Board of Child Welfare—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$300,000, for the Purpose of Granting Allowances to Widows with Dependent Children.

Board of Child Welfare of the City of New York, City Hall, Room 2, New York, March 31, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—In accordance with subdivision 8 of section 188 of the City Charter, I beg leave to make request for special revenue bonds to the sum of \$300,000 to be used in granting allowances to widows with dependent children who prove to be eligible for such assistance under chapter 228 of the laws of New York State of 1915.

When the Board of Child Welfare presented its budget for the year 1916 it asked that \$400,000 be allowed for the above purposes. That amount was reduced by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to \$100,000, it being thought best at that time that the Board should organize and conduct its work for a certain time before receiving the full amount requested. Since that time the Board has granted monthly allowances to 385 widows at a total cost of \$8,837.81 per month. On this basis the appropriation already made is now encumbered for the year 1916.

There are now waiting for action by the Board of Child Welfare 700 cases on which the investigations have been entirely completed. No action can be taken on these by the Board until further funds are available. Our experience to date leads us to believe that in addition to the 385 allowances already granted and the 700 applications now waiting for Board action, there will be approximately 2,500 additional widows who will prove eligible for assistance under the law.

When the Board of Child Welfare made its original request for \$400,000, it felt quite sure that it was not asking more than would be needed for this year, and in the light of its further experience it would now renew the request that \$300,000 be added to the \$100,000 already appropriated. It must be borne in mind that the widows and children whose cases are now waiting action are quite as much in need as those to whom assistance has already been granted.

The Board of Child Welfare would, in behalf of these families, urge the Board of Aldermen to take immediate action in this matter. Yours very sincerely,

Sirs—I would request an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$1,500 to repair the storm-water culvert across Richmond Turnpike, at a point about 210 feet west of Ontario Avenue. The present culvert is too small and must be enlarged, in order to prevent damage by flooding property to the south of Richmond Turnpike.

I transmit herewith copy of a letter from the Corporation Counsel, dated February 1, 1916, in which he states:

"In view of the foregoing facts I would respectfully suggest that you take such action in the premises as will effectively remedy the conditions complained of and thus prevent further suits on the part of the Market Gardeners' Association against the City of New York."

I am also forwarding detailed estimate of the cost of this work.
You will note, from the Corporation Counsel's letter, that in addition to the judgment of \$6,420, which has been confirmed by the Court of Appeals, there are additional suits against the City still untried, amounting to \$173,075.

It is desired that favorable action be taken on this request at the earliest possible date, so that this culvert may be enlarged, thereby preventing any recurrence of damage from flooding. Very truly yours,

Hon. CALVIN D. VAN NAME, President, Borough of Richmond:

Sir—I desire to bring to your attention the following facts in connection with the masonry culvert located under the Richmond Turnpike, west of the Clove Road, Borough of Richmond, which was constructed in 1912, replacing two 24 inch culvert pipes encased in a rubble-stone wall constructed by the County of Richmond in 1896.

In February, 1907, the Market Gardeners' Association commenced an action against the City of New York to recover the sum of \$7,000 damages sustained by it to seeds, plants and bulbs during the year 1903 and 1904, caused by the overflow of the water course, which runs under the Richmond Turnpike, due to the insufficient capacity of said culvert, and on April 14, 1909, a judgment was entered against the City of New York and in favor of said Market Gardeners' Association for the sum of \$6,420.

An appeal was taken from said judgment to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, and thereafter to the Court of Appeals, which latter Court affirmed the judgment of the Court below.

Subsequent thereto this department advised your predecessor in office, Mr. George Cromwell, of the decision of the Court of Appeals and suggested that the culvert in question should be reconstructed so as to avoid further overflow of the water course in question, likewise further liability on the part of the City.

In the month of July, 1912, the old pipe culverts were removed and replaced by a masonry culvert having a greater carrying capacity than said pipe culverts.

On July 15, 1912, and before the completion of said new culvert, Mr. A. C. Nellis, Manager of the Market Gardeners' Association, wrote Mr. Louis L. Tribus, Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Richmond, stating among other things, as follows:

"* * * As the work progresses, we are surprised to note that the alleged improvement will give little or no relief to the property south of the Turnpike."

"We are willing to take this matter up in conference between your engineers, those of the water company and our engineer at any moment, and will do all in our power to arrive at some amicable settlement of the question without further litigation. However, if your Department insists upon going on with the present plans, we shall immediately turn the matter over to our attorneys."

Notwithstanding this protest, the work appears to have been completed according to the original plan.

On May 6, 1914, another action was commenced against The City of New York by said Market Gardeners' Association, to recover the sum of \$110,825.50 for damages to seeds, etc., caused by the flooding of their land during the years 1905 to 1913, inclusive, which action is still pending and undetermined.

On March 10, 1915, a further claim was filed with the Comptroller of the City by said Market Gardeners' Association for \$65,250 damages to seeds and bulbs, caused by floods occurring in the year 1914.

On April 29, 1915, Mr. Theodore Oxholm, Engineer in Charge, Borough of Richmond, replying to a communication addressed to him by Spire Pitou, Esq., Acting President of the Borough of Richmond, requesting further information regarding the claim lastly referred to, stated:

"In reply to your request for additional information relating to the claim for damages of the N. Y. Market Gardeners' Association, and supplementing my report of April 15, 1915, will state that the new concrete culvert across Richmond Turnpike, referred to in the claim, was built without the knowledge of the Bureau of Engineers, which did not design it. In our opinion this culvert is at present inadequate to carry off water from any heavy storm of several hours duration, without flooding the property to the south of Richmond Turnpike.

"I would remind you of a former claim of this company against the City for damages from a similar cause, in which the case was decided adversely to the City."

On August 30, 1915, said Market Gardeners' Association commenced an action against the City to recover the sum of \$62,250 for damages sustained in the year 1914, which action is still pending and undetermined.

On January 10, 1916, said Market Gardeners' Association filed with the Comptroller of the City a further claim against the City for \$105,703 damages sustained in the year 1915, by reason of the flooding of their property.

In view of the foregoing facts, I would respectfully suggest that you take such

action in the premises as will effectively remedy the conditions complained of, and thus prevent further suits on the part of the Market Gardeners' Association against The City of New York. Respectfully yours,

Chambers of the Surrogates' Court, County of New York, New York, March 29, 1916.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Gentlemen—We desire respectfully to call your attention to the fact that our fund for the purchase of equipment for this year (Code No. 3208, 1916), for which the sum of \$779 was appropriated, has now an unencumbered balance of only \$92.57. This is the fund from which we purchase our law books, rugs, furniture and other equipment.

Up to date we have spent \$53.83 for furniture and \$121.93 for window ventilators, typewriter equipment and sundries. The great part of the fund, both in this and other years, has been expended for law books, for which we have already spent \$513.50 since January 1, 1916. The law library has in the past been very poorly equipped, and, with a view to more nearly bringing it up to our requirements, some sets of books which were badly needed were purchased last year, and this year a set of the United States Reports have been added. Our expenditure for various law reports which are issued from time to time is necessarily large, as the private chambers of each Surrogate, as well as the law library, have in most cases to be supplied, while, in the matter of yearly volumes of the Code of Civil Procedure, advance sheets, etc., it is necessary also to provide the heads of departments with copies.

Two years ago \$1,700 was appropriated for this fund by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and of that amount we expended \$1,440.28, while last year, although the appropriation was reduced to \$779, special revenue bonds to the amount of \$250 and a transfer of a further amount of \$250 were made later in the year, and we expended during that year \$1,276.08.

