Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M. on Thursday, January 25, 1917.

The minutes of the meetings held January 11 and 16, 1917, were approved as printed.

Dock Department—Amendment to New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront Between 28th and 36th Sts., Gowanus Bay, Brooklyn.

The Chair called for a public hearing in the matter of amendment to the amended new plan for improvement of the waterfront between the center line of 28th st. and the southerly side of 36th st., Gowanus Bay, Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks Dec. 20, 1916, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Amendment to New Plan.
Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith tracing and print of amendment to the amended New Plan between the center line of 28th Street and the southerly side of 36th Street, Gowanus Bay, Brooklyn.

The amendment consists in widening the marginal street, wharf or place between these limits to 500 feet, thus making the inshore side coincident with the westerly side of Second Avenue, also discontinuing that portion of the marginal street between the northerly side and the center line of 28th Street.

No one appearing in opposition the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 17, 1917.

To the Honorable The Commissioners of The Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Under date of December 20, 1916, the Commissioner of Docks adopted and transmitted for approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund an amendment to the amended New Plan between the center line of 28th Street and the southerly side of 36th Street, Gowanus Bay, Brooklyn.

The amendment consists in widening the marginal street wharf or place between the limits stated, to 500 feet, thus making the inshore side coincident with the westerly side of Second Avenue, also discontinuing that portion of the marginal street between the northerly side and the center line of 28th Street.

I am advised that the purpose of this amended New Plan is to place the property lying between easterly line of the marginal street, wharf or place and the westerly side of Second Avenue under the control of the Commissioner of Docks, who has entered into leases with various parties located in the area which it is now proposed to include within the marginal street, wharf or place.

I see no objection to the proposed amendment and concurring in the request of the Commissioner of Docks, if there be no objection advanced at the public hearing to be held on January 25th, 1917, I recommend the approval of the attached resolution approving the request. Respectfully,

Pier A, North River, December 26, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sir—I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of the following described lease:

Lessee—Wilson & Co., Inc.

Description—All that certain property situated on the East River, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and County of New York, known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point in the exterior face of the present platform between East 45th and East 46th Streets, said point being distant 23.83 feet northerly from the northerly line of East 45th Street and 15.27 feet easterly from the crib bulkhead or present line of solid filling, and running thence easterly 40 feet on a line parallel with the northerly line of East 45th Street; thence southerly and at right angles with the northerly line of East 45th Street 110 feet; thence northerly and at right angles with the northerly line of East 45th Street 80 feet; thence westerly and on a line parallel with the said line of East 45th Street 150 feet to the face of the said platform between East 45th and East 46th Streets; thence southerly and along the exterior face of said platform 57 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

Term—Five (5) years from the first day of January, 1917.

Rental—Three thousand one hundred twenty-two dollars and thirty-five cents (\$3,122.35) per annum.

Removal of Structures—In the event of the termination or cancellation of this

lease, the lessee will within thirty (30) days after the service upon it by the lessor of a written notice so to do, remove any and all structures that may have been erected upon the premises.

Dear Sir—Referring to our communication of the 26th ultimo, recommending that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease of certain property between East 45th and East 46th Streets, East River, Borough of Manhattan, to Wilson & Co., Inc., I beg to request that the description therein given of the property proposed to be leased be amended to read as follows:

All that certain property situated on the East River, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and County of New York, known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point in the exterior face of the platform extending from the northerly side of East 45th Street to East 46th Street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, where the southerly inshore side of the platform proposed to be leased intersects same, said point being distant 23.83 feet northerly from the northerly line of East 45th Street and 15.27 feet easterly from the crib bulkhead or present line of solid filling; thence easterly and along the southerly side of said platform a distance of 40.3 feet to an angle point in same; thence southerly and at right angles to last mentioned line a distance of 23.42 feet to the southerly outshore side of said platform; thence easterly and along the southerly outshore side of said platform a distance of 111 feet to the outshore face of said platform; thence northerly and along the outshore face of said platform a distance of 80.3 feet to the northerly side of said platform; thence westerly and along the northerly side of said platform a distance of 154.88 feet to the exterior face of the first mentioned platform; thence southerly and along said exterior face of first mentioned platform a distance of 56.56 feet to the point or place of beginning; containing an area of 11,354 square feet.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 15, 1917.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On December 26, 1916, the Commissioner of Docks requested approval of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to Wilson & Co., Inc., of all that certain wharf property situated on the East River, Borough of Manhattan, between East 45th St. and East 46th St.

