COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in
Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, November 21, 1918.

Present—John F. Hyland, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Alfred J. Johnson, Chamberlain; Robert L. Moran, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Minutes of the meeting held October 31, 1918, were approved as printed in the
City Record November 13, 1918 (Cal. No. 1).

Dock Department—Approval of Assignment by the New York and Baltimore
Transportation Line to the Munson Steamship Line of the Lease of Pier 10,
East River (Cal. No. 2).

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, October 28, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking
Fund, New York City:

Dear Sir—The New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, lessee, requests
consent to assign the lease of Pier 10, East River, and all and singular the wharfage
that may arise, accrue and become due, leased, demised and farm-let to the New
York and Baltimore Transportation Line by the indenture made the 30th day of March,
1906, by and between The City of New York by the Commissioner of Docks, party
of the first part, and the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, party of the
second part, and the renewal thereof made on the 1st day of August, 1916, for the
period of ten (10) years, expiring on July 31, 1926.

The terms upon which the lessee proposes to assign are as follows:

1. That the Munson Steamship Line will pay the rent reserved in the lease and
renewal thereof hereinbefore described during the unexpired period of the renewal,
to wit: the sum of thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000) annually in equal quarterly
payments.

2. That the Munson Steamship Line will perform every covenant, condition and
agreement contained in the lease hereinbefore described and the renewal thereof here-
inbefore described.

3. That the Munson Steamship Line will pay to the New York & Baltimore
Transportation Line compensation at a stipulated sum for the shed, heating plant, office
equipment and other permanent improvements now on said pier.

In accordance with the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking
Fund May 18, 1916, the request to assign is transmitted to the Commissioners of
the Sinking Fund for consideration. Very truly yours,

This matter was on the calendar of meetings held November 7 and 14, 1918, laid
over at both meetings, and the Commissioner of Docks requested to recommend to the
Commissioners of the Sinking Fund such action as he may deem proper in the matter;
also to transmit such information as he may have on the subject, in order that the
members of the Commission may be able to form an independent judgment.

The Comptroller called the attention of the members of the Commission to the
fact that the Commissioner of Docks has been twice requested to furnish the Com-
missioners of the Sinking Fund with information with respect to the conditions of
this assignment; that no such information has been furnished nor has he made any
recommendation, although requested by the Commissioners to do so; that he, the
Comptroller, had sent an Engineer down to the pier, but access has been impossible
because the pier appears to be in possession of the United States Shipping Board; that
he had obtained information himself from other quarters to the effect that the \$112,500
that the Munson Steamship Line is to pay to the New York and Baltimore Transporta-
tion Line is for the present value of the improvement made upon the pier since the
lease was made in 1906, for a period of ten years, with a ten year renewal.

The United States Government seized the ships of the New York and Baltimore
Transportation Line so that they only have one vessel left. That left them with
this pier on which they were paying rent to The City of New York. They have no
use for it and they themselves took the matter up with the Munson Steamship Line,
which happens to be a neighbor right alongside of them, the next pier to them, think-
ing they might want to extend, and they entered into this arrangement by which the
Munson Steamship Line would assume all of the obligations of the New York and
Baltimore Transportation Line under said lease, and would recompense the New
York and Baltimore Transportation Line for these improvements. Under the lease
any improvements that the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line made were
to be made under plans approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and the improve-
ments, of course, would belong to The City of New York when the lease expired. The
improvements, he assumed, have been made in conformity with the plans of the Dock
Commissioner although he has not been able to confirm that; that it seems unjust
that the shipping interest should be delayed in disposing of a matter of this kind; that
he does not believe that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, although they
have no recommendation from the Dock Commissioner, and the Dock Commissioner
has not complied with the request for the information that they should have, should
delay the matter any further.

Upon further examination and inquiry, he, the Comptroller, finds that the Com-
missioners of the Sinking Fund on June 14, 1904, approved the assignment of the
lease of Pier 40, North River, from the Atlantic Transport Company, to one of the
Sound steamship lines. The record shows that the Providence and Stonington Line,
that is a Sound steamship line, was to pay to the Atlantic Transport Company \$150,000
for the latter's interest in a shed erected on the pier. The lease to the Atlantic Trans-
port Company had about nine years to run at the time of the assignment. This one has
eight years to run and is for a lesser amount. The Sinking Fund Commissioners
approved that assignment. That is one of the piers occupied by a Sound steamship
company.