In our estimate for this year we requested an appropriation of \$1,700, but \$779 only was allowed. We now respectfully ask your Board to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the issuance of \$1,000 in revenue bonds to be placed to the credit of No. 3208, 1916, which, with the present unexpended balance, will amount to \$1,092.57. This amount we propose to expend for the following necessary equipment:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000) to provide means for the construction and equipment of a new boiler house and heating plant, including sea wall, at Willard Parker Hospital, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, maturing not more than fifteen (15) years after date of issue, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against the proceeds of corporate stock herein authorized, nor shall bids upon such contracts be advertised for until after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of cost and forms of such contracts, which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Health, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such proceeds, except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary and final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which are to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees, such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

The City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Municipal Building, Bureau of Contract Supervision, February 14, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 7, 1916, you referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee a request of the Department of Health, dated February 4, 1916, for immediate action on the item for a new boiler house and heating plant at Willard Parker Hospital included in their estimate of corporate stock needs for 1915, dated November 18, 1914. Their present estimate of cost is \$125,000.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports thereon as follows:

"The present boiler plant consists of four Altman and Taylor (Babcock and Wilcox type) water-tube boilers, each of 196 horse power, and two fire-tube horizontal multi-tubular shell boilers, each of 75 horse power, a total of 934 horse power. The present power house building, which is 30 years old, cannot accommodate any more boilers, nor can it be enlarged, both on account of lack of space, and also on account of age and general dilapidation. It was originally constructed by the Department of Docks and Ferries for use as a cement shed. Afterward converted into a scarlet fever pavilion, and subsequently into a power house.

"The plant was originally intended to heat only the buildings on the north side of 16th Street whose cubic contents are approximately 2,600,000 cubic feet. It is now called on to heat two buildings on the south side, an additional 800,000 cubic feet, and another building, the new staff house, will be ready for occupancy late this year, which will add 600,000 cubic feet. It will then be necessary to provide a plant with sufficient capacity to heat a total of approximately 4,000,000 cubic feet in the fourteen buildings. In addition, there is a loss of steam through condensation in the tunnels,

steam must be used for domestic hot water purposes, and power must be provided for the ventilating apparatus in a number of the buildings.

"The plant is decidedly inadequate for the needs of the present buildings, and it will be absolutely impossible to supply sufficient heat for all the buildings, when the new shaft house is ready for occupancy.

"The four water tube boilers can be reset in a new boiler house, but the other two are twenty-three years old and cannot be utilized with economy. It is planned to install, in addition, two water-tube boilers of 338 horse power each. This will give a total of 1,460 horse power as against 934 at present, or an increase of power, in about the same proportion as the cubical contents to be heated have increased. It is estimated that this will fully meet all present requirements of the hospital. Sufficient space will be provided in the new plant for additional boilers when need arises for them in the future.

"The original estimate of cost by the Department was \$200,000, due to the fact that the site, as planned, would necessitate the razing of several buildings, including the Vaccine and Plague laboratories. On account of this, the plans for the building called for five stories, three of which were to be used to house the laboratories.

"After a conference with the Bureau of Contract Supervision, this plan was abandoned.

"It is now proposed to construct the building on the space between the westerly end of the 17th Street bulkhead line, and the site of the present coal shed. This will obviate the necessity of the removal of any of the buildings, and will considerably reduce the cost.

"The building is to be two stories high, approximately 60 by 80, coal storage on second floor, arranged so that coal can be weighed and deposited directly in front of the boilers.

"It has been estimated that the plant will cost \$125,000, as follows:

"In order to provide proper heating for the present structures and to meet the additional needs when the Staff House and Employees' House are occupied, it seems to be necessary to provide the new power plant."

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 25 and February 29, 1916, the DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION requested modification of Codes Nos. 851 and 857 for the year 1916.

The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—(1) To increase James Cuffe, an Auto Engineman in the Bureau of Supplies at \$1,050 per annum, to Chauffeur in the office of the Secretary at \$1,200 per annum.

"(2) To promote Nicholas Rotunda, an Auto Truck Helper at \$750 to Auto Truck Driver at \$960 and place \$90 in Balance Unassigned.

"Reason—(1) To fill a vacant position of Chauffeur to the President.

"(2) To fill the position to become vacant on the promotion of James Cuffe.

"Finding—(1) The position is necessary. A salary increase of \$150 is involved. The work falls within Grade 1 of the Motor Driver Group with a salary range of \$1,020 to \$1,320 per annum. Mr. Cuffe is to operate the automobile of the President of the Board of Education, and the nature of the work requires irregular attendance and a consequent responsibility not borne by him in his present position. An increase to \$1,080, the rate next highest to his present salary, would be reasonable and proper, and \$120 placed in Balance Unassigned.

"(2) The position is necessary. A salary increase of \$210 is involved. Mr. Rotunda is to operate a motor delivery truck. The duties fall within Grade 1 of the Motor Driver Group (Motor Truck Driver) with a salary range of \$960 to \$1,200. The request contemplates an increase to the minimum of the grade in which the duties fall."

Recommendation—In view of the above report the Committee recommends that the request insofar as it refers to Mr. Cuffe be approved at the rate of \$1,080 per annum, and that the request affecting Mr. Rotunda be approved by adoption of the attached resolutions modifying the schedules. Respectfully,

Dear Sir—Request is hereby respectfully made that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of ten thousand five hundred dollars (\$10,500), for the purpose of providing funds necessary for the purchase of street signs.

It is proposed to erect two thousand three hundred signs similar to the signs recently erected in the Borough of Manhattan, in the principal streets and avenues of the section west of the Bronx River, and in the outlying parts of that section, two

thousand two hundred and forty painted or enameled signs on five hundred and sixty posts. It is also proposed to erect two thousand three hundred painted or enameled signs on five hundred and seventy-five posts in the section east of the Bronx River.

The following is an estimate of the cost of the proposed signs:

Under date of March 28th, 1916, a public letting was held, and only one bid was received for supplying gasoline during the year. The price submitted was 24 cents per gallon, which the Department considered excessive, and the proposal was therefore rejected.

At the present time we are paying 22 cents per gallon, and it is anticipated that when market conditions improve a lower price will be obtained.

In view of the absence of competition, and our inability to obtain a fair and reasonable price by contract, I respectfully request that permission be given to obtain the quantity required by purchase in the open market.

Gentlemen—On February 2nd, 1916, bids were invited for furnishing and delivering ice for the various public buildings, baths and comfort stations, at the rate of 30 cents per hundred pounds for ice to the public buildings and 40 cents per hundred pounds for ice to the public baths and comfort stations.

Only one bid was received, and as the amount was in excess of the appropriation for this year, same was rejected.

We have every reason to believe that we can secure the delivery of the necessary ice for 25 cents per hundred pounds for the public buildings and 30 cents per hundred pounds for the public baths and comfort stations, at a total cost of about \$1,800.

For the past ten years or more only one bid has been received for ice. It would appear, in the best interests of the City, that we purchase the ice without public letting. I would therefore request that a resolution be introduced in your Board to purchase same, in the manner aforesaid, in a sum not to exceed \$1,800.

Dunlap & Co., 242 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, failed to execute a contract for these commodities, an opening for which was held January 29th, 1916, and the award made to him February 9th, sureties being perfected March 6th. The total amount of this contract was \$18,042.50, and was intended to cover the needs of this Department for the first six months of this year.

