board of Aldermen and the office of Vice-Chairman of said Board.

Second—That as there is no express provision for the succession of the Vice-Chairman to the Mayoralty, there is now a vacancy in the office of Mayor to be filled by appointment of the Governor under the general provisions of the Public Officers Law (Sec. 42).

Third—That pursuant to Sec. 23 of the Charter, the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, upon the happening of the contingencies stated, becomes the Mayor of the City, automatically vacating his office as Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, to which is incidental the exercise of the powers, duties and functions of the President of the Board, involving, also, a vacancy in the office of Alderman in and for the district formerly represented by the Vice-Chairman of the Board.

From the conclusion that the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen only becomes Acting Mayor in the circumstances described, retaining also the functions and powers of the President of the Board of Aldermen, with membership in the various boards of which the President of the Board of Aldermen is a member by virtue of his office, it would follow that there would be vested in the same individual two distinct positions, to each of which a salary is attached by law, in conflict with Sec. 1549 of the Charter, which prohibits just these things.

Though it has been suggested that the offices of Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen are not incompatible, such incompatibility, in a legal sense, clearly appears when the same person attempts to exercise permanently the functions of both offices. That is to say, the combination of the functions of the offices of Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen in one individual would give him six votes in the Board of Estimate, or a majority of a quorum of that Board (Sec. 226 of the Charter), and two votes in the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or one-half of a quorum of that Board (Sec. 204 of the Charter), a consequence the mere statement of which describes a result so preposterous as that its contemplation as a matter of legislative intention may be instantly dismissed from the mind.

If we conclude that there is now a vacancy in the office of Mayor, it would follow that some of the most important and necessary functions of our City Government must be suspended for more than three months. It is familiar knowledge that for issuance of special revenue bonds under paragraph 8 of Sec. 188 of the Charter, the "concurrent vote of all the members of the Board of Estimate" is required, and that for other and equally important municipal functions the "unanimous vote" of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, of which the Mayor is also a member, must be had (Secs. 204, 205 et seq.). For other Charter sections requiring the unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund or Board of Estimate see Secs. 221a and 246. These considerations serve to give added emphasis to the legal maxim that the law abhors a vacancy in office. Certainly no interpretation of a legislative act will be unnecessarily indulged which does violence to this maxim, or would result in the complete breaking down or serious interruption of the proper administration of the business of the City.

The notion that the Governor or Acting Governor might fill such a vacancy under the general provisions of Sec. 42 of the Public Officers Law, and that thus a vacancy might be avoided, does not commend itself to my judgment. Such a construction would be contrary, if not to the letter, at least to the spirit, of that provision of our Constitution designed to secure local self-government, as applied to the choice of local officers (see N. Y. Const. Art. 10, Sec. 2; Lincoln's Const. Hist. of N. Y., Vol. 4, pp. 733 et seq.).

Upon the foregoing considerations, I am of the opinion that the only practical and satisfactory solution of the questions presented is that under section 23 of the Charter the former Vice-Chairman of the Board of Aldermen, upon the happening of the contingencies already stated, become Mayor of the City for the remainder of the present year, automatically vacating his office of Vice-Chairman, as well as his office of Alderman in and for the district formerly represented by him.

North Side Board of Trade in The City of New York, Third avenue, 137th street and Lincoln avenue, Borough of The Bronx, N. Y., September 24, 1913.

Dear Sir—At a regular meeting of the North Side Board of Trade held on the 24th inst., the enclosed report with accompanying resolution was adopted and the Secretary requested to send you copy.

To the President and Members of the North Side Board of Trade:
During the past two years the elementary school population in the Borough of The Bronx has increased about 18 per cent. from 70,000 to 83,000. To meet this rapid growth accommodations have been provided by the erection of new buildings and additions, and the use of hired annexes and temporary portable buildings. Four large new schools have been opened during this period, and wings with additional rooms built on four school buildings. About 44 rooms have been equipped in private property leased to the City, and 8 rooms in portable school buildings. Notwithstanding this increase in accommodations the part-time register has swelled from about 17,000 to over 30,000, or about 70 per cent.