On June 14, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the recommendation
of the Commissioner of Docks approved of the assignment of the lease of Pier No. 40,
North River, from the New England Navigation Company, to whom it had passed from
the subsidiary line, to the New England Steamship Company. Both of them are
subsidiaries to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company. The
statement furnished at that time was that the assignors received nothing for the
assignment of the lease. Manifestly that does not signify anything, because one com-
pany was the holding company for the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad
Company and the other was the holding company for the New York, New Haven
and Hartford Railroad Company, washing the thing from one company to the other.

Now under all the circumstances, in view of the fact that it has been here three
weeks already, he thought a resolution should be adopted approving of the assignment
of the lease.

The Mayor said he did not think so and that he wanted to get a report from the
Dock Commissioner first.

The Comptroller then stated the Commissioner has had all this time and in the
meantime the shipping company is held up here. It cannot do anything with the pier
that it is paying money for to the City and on which it cannot get any return, and
there is a company that wants to do business and pay for the use of the pier and it is
being deprived of an opportunity to do so.

The Mayor then stated that he thought the Commissioner of Docks should make
his recommendation and that he was not going to vote on anything until he does
make a recommendation and knows what it is; that is, he is not going to vote in favor
of it or against any proposition that the Commissioner does not recommend.

Judge Stapleton then stated that he understood that the Commissioner of Docks
was requested to make a report and that one was in course of preparation and would
be here to-day. The matter was then held until the end of the calendar, and in the
meantime the Mayor's Secretary was requested to call up the Commissioner of Docks
and ascertain why the report had not been received.

After the calendar had been disposed of the Mayor's Secretary presented the
following communication from the Commissioner of Docks, which he had just received,
asking for authority to approve of the assignment of the lease.

Pier A, North River, November 20, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, City of New York, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—On October 28, 1918, I addressed a communication to the Commis-
sioners of the Sinking Fund, copy of which is enclosed herewith, stating that the New
York and Baltimore Transportation Lines request consent to assign the lease of Pier
10, East River, to the Munson Steamship Line, and stating the terms upon which the
proposed assignment is to be made, as set forth in the communication from the
Transportation Company.

Subsequently the Comptroller requested information as to the sum stipulated to
be paid by the Steamship Company to the Transportation Co. for the shed, heating
plant, office equipment and other permanent improvements. The President of the
New York and Baltimore Transportation Lines states that the sum stipulated is
\$112,500.

This matter came up for consideration by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on November 14, 1918, and laid over for one week.

"In the meantime, the Commissioner of Docks was requested to recommend to the Board such action as he may deem proper in the matter; also to transmit such information as he may have on the subject so that the members may be able to form an independent judgment."

This lease expires July 31, 1926, and the rental reserved in the lease is \$33,000 per annum.

An examination has been made by the Engineers of this Department and their estimate of the value of the shed, based on present day prices is \$96,000.

If this lease were terminable the pier, as it stands, could in my opinion be leased at the rate of \$50,000 per annum by the City.

The difference between \$33,000 and \$50,000 is \$17,000 a year, which for seven and one-half years would amount to \$127,500. In view of the foregoing, I ask authority to approve of the proposed assignment. Yours very truly,

On motion of the Comptroller the following resolution was offered for adoption: Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and is hereby authorized to consent to the assignment by the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, lessee, to the Munson Steamship Line, of the lease of Pier 10, East River, and all and singular the wharftage that may arise, accrue and become due, leased, demised and farm-let to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line by the indenture made the 30th day of March, 1906, by and between The City of New York, by the Commissioner of Docks, party of the first part, and the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line, party of the second part, and the renewal thereof, made on the 1st day of August, 1906, for the period of ten (10) years, expiring on July 31, 1926, in accordance with the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated November 20, 1918.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to the Condition of the Pier at the Foot of Canal Street, North River (Cal. No. 3).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 23, 1918, with reference to the condition of pier at the foot of Canal street, North River. The south side of the pier is used as a dump by the Street Cleaning Department and it is scarcely worth the expenditure of further moneys to keep it in order for wharftage purposes.

The total cost of a new pier will be about \$350,000, including an improved dumping board. The Dock Commissioner proposes to extend it 180 feet to the established pierhead line, which will make a total length of wharftage of 1,022 feet on the south side of the pier. The south half of Canal Street Pier is being operated under very dangerous conditions.

