Held Wednesday, Jan. 31, 1917, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by including in the Labor Class, Part III., the following: Battery Constructor. There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Martin as Supervisory Engineer (Supervising Engineman) under the provisions of clause 3 of Rule XII, be authorized.

The recommendations were adopted.

A report, dated Jan. 24, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, recommending certification of the list for promotion to Fourth Grade Clerk, Court of Special Sessions, in response to a request from the Chief Clerk of the Children's Court for a list from which to make one promotion to the position of Fourth Grade Clerk in the Children's Court. The action of the Secretary on Jan. 29 in making the certification recommended was approved.

A report dated Jan. 23, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, transmitting the request of the Chief Clerk of the Court of Special Sessions to be informed whether there would be any violation of the civil service rules if court Stenographers were required to perform other duties in the line of their employment within regular office hours, and when not actually engaged in taking the minutes of the court. The Commission ruled that the work indicated could be performed by the court Stenographers.

A report dated Jan. 24, was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner relative to the request of the Superintendent of Buildings, Manhattan, for approval of the restoration to a salary of \$1,200 of Joseph F. Hawkes and Theodore N. Melvin, Clerks, and James A. Garvey, an Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, under clause 24 of Rule XV, and of the promotion to a salary of \$1,200 per annum of David J. Finn and Carl A. Baas, Inspectors of Elevators, under clause 23 of Rule XV. The matter was laid over pending the receipt of information from the department as to the eligibility of the said employees for the requested promotions and restorations in salary.

A report dated Jan. 29 was presented from Miss Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, requesting approval of the employment of Rose Summerfeld, Superintendent of the Clara de Hirsch Home and Trade School, as expert examiner in the oral test for Institutional Inspector. The employment was approved, under clause 8 of Rule XII.

The following reports were presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation:

The recommendations were adopted.

A report dated Jan. 29 was presented from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation relative to five candidates in the examination for Assistant Electrical Engineer, Grade E, named therein. The Secretary was instructed to mark the candidates "Qualified" and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list of Assistant Electrical Engineer, Grade E, be and the same hereby is promulgated.

Reports (3), dated Jan. 29, were presented from the Examiner in Charge of Service Records, recommending that the Commission accept the service ratings of the Armory Board and the College of the City of New York for the period ending Sept. 30, 1916, and those of the Sinking Fund Commission for the period ending Dec. 31, 1916. The recommendations were adopted.

Reports dated Jan. 24, Jan. 25, Jan. 26 (2) and Jan. 30 (3), were presented from the Certification Clerk requesting approval of his action in certifying from the eligible lists of Bookkeeper, Third Grade, Male; Stenographer and Typewriter, Second Grade,

Female; Laboratory Assistant (Bacteriological Laboratory), Engineer, with knowledge of sewage disposal; Topographical Draftsman, Grade C, and Craneman (Electric), the names of candidates not reported upon by the Bureau of Investigation. The action of the Certification Clerk was approved.

A report dated Jan. 25 was presented from the Certification Clerk recommending that Alice Treadwell be marked "Not Qualified" on the eligible list of Social Investigator, Female, for the reason that she did not reside in the State of New York. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated Jan. 19 was presented from the Certification Clerk recommending that the name of Philip Shapiro be placed on the old preferred list of Temporary Clerk. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated Jan. 25 was presented from the Application Clerk, stating that Oscar Staber, a candidate on the eligible list of Patrolman who had been rejected by the Police Surgeons, had passed the medical re-examination for that position given him by the Commission's physicians. The Secretary was instructed to recertify the candidate's name to the Police Commissioner.

Y., be and he hereby is excepted from examination, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6a of Rule XII, of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to be employed as hydraulic engineer by the Board of Water Supply for a period of one year from Feb. 16, 1917, provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$3,000.

Upon the request of the Board of Coroners, Borough of Manhattan, in a communication dated Jan. 16, it was

Resolved, That, under clause 6a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Ignatius Canale be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed as Italian Interpreter in the office of the Coroners of the Borough of Manhattan from time to time during the year 1917, provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750.

A communication dated Jan. 22 was presented from the Committee on City Plan of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting that the payroll of John P. Assembly Introductory 317, Printed No. 324, being an Act to amend the Greater New York Charter in relation to the rehearing of charges against and the reinstatement of persons dismissed.

Assembly Introductory No. 316, Printed No. 323, being an Act to amend the civil service law in relation to the suspension and reinstatement of employees.

Senate Introductory No. 250, Printed No. 257, being an Act to amend the civil service law in relation to appointments by promotion in the civil service.

Matters Not Upon the Calendar Considered by Unanimous Consent.

Young, Clerk, from \$1,200 to \$1,320 per annum, and of Charles P. Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Oculist, Grade 2.

Upon the recommendation of the Advisory Board in the same report, the following form of advertisement for the examination for Oculist, Grade 2, was approved:

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of the State of New York.

The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience, 6; 70 per cent. required. Technical, 4; 75 per cent. required.

A qualifying physical examination will be given.

Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form B. Duties—The duties of physicians (Oculist) are to supervise and be responsible for the diagnosis and treatment of diseases, physical abnormalities and other pathological conditions of the eyes in city hospitals, clinics or other institutions.

Requirements—Applicants must present a license to practice medicine in the State of New York, when filing their applications, and must present evidence of at least one year's internship or three years' service in the Out-patient department of a hospital giving special training in diseases of the eye.

Candidates must be at least 21 years of age and not more than 45 years of age on the date of filing applications.

The compensation rates proposed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this position are from \$1,020 to \$1,380. Under the terms and conditions of the Budget for the year 1917, appointments will, as a rule, be made at the lowest compensation rate.

Oculists are usually required to work 21 hours a week in the Department of Health.

There are no vacancies at present.

The term of the eligibility of the list resulting from this examination is fixed at not less than one year nor more than four years.

A report dated Jan. 22 was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board submitting a report (A-350) dated Jan. 19, from Assistant Chief Examiner Fuld recommending a revised form of application for the use of candidates for Trained Nurse in the Non-Competitive Class, Part I., under clause 11 of Rule XVIII. A report dated Jan. 30, was presented from the Examiner in Charge of Service Record, transmitting a communication dated Jan. 30, from the Secretary of the Department of Health, stating that in acknowledgment of the generous response of its employees in the campaign of the Department against the epidemic of poliomyelitis, the Board of Promotions and Discipline at its meeting held Jan. 24, 1917, had put itself on record to take into consideration in marking the efficiency ratings for the quarter ended Sept. 30, 1916, the overtime given by its employees, and to indicate on the cards of such employees the productive overtime given by them during the epidemic of poliomyelitis. The Examiner recommended that the Commission disapprove the policy of the Health Department for the reasons stated in the report. The matter was referred to the Secretary.

A report dated Jan. 30, was presented from the Application Clerk stating that Sam Manus, 33 Sumner ave., Brooklyn, a candidate on the eligible list of Fireman, had been rejected in a medical re-examination by the Commission's physicians.