Communication from the Corporation Counsel—Being an Opinion Relative to the Appointment of Dr. Benjamin Abramowitz as Physician to the New York County Jail, Stating that Under the Code the Board May Remove, but Can Not Appoint Unless in Compliance with the Civil Service Law.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, April 1, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:
Sir—I am in receipt of your communication dated February 16, 1916, reading as follows:

"On January 25, 1916, the Board of Aldermen, by a vote of a majority of its members, passed a resolution appointing Dr. Benjamin Abramowitz as Physician at the New York County Jail, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on February 1st, 1916. The Board predicted this action upon the authority conferred upon the Common Council of The City of New York by Section 126 of the Code of Civil Procedure. A Dr. O'Brien had been the incumbent of this position for a number of years, and was filling the position at the time of the passage of this resolution.

"On the 7th instant, the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission addressed a letter to the Clerk of the Board, asking the particulars as to the appointment of Dr. Abramowitz, and was informed that the Board made the appointment under the provisions of the above-cited section of the Code of Civil Procedure. He also inquired as to the removal of Dr. O'Brien, and was answered by a quotation of the part of the section which states that the physician of a jail holds his office at the pleasure of the Board.

"This office is now in receipt of a communication from Secretary Birdseye, copy

of which is enclosed, in which he states that he is directed by the State Civil Service Commission to advise me that it cannot accept the appointment of Dr. Abramowitz, as the position of physician, for which he has been selected, is in the competitive class.

"Will you kindly advise me whether, in your opinion, the Board of Aldermen exercised its legal powers in making this appointment under the authority granted to it by Section 126 of the Code of Civil Procedure, or whether the power granted to it under this section is removed and superseded by the Civil Service law. Your kind attention to this request at an early date will oblige."

The communication from Mr. Birdseye, addressed to Mr. Shelley, Secretary to the President of the Board of Aldermen, under date of February 15, 1916, a copy of which was enclosed, reads as follows:

"We have your letter of February 11th advising as to the appointment of Dr. Benjamin Abramowitz as physician at the New York County Jail.

"I am directed by the State Civil Service Commission to advise you that it cannot accept the appointment of Dr. Abramowitz as the position of physician for which he has been selected is in the competitive class.

"Your attention is respectfully invited to the decision of the court in the matter of Phillips, 139 App. Div. 365, aff'd 200 N. Y. 521, in which it was held that 'Physicians to the county jails of the several counties are within the classified service under the Civil Service Law, and appointments to that office must be made in accordance with that law; that the term of the office is indefinite does not exempt it from the provisions of the Civil Service Law.'

"As to the removal of Dr. O'Brien, would invite your attention to Section 22 of the Civil Service Law which reads in part as follows:

"In every county of the state wholly included within the limits of a city but not comprising the whole of such city, no regular clerk or head of a bureau or person holding a position in the classified state civil service, subject to competitive examination, shall be removed until he has been allowed an opportunity of making an explanation; and in every case of removal the true grounds thereof shall be forthwith entered upon the records of the department of the office in which he has been employed, and a copy filed with the state civil service commission. In case of a removal, a statement showing the reasons therefore shall be filed in the department or office where such clerk, head of a bureau or person had been employed."

Replying to your inquiries, the case to which Mr. Birdseye refers to sustain the position taken by the State Civil Service Commission with respect to the appointment of Dr. Abramowitz. I am unable, however, to agree with Mr. Birdseye's suggestion that section 22 of the Civil Service Law, which he quotes, would apply in this case. The Courts have held that where there is statutory provision for the summary removal of officers, or where the term of office expires, statutory provisions requiring an opportunity of making an explanation or a trial before an incumbent of a position may be removed, do not apply. Section 126 of the Code of Civil Procedure provided:

"The board of supervisors of each county, except New York, must appoint some reputable physician, duly authorized to practice medicine, as the physician to the jail of the county. If there is more than one jail, they must appoint a physician to each. The common council of the city of New York must appoint a similar physician, to the jail of that city and county. The physician to a jail holds his office at the pleasure of the board which appointed him, except in the county of Kings. In that county, the term of his office is three years."

By the Prison Law, this section of the Code was re-enacted at section 348, omitting the words "The common council of the city of New York must appoint a similar physician, to the jail of that city and county;" and by the Prison Law, section 126 of the Code of Civil Procedure is declared to be repealed, except with respect to that portion of said section which applied to The City of New York.

It would seem, therefore, that the Board of Aldermen have the power to remove a Physician to the Jail in the County of New York, without regard to the provisions of section 22 of the Civil Service Law, but, on the other hand, the said Board of Aldermen must, in making appointments to this position, appoint persons certified by the State Civil Service Commission from duly constituted eligible lists.

Gentlemen:—On February 17, 1916, the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, requested immediate action on one item of a corporate stock request which was referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee on November 20, 1914, as follows:

Construction of a retaining wall at Putnam avenue and Woodbine street.....\$4,800.00

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports upon this item, as follows:

"The proposed wall is to be built for about 265 feet along the North boundary of the Bushwick Playground on the line of Woodbine street, in order to preserve the playground, which at this location is about fifteen feet above the established grade of the street, which is about to be physically opened.

"Action upon the request has been deferred pending authorization by your Board of the proposed grading of the street. Request for final authorization is about to be made by the Borough President.

"The improvement is necessary, as the destruction of a considerable area, so far as its use for playground purposes is concerned, would result from the grading of this street, if the retaining wall is not constructed.

"The estimated cost of the wall is \$6,000, which appears reasonable.

"There is a balance of \$1,200 in the fund C. D. P. 200 D, Construction of Playground on Putnam avenue, Woodbine street and Irving avenue, which is available for the purpose. The request is for the necessary additional sum of \$4,800."

No. 375.

Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$20,000, for the Acquisition of a Boating and Skate House in Central Park and for the Municipal Operation Thereof During the Season of 1916.

City of New York, Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, Municipal Building, 10th Floor, April 10th, 1916.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—Request is hereby made for the issue, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$20,000, the proceeds to be used for the acquisition of a boating and skate house plant in Central Park and for the municipal operation thereof during the season of 1916.

After careful consideration of various plans of operation, and having observed the methods employed in other large cities of this country, I reached the conclusion that these privileges should be operated in the future so as to provide better service at less cost to the greatest number of people of New York. In many of the large cities I found the municipalities operating privileges such as these, treating the matter of service as more important than that of revenue, and thus charging very low rates, nevertheless, getting a very fair profit on the investment.

Last year in St. Paul, Minn., the operation of these concessions obtained a profit of \$8,000. Minneapolis, a figure slightly below this amount, and several other cities have reports equally favorable.

These concessions for many years past have been held by the same privilege holder. I have no doubt he is a very worthy man, but I do not feel that under the past method it has proved possible to make the concessionaire responsive to the changing needs of the citizens who use these privileges. Thus it is that this concessionaire has, down to the present, run his privilege precisely on the basis of the needs of the park some ten or fifteen years ago, and has not provided the kind of rates demanded by the large crowds under present conditions.

There is no doubt that this form of recreation in the parks can be made as useful and popular as it is in other large cities.

The Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion that under the present New York Charter this City was not at liberty to operate municipally its park privileges, as is done in many of the large cities of the country. However, he has recently rendered me a modified opinion that would make possible the operation of the boating and skating privileges herein planned by allowing the public to take boats and use skating facilities for a certain period without charge, merely making a small charge after a certain time limit has expired in case the boats and skates are not returned, because the users wished to make use of them for a longer period. It is on this basis that it is proposed to operate these privileges in case the special revenue bonds requested are authorized.

I feel that it is important that New York make a trial of municipal operation, and urge that this opportunity be now taken advantage of when the term of this privilege has run out.

The 1916 cost is estimated as follows:

The main privilege holder in Central Park has itemized his present equipment as costing \$26,375, which he would be willing to sell for \$21,369.

The privilege holder on Harlem Meer lists his equipment as having cost him \$1,224.30, and has signified his willingness to sell it for \$833.50.