If the portion of the pier occupied by the dumping board should give way the Street Cleaning Department would be without any place on the west side below 30th street for dumping purposes, and it would be necessary to cart material to the two dumps on the east side at a tremendous increase in cost of extra labor and vehicles.

Laid over at meetings held October 31, November 7 and 14, 1918.

On motion of the Mayor, the matter was laid over two weeks.

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to Pier at the Foot of 29th Street, East River (Cal. No. 4).

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, November 13, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Municipal Building, N. Y. City:

Dear Sir:—With reference to No. 16 on the calendar of the meeting held November 7, 1918, and No. 22 on the calendar of the meeting to be held to-morrow, it will be necessary for the Trustees of Bellevue Hospital to surrender the East 29th street pier, Manhattan, so that the Departments of Charities and Correction may be provided for thereon.

Suitable provision should be made for the Bellevue Hospital on the East 28th street pier, Manhattan, and this Department will take the matter up with the proper authorities to that end. Yours very truly,

Pier A, North River, November 13, 1918.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Municipal Building, N. Y. City:

Dear Sir:—On October 19, 1918, I transmitted to the War Industries Board a copy of my statement covering the requirements of the Department of Docks of the City of New York during the years 1918, 1919, 1920 and 1921, submitted to Hon. Charles L. Craig, Comptroller, and Chairman of the Committee on Finance and Budget, and Chairman of the Committee on Port and Terminal Facilities of the Board of Estimate of the City of New York, under date of October 7, 1918, which was referred to the Chief of the Non-War Construction Section.

I am in receipt of a letter from him under date of November 12, reading as follows:

"Under new ratings, effective to-day, no permits from this section are necessary for construction, extension, improvement, maintenance or repairs of any public utility. Therefore, so far as we are concerned, this work may proceed."

Second District Municipal Court—Request That Part III, Now Located in the Bergen Building, Be Transferred to the Court House at 162d Street and Washington Avenue, Bronx (Cal. No. 6).

A communication was received from the Board of Justices of the Municipal Court, dated November 12, 1918, transmitting resolution adopted by the said Board October 15, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to find quarters elsewhere for that portion of the Magistrates' Court located at 162d street and Washington avenue, so that Part III of the Municipal Court, Second District, Borough of The Bronx, now quartered in the Bergen Building, 1918 Arthur avenue, Borough of The Bronx, may be transferred to the Second District Court proper at 162d street and Washington avenue.

The New York County Chapter and the Richmond County Chapter have been granted this privilege by resolutions heretofore adopted by your Board. Department of Plant and Structures—Communication from, with Reference to Application of Frank Fallon for a Lease of Space in South Hallway of the Municipal Building, Manhattan (Cal. No. 12).

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen:—An application has been made by Frank Fallon, No. 36 West 37th street, New York City, for a lease for a term of five years of the privilege of selling cigars, cigarettes, tobaccos and candies, in the northeast corner of the south hallway of the Municipal Building at a rental of \$480 per year.

The applicant proposes to erect a stand, consisting of a counter, 6 feet long, 28 inches high and 30 inches wide, with glass case on top of it, and wall case in back, to contain the cigars and other articles to be sold. The construction is to be of quartered oak, finished to match trim of building; the counter to have the marble base to match bases of building.

The applicant for this privilege states that he operates similar privileges at the Hotel Biltmore, the University Club, the Racquet and Tennis Club, the Cafe Savarin and many other similar locations, and that the fittings will be first class in every particular and appropriate to the general character of the building.

Herewith is transmitted a blue print of sketch of installation proposed, a photograph of location in hallway desired and sketches and specifications showing detail of construction of proposed stand.

Sinking Fund Commission, Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan:

Gentlemen:—Our client, Mr. Jeremiah Milbank, has asked us to write to you to apply for a cancellation of the real estate assessments for the year 1919 against his premises, Nos. 301-311 4th avenue, and Nos. 107-113 East 23d street. These properties are assessed, respectively, at \$400,000 and \$250,000. They are located in Section 3, Block 879 of the Land Map of the City of New York, and are Lots Nos. 1 and 5 in said block.

Mr. Milbank is donating to the Red Cross the use of the upper floors of this building, receiving no rent from this occupancy. It is also his purpose and intention to turn over the balance of the building to the Red Cross in the near future, as soon as present tenancies can be terminated. The result will be that on or before January 1, 1919, the Red Cross will have the use and occupancy of these premises, rent free.