The lease to be from January 1, 1917, for a term of five years, at \$3,122.35 per annum.

The lease to further provide that in the event of the termination or cancellation of this lease, the lessee will, within thirty (30) days after the service upon it by the lessor of a written notice so to do, remove any and all structures that may have been erected upon the premises.

The remaining terms and conditions of the lease shall be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The premises in question, land under water (11,354 square feet) on the East River, between East 45th and East 46th Streets, is the same wharf property formerly leased to Schwarzschild & Sulzberger, from January 1, 1907, to January 1, 1917, at \$2,838.50 per annum, or at the rate of 25 cents per square foot, the rental for the proposed lease to Wilson & Co., Inc., is recommended at an increase, or at the rate of 27½ cents per square foot per annum.

The rental being reasonable and concurring in the other terms of the proposed lease, I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the request.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to Wilson & Co., Inc., of all that certain property situated on the East River, in the Borough of Manhattan, City and County of New York, known and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at a point in the exterior face of the platform extending from the northerly side of East 45th Street to East 46th Street, East River, Borough of Manhattan, where the southerly inshore side of the platform proposed to be leased intersects same, said point being distant 23.83 feet northerly from the northerly line of East 45th Street and 15.27 feet easterly from the crib bulkhead or present line of solid filling; thence easterly and along the southerly side of said platform a distance of 40.3 feet to an angle point in same; thence southerly and at right angles to last mentioned line a distance of 23.42 feet to the southerly outshore side of said platform; thence easterly and along the southerly outshore side of said platform a distance of 111 feet to the outshore face of said platform; thence northerly and along the outshore face of said platform a distance of 80.3 feet to the northerly side of said platform; thence westerly and along the northerly side of said platform a distance of 154.88 feet to the exterior face of the first mentioned platform; thence southerly and along said exterior face of first mentioned platform a distance of 56.56 feet to the point or place of beginning; containing an area of 11,354 square feet.

—the lease to commence on January 1st, 1917, and to be for a term of five (5) years at a rental of three thousand one hundred and twenty-two dollars and thirty-five cents (\$3,122.35) per annum; the lease to provide that in the event of the termination or cancellation of this lease, the lessee will within thirty (30) days after the service upon it by the lessor of a written notice so to do, remove any and all structures that may have been erected upon the premises.

The remaining terms and conditions of the said lease to be similar to those contained in leases of wharf property, now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Modification of the Lease to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company of Pier New 22, North River, Manhattan.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Repairs to Pier 22, North River.

Pier A, North River, November 15, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Municipal Building, Manhattan:

Sir—Pier 22, North River, was extended by this Department under contract, in 1904, a distance of 175 feet. Levels taken about a year after the extension had been built, showed a settlement extending from the end of the old pier before the extension was built out to the end of the extension in a gradual curved line.

No one at present connected with the Engineering Bureau of this Department had anything to do with the construction of and no personal knowledge of the extension, but, as no other pier on the North River from the Battery to 72d Street has shown any perceptible settlement, and as all the extensions recently built extend much further out into the river, and show no settlement, it seems to prove conclusively, that the extension was not properly constructed, in that the piles were not properly founded or were too short to reach the rock bottom which prevails at that locality.

The lessee is in no way responsible for the undue settlement of this particular pier, and while the condition of the pier is not at all dangerous, it is out of alignment and should undoubtedly be raised to its proper grade, especially as the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company, the lessee, has extended the pier further outshore to the 1913 pierhead line.