While the foregoing estimates may be equitable and just, and it would not seem possible to duplicate the articles enumerated in the open market at anything near the prices designated, the Purchasing Agent of this Department has done considerable investigation along these lines to determine whether it would not be possible to buy similar equipment for early delivery, and has obtained proposals, which indicate that we will have several bidders in any competition which we might advertise. The proposals submitted indicate that it would cost not less than \$10,000 to procure an equipment, which would be at all adequate for the purpose of operating the boating and skate privileges on the various Central Park lakes. The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

No. 376—Ord. No. 42.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Communication from, Transmitting Form of Proposed Amendment to the Code of Ordinances in Relation to Operators of Motion Picture Apparatus.

"The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, April 4, 1916.

"Hon. FRANK DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

"Dear Sir—The department again requests the Board of Aldermen to enact an ordinance under which fees can be exacted from those applying to the department for a license to operate moving picture apparatus. Last year the Board of Aldermen declined to enact an ordinance under which an examination fee of \$2.50 was to be paid. This year, out of deference to their views, the department has lowered the proposed examination fee to \$1. The license fee recommended is \$5. The department believes that some low examination fee is desirable and that thoroughly incompetent persons will be thereby deterred from consuming the time of department officials in conducting unnecessary examinations. On the other hand, a fee of \$1 is so low that it will not deter anyone from applying for an examination who has a reasonable chance of passing.

"In connection with the foregoing, I call your attention to the fact that section 43 of chapter 3 of article 2 of the ordinances, entitled 'Operators of Motion Picture Apparatus,' is merely a repetition of the charter, except that subdivision 7 thereof contains an error in that it provides that a license may be renewed 'at the end of a year from the date of issue thereof,' whereas the statute requires it to be renewed 'within the thirty days previous' to its expiration. I do not understand that in this instance any good purpose is served through the re-enactment of the statute in the shape of an ordinance. Furthermore, the law governing the matter in question is, I am informed, not section 529a of the charter, but chapter 252 of the Laws of 1911, which differs in some slight particulars. On this subject the Corporation Counsel has written an opinion, dated July 28, 1911. I respectfully submit that the only ordinance at this time required, in reference to the operation of moving picture apparatus, is one under which fees can be collected, and as to that I submit a draft.

Proposed Amendment to the Code of Ordinances.

Section 43 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "operators of motion picture apparatus" is hereby amended to read as follows:

Fees to be paid by applicants for a license to operate moving picture apparatus.

Section 1. Each applicant for a license to operate moving picture apparatus and its connections shall, at the time of his application, pay to the commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity a fee of one dollar, and if after examination a license is granted him, he shall, upon the issuance of such license, pay an additional fee of five dollars. Upon each renewal of a license a fee of one dollar shall be paid.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(Repeal existing section 43.)

No. 378.

President of the Borough of Queens—Request for an Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$68,040, for the Maintenance of Highways Under His Jurisdiction for the Year 1916.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, April 11, 1916.

To the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—In accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, I hereby request your approval of an issue of revenue bonds to the extent of \$68,040 for the purpose of providing additional funds for the maintenance of highways under my jurisdiction for the year 1916.

The estimate is based upon the employment of one hundred (100) men up to the end of October on the basis of twenty-four (24) working days per month, and Assistant Foremen on the basis of one to each ten men and the employment of teams and carts.

At the time the estimate for 1916 was submitted to your Board there was submitted in support thereof data as to the areas which this Department is charged with maintaining and among the figures submitted was one showing an area of dirt roads to the extent of 8,709,675 square yards and macadam roads 1,243,705 square yards in addition to the improved pavements for which there appears to be ample provision at this time on the basis of the costs obtained from previous experience. The average costs for the usual maintenance of dirt roads is 3 cents per square yard per year, and that of maintaining macadam roads is 88.7 cents per square yard, assuming that the roads are rebuilt.

The total cost of maintaining these two features, assuming that all of them were taken care of, would have amounted to \$358,700, which figure the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and your Board would not have allowed in the analysis of the Budget.

At the time the Budget was made this Department, like most others, was in the position where it was anxious to assist the budget makers in producing as low a budget as possible, in view of the conditions that prevailed last year, and on the whole budget I consented to a very material reduction below the allowance of the previous

year for the reason I have stated, although at all times there was submitted supporting data to justify a much greater appropriation on the assumption that normal conditions would prevail during this year.

It is common knowledge that the past winter has been a most severe one and particularly with respect to the unimproved streets in this Borough, and for that reason I am requesting an additional appropriation as heretofore set forth in order that I may in a small way do the best I possibly can, that even a satisfactory showing may be made. The roads have materially deteriorated during the year and the dirt streets are in a condition which justifies treatment in almost every case, which, of course, the budget allowance did by no means contemplate.

The same condition that prevails with respect to the dirt and macadam roads prevails regarding the improved pavements, out of maintenance which this Department is obligated to maintain and the expenses of such maintenance will far exceed the estimates that were presented at the time the budget was under consideration.

It is my desire that the work of repairing these roads be prosecuted early in the season and I ask your Board to dispose of this request speedily in order that the situation may be relieved at the earliest possible moment. Yours very truly,

An Ordinance to Amend Article 2 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Rules of the Road.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances relating to "rules of the road."

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 10 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "rules of the road," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§10. Drivers; age limit [...]; acts of owners of vehicles responsible for.

Drivers or persons in charge of vehicles other than licensed vehicles shall not be less than 16 years of age, unless provided with a permit from the police department [...]; the owner of an unlicensed vehicle shall be held responsible for the act or acts of one authorized to drive such vehicle, be such driver licensed or unlicensed. No vehicle, of whatever nature, used for public hire, shall be operated or driven by an unlicensed driver.

Sec. 2. Article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof a new section, to read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE In Relation to Motor Cycle Repair Shops and Storage Places.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter ten of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new article, to be article fourteen and to read as follows:

Article 14.

Motor Cycle Repair Shops and Storage Places.

Section 190—Permit.

Section 191—Restrictions.

Section 192—Fire Prevention.

§190—Permit.

Except upon premises for which a permit has been issued under this article, no person shall conduct a repair shop for motor cycles; nor store, house or keep nor receive for storage, housing or keeping, more than four motor cycles containing gasoline in their fuel tanks.

§191—Restrictions.

1. Storage of oil. Such permit shall state the amount of kerosene and lubricating oils which may be stored on such premises, which amount shall not be exceeded.

2. Basement premises. No permit shall be granted for premises below the grade story of any building, except by special authority of the Fire Commissioner.

3. Tenement Houses, etc. No permit shall be issued for any premises situated in any tenement house, hotel or frame building, or in any non-fireproof building in which there is a factory or place of public assemblage unless:

(a) The compartment enclosing such premises is of fire retarding material throughout, including doors and windows, and

(b) All doors and windows opening from such compartment into other portions of the building are self-closing, and

(c) The floors of such compartment are protected against the accumulation or absorption of oil or gasoline in such manner or by such material as the Fire Commissioner may direct.

§192—Fire Prevention.

On every premises for which a permit is issued under this article, the following regulations shall be complied with:

(a) No gasoline, except that in the fuel tanks of motor cycles, shall be permitted on the premises and such fuel tanks shall not be opened, drawn from or filled on the premises.

(b) No coal or oil burning stove shall be used.

(c) No motor cycle or part thereof shall under any circumstances be cleaned by the use of gasoline.

(d) Except under special authority from the Fire Commissioner, only electric lights shall be used, the bulbs of which shall be enclosed in wire cages or otherwise properly protected in a manner approved by the Fire Commissioner.

