### SANITARY BUREAU.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 20,249; the number of causes of complaint was 6,439, as follows:

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,572, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 1,358 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,441 permits to scavengers to empty privies, their work being inspected by officers of this Board detailed for the purpose; 90 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 15 permits to transport manure; and 18 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1882, nine thousand six hundred and nineteen (9,619) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and ninety (290) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; six hundred and sixty-one (661) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; one thousand and fifteen (1015) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand two hundred and twenty-seven (1227) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and six hundred and fifty-five (655) transcripts of the records of deaths, ninety-one (91) of marriages and seventy-eight (78) of births from said records were issued. There were five thousand five hundred and twenty-eight (5528) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand two hundred and fifty-seven (6257) children were born during the same period.

# Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 30, 1882.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was

1,829, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 859 tenement-houses, 129 private dwellings, 93 other dwellings, 5 manufactories and workshops, 21 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 25 slaughter-houses, 1 hospital, 1 brewery, 2 laundries, 2 public sewers, 1 packing-house, 37 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 55 yards, courts and areas, 98 cellars and basements, 173 waste-pipes and drains, 203 privies and water-closets, 33 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 5 dangerous stairways, 12 dangerous chimneys, 9 cesspools, 8 other nuisances.

The number of property thereon received from the Inspectors was 180.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 580.

During the past week 245 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

88 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health

181 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 58 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 42 houses, 42 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

8 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 606 births, 46 still births, 232 marriages, and 547 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 30, 1882. This shows an increase of 92 births and 28 marriages, and a decrease of 10 still-births and 88 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 117 births, 5 still-births and 72 marriages, and a decrease of 231 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 7; diphtheria, 3; whooping cough, 12; malarial fevers, 5; diarrhœal diseases, 26; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 34; bronchitis, 5; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 9; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 11; direct effect of solar heat, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 17; premature and preternatural births, 7; while the deaths from croup increased 2; erysipelas, 2; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; cancer, 5; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 9; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; apoplexy, 6; gastritus, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; and drowning, 1. The number of deaths from puerperal diseases, and cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 92 were in institutions, 289 in tenement-houses, 149 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 110 on the first, 150 on the second, 99 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 15 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 541 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents; 61 were stated to be single, 123 married, 60 widowed, and the condition of 303 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 547; still-births, 46; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 73 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 606 births; 232 marriages; 46 still-births; 547 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 72 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 51 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 30, 1882, was 57.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.055, the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,707, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.54 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall hail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any other structure allowed by the corporation of the time allowed by the corporation of the time allowed by any control of the time and the structure, or the structure, and the structure and the structure, and the structure and the structure, and the structure and the structure, and the structure, the structure and the structure, and the structure and the structure, and the structure and the structure, and the structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of the structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consigne, master or other officer or stevedore, severally such as the structure, and the structure, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any pa

account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the

vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or trom the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14—The term "Board," when used in the fore going rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York."
