

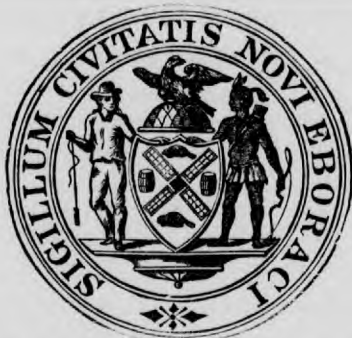

Present—Commissioners Dimock and Vanderpoel.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held the 7th instant were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation inclosing draft of regulation in reference to compelling owners, lessees and occupants of wharf property to keep the same in proper repair and slips adjacent thereto properly dredged, and, being read,

On motion, pursuant to authority vested in this Board by subdivision 7, section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, the following regulation was adopted :

## REGULATION 16.

The owners, lessees, and occupants of every pier, wharf, and bulkhead in the city of New York, shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged ; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board of the Department of Docks, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage, of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done, and in case of failure of the owners, lessees, or occupants so notified to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall be liable to a penalty of \$50 per day for every day they shall neglect to comply with such notice.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to cause the said regulation to be published as recommended by the Counsel to the Corporation to comply with the requirements of said section 6.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action as stated, to wit :

From E. G. Tinker, Captain of the Port—In reference to the necessity for increased wharf accommodations on the East river for sailing vessels.

From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to claim against R. Cornell White, lessee of Pier 37, East river. Secretary directed to furnish the data required.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to repairing bulkhead, etc., in front of Coe's stores on Water street, East river.

From James J. Hart and James O'Neil—In reference to furnishing bills introduced in the Legislature for 1880. Secretary directed to ascertain the terms upon which said bills will be furnished to the Department.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit :

From Jeremiah Towle—In reference to title to premises at foot of Sixty-first street, East river. Superintendent Butler notified to collect wharfage from all vessels using said premises from this date, the Counsel to the Corporation having advised this Department that the title to the pier at Sixty-first street, East river, is vested in the city.

From New York, Lake Erie, and Western Railroad Company—For permission to remove the two small buildings now between Piers, new 20 and 21, North river, out to the edge of the bulkhead, as indicated on the tracing submitted. Application granted; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Wm. H. Webb—In reference to repairs needed at pier, Seventh street, East river.

From Compagnie Générale Transatlantique—In reference to repairs needed to the Croton-water pipe leading from the west side of West street to Pier, new 42, North river, leased by said Company. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the necessary repairs to said water-pipe.

From Engineer-in-Chief, the following reports :

1. As to spring piles replaced at Pier, new 1, North river.
2. As to the completion of pier at Sixty-second street, East river.
3. As to repairs made to bulkhead at Seventeenth street, East river.
4. As to condition of Pier 46, East river.
5. As to work performed during week ending January 10, 1880.

6. Stating that proper facilities for shipping fire apparatus to the islands in charge of the Department of Public Charities and Correction can be afforded by providing suitable runways on piers at Sixty-second and One Hundred and Seventeenth streets, East river, at a cost of about \$200 each. Communication from Department of Public Charities and Correction, in reference to the same, taken from the table and placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to provide the accommodations on said piers in accordance with his report.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of sixteen bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$7,758.18, and, being read, was,

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to forward the said bills together with proper requisitions for the amount to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, Thomas Patten was requested to call upon the Commissioner in reference to the wharf property at Ninety-third street, East river.

An application was received from the West Side & Yonkers Railway Company, with plans and drawings, asking that they be permitted to construct a bridge across Harlem river, at or near the end of Eighth avenue, and, being read, and Mr. Morris, on behalf of said company, being heard at length in reference to said application,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to address a communication to the Counsel to the Corporation, stating that said company appears to be the owner of the land lying under water on either side of the Harlem river, where said bridge is to be located, and that the consent to the erection of the bridge, from the Department of Public Parks, has been obtained, and that the plans thereof have been approved by the U. S. Engineer, in charge of the improvement of Harlem river, and requesting said counsel to give his written opinion as to the extent of the powers and duties of this Department in passing on the aforesaid application.