(e) Except under special authority from the Fire Commissioner, no gas or other open flame shall be used for heating, lighting or repair purposes.

(f) Fire pails filled with sand, approved fire extinguishers, "no smoking" signs and self-closing metal receptacles for waste shall be provided in such number as the Fire Commissioner may require.

§2. Section forty-three of such chapter is hereby amended by inserting therein a new subdivision to be numbered twenty-six and to read as follows:

26-a. Motor cycle repair shop or storage place or both.....\$5.00

§3. This ordinance shall take effect on January first, nineteen hundred and seventeen.

Report of the Committee on Buildings, in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend Article 16 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Signs and Showbills.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on March 21, 1916 (Minutes, page 765), the annexed ordinance to amend article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to signs and showbills, recommended, respectfully

REPORTS:

That this matter was favorably reported by the Committee and then recommended by the Board for further consideration and amendment. The Committee accordingly has prepared a substitute ordinance, which has the approval of the departments having jurisdiction in the matter. It therefore recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Article 16 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Signs and Show Bills.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 3 of section 211 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Illuminated signs [Electric wiring and appliances]. In the case of [a sign] an illuminated sign illuminated by electricity, a certificate must also be procured from the department of water supply, gas and electricity, certifying that the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed sign are in conformity with the rules and regulations of [that] said department; and, in the case of an illuminated sign illuminated by gas, a certificate must also be procured from the fire commissioner approving of the arrangement, location, and piping of the said sign and certifying that the said sign is constructed of incombustible material and that there has been compliance with the provisions of subdivision c of subdivision 6 of section 215 of this article.

Section 2. Section 215 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§215. [Electric] Illuminated signs.

1. Application of preceding sections. Except as hereinafter specifically prescribed, all provisions of §§211 to 214, inclusive, of this article, shall apply to the continuance, construction, alteration, reconstruction, and maintenance of [electric] illuminated signs, as hereinafter defined.

2. Issue of permits. All permits for [electric] illuminated signs shall be issued by the city clerk, upon applications therefor, approved by the commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity and the superintendent of buildings [having jurisdiction]

in the case of electric signs, and, in the case of gas signs, by the fire commissioner and the superintendent of buildings. A permit or renewal thereof issued hereunder, upon the expiration thereof or within thirty days thereafter, may be renewed for a further period of one year; and, upon the payment by the applicant of the fee therefor and the surrender of the old permit, accompanied by satisfactory proof in the form of an affidavit that the illuminated sign is the same as when originally licensed, and that the wiring or piping of the sign is in good condition, the city clerk may issue the permit.

3. Definition. Any letter, word, model, sign, device, or representation, used in the nature of an advertisement, announcement, or direction, illuminated by electricity or gas, erected on any building and extending beyond the building line shall be deemed to be an [electric] illuminated sign. No such sign shall be illuminated otherwise than by electricity or gas.

4. Fee for permit. The applicant for a permit to construct or maintain an [electric] illuminated sign shall pay to the city clerk an annual fee of 10 cents for each square foot of sign space or part of square foot of [such] sign space displayed on such [electric] sign, to be computed and collected by the city clerk. The square feet of sign space on one side of an [electric] illuminated sign, however, shall be deemed to [be] constitute the entire number of square feet of sign space, for the purpose of computing the license fee [herein] referred to herein [and required to be paid].

5. Consent of owner of adjoining residence. No permit shall be issued for the erection of an [electric] illuminated sign upon a building which adjoins another occupied exclusively as a private residence, until the applicant for the permit shall have filed the written consent of the owner of such residence to the erection of the proposed sign.

6. Restrictions. a. No [electric] illuminated sign shall extend more than 8 feet from the building line, nor shall any such sign be less than 10 feet in the clear above the level of the sidewalk beneath the same.

b. All [electric] illuminated signs shall be constructed entirely of metal or other incombustible material, except the insulation thereof if such sign is to be illuminated by electricity, including the uprights, supports, and braces for the same, and shall be properly and firmly attached to the building [.] and [shall be] so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.

c. If such sign is to be illuminated by gas, the gas burners for same shall be located entirely inside of the sign and so arranged and protected as to prevent the flame from being extinguished by the wind. A shut-off valve shall be placed on the gas piping extending from the building to the sign, and so arranged as to permit of the shutting off of the gas from the sign on the outside of the building, in case of necessity.

Section 3. Section 218 of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§218. Alteration of existing signs. No existing fence, sign, billboard, or roof sign or sign structure shall be enlarged, rebuilt, structurally altered, or relocated, except in accordance with the provisions of this article; provided that this requirement shall not apply to the relettering [or rewiring of electric signs] of illuminated signs, except where such relettering requires a change of the wiring or piping of such signs.

Sir—The department respectfully refers to the proposed amendment of article 16 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances relating to signs and show-bills, which was introduced at the January 18 meeting of the Board of Aldermen.

It is noted that under the proposed revision of subdivision 3 of section 211 this department will, in addition to its present duty of certifying that the wiring and appliances of electric signs are in conformity with its rules and regulations as at present, be charged also with the duty of certifying that "the (gas) piping" of gas signs is "in conformity with its rules and regulations." Whether this particular portion of the revised ordinance was inserted inadvertently and without regard for the fact that this department now exercises no jurisdiction over, and consequently has no rules and regulations in relation to gas piping, or whether it was actually the intention to impose this duty upon this department rather than upon the Bureau of Buildings, is not clear. The department believes, however, that it is not wise to place upon it this particular duty for the reason that all matters relating to gas piping are now and have heretofore been under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings, and it is believed that they should continue to receive attention therein where extended experience and special organization for such work will undoubtedly result in more efficient control thereof.

Sir—In reference to your communication of March 23rd, 1916, requesting the Bureau of Standards and the Bureau of Contract Supervision to investigate and report on the request of the Police Commissioner for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$13,312.00 to enable the Police Department to again place the steamer Patrol in commission, the Bureau of Standards reports as follows:

In considering the 1916 estimate of the Police Department the Budget Committee decided that the steamer Patrol in so far as its service for the Police Department was concerned did not warrant the spending of the money it cost annually to operate it, but agreed that a boat less expensive to operate and maintain should be furnished the Department. A gasoline or oil driven boat was the kind agreed upon. Application for the issue of corporate stock to purchase such a boat has been made by the Police Commissioner, but no action as yet has been taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on his request. If the request for a new boat is approved it would take months to obtain one because of the conditions existing in the ship building trade at the present time. No civilian marine force was allowed in the Department for the operation of a boat because their services would not be required on the new boat. It was proposed to utilize the time of the uniformed men who would necessarily have to be detailed to the boat as the work be intermittent and their services for other duties would be available at any moment.

The force requested by the Police Commissioner to operate the boat is reasonable. The rate, however, should conform to the specifications of the work to be performed.

The duties of the Chief Engineer and Assistant Engineer are appraised at \$1,320 to \$1,560 per annum, Fireman from \$828 to \$960 per annum, Oiler from \$900 to \$972 per annum and Deckhand from \$720 to \$840 per annum. In view of the fact that it is proposed to assign the former employees to the boat, it would be reasonable to allow the maximum of \$1,560 for the Chief Engineer and Assistant Engineer. The rates proposed for Oilers, Firemen and Deckhands are within the grade. A representative of the Police Department states that funds for the services of these employees from April 15th, 1916 will be sufficient. On this basis the amount required for the salaries will be as follows:

authorization of special revenue bonds for the purpose of installing a combined system of hose connection and sprinkler equipment at various dumping boards.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—On October 26, 1915, your Board recommended an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$32,738 for the above purpose. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment concurred in this action on December 10, 1915.