There are at present four large new buildings under contract and under construction, namely:

Public School 50, 172d st. and Vyse ave., ready about February, 1914. Public School 51, 158th st. and Jackson ave. Public School 52, Kelly st. and Avenue St. John. Public School 53, 168th st. and Teller ave.

On July 15, 1913, the Board of Aldermen approved of issues of corporate stock (approved by the Mayor on August 20, 1913), as follows:

\$147,800 for the construction and equipment of a new school at 207th st. and Hull ave. (Public School 56). \$114,300 for the construction and equipment of an addition to Public School 21, at 235th st. near White Plains ave. \$113,300 for the construction and equipment of an addition to Public School 12, at Overing st. and Benson ave., Westchester.

Appropriations are now pending for two new school buildings as follows:
Public School 54, Intervale ave., Freeman and Chisholm sts. Public School 55, in the vicinity of St. Paul's place and Washington ave.

It is clear that if all of these projected buildings could be ready to-morrow the congestion in this borough would be greatly relieved. But it is scarcely probable that the last operation will be finished within two years, or 18 months at the earliest. Meanwhile the school population will go on increasing, and the opening of the new subway lines will make the growth even more rapid than before. There must, therefore, be no cessation of building operations, if we are ever to catch up and keep pace with the natural increase, so as to gain relief from the intolerable part-time conditions.

A plan has been proposed and adopted by the Board of Education at a recent meeting to remedy part-time conditions. The Committee of Superintendents who devised the plans have hopes that it will reduce part-time from 90,000 in the whole City to 40,000 by the end of September. Whether or not it will be successful remains to be seen, but your committee is doubtful. Moreover, as the Superintendents say, all devices to reduce part-time are but temporary expedients, and the building of more schools in the only solution.

Your committee recalls a mistake that was made four years ago by the financial authorities of the City, which was one of the main causes of the present congestion. A large appropriation for new sites and buildings was vetoed by the Mayor a few days before his term expired. It was many months before the new administration found itself, and made appropriations for the schools. Meanwhile much valuable time had been lost, and the school population kept on steadily increasing. It is to be hoped that in the heat of a political campaign and in the confusion incident to a change of administration the importance of school appropriations will not be again ignored, or such appropriations postponed for political reasons. Your committee would urge that appropriations be made immediately for the increased accommodations projected and requested by the Board of Education. Building operations now in progress must be hurried to completion, and new buildings in congested districts commenced at once.

The following resolutions are offered for adoption:

Whereas, The number of sittings in the public schools in the Borough of The Bronx is wholly inadequate to the needs of the school population and a deplorable condition of congestion exists; and

Whereas, The school population in the said Borough is rapidly and constantly increasing, and such increase will be accelerated as the new subway lines approach completion; and

Whereas, In the opinion of the North Side Board of Trade, all devices to decrease the part-time evil with the present accommodations, are but temporary expedients, and no permanent relief can be secured except by the erection of new school buildings;

Resolved, That the North Side Board of Trade hereby respectfully urges upon the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that liberal appropriations of funds be immediately made to the Board of Education for the erection of new school buildings in the Borough of The Bronx; and

Resolved, That copies of the foregoing report, and of these resolutions be forwarded to the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and Secretary of the Board of Education.

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, July 14, 1913.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On June 10, 1913, the Finance Committee of the College of The City of New York requested funds to enable it to comply with the Fire Commissioner's orders that certain changes be made in the equipment of the College buildings, so as to conform with the rules and regulations of the Fire Prevention Bureau.

It is proposed to install direct pump pressure on all fire lines, at an estimated cost of \$3,000, and to cover all entrance doors from subway to buildings, and doors to certain pump rooms, with kalameine iron at an estimated cost of \$700, making a total estimated expenditure of \$3,700.

The proposed expenditure of \$3,000 is for a 6-inch water line connecting the five buildings. The Engineer of the Department of Finance who investigated the request with a view to determining the amount of work actually necessary at the present time reports that the main building is now well served by tank and pumps so that it can take care of itself independently of the other buildings. The other four buildings, viz.: the Gymnasium, Townsend Harris Hall, Mechanic Arts Building and Chemical Building, are served by tank pumps located in Townsend Harris Hall. The water supply is insufficient for these buildings, particularly in the Chemical Building and the Gymnasium. It is advisable that new supply lines be installed connecting these four buildings with the pumps in Townsend Harris Hall. This installation, which will cost approximately \$1,800, will be of a permanent character, it being part of the plan laid down for the entire improvement. The remainder of the work connecting the main building with the system so as to provide cross connections may be done at a later date.

