

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 21, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,502, as follows, viz.: 21 public buildings, 593 tenement-houses, 177 private dwellings, 35 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 56 stables, 2 markets, 30 slaughter-houses, 4 milk inspections, 5 fat-rendering establishments, I manure dump, I coal-yard, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 47 yards, courts, and areas, 77 cellars and basements, 110 waste-pipes and drains, 198 privies and water-closets, 28 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 6 smoky chimneys, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 26 violations of the Code, 17 other nuisances, together with 1 visit of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 651.

During the past week 208 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 79 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

Health Officer of the Port.

170 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 35 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 33 houses, 33 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,466 privies and water-closets, 173 cellars, 393 yards, courts, and areas, 267 garbage-boxes, and 133¾ miles of street gutters.

I case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, July 21, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 754 burial permits for city deaths, 31 for bodies in transitu, and 53 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 754 deaths, 96 marriages, 480 births, 53 still-births, 31 applications for transit permits, and 74 returns from coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau.

To W. D. F. Day, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent, etc.:

Sir.—I have to report that during the half week ending Saturday, July 21, the members of the Special Visiting Corps have visited 3,060 houses, 18,721 families, prescribed for 646 children, given away 722 excursion tickets, a large number of diarrhœal circulars, and imparted the appropriate advice to mothers wherever such advice was needed.

They have also presented memoranda of nuisances met with in their rounds, which are referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation. In this summary the reports of five are omitted, two as not furnishing the necessary information, and three not yet received. As the appointments were not all made at the same time, it is but proper to add that the average time of service for each amounted to 2.7-50 days. to 2.7-50 days.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, July 21, 754 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city, which is a decrease of 77 compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 243 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending July 14, was 825, which is 86.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 39.80 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,796.

Although the mean temperature for the week was 1.6 degrees higher, and the mean humidity 87-100 of saturation, against 74-100 for the previous week, the mortality was less; this decrease is particularly noticeable during the last days of the week when the temperature was lower, viz.:

The deaths of children under five years during the week were 30 less than the number reported for the previous week. The mortality of children under 5 years is still excessive, forming 66.3 per cent. of the total mortality for the week, while 56.4 per cent. of all the deaths were in tenement houses. The deaths from diarrhœal diseases during the week were 331, of whom 304 were children under 5 years, against 379 for the previous week, of whom 355 were under 5 years.

There was a decrease during the past compared with the previous week of 1 death from small-pox, 4 from scarlatina, 10 from diphtheria, 1 from puerperal diseases, 48 from diarrhœal diseases, 3 from cancer, 7 from phthisis, 8 from pneumonia, 24 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, Bright's disease 3; and an increase of 1 death from measles, 7 from membranous croup, 5 from whooping-cough, 1 from typhus fever, 3 from typhoid tever, 3 from bronchits, 2 from diseases of the heart, 1 from marasmus and scrofula and 1 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis.