On November 17, 1914, the Bureau of Fire Prevention of the Fire Department ordered that an open sprinkler system be installed at once to cover the entire area beneath the dumping boards, at practically all of the street Cleaning Department dumps. On September 17, 1915, the Department of Street Cleaning was reminded by the Fire Prevention Bureau that this work had not been complied with.

The installation of fire fighting appliances at the street cleaning dumps is a desirable improvement and should eventually result in a considerable saving to the City. Much of the material handled is highly inflammable, and fires in the past have been quite frequent. In addition to the cost of replacing dumps destroyed by fires, there has been large consequential and resultant losses due to the necessity, in many instances, of hiring privately owned dumping boards for which high prices usually have to be paid. There is also to be considered the much longer haul, and wear and tear on horses and carts to reach the hired dumps.

The plans for the work were not completed until March 17, 1916. As it is necessary to have the form of contract approved by the Corporation Counsel, printed and advertised for at least ten days, as required by the Charter, it is evident that the extension of time should be granted. Respectfully,

After extensive inquiries the department has learned that St. John's Guild is willing to sell the boat "Helen C. Juillard" for \$5,000. A report from the Department of Finance of an examination made by the Chief Engineer reads as follows:

"The boat is 210 feet in length over all and 39 feet in width over guards, and has a tonnage of 756 tons. The type of the boat is an excursion or bay barge with half of main deck inclosed to form cabins; second deck (full span) covered by hurricane deck; hull divided into three sections to form mass hall, crew quarters and boiler and pump room.

"Boat appears sound throughout, and has the appearance that it has been well cared for since built, about 16 years ago.

"The arrangement of partitions, etc., are well adapted for a hospital ship having shower baths, toilets, examining rooms, wards, kitchen with ice box, etc.

"I am informally advised that the boat cost \$35,000 to build.

"The price asked, \$4,500, appears reasonable and just."

The price mentioned in the last paragraph appears to be an error, the authorities of St. John's Guild asking \$5,000 for the boat, and having under consideration at the present time an offer for that amount. In view of the cost of building and the present excellent condition of the boat, there can be no doubt of the reasonableness of the price asked. AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section in relation to "Meat; sale of; kinds forbidden."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1, Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§ 9-b. *Meat; the sale of; kinds forbidden. No person shall give away, sell or dispose of for human consumption, the meat of a horse, dog, cat, or any animal of the species of mus or felus. The finding of meat of any of the animals herein enumerated in any restaurant, butcher shop, delicatessen store, provision store, or any other place in which foodstuffs are on sale, manufactured or prepared, either cooked or uncooked, shall constitute prima facie evidence of a violation of the provisions of this section, and the person apprehended therefor shall be punished by a fine of \$50, or by imprisonment not exceeding 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.*

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by Inserting Therein a New Section in Relation to "Meat; the sale of; Kinds Forbidden."

"AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances, by inserting therein a new section in relation to 'Meat; sale of; kinds forbidden.'

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

"Section 1, Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

"§9-b. *Meat; the sale of; kinds forbidden. No person shall give away, sell or dispose of for human consumption, the meat of a horse, dog, cat, or any animal of the species of mus or felus. The finding of meat of any of the animals herein enumerated in any restaurant, butcher shop, delicatessen store, provision store, or any other place in which foodstuffs are on sale, manufactured or prepared, either cooked or uncooked, shall constitute prima facie evidence of a violation of the provisions of this section, and the person apprehended therefor shall be punished by a fine of \$50, or by imprisonment not exceeding 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.*

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The proposed ordinance, among other things, prohibits the sale, giving away, etc., of horse meat for human consumption. According to my understanding, horse flesh is not inherently unwholesome or hurtful as an article of human food, and in some communities is regarded as proper for such purposes and extensively so used. In this view it is, in my judgment, doubtful if the Board of Aldermen may absolutely prohibit the sale, etc., of horse meat for human consumption.

The provision that "the person apprehended therefor shall be punished," etc., is open to legal objection. For this should be substituted the following or its equivalent, namely: "Any person convicted of a violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be punished," etc. Respectfully yours,

MINORITY REPORT.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Alderman Charles H. Haubert, a member of the Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on February 15th, 1916 (Minutes, page 427), the following ordinance to amend a certain provision of the Code of Ordinances relating to Weights and Measures, and particularly to Standards for Various Commodities, respectfully

REPORTS:

That a public hearing was held on this matter in the Aldermanic Chamber which was attended by the Hon. Joseph Hartigan, Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of

Weights and Measures in favor of the said ordinance, and one other person, who was not engaged in the coal business, opposed thereto. The Commissioner in the course of his address in support of the ordinance stated in substance, that under the terms of the existing ordinance, coal in small quantities may be sold in The City of New York by either weight or standard measure. The provisions of the proposed ordinance make it mandatory for coal to be sold by weight only, eliminating use of the standard measure. From the experience of Weight and Measure officials throughout the country and in particularity the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures of this City the evil connected with short measuring can be eliminated by the people having sold to them coal on a strictly weight basis. The measure, pail, the bucket are containers which to the public, mean nothing. The occasion for fraud arises through the ignorance or carelessness of the buying public, in being guided in the quality they desire by the size of the container. The people in this City who are obliged to buy coal in small quantities live in so called "cold water tenement" districts. They buy coal to heat their rooms or for cooking purposes. Their circumstances are such that they cannot afford to buy in greater quantities in excess of 100 pounds at a time. Many of the people buy less than 100 pounds by the measure, half measure, bag, bucket or pail. A certain percentage buy in monies' worth, such as five, ten or twenty-five cents worth. Coal is mined by weight. The miners are paid on a weight basis, and from its production to its consumption, should be sold on a weight basis. Weight is arbitrated by scales and the buyer, whether wholesale or retail, can ascertain the amount or quantity of coal as is indicated by the weight on the scale. The people who now buy coal by measure, by bucket or pail are not deprived of any privilege or right in the elimination of the standard measure provision from the existing ordinance. Just as they have been buying coal they can buy on a weight basis and know what they are getting, for the same amount of money. Weight and Measure officials, specially trained by experience and knowledge in Weights and Measure subjects, advocate the sale of coal by weight, as it gives a more equitable adjustment to the buyer, and is of greater protection alike to the buyer, as well as to the seller. The proposed change in the ordinance would not cause any hardship to the 15,000 retail merchants of coal in this City. The merchants, in stores and cellars in a majority of cases, now have scales. The itinerant peddler with wagon or pushcart sell principally by the bag, and the bag is filled on a weight basis. As a safeguard and protection to at least 1,500,000 people in the City of New York who buy coal in small quantities, the Commissioner respectfully urged upon the Board of Aldermen that coal in this City should be sold by weight only as provided by the proposed ordinance, which reads as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 33 of article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances relating to Weights and Measures, and particularly to standards for various commodities.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 33 of article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances relating to Weights and Measures, and particularly to Standards for Various Commodities, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. Ice, coal and coke. No person shall offer for sale ice, coal or coke in any manner other than by weight, and the same shall be weighed immediately before delivery.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

In view of the reasons expressed by the Commissioner above stated, and further because the proposed ordinance is designed to benefit and protect thousands of consumers of coal in small quantities against short weight and fraud, the undersigned recommends that the said proposed ordinance be adopted.

1. Method. No person shall deliver volatile inflammable oil from a storage tank to a motor vehicle, except by means of an approved portable tank or directly through the outlet of the drawing-off pipe by means of an authorized hose attachment[,] or an approved safety can. All lights on motor vehicles, except electric lights, shall be extinguished before volatile inflammable oil is delivered to fuel tanks.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I have the honor to request permission to purchase, without public letting, two electric searchlights for the use of this department, at a cost of \$1,600.