A requisition was received from the CITY RECORD, asking that a list be furnished of the officers and employees of the Department of Docks, as required by section 3, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and, being read,

On motion, the Secretary was directed to furnish the list called for in said requisition.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the pay of Samuel Fitzpatrick, Office Keeper, be and is hereby fixed at the rate of \$15 per week of six days, without allowance for extra time.

The Secretary, stating that the insurance against fire on the derrick "City of New York," to the amount of \$75,000, would expire on the 25th instant.

On motion, the Treasurer was authorized and directed to effect an equal amount of fire insurance, either by renewal of existing policies or otherwise, for one year from said date.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

On motion, Commissioner Dimock took the chair.

The minutes of the meeting held 14th instant were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Finance Department in reference to settlement of claim for arrearages of rent due from Isaac Fowler, lessee of Pier 61, East river, and being read,

On motion, the communication from the Health Department, in reference to berths for night-soil boats, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolutions adopted :

Resolved, That the Treasurer be and is hereby authorized and directed to make a reduction of \$375 per annum, from May 1, 1878, to February 1, 1880, from the rent payable by Isaac Fowler, under lease of Pier 61, East river, purchased by him at public sale on March 14, 1878, consequent upon the failure of the Department to place him in full possession of the northerly half thereof, and the said allowance having been sanctioned and consented to by the Comptroller, under date of 17th instant.

Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to ascertain from the Health Department the date of the agreement presumed to have been recently entered into by it with the contractors for removal of night soil ; and from the said contractors as to whether it is their intention to continue in the occupancy of the northerly half of Pier 61, East river.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action as stated, to wit :

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to suspension from duty of James Cavanagh and Simon Fitzsimmons, Night Watchmen.

From N. Y. Central & Hudson R. R. Co., with plans—To build piers, etc., between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report upon the same, and Chauncey M. Depew, Counsel of said Company requested to call upon the Commissioners in reference to said application.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to dredging required at dumping board at pier at Thirty-ninth street, North river. Secretary directed to address a communication to the Police Department, calling attention to the various communications addressed them in reference to the refuse and street cleanings which have for a long time past been deposited on the water front at Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets, North river, more or less of which has been washed into the river ; and to state that some time since on a certain Sunday one of the Commissioners of this Department visited

the premises and found a large gang of Italian laborers in the employ of the Police Department, engaged in shoveling the material into the water, covering up the outlet of the sewer at that point, such action not being only in violation of law, but highly injurious to the Harbor, and that in view of all the circumstances of the case this Department is uncertain what action it ought to take in reference to the application of said Department to have dredging done at pier at Thirty-seventh street, North river.

The following communications were received, read, and

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit :

From Fire Department—In reference to having a Pier built south of Pier, new 1, North river, for use of Fire steamer.

From Police Department—To have a scow turned over by the large floating derrick.

From Hendricks Brothers—For permission to insert drain-pipe in bulkhead, between Piers 11 and 12 East river, application granted; the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Orson M. Ford—Offering to furnish legislative document for the session of 1880. Secretary directed to state in reply that arrangements have already been made with other parties to furnish the same.

From Thomas Douglass—In reference to furnishing the Department with his patent stone crusher. Secretary directed to advise in reply that this Department has no need for such a machine at present.

From Gustavus A. Karwiese—Asking that he be furnished with documents issued by the Department of Docks. Secretary directed to forward to him the last annual report of the Department.

From Engineer-in-Chief the following reports :

1. As to work performed during week ending January 17, 1880.

2. Stating that a quantity of rejected granite stone at East Seventeenth Street Yard should be removed back from the bulkhead in order that said bulkhead may be repaired.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove said stone at a cost of about \$100, and to repair the bulkhead, if found to be necessary, at a cost of about \$250.