A proposition has been made by the lessee to raise the pier to grade, providing the City will reimburse the company for one-half the cost.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise whether the Department can enter into any such agreement, and also as to the best method to be employed for reimbursing the railroad company for one-half of its expenditure. Under date of November 8, 1916, he advises:

"It seems to me the proper course to be pursued in this matter is that you should present the facts to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with a request that you be authorized either to make the necessary repairs, or to grant to the Company an allowance upon the rental reserved to the extent of one-half of the cost of the necessary repairs when made by the Company."

In accordance with the advice of the Corporation Counsel, I beg to request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize me either to make the necessary

repairs to Pier New 22, North River, or to grant to the lessee an allowance upon the rental reserved under the lease to the extent of one-half of the cost of the necessary repairs when made by the company.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report:

January 17, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Relative to the communication of the Commissioner of Docks requesting authority to either make the necessary repairs to Pier new No. 22, North River, or to grant to the lessee an allowance upon the rental reserved under the lease to the extent of one-half of the cost of the necessary repairs when made by the Company, I report:

Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 2, 1903, the Commissioner of Docks executed a lease dated May 31, 1910, leasing to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Co., the old original pier No. 22 and an extension 175 ft. in length to the pier, the lease of the old pier to begin on Jan. 1, 1904, and on the extension when completed. The lease on both parcels terminating on January 1, 1914.

The Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries under date of February 26, 1915, reported:

"The outer 175 feet of the present pier was extended by this Department under a contract in 1904. Levels taken about one year after the pier extension had been built showed a settlement extending from the end of the old pier, before the extension was built, out to the end of the extension in a gradual curved line, the outer end of the pier remaining on the required grade; the extreme settlement after the extension was built running from about one foot in the middle of the pier to about two feet on the southerly side. Levels taken at other times and up to the present time show no new settlement after the original extension after the pier was built, therefore the extension has unquestionably reached a solid foundation from which no danger can possibly arise in the future."

The Department of Docks and Ferries is unable to furnish any information covering the reason for this condition, but advises that as no other pier between the Battery and West 72d Street on the North River, including a further extension to this pier constructed in 1915, has shown any perceptible settlement, conclusive proof is thereby offered that the extension in question was not properly constructed, in that the piles were either not properly founded or were too short to meet the rock bottom prevailing at this locality.

In view of these conditions the Commissioner believes that the lessee is in no way responsible for the undue settlement and while the conditions cited are not dangerous still this portion of the pier should be brought to its proper grade.

The Corporation Counsel, upon being requested to advise whether the Department could enter into any agreement, under date of Nov. 8, 1916, advised:

"It seems to me the proper course to be pursued in this matter is that you should present the facts to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with a request that you be authorized either to make the necessary repairs, or to grant to the Company an allowance upon the rental reserved to the extent of one-half of the cost of the necessary repairs when made by the Company."

It is estimated that it will cost approximately \$11,500 to bring this portion of the pier to proper grade and raise the structures erected thereon. I am further advised by the Chief Engineer of this Department that in view of the condition of the adjacent piers it is practicable to repair the depressed portion of this pier, bring it to grade and to maintain it at its proper grade, also that from all the facts obtainable it is apparent that the settlement in question is due to the failure of the piling to reach the underlying rock surface.

On Oct. 15, 1914, the Commissioner of Docks executed a lease, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 4, 1914, approving of and consenting to the Commissioner of Docks executing a lease to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Co. for the present pier No. 22 (including the original pier and the 1904 extension) and for a further extension to be built extending to the 1913 pierhead line.

The said lease contains a clause to wit:

"That it will at all times put, keep and maintain the said premises and every part thereof, and the structures thereon or to be erected thereon, in good and sufficient repair and condition."

The above report giving full information is transmitted for the consideration of the Commission. If it is decided that the City should be responsible for a portion of the defects, I advise the adoption of the attached resolution granting to the lessee an allowance of the rental reserved under the lease to the extent of one-half, but not to exceed \$5,000 of the cost of the necessary repairs when made by the Company.