As by January 1, 1919, Mr. Milbank will be receiving no rent or income of any kind from these premises he desires to cut down expenses to as low a figure as possible. With this in view we hereby make application on his behalf to have the real estate assessments for the year 1919 against these premises cancelled.

If you so desire we shall be glad to submit details of the work the Red Cross is doing on the premises, and also of the purpose for which it wishes to occupy the remainder of the building. Yours respectfully,

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On November 27, 1917, this Board adopted a resolution authorizing and directing the Comptroller to establish and maintain a sinking fund, to be known as "The Rapid Transit Sinking Fund of The City of New York," which shall have for its purpose the amortization and liquidation of the principal of the funded debt issued by The City of New York after January 1, 1910, for rapid transit improvements owned or to be owned by the City.

This action was predicated upon the provisions of section 10 of article VIII of the Constitution of the State of New York, so that debt incurred after January 1, 1910, by The City of New York for a public improvement owned or to be owned by the City, which yields to the City current net revenue in excess of the interest on said debt and of the annual installments necessary for its amortization, may be excluded in ascertaining the power of the City to become otherwise indebted, provided that a sinking fund for the amortization of such debt shall have been established and maintained.

The resolution referred to provided, in part:

"Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to transfer from the total liability, aggregating as of this date, \$802,071,196.40, of the 'Sinking Fund of The City of New York' for bonds issued by the City on and after January 1, 1898, a sum total of \$141,011,563.59 of rapid transit bonds issued by the City on and after January 1, 1910, for the purposes of rapid transit contracts Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, viz.:

For account of Contract No. 2..... 1,776,645.74
For account of Contract No. 3..... 58,376,309.21
For account of Contract No. 4..... 79,092,744.41

--and that said total amount of \$141,011,563.59 be established as the total bonded indebtedness liability as of November 27, 1917, payable from the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund of The City of New York," for the Amortization and Redemption of Rapid Transit Bonds Issued on and After January 1, 1910; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and requested to transfer from the investments held for account of the 'Sinking Fund of The City of New York,' securities aggregating \$3,060,007.18, as more particularly described in Schedule 'A,' herewith subjoined and forming part of this resolution, and credit said securities to the account of the 'Rapid Transit

Sinking Fund of The City of New York,' as established by authority of these resolutions; and be it further

"Resolved, That the interest on that portion of these securities which accrues from September 1, 1917, to December 31, 1917, be transferred from the 'Rapid Transit Sinking Fund' and paid into the 'Sinking Fund of the City of New York' on March 1, 1918, when the next semi-annual interest on said securities is due and payable, and that the interest on that portion of said securities which accrues from November 1, 1917, to December 31, 1917, be transferred from the 'Rapid Transit Sinking Fund' and paid into the 'Sinking Fund of The City of New York' on May 1, 1918, when the next semi-annual interest thereon is due and payable."

Pursuant to said resolution, the Comptroller transferred from the "Sinking Fund of The City of New York," to the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund of The City of New York," the liability for rapid transit bonds issued by the City on and after January 1, 1910, for the purposes of rapid transit contracts Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, amounting in the aggregate to the sum total of \$141,011,563.59, and said total amount of \$141,011,563.59 was established as the total bonded indebtedness liability as at November 27, 1917, payable from the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund of The City of New York," and, further, pursuant to said resolution, the Comptroller transferred from the "Sinking Fund of The City of New York" securities aggregating \$3,060,007.18, and credited such total securities to the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund of The City of New York," this latter amount representing approximately the accrued amortization or accrued actuarial reserve to December 31, 1917, on the liability of \$141,011,563.59, payable from the latter sinking fund.

As may be noted from the foregoing, the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund" was established subsequent to the adoption of the Budget of 1918 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. There was an appropriation of \$9,250,000 included in said budget to provide the amortization installment payable in 1918 to the "Sinking Fund of The City of New York," and contained within and forming part of said amount is the sum of \$1,226,113.07, which, plus the moneys to be received from the Interborough Rapid Transit Company as rentals on the bonds therein which were used for the purposes of Contract No. 1 and Contract No. 2, represent the actuarial installment required to be paid in the year 1918 to amortize the bond indebtedness of \$141,011,563.59 of rapid transit bonds, formerly a liability of the aforesaid sinking fund, but which liability was transferred on November 27, 1917, to the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund," as hereinbefore stated.