3. Stating that the repairs to the surface of pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river, are necessary, at an estimated cost of about \$30.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work in accordance with his report.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to address a communication to the Police Department, calling their attention to the method lately adopted of removing the dirt from Broadway and other streets by washing it into the sewers by use of Croton water, as in this manner large quantities of material are deposited in the sewers and ultimately into the slips of the water front, and that then this material has to be removed from the receiving-basins of the sewers, and from the slips by dredging, involving a much greater expense than if it were carted direct from the streets and removed from the limits of the city, and that this manner of removing the dirt from the streets appears, in the opinion of this Board, about as injurious to the slips or the harbor as if the material was carted and dumped direct into the river, and that against this practice this Department desires to enter its protest, and respectfully requesting the Police Department to take proper action for the discontinuance of this practice of removing the dirt from the streets.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Frederick W. Beatty be and is hereby appointed Office Messenger, at \$12 per week, from the 22d instant, inclusive, in place of Eugene Conkling, resigned.

On motion, Dennis Gallagher was appointed a Dockbuilder.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

## BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met, pursuant to call, in the Mayor's Office, at 2 P. M., on Wednesday, January 21, 1880.

Upon a call of the roll the following were ascertained to be present : Edward Cooper, Mayor ; Richard A. Storrs, Deputy Comptroller ; Allan Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works ; John J. Morris, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The following authorization was presented by the Deputy Comptroller :

Pursuant to the provisions of section 32 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, I hereby designate and authorize Richard A. Storrs, Deputy Comptroller, to possess every power and perform all and every duty belonging to the office of Comptroller of the City of New York, on Wednesday and Thursday, the 21st and 22d days of January, 1880, for the reason that on those days I shall be absent from the Comptroller's Office.

Which was directed to be recorded on the minutes.

The minutes of the meeting held December 16, 1879, were read and approved.

James F. Wenman, President of the Department of Public Parks, then appeared and took part in the meeting.

The Secretary presented a paper signed by the members of the Board, acknowledging that they had received due and timely notice of the present meeting, which was ordered on file.

The Secretary also notified the Board that he had caused to be inserted in the CITY RECORD a notice, signed by all the members, that they proposed to lay out and open West Fifty-third street, from the Tenth avenue to the Eleventh avenue, and West Fifty-fourth street, from the Tenth avenue to the established bulkhead line on the Hudson river, and would lay their proposed action before the Board of Aldermen on or after January 27, 1880.

The Mayor presented the following communication, which was ordered on file.

To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York :

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, owners of property, respectfully petition that Washington street be extended from Little West Twelfth street to West Fourteenth street, so as to run parallel with the Ninth and Tenth avenues, in the manner shown on the accompanying diagram.

We respectfully submit that this improvement should be made for the following among other reasons :

Washington street, which is almost exclusively devoted to business purposes, and on which there is a great amount of travel, terminates abruptly in a short, narrow street (Little Twelfth), and there is no suitable way of entrance to or exit from its northern end, which its importance as a business street requires. If it is extended to Fourteenth street, a distance of only two blocks, it will then terminate in a large, wide, and extensive thoroughfare.

There is no suitable or sufficient way of access to or departure from the new market which has just been established on the Fort Gansevoort property at Washington and Little West Twelfth streets. The streets that now lead to the Market are very narrow, are encumbered with car tracks and filled with obstructions, and do not afford sufficient means of communication with it. It is proposed also to establish a ferry from the foot of West Fourteenth street to Jersey City, and the probabilities are that it will be in operation in a short time. Inasmuch as the inauguration of the market and the ferry will tend to largely increase the travel and business in this locality, an avenue such as the proposed improvement would make will be a public necessity.

If extended in accordance with annexed diagram it will not be necessary to tear down or remove any buildings, as the land which it is proposed to take consists of vacant lots. A large item of expense will thereby be saved.

The proposed extension will not alter or interfere with any existing house or lot lines. An objection of considerable consequence is thus avoided.



If undertaken at once, the cost of this improvement will be small, and the consequent expense to the property owners trivial.

Your petitioners therefore urgently request that immediate action be taken by your Board.

The Chairman put the question upon the said resolution, which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Mayor also offered the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, as stated in the foregoing resolution, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

The question being put upon the adoption of the said resolution, was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Deputy Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The meeting then adjourned.