The Commissioner of Docks was interrogated by members of the Board in regard to the matter.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Whereas, Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on July 2, 1903, the Commissioner of Docks executed a lease dated May 31, 1910, to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company for pier No. 22, North River (as existed in 1903), together with an extension of 175 feet in length to be built by the City, for a term of ten years from January 1, 1904, rental to be paid on the extension from date of completion to January 1, 1914; and

Whereas, It appears that levels taken by the Department of Docks and Ferries on the extension, as built by the City under a contract in 1904, showed a settlement extending from the end of the old pier, before the extension was built, out to the end of the extension in a gradual curved line, the outer end of the pier remaining on the required grade, the extreme settlement after the extension was built running from about one foot in the middle of the extension to about two feet on the southerly side. It further appears that levels taken at other times and up to the present time show no new settlement after the original extension; and

Whereas, The lease to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company of the pier as extended by the 1904 extension, together with an additional extension to be built by the City, executed by the Commissioner of Docks on October 15, 1914, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on March 4, 1914, for a term of ten years from January 1, 1914, contains the usual clause, to wit:

That it (the lessee) will at all times put, keep and maintain the said premises and every part thereof, and the structures thereon or to be erected thereon, in good and sufficient repair and condition; and

Whereas, It is deemed fair and equitable that the City should bear a portion of the expense of repairing the depressed section of the pier, which was not to proper grade at the time of the execution of the 1914 lease, although no protest was made by the Company at the time of the execution of said lease; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of an agreement with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, modifying or amending the lease to said Company, dated October 15, 1914, of pier new No. 22, North River (as then existed), together with an additional extension to the pierhead line of 1913, by providing for the Commissioner to make an allowance to the said railroad company of the cost of the necessary repairs to the 1904 extension to said pier, when made by the company.

The work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications submitted to and approved by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries. For the purpose of ascertaining the cost of the repairs, the proper officers and employees of The City of New York shall at all times have access to the books and accounts of the said railroad company showing said cost and the said railroad company shall file in the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries a sworn statement of the amount of money expended for said repairs. If such amount shall be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, that amount shall be fixed and determined upon as the cost of said repairs for the purpose of this agreement.

When said cost is fixed and determined as above, the Commissioner of Docks is authorized to make an allowance to the said railroad company from the rental for the next succeeding quarter, of an amount to the extent of one-half of the cost, as so determined, for the necessary repairs when made by the Company and certified by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Docks and Ferries; said allowance of one-half to be limited to \$5,000.

It being expressly understood and agreed that the terms and conditions of the lease shall remain in full force and effect except as herein noted.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Request of Benham & Boyesen, Inc., on Behalf of the Norwegian-American Line for Permission to Sublet a Portion of Pier at the Foot of 30th St., Brooklyn.

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

Pier A, North River, January 12, 1917.

Subletting of Part of Pier, foot of 30th St., Brooklyn.
Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 13, 1915, a resolution was adopted (and subsequently amended June 16, 1915), approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Norwegian-American Line, Benham & Boyesen, Inc., Agents, of a pier to be built at or near the foot of 30th Street, Borough of Brooklyn, about 1,324 feet long and 125 feet wide, together with bulkhead extending from a point 115 feet north of said pier to a point 137½ feet south of said pier, together with a shed on said pier to be erected at the expense of the City, for a term of ten years from the date that said pier shall be completed and ready for occupancy by the lessee, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each, rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$60,000 per annum, and for each renewal term ten per cent. advance on the rental for the preceding term.

The pier and shed were fully completed on December 1, 1916, since which time the lessee has been paying the full amount of the rent.