These searchlights are made only by the Edison Company, and their substitution for the searchlight now in use in this department will make it possible to effect an economy amounting to \$7,900 per annum.

At the present time this department maintains two water towers in Brooklyn, and it is the intention to equip each with a searchlight at no extra expense beyond the purchase and installation.

The operating cost of the searchlights at the present time is as follows:

Salaries of two Engineers.....	\$3,200 00
Keeping of two horses.....	600 00
Twenty-five tons of coal.....	150 00

Total saving for each searchlight.....	\$3,950 00
Total saving for two searchlights.....	7,900 00

In addition to this, the engines used in connection with the searchlights can be returned to service and disposed of.

The light furnished by the new Edison searchlight is vastly superior to the light furnished by our old-fashioned searchlights. A demonstration of this searchlight was recently made before myself, Chief Kenlon, Deputy Chief Martin and a number of other high officers of the department, and was pronounced far more satisfactory than the present searchlight. In other words, we can effect a saving of \$7,900 per annum and at the same time procure a much better searchlight for use at fires. I would greatly appreciate your favorable action upon this request as early as possible, as we would then be able to assign four engineers and four horses to other service.

On December 16, 1915, permission was requested to purchase three of these to replace three searchlights then in operation in the Borough of Manhattan. These are to be mounted on water towers. Permission to purchase these three searchlights in the open market was granted by the Board of Aldermen on December 21, 1915.

Gentlemen—On April 23, 1912, your Board adopted a resolution changing the names of Bullion street, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Skillman avenue; Benton street, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Jackson avenue; Parker street, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Withers street; Bennett street, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Frost street; Ames street, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Richardson street.

This was done, no doubt, to give the same names to the streets on the east side of Kingsland avenue as they now have on the westerly side, because the streets are continuous.

Benton street, however, was changed to Jackson avenue, whereas this street west of Kingsland avenue of which Benton street is the continuation, is known as Jackson street.

I would respectfully recommend, therefore, that a resolution be adopted by your Board changing the name of Jackson avenue, between Kingsland avenue and Newtown Creek to Jackson street, in order that it may agree with its continuation on the westerly side of Kingsland avenue.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, March 8, 1916, at 10:30 o'clock A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, and Commissioners Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of clause 12 of Rule XIX. by adding thereto the following:

"When two or more persons selected from the same eligible list are serving as probationers under the same appointing officer, and a reduction of force is necessary, they shall be preferred for retention in the order of their original standing on such list."

There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Competitive Class, Part 1, Group 3, the following: Chief Attendance Officer, Supervising Attendance Officer. George T. Keyes, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, and Frank Prial, representing the New York Civil Service Society, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. John W. Davis, Director of the Bureau of Attendance, Department of Education, and George H. Chatfield, Assistant Director of that Bureau, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was called on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Correction, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following: Without Maintenance: Prison Artisan, 600 per annum. With Maintenance: Prison Artisan, \$360 per annum. There were no appearances.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held Feb. 17, 21, 23 and 24 were approved.

On motion, it was resolved, that the first paragraph of clause 12 of Rule XIX. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is amended to read as follows:

"12. It shall be the duty of an appointing officer to submit in such manner as the Commission may prescribe the report of appointments and changes in the Labor Class required by law, and upon the termination of an employment he shall in each case certify to the Commission the reasons therefor. Where such termination is due to a reduction of force the name of the person affected, if he has been employed for a period of one month or less, shall be restored to the registration list, in its original relative order; if such person has been employed for a longer period than one month he shall be deemed to be suspended from such employment, and shall be registered upon a preferred list for reinstatement, if his services be again required, in the manner prescribed by clause 1 of Rule XIII., for positions in the Competitive Class. Any necessary reduction of force shall be made from among those persons who have not been employed for a period of one month, persons who have completed their probationary period having preference for retention. When two or more persons selected from the same eligible list are serving as probationers under the same appointing officer, and a reduction of force is necessary, they shall be preferred for retention in the order of their original standing on such list."

On motion the proposed amendment of the Competitive Class, by including in Part 1, Group 3, thereof the titles "Chief Attendance Officer" and "Supervising Attendance Officer," was laid over.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Correction, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following: Prison Artisan, \$600 per annum (without maintenance); Prison Artisan, \$360 per annum (with maintenance).

Samuel Brock, Clerk, office of the President, Borough of Queens, appeared in connection with the request of the President of the Borough of Queens, under date of March 4, for authority to employ Frederick C. Noble, Consulting Engineer, under the provisions of clause 6 of Rule XII. On motion, it was

Resolved, That, under authority of clause 6a of Rule XII. of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Frederick C. Noble, of 867 President St., Brooklyn, be and he hereby is excepted from examination to be employed by the President of the Borough of Queens to render expert service as Consulting Engineer from time to time for a period of one year; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

Henry C. Wright, First Deputy Commissioner, and George C. Thomson, Third Deputy Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk in that department, appeared in connection with the proposed amendment of the Non-Competitive Classification of the Department of Public Charities, which matter was laid over at a previous meeting of the Commission. In this connection the Commission considered a memorandum dated March 3, signed by the Secretary of the Commission, the Acting Chief Examiner, and Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Engineer, as a Committee to whom matters relating to the proposed classification had been referred, with special reference to the positions of Laundryman, Tailor or Cutter, Head Baker and Junior Institutional Clerk. On motion, the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for an amendment of the Classification (non-competitive class) in so far as it applied to the positions of Laundryman, Tailor or Cutter, Chief Nurse (\$900 per annum), Junior Institutional Clerk at \$720 per annum, without maintenance, and Head Baker, was denied and the Secretary was instructed to call the attention of the Commissioner of Public Charities to the fact that the eligible list of Hospital Clerk was an appropriate list from which to fill the position of Junior Institutional Clerk at \$720 per annum, without maintenance, and to certify the same; also to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendment of the Classification as follows:

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, under

the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below" be and the same hereby is amended as follows:

1. By striking therefrom, under the subheading "With Maintenance," the following: Hospital Helper, \$480 per annum; Cook, \$900 per annum; Butcher, \$720 per annum; Baker, \$900 per annum; and by substituting therefor the following: Hospital Helper, \$360 per annum; Cook, \$660 per annum; Butcher, \$600 per annum; Baker, \$720 per annum.

2. By striking therefrom, under the sub-heading "Without Maintenance," the line Hospital Helper, \$720 per annum, and by substituting therefor the line Hospital Helper, \$600 per annum.

3. By including therein, under the sub-heading "Without Maintenance," the following: Senior Hospital Helper, \$720 per annum; Hospital Artisan, \$600 per annum; Senior Hospital Artisan, \$780 per annum; Butcher, \$840 per annum; Baker, \$960 per annum.

4. By including therein, under the sub-heading "With Maintenance," the following: Senior Hospital Helper, \$480 per annum; Junior Institutional Clerk, \$480 per annum; Hospital Artisan, \$360 per annum; Senior Hospital Artisan, \$540 per annum; Head Cook, \$900 per annum.

Report dated March 6 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Chief, Division of Milk Inspection of the Bureau of Food and Drugs, Department of Health, to be open to all Inspectors of Foods, Grades 2 and 3, eligible under clause 10 of Rule XV.

Report dated March 7 recommending that an examination be ordered for promotion to the position of Foreman Riveter, Grade 3, in the Department of Bridges, to be open to all Riveters, Housesmiths and Bridge Mechanics eligible.

Report dated March 6 recommending that the name of Leon J. Costello be transferred from the promotion list of Clerk, Third Grade, Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, Brooklyn, Department of Finance, to that for the Auditing Bureau, Inspections, Department of Finance, it appearing that he had been employed in the latter bureau on the date of the examination.