The work of kalameining the doors connecting the various buildings with the subway, while advisable, is not urgent. These doors are of oak and are good fire stops.

We recommend, therefore, that corporate stock to the extent of \$1,800 be authorized to provide for the new fire lines above indicated. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—Our roofs are in bad condition. So many leaks and breaks have developed during the past week that it will require a considerable sum of money to repair the same. Something must be done immediately; much damage has been done already; many books have been ruined; expensive ceilings marred, and, unless we make repairs, we may have to close our main reading room because the plaster ceiling will certainly fall, softened as it is by water. Likewise our electric plant is threatened with destruction. Whenever it rains we have to cover the machinery, which often forces us to shut down.

I am doing my best to avert a disaster, and I recommend that Commissioner Stover be acquainted with the facts in the case and be requested to secure at least \$3,000 to make repairs before winter. Respectfully,

These leaks have developed during the past week, probably from the contraction caused by the cooler weather. Of course, when the weather becomes really cold the leaks will be larger and more numerous.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 53 of article 3 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, and section 76 of article 4 of the same part, in relation to the sale of real estate belonging to the Sinking Fund.

Be it Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 53 of article 3 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 53. All moneys heretofore received and hereafter to be received from the following sources are hereby pledged and appropriated to and constitute and form a fund called the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, until the whole of the stocks of The City of New York shall be finally and fully redeemed, namely:

1. For commutation of quit-rents on grants.
2. For quit-rents arising from such grants as were issued prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and four.

3. The net proceeds of all sales of real estate belonging to the corporation when sold (.), except when the same are made payable to a fund, the purpose of which is restricted to the purchase of other real estate, as provided by the Charter of The City of New York.

4. The net proceeds of all bonds and mortgages payable to the corporation when collected (.), except when the said bonds and mortgages are part of the proceeds of the sale of real estate and the proceeds thereof are deposited in a fund, the purpose

of which is restricted to the purchase of other real estate, as provided by the Charter of The City of New York.

5. For licenses to pawn brokers and dealers in the purchase or sale of second-hand furniture, metals or clothes.

6. For hackney-coach licenses and street vaults.

7. For exclusive occupation of private wharves, basins and piers.

8. For market fees and market rents.

9. The proceeds of all bonds and mortgages which may have or shall become the property of the corporation, in pursuance of the ordinance creating the fire loan stock of The City of New York.

10. The building included in the establishment called the Almshouse, at Bellevue, together with the lots of land and water rights attached thereto when sold, and the rents when leased.

11. Such portions thereof of the annual taxes levied in The City and County of New York as may be collected for the redemption of the floating debt stock of The City of New York and the fire indemnity stock of The City of New York.

12. All such other sources of revenue or sums of money as the said corporation shall hereafter think proper to appropriate to said fund.

Sec. 2. Section 76 of article 4, of part 1, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to the Sale of Real Estate Belonging to the Sinking Fund, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 76. Whenever any real estate shall have been sold pursuant to the preceding sections of this article, it shall be the duty of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or a majority of them, to give a certificate, under their hands, that the same has been sold pursuant to the provisions of this article, and upon the production of such certificate and the evidence that the proceeds of such sale have been paid into the treasury to the credit of the sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt (.) or such other appropriate fund as provided by the Charter of The City of New York, it shall be the duty of the Mayor of the City and the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen to execute proper conveyances of such real estate under their hands and the seal of the city corporation.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed change of name to be necessary in order that the sale of this substance may not be made under the common name of alcohol, which misleads many persons to the extent that sometimes serious injuries are inflicted. It therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the sale and use of "wood alcohol" in the City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. The chemical composition known professionally as CH₃OH is hereby prohibited from being sold in packages of less than one barrel capacity under any other name than "methyl," to which may be prefixed the commercial grade, such as "95 per cent.," "97 per cent.," etc.; nor shall it be lawful to use said chemical composition for any medicinal purposes, internal or external. Said chemical composition, when sold in packages of less than one barrel capacity, shall be labeled with a regulation poison label, to which the following words shall be added thereto: "It is unlawful, also dangerous, to use this fluid for any medicinal purposes, internal or external, and, when used in manufacturing operations, proper ventilation shall be provided." Said words shall be printed in type not less in size than eight point, as known to the trade, in red letters on a white field.