An application has been made by Benham & Boyesen, Inc., representing the Norwegian-American Line, for permission to sublet to Houlder, Weir & Boyd, Inc., Agents for Nippon Yusen Kaisha (Japanese Line), five hundred feet of the pier at the foot of 30th Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for a period of five years at an annual rental of \$45,000 per year. "The continuance of occupancy after that period to be mutually arranged three months prior to the expiration of the five-year period, and if continued, the rental shall not exceed an amount of ten per cent. in excess of the above mentioned figure per year, or \$49,500 per annum for the succeeding five years, terminating approximately September, 1926, which date is the approximate termination of our existing leasing period with the City."

Under date of December 30, 1916, in a communication to me on the subject, Benham & Boyesen, Inc., state:

"In your conversation with our Mr. McGowan you confirmed our impression that the parties mentioned were desirable tenants and regretted exceedingly your present inability to provide them with wharfage accommodations. Consequently, we believe that in arranging to sub-lease this space we are performing a good service to the City of New York in taking care of their wharfage requirements, which you at present are unable to provide.

"We would also desire you to consider that in granting this accommodation to the Japanese Line, we fully expect at times to be compelled to rent outside wharfage facilities when our arrivals and departures prevent our handling all of our steamers at 30th Street.

"In view of the fact that we are financially responsible to the City of New York for the performance of our contract under our lease with you, and furthermore, that we provide a satisfactory bond to guarantee such performance, we cannot consider the proposal of division of revenue outlined in your conversation with our Mr. McGowan on Wednesday last. Under our lease with your Department, we are obligated, irrespective of market conditions, to pay you the rentals specified in our lease, and we must respectfully contend that, inasmuch as the City of New York would not participate in our losses, the City is not entitled to participate in our profits. Furthermore, this question of profits is an unknown quantity and is dependent entirely upon our operating costs, which may be considerably increased from our leasing this space, and furthermore, the upkeep of the pier may be seriously increased through increased wear and tear on same, through the operation by this Japanese Line, for all of which we are responsible to the City.

"In conclusion, we wish to state that in making this application for your permission to sub-lease a portion of this pier, we are actuated by no selfish motives, neither are we seeking to be relieved from any of our obligations as your lessees."

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held May 18, 1916, a resolution was adopted directing the Commissioner of Docks in no case to consent to the assignment or subletting of leases of wharf property belonging to the City of New York without the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having first been obtained.

The application of Benham & Boyesen on behalf of the Norwegian-American Line, as set forth above, is respectfully forwarded for the consideration of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund without recommendation.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report:

January 17, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Commissioner of Docks, under date of January 12, 1917, forwarded without recommendation the request of Benham & Boyesen, Inc., on behalf of the Norwegian-American Line to sublet for a period of five years a portion of the pier at or near the foot of 30th Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

On May 18, 1916, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks be and is hereby directed to transmit to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval all assignments or sublettings of leases of wharf property belonging to the City of New York, and in no case to consent to any such assignment or subletting without the approval of this Board having first been obtained."

As I read the resolution, applications for subletting wharf property should not be considered by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund prior to their approval by the Commissioner of Docks. Therefore I suggest that the matter be referred back to the Commissioner of Docks for at least an expression of view upon the application of the Norwegian-American Line.

The Commissioner of Docks was interrogated by members of the Board in regard to the matter. The Commissioner called attention to the particulars of the subletting recited in his communication above which he stated were his reasons for submitting the matter for consideration.

Discussion followed.

The following resolution was then offered for adoption:

Resolved, That it is the sense of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the application of Benham & Boyesen, Inc., on behalf of the Norwegian-American Line for permission to sublet 500 feet of the pier at the foot of 30th St., Brooklyn, to Houlder, Weir and Boyd, Inc., Agents for Nippon, Yusen Kaisha (Japanese Line), for a period of five years at an annual rental of \$45,000 should be rejected by the Commissioner of Docks.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Dock Department—Proposed Amendment to Leases of Ferry Franchises.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the communication from the Commissioner of Docks requesting authority to amend all leases or renewals thereof of franchises to operate ferries in connection with an Interstate railroad, by changing the provisions therein contained which have to do with the rate of ferriage to be charged on said ferries, which was on the calendar of meetings held Dec. 7, 14 and 21, 1916, and Jan. 11, 1917, and laid over at each of said meetings.