It is, therefore, necessary, inasmuch as the \$9,250,000 installment for the year 1918, contained in the budget, has been paid into the "Sinking Fund of The City of New York," as set forth in the certificate, herewith attached, of the Chief Accountant of the Department of Finance, to transfer from said sinking fund to the "Rapid Transit Sinking Fund" the sum of \$1,226,113.07, in order to maintain said fund.

MATTERS CONSIDERED BY UNANIMOUS CONSENT.**Transfer of \$2,600,000 from the Water Sinking Fund of Brooklyn to the Water Sinking Fund of the City of New York (Cal. No. 20).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

November 15, 1918.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Chief Accountant of the Department of Finance has advised me that the sum of \$2,546,095 will require to be paid into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" to provide the necessary amortization installment payable into said sinking fund for the current year and thus bring its assets up to the actuarial reserve required as of December 31, 1918.

During the past four years the amounts required to be paid into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" as annual amortization installments have been provided from the surplus assets of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn," thus relieving the taxpayers of this debt service expense by obviating the need of an appropriation therefor in the City's recurring annual budgets.

The assets of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" aggregate, as of October 31, 1918..... \$6,301,832.11

The total par value of the bonds redeemable by said sinking fund amount to..... 1,955,000.00

Thus leaving a surplus, over and above all its liabilities, of..... 4,346,832.11

Under date of October 21, 1914, the then Deputy and Acting Comptroller communicated with the Corporation Counsel, requesting him to advise the Comptroller, for the information of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, whether an excess then existing of \$2,048,003.90 of assets over all liabilities of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" might be legally transferred from said sinking fund and paid

into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York." This communication was answered by the Corporation Counsel on October 22, 1914, who advised the Comptroller that, predicated upon the facts detailed in the communication from the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, in his judgment there was no objection to said transfer.

In accordance with said advice of the Corporation Counsel the Sinking Fund Commission by formal resolution has in 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1917 transferred from the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" to the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" in securities and cash sufficient amounts each year to provide the necessary amortization installments payable into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" for said years.

Copies of the communication by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller under date of October 21, 1914, and of the Corporation Counsel's answer thereto were printed in full in the minutes of the meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held December 3, 1915.

The sum of approximately \$2,600,000 (\$2,546,095) will require to be paid into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" to provide the necessary amortization installment payable into said sinking fund on or before December 31, 1918, and as the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" holds (October 31) in cash and securities \$6,301,802.11, which is \$4,366,802.11 over and above the par value of all the bonds which are redeemable by said sinking fund, viz., \$1,935,000; and furthermore, as the assets of said "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" are being periodically augmented by the resultant surplus revenues of the Water Department, Borough of Brooklyn, the amortization installment required by the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" for the current year should be acquired from the surplus assets of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" in accordance with the opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated October 22, 1914, and with the procedure that has since obtained predicated thereon.

The subjoined resolution is submitted for the purpose of authorizing and effecting the transfer of \$2,600,000 in securities from the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" to be paid into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York."

Dear Sir—It will be necessary to pay \$2,546,095 into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" to provide the necessary actuarial reserve required by the fund on or before December 31, 1918. As this amortization requirement for the year 1918 should be obtained from the large and continually increasing surplus revenues of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn" it was entirely unnecessary to add this burden to the taxpayers by placing an appropriation for such purpose in the budget of the current year.

The amortization installments paid into the "Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York" for the past four years, viz., 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1917, aggregating \$8,202,500, have all been provided, in accordance with an opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated October 22, 1914, and under specific resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, from the surplus assets of the "Water Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn."

Riker's Island—Application of the Commandant of the Third Naval District for a Lease of (Cal. No. 23).

Hon. C. L. CRAIG, Comptroller of The City of New York, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sir—Acting upon the report made to me by Commodore Forsberg and Lieut. Stewart of the Navy, concerning a recent interview with you in regard to the acquisition of Riker's Island for use by the Navy Department, I have communicated with the Department and obtained from it authority to pay to the City for use of this island a rental at the rate of fifty thousand dollars per annum.

I understand that you are required to advertise the sale of this lease before it can be entered into by the City and that this advertisement must be upon the authorization of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. As the necessities of the Navy require speedy action in this matter, may I urge upon you the laying of this matter before the Sinking Fund Commissioners at the earliest possible moment, and, if necessary, calling a special meeting of that body for the purpose.

I enclose herewith certain terms and conditions, which, I suggest, might be incorporated in the advertisement and in the lease, if these are satisfactory to the City authorities.

Resolution to provide, among other things, as follows:

For the period beginning December 1, 1918, and ending June 30, 1919.

The minimum upset rental on which said lease shall be sold is hereby appraised and fixed at fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for each year of the lease, payable as follows: In quarterly payments of \$12,500 each, and the lease be subject to the following terms and conditions:

1. That all stores and supplies, including coal, shall be retained by the Department of Correction of The City of New York, or, at the option of the lessee, may be purchased by it. An inventory shall be prepared of all the equipment not removed by the Department of Correction, and initialed by the Commissioner of the Department of Correction, and attached to the lease.

2. The lessor to agree that the said buildings and such machinery, boilers, plumbing, heating apparatus, as may be therein are, or, at its expense, shall be forthwith placed, in condition suitable for occupancy and use for the purposes for which they are now used.

3. The lessor to agree to pay all taxes, assessments and other governmental charges assessed against said demised premises as and when due, including water rates or charges.

4. The lessor to assume risk of loss or damage to said demised premises by fire or explosion, however or by whomsoever caused, and all damage by the elements. In the event any building now on the demised premises shall be damaged or destroyed by fire or otherwise, the lessor shall restore the same as speedily as possible to the condition it is now in, and remit to the lessee a sum which shall represent a fair and proportionate part of said rental as compensation for the loss of occupancy of said building until the restoration is complete.

5. The lessor to agree that the lessee may make such alterations and improvements to and upon said demised premises as the lessee may require, and all improvements fixed to or erected or placed in and upon said premises by the lessee shall be and remain the property of the lessor.

6. The lessee to agree at the expiration of the term, or the termination of this lease, to quit and surrender the premises in as good a state and condition as when received, reasonable wear and tear and damage, the result of risks herein provided to be assumed by the lessor, excepted.

7. That the lessor will warrant and defend to the lessee the quiet and peaceable possession and occupancy of the aforesaid premises, and, in case of any disturbance by suit or otherwise, will defend the same, free of charge.

8. That the lessee may reserve the right to quit, relinquish and give up the said premises at any time within the period for which this lease may be renewed, by giving to the said lessor or agent thirty days' notice in writing.

9. That, at the option of the lessee, the lease with all its covenants and agreements may be renewed yearly as often as the needs of the public service may require, so as to give the lessee a continued possession of the premises, not extending, however, beyond June 30, 1930, but no renewal shall be made to include more than one fiscal year.

10. The Comptroller shall have the right to reject any and all bids.

The Comptroller stated that this matter was the subject of a conference between Commodore Forsberg, Lieutenant Stewart and himself.

Previously Commissioner Hamilton, of the Department of Correction, had taken the matter up with him and expressed the view that a rent of 10 per cent. of the assessed valuation of the property (\$140,000) would probably be the least that the City would be satisfied to take, and, if they receive that sum, he could use the property at Warwick or New Hampton, and transfer certain activities there, in order to accommodate the Navy Department. That was before the armistice was signed; that he, the Comptroller, suggested a somewhat lower figure than that, \$120,000 or thereabouts. The next thing that happened was that Commodore Forsberg and Lieutenant Stewart came to see him and stated that they had decided on the figure they were prepared to offer, \$42,000; that he, the Comptroller, told them of the discussion with Commissioner Hamilton, and that, in view of that, it was useless to go into the thing until they got word from the Navy Department as to the outside figure that the Navy could offer. The next thing was, on the 18th of November, he received a telephone message that they had a radiogram that they could pay \$50,000 a year. Then yesterday afternoon came this letter, printed above.

Discussion followed.

The following resolution was offered for adoption:

Whereas, The Commandant of the Third Naval District, U. S. N., has made application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the sale of a lease of Riker's Island, at a rental at the rate of \$50,000 per annum.

Resolved, That, in view of the necessities of The City of New York for the use of Riker's Island for the purposes of the Department of Correction, and the inadequacy of the rental the Navy Department offers for it, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are compelled to decline to request the Commissioner of Correction to surrender the use of the property for lease to the Navy Department.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES therein will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, not less than the amount of the purchase price in full, the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause, or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing thereon or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made to comply together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old masonry or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher than any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water lines and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all openings in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions to said City, to be fully standing together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer or employee of The City of New York, is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business in which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three per centum of the amount of the bid, as provided in section 400 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.