Section 2. Any person guilty of a violation of this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall, upon conviction thereof, before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars for the first offense and not less than fifty dollars for any subsequent conviction, and, in default of payment of any fine so imposed, shall be committed to the City Prison for a term of ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of each dollar of such fine.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

AN ORDINANCE to amend "An Ordinance Relative to Motion Picture Theatres," approved July 8, 1913.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 9, section 352D, article III., title 2, chapter 7, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

9. Aisles—All aisles in the auditorium or gallery must not be less than three feet in the clear. No aisle or passageway (or space) in the (rear of the) auditorium or gallery shall be obstructed by any camp stool, sofa, settee, or other obstruction, nor shall any person be permitted to stand or sit therein, except as hereinafter provided:

It shall be lawful to permit persons to stand in the aisles, passageways and space in the rear of the seats as follows:

(a) If the aisle, passageway or space be more than four feet and less than sixteen feet wide, persons may stand therein provided an unobstructed passageway of at least four feet in width is left open in said aisle or passageway.

(b) If the aisle, passageway or space be more than sixteen feet wide, persons may stand therein, provided an unobstructed passageway of at least eight feet in width be left open in said aisle or passageway.

(c) If the aisle, passageway or space be four feet or less in width and there be an outer passageway in the rear of the auditorium, to which all aisle heads have direct access, it shall be lawful to permit two rows of persons to stand in said aisle, passageway or space in the rear of the seats.

(d) In balconies or galleries one row of persons.

(e) In no event, nor under any circumstances, shall any person be permitted to stand at the head of any aisle. The space to be occupied by said persons shall be separated by tape, ribbon, or other easily broken material, supported by light posts fixed in stationary sockets, and to be not less than three nor more than four feet from the floor; all to be so constructed and placed as to be no obstruction in case of panic or emergency.

Any manager, proprietor, usher, agent or employee who shall violate any of the provisions of this section shall severally pay a penalty in the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) for each violation.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN AMENDMENT to the Ordinance Relative to Motion Picture Theatres.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Subsection 352G, article 3, title 2, chapter 7 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. Through its Motion Picture Inspectors, as provided in subsection 352B of this ordinance, the Bureau of Licenses shall inspect, subject to the authority of the Mayor, the character of exhibitions in motion picture theatres and shall report to the Mayor any offense against morality, decency or public welfare contained in said exhibitions. Official Municipal Censorship.

2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to show or exhibit any motion pictures in any licensed place of public amusement, in any theatre, concert hall, motion picture theatre or in any open air motion picture theatre without first having obtained a permit therefor issued by the Bureau of Licenses as hereinafter provided. Every day's exhibition in any licensed place of public amusement without such permit therefor shall be deemed a distinct and separate violation of this ordinance.

3. The Bureau of Licenses shall not grant a permit to exhibit any motion picture, until an application in writing shall have been made therefor to the Bureau of Licenses, nor until the plates, films, rolls, or other like apparatus by or from which such motion picture is shown or produced shall be inspected by a censor or censors, duly authorized, by the Department of Education from the teachers, examiners or supervising staff thereof for the work of censoring motion pictures, nor until the motion picture itself shall be seen by the censor or censors, nor until a letter of approval from the Department of Education fully describing said motion picture shall have been received by the Bureau of Licenses.

In case such picture is approved by the Department of Education, the Bureau of Licenses shall issue a permit in writing and in such form as the Bureau of Licenses shall prescribe.

4. If any motion picture for the exhibition of which an application for such permit is made, is an obscene, indecent, immoral or impure motion picture which would tend to the corruption of the morals of youth or others, or if it pictures any crime, any murder, suicide, robbery, hold-up, stabbing, assaulting, clubbing or beating of any human being in such detail as to offend the sense of morality or decency it shall be the duty of the Bureau of Licenses to refuse such permit. Otherwise it shall be the duty of the Bureau of Licenses to grant such permit.

The Bureau of Licenses, however, shall not grant any such permit, unless it has received a letter of approval from the Board of Education, through its agents duly authorized for censoring motion pictures. In case any motion picture is declared by the censor or censors authorized by the Department of Education to be of such a high degree of educational, moral, spiritual, religious or sacred characters as to make it in keeping with the highest ideals of the American Sunday as set forth in the laws of New York, the Bureau of Licenses shall indicate that fact upon the permit by the use of these words: "Approved for Sundays and week days."

Only such motion pictures as are thus approved by the Department of Education for Sunday use shall be used in such exhibitions of motion pictures as are permitted by law on Sunday.

5. In case the Bureau of Licenses shall refuse to issue such permit because of the failure to receive the aforesaid approval from the Department of Education, the applicant may appeal to the Mayor, such appeal shall contain the statement of the grounds for the refusal of the Bureau of Licenses to grant a permit and shall be presented to the Mayor in the same manner as the original application to the Bureau of Licenses and shown and exhibited in the same manner as before the censors of the Department of Education. If any motion picture for the exhibition of which such appeal is made to the Mayor for permit is an obscene, indecent, immoral, or impure motion picture which would tend to the corruption of the morals of youth or others, or if it pictures any crime, any murder, suicide, robbery, hold-up, stabbing, assaulting, clubbing, or beating of any human being in such detail as to offend the sense of morality or decency, it shall be the duty of the Mayor to refuse such permit. Otherwise, after he has secured from the Board of Education a statement of the ground upon which a letter of approval was refused by the censor or censors duly authorized by said board, it shall be the duty of the Mayor, in case he deems the decision of the censors of the Board of Education to be erroneous, to grant such permit, and he shall direct the Bureau of Licenses to issue it as ordered by him.

The determination of the Mayor in respect to the appeal for any such permit may be reviewed by writ of certiorari and the provisions of law and of practice in respect to the writ of certiorari to review the determination of an inferior tribunal shall be applicable thereto.

6. The permit provided for in this ordinance shall be obtained for each and every motion picture exhibited in any motion picture theatre, in any open air motion picture theatre in every licensed theatre, or concert and every licensed place of public amusement, and shall be required in addition to any license now required by any other provision of this ordinance. No fee or tax of any kind whatsoever shall be charged or exacted for such permit.

7. When such permit to show or exhibit a motion picture is once issued to any applicant, such motion picture may be shown in any duly licensed place, provided that such written permit, clearly describing such motion picture is actually delivered to the licensee of such motion picture theatre or other licensed place of public amusement. Any number of transfers of such permit may be made, provided always that such permit is actually delivered to such transferee.

8. The permit provided for in this ordinance shall be posted at or near the entrance of the motion picture theatre or the open air motion picture theatre or any licensed place of public amusement where the motion picture permitted by such permit is being shown or exhibited at such a place and in such a position that such a permit can easily be read by any person entering such theatre at any time when such motion picture is there being exhibited. The exhibition of any motion picture in any motion picture theatre or in any open air motion picture theatre or any licensed place of public amusement without the posting of such permit therefor shall be considered a violation of this ordinance; and each day's exhibition of any motion picture in any motion picture theatre or open air motion picture theatre, or licensed place of public amusement without the posting of such permit there shall be deemed a distinct and separate offense.

9. It shall be the duty of the Bureau of Licenses to number all permits for motion pictures and to keep a record of all permits for motion pictures issued, both numerically and alphabetically arranged.

This resolution to take effect immediately.

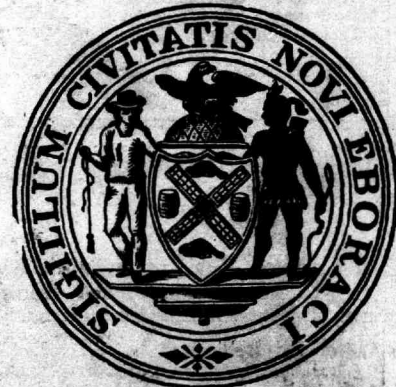

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay, or certify, check or cash, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock, or certificates of indebtedness of any nature, issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