Which was referred to a committee consisting of the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Docks.

Dock Department—Proposition to the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line for a New Lease of Pier 10, East River.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the communication from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for consideration a communication from Cyrus C. Miller, dated April 11, 1916, stating that he is authorized by the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line to accept a renewal of the lease of Pier 10, East River, for a further term of 10 years beginning Aug. 1, 1916; also that the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line prefers a new lease and offers to take a new lease of Pier 10 for 20 or 30 years at \$33,000 per annum, including the bulkhead on either

side and land under water adjoining said pier under the platforms at 27½ cents per square foot.

The Comptroller recommended that in view of the fact that the offer of the New York and Baltimore Transportation Line for a new lease is less than the rental fixed for the renewal term the offer for a new lease be rejected and a renewal lease on the terms and conditions provided for in the original lease be recommended by the Commissioner of Docks for approval.

At the request of Mr. Cyrus C. Miller the matter was referred back to the Commissioner of Docks.

Board of Education—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 245 Concord St., Brooklyn.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 20, 1917.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Education, in a communication to your Board under date of January 11, 1917, states that the Board of Education at a meeting held January 10, 1917, adopted a resolution requesting the consent and approval of your Board to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of the second floor of the premises No. 245 Concord Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use as an annex to P. S. 14, for a period from February 15, 1917, to July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$400.

On January 11, 1917, a resolution was adopted by your Board authorizing a lease of the first floor of said premises for use of the Board of Education for a period from January 1, 1917, to July 1, 1918.

The Acting City Superintendent and the Committee on Buildings of the Department of Education certify that the second floor of the premises above mentioned is needed to provide additional kindergarten accommodations for P. S. 14.

The rental of \$400 a year is less than that paid by the City for use of these same premises for a number of years. The former rental was \$450 a year.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just and it being less than previously paid I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of the second floor of the premises known as Maxwell House, No. 245 Concord Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Education, for a period from February 15, 1917, to July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$400, payable quarterly; the lessors to pay taxes and water rates, make outside repairs, furnish light, heat and janitor service and remove, at the expiration of the lease, the balcony which they have caused to be erected in front of Public School 14 (adjacent to Maxwell House), if so desired by the Board of Education; the Board of Education to have possession of the premises on all school days except Fridays from 8:30 o'clock a. m. to 3:30 o'clock p. m., and on Fridays from 8:30 o'clock a. m. to 2:55 o'clock p. m. Lessors, United Neighborhood Guild, Frank C. Munson, President, No. 176 Nassau Street, Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education, of a lease to the City, of the second floor of the premises known as Maxwell House, No. 245 Concord Street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Education, for a period from February 15, 1917, to July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of four hundred dollars (\$400), payable quarterly; the lessors to pay taxes and water rates, make outside repairs, furnish light, heat and janitor service, and remove at the expiration of the lease the balcony which they have caused to be erected in front of Public School 14, (adjacent to Maxwell House) if so desired by the Board of Education; the Board of Education to have possession of the premises on all school days except Fridays from 8:30 o'clock A. M. to 3:30 o'clock P. M. and on Fridays from 8:30 o'clock A. M. to 2:55 o'clock P. M. Lessors, United Neighborhood Guild; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Board of Education—Turning Over by, of P. S. 67, Queens, Located at Central Ave. and Olmstead Pl., Glendale, L. I., for a Period of Three Years.

The following was received from the Board of Education:

To the Board of Education:
The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a communication from Charles A. Martin, of No. 14 Tompkins place, Glendale, L. I., stating that he is desirous of leasing old Public School 67, Queens, for a number of years, for manufacturing purposes, with the understanding that he will vacate the same on short notice from this Department.