Report dated March 6 recommending that the order for examinations for promotion to Plan Examiner, Grade C, and Plan Examiner, Grade D, Bureau of Buildings, Brooklyn, be rescinded and that instead examinations be ordered for promotion to Plan Examiner (Plumbing), Grade D, to be open to all Inspectors of Plumbing, Grades 2 and 3, and for promotion to Plan Examiner (Construction), Grade D, to be open to all Inspectors of Carpentry and Masonry and Inspectors of Elevators, Grades 2 and 3, eligible, and that the receipt of applications be extended to March 20, 1916.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated March 7 was presented from Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, relative to the employment of Miss Olga V. Lacey as Clerk in the office of the Commission. The employment of Miss Lacey as Clerk from January 31 to and including February 16 and on February 28 and 29, with compensation at the rate of \$2.50 per day, was approved, under clause 4 of Rule XII.

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in reports (3) dated March 7, it was

Resolved, that the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with open competitive examinations for the following positions: Superintendent, Asphalt Plant; Storekeeper; Pathologist.

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in reports (3) dated March 7, it was

Resolved, that the action of the Commission, in ordering open competitive examinations for the following positions be and the same hereby is rescinded: Nurse, Male; Clerk, First Grade; Examiner (for applicants for licenses as Stationary Engineer).

In connection with the cancellation of the order for an examination for Nurse, the Secretary was instructed to inform the Department of Health that, in the opinion of the Commission, the title of Male Nurse should be changed to "Orderly," and to request that steps be taken forthwith to secure such change, when the preferred and competitive lists of Male Attendant would be certified to fill vacancies in that position.

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in a report dated March 7, it was

Resolved, that the order for the examination for Physician (Clinic) for appointment at \$300 per annum be amended to read "Physician (Clinic), Grade 1."

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in reports (4) dated March 7, the following forms of advertisement for the examinations for Physician (Clinic), Grade 1, Superintendent, Asphalt Plant, Storekeeper, and Director, Central Purchase Committee, were approved.

Physician, Clinic, Grade 1.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience, 5; 70 per cent. required. Technical, 5; 75 per cent. required. A physical qualifying examination will be given. Candidates failing to pass the physical test will not be summoned for the mental test.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C.

Duties: The duties of a Clinic Physician are to diagnose and treat patients applying at the Tuberculosis Clinics of the Department of Health, and to examine, at the Occupational Clinic of the Department, applicants for licenses as food handlers. Eight hours of service per week are required.

Requirements: Candidates must present evidence of one year's service as an interne in a hospital or sanatorium, or at least two years' experience in out-patient work, or its equivalent. Candidates for this examination must also be licensed to practice medicine in the State of New York and must present their licenses for inspection at the time of filing applications.

The subjects and weights are: Experience, 4; 70 per cent. required. Duties, 3; 70 per cent. required. Oral, 3; 70 per cent. required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given. Candidates failing to qualify in any part of the examination will not be summoned for the ensuing tests.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B, with insert.

Requirements: Candidates must have had at least ten years' experience in the construction of pavements or in the manufacture of materials for pavements or in industrial plants of such character and magnitude as to have brought them into intimate contact with crushing, mixing or distributing machinery which prepare materials for Engineering Works, or the equivalent of such experience. Three years of this period must have been spent in responsible charge of an asphalt plant or of similar works of such size and importance as to require administrative and initiative ability. Candidates must further be familiar with current practice and discussion relative to bituminous mixtures and they must give evidence of a knowledge of the approved types of asphalt working machinery. Suitable credit will be allowed to holders of appropriate technical degrees or to those submitting evidence of having equivalent or similar scientific acquirements.

Duties: The Superintendent of an Asphalt Plant will have responsible charge of the operation, maintenance and efficiency of a Municipal plant now being operated by the City of New York. He will report directly to the Chief Engineer of Highways and will be required to give independent, critical judgment incident to organization and equipment; in co-operation with the Chief Chemist, he will be required to advise as to the quality and inspection of the raw materials; he will be expected to co-operate with the Engineer of maintenance and to install from time to time approved appliances for efficient handling of materials within the plant as well as for the distribution of the product to various points for repairing city streets. He will supervise, direct and regulate the proportioning of mixtures based upon his own knowledge and upon that derived from the tests of the plant chemist.

The salary for this grade of work ranges from \$2,100 to \$3,180 per annum.

depending upon the size of the plant. The vacancy immediately to be filled is at the large Municipal Plant of the Borough of Manhattan, which carries a minimum salary of \$2,400 per annum.

Duties: To have active direction of the planning, installing, organizing and supervising a system of central purchase and control of all supplies purchased by the City of New York.

Requirements: Extended experience in an important executive capacity is required. This experience must have been such as to qualify the candidate for the position sought. The candidate must also present evidence of having occupied a position of trust over a considerable period. Before any appointment is made, the character and record of the prospective appointee will be investigated most carefully.

Technical: A thorough knowledge of scientific purchasing methods and of accounting control relating thereto and a clear understanding of the legal conditions governing the making of purchases by the City of New York are required.

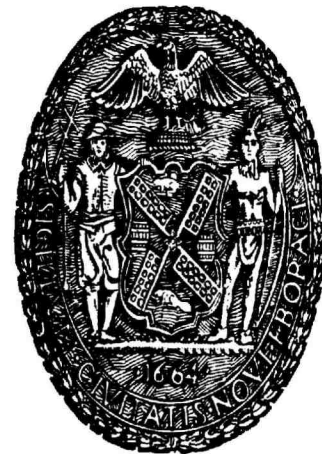

Re safety Devices in Lieu of Self Closing Attachments on Doors Leading to Elevator Shafts.
Electrical and mechanical devices, approved by the Bureau of Buildings and the Labor Department for safeguarding elevator shafts by preventing the elevator car from being moved or operated when any door in the shaft is open, will be accepted in lieu of self-closing attachments or automatic devices on doors to elevator shafts.

Re Fire Escapes on Existing Warehouses and Mercantile Establishments.
The following regulations shall govern the recommendations of Company Commanders and the action of the Bureau of Fire Prevention regarding:

(1) Existing warehouse buildings and (2) Existing mercantile establishments (such as butter and egg and grocery stores) in which the public is not admitted above the ground floor.

1.—Means of Exit.—If the building is not more than six stories in height and not more than five persons are employed above the ground floor, fire escapes will not be required, but a substantial manila rope, steel cable or portable ladder, capable of sustaining a weight of 1,000 pounds and of sufficient length to reach to the ground, must be provided and securely anchored in the wall at one of the front windows. In case of floor areas exceeding 2,500 square feet such additional ropes, cables, or portable ladders as deemed necessary may be required.

If the building is more than six stories in height, there shall be provided at least two means of exit, one of which must be an enclosed interior stairway or an outside fire escape. The windows on the course of the fire escape need not be made fireproof, providing not more than five persons are employed above the first floor.

2.—Vertical Shafts and Floor Openings.—Stairway, elevator and other vertical shafts must be properly enclosed in fireproof or fire-retarding partitions, or protected by automatic trap doors completely covering the openings and constructed in a manner equivalent in fire resistance to the floor construction. In making recommendations the dimensions of the floor openings must be given and a statement made as to whether protection by trap doors is deemed feasible. Protection of vertical openings may be waived in buildings not more than six stories in height where not more than five persons are employed above the ground floor, if fire escapes, under orders of the Fire Commissioner, have heretofore been provided, and no unusual hazard exists. a13

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser. After being properly vacated of the tenants, the sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
