# BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

ARMORY BOARD—CITY OF NEW YORK, September 28, 1885.

NEW YORK, September 21, 1885.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at the office of his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, all the members being present.

There was also present a delegation from the Seventy-first Regiment, including Lieutenant-Colonel A. D. Palmer and other officers.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read approved.

A communication from the Comptroller recommending substitution of surety in the proposal of John Renehan, plumber, was received, and the following resolution passed:

Resolved, That the substitution of J. Richard Adler in the place of Edward Murphy, one of the sureties of John Renehan, contractor, for additional plumbing work in Twelfth Regiment Armory, be

and is hereby approved.

The following report from the Architect of the Twelfth Regiment Armory was read:

# ARMORY BOARD, CITY OF NEW YORK:

The mason work of the new armory for Twelfth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., Sixty-first and Sixty-second streets, Ninth avenue, has progressed to entitle the contractors, Messrs. Moran & Armstong, to the amount of third payment, viz.: sixteen thousand one hundred and sixteen 45-100 dollars, in accordance with the terms of agreement.

The report was received and the Secretary instructed to forward the account to the Comptroller

The secretary presented a bill from Messrs. Amerman & Ford for surveying, and it was Resolved, That the bill of Amerman & Ford, amounting to \$30 for surveying site of Twelfth Regiment Armory, at Sixty-first street and Ninth avenue, and dated August 21, being certified to by the Architect, be passed, approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

A communication was read from Lieutenant-Colonel A. D. Palmer, commanding Seventy-first Regiment, calling attention to the application of the regiment nearly a year ago for a new armory, and requesting early action in the matter. Colonel Palmer and other officers of the regiment spoke at some length, urging the needs of the organization and the present poor accommodations.

After consideration of the matter, the members of the Board expressed a willingness to second any effort the regiment might make to secure the co-operation of the State authorities in obtaining the site of the State Arsenal at Seventh avenue and Thirty-fifth street, and some contiguous property for joint occupation for a State Arsenal and an armory combined.

A petition of Col. Geo. D. Scott, commanding Eighth Regiment, was read, in which request made for action by the Board, urging upon the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the neces-

sity of making an appropriation for their new armory. Application was also made for rental of temporary quarters for the regiment. The Mayor explained to Col. Scott that he could not favor action prejudicing or anticipating his action as a member of the Board of Apportionment, as that Board would consider the question of armory appropriations in connection with the finances of the city.

Adjourned, subject to the call of the President.