Your Committee referred the matter to the Board of Superintendents for advice regarding the necessity of again using old Public School 67, Queens, for school purposes, and also whether it would be advisable to turn the same over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund so that the City may derive revenue therefrom, inserting a proviso that the building may be reassigned to the Department of Education at some future date, if required.

In connection therewith a communication was received from Associate City Superintendent Shallow, dated December 28, 1916, reading in part as follows:

"At a meeting of the Board of Superintendents held to-day, I brought to the attention of the Board the conditions as at present existing in the neighborhood of old Public School No. 67, and the matter was referred to me with power to report to your Committee in favor of leasing this building for a comparatively short period.

"The school population at present in Glendale, in Middle Village on the northeast, and in Ridgewood on the west, is amply accommodated in the buildings at present used. New Public School No. 91, which was erected to take the place of old Public School 67, is at present filled, but there are no part-time classes. Public School 87, located a short distance to the eastward, has 259 vacant sittings; Public School 88, to the westward, has a few part-time classes, but when new Public School No. 93, farther to the west, is opened, probably in September next, Public School No. 88, will, no doubt, transfer quite a percentage of its pupils to Public School No. 93. Consequently No. 88 can relieve Public School 91.

"The New York Connecting Railroad forms a sort of natural boundary between the district of Public School No. 88 and that of No. 91, but there would be no objection to extending the district of No. 88 farther to the eastward to relieve No. 91, if necessary. On the north all of the district of Public Schools Nos. 91 and 87, is bounded by cemeteries; on the south the districts of these two schools are bounded by cemeteries and parks. Therefore the prospect is that Public Schools Nos. 87, 88, 91 and 93 will take care of the school population in that long narrow district for some time to come.

"Therefore, in my judgment, it would be safe to turn old Public School No. 67, Queens, over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a period of three years, with the proviso that, if it is required for school purposes at any time after 18 months from the beginning of the lease, it will be turned back again to the Board of Education at 30 or 60 days' notice."

Your Committee is in accord with the decision reached by Mr. Shallow, as set forth in the last paragraph of the communication above quoted, but believes it advisable, in turning over said building to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that it be stipulated that no changes or alterations be made in the same which will render it unsuitable for school purposes.

Accordingly there is submitted for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That old Public School 67, Queens, located at Central avenue and Olmstead place, Glendale, L. I., be and it is hereby turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a period of three years, with the proviso that, if it is required for school use at any time after eighteen months from the date of the leasing of the same, it will be reassigned to the Department of Education at thirty or sixty days' notice, and with the stipulation that no changes or alterations be made in the building which will render it unsuitable for school purposes.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Comptroller be authorized to derive such revenue therefrom as may be had from the leasing of the above described premises for the period and upon the conditions specified in the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on January 10, 1917. Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication from the Clerk of the Appellate Term of the Supreme Court, Second Judicial Department, dated January 12, 1917, stating that Justices Jenks and Kapper have requested that the lease of the present quarters occupied by said Court in the Offerman Building, 503 Fulton Street, Borough of Brooklyn, be renewed for a further term of one year from March 1, 1917.

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of January 30, 1912, recommended this lease for a term of five years from March 1, 1912, at an annual rental of \$5,000, the same as now asked, and said report was approved and lease authorized at a meeting of your Board held January 31, 1912.







First.—That the undersigned, Commissioners of Estimate, have completed their estimate of damage, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises affected thereby, having any objection thereto, do file their said objections in writing, duly verified, with them at their office in the Municipal Building, Court House Square, Long Island City, in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, on or before the 13th day of February, 1917, and that the said Commissioners will hear parties so objecting, and for that purpose will be in attendance at their office on the 16th day of February, 1917, at 2.30 o'clock p.m.

Third.—That the Commissioner of Assessment has assessed any or all such lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises as are within the area of assessment fixed and prescribed, as the estimate for benefit by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 3rd day of December, 1915, and that the said area of assessment includes all the lands, tenements and hereditaments and premises situate and being in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, which, taken together, are bounded as shown on the following diagram:
