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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 14, 1888.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews, and Post.

The minutes of the meeting held June 7 and 8, 1888, were read and approved.

The application of the Fort Lee Park and Steamboat Company for permission to erect awning frame and tally-house on outer end of the Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, and the communication from the Dock Master as to rate of compensation for landing thereat, were,

On motion, laid on the table.

The communication from Scott & Co., for permission to cut backing-log on Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, was

On motion, laid on the table, and the Dock Master requested to call on the Commissioners.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7921, respecting the application of J. A. Bostwick for permission to make certain improvements at Pier 45, East river, was,

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit :  
From Department of Public Works—Suggesting that a berth be assigned for public bath at foot of Forty-sixth street instead of Fifth street, North river. The action of the President pro tem. in advising that berth has been assigned at said pier was approved.

From Department of Public Parks—Desiring to be informed if any changes are contemplated in the arrangement of streets, bulkhead lines and crossings between Seventy-ninth and Ninety-sixth streets, North river (Riverside Park). The action of the President pro tem. in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Reporting settlement of claim against the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for arrears of rent of premises between Piers 25 and 26 and 26 and 27, North river.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to inform the Board as to the area of wharf property occupied by said company.

From Henderson Brothers, Agents Anchor Line—Desiring to be informed upon what terms they can have the use of Pier, new 43, North river.

From Western Union Telegraph Company—Requesting the privilege of placing and maintaining its cables under pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river, together with the privilege of cutting a trap-door through the pier at a point about one hundred feet from the river end. The action of the President in issuing a permit under usual conditions was approved.

From M. C. Dexter—Requesting permit to berth swimming-baths on the south side of piers foot of Twenty-first street and Thirty-fifth street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From John Norton & Sons—Requesting renewal of permit for tally-house on Pier 13, East river. Permit granted.

From R. W. Cameron & Co.—Requesting renewal of permit for hoisting-engine, tool-house and tally-house on Pier 9, East river. Permit granted.

From Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, lessees—Agreeing to repair pier at Thirty-seventh street, East river.

From J. H. Schenck & Co., Iron-Steamboat Advertising Bureau—Requesting permission to place on pier foot of Twenty-third street, North river, a portable closet, in sections, with advertising signs thereon. Application denied.

From West Shore Railroad Company—In reference to repairing pier at Forty-sixth street, North river. Referred to Commissioner Matthews.

From Twenty-third Street Railway Company :

1st. Requesting permission to run a four-inch iron pipe through the bulkhead on South street, opposite No. 87 Fulton Market, East river.

2d. Requesting dredging in north ferry slip, foot of West Twenty-third street, North river. The action of Commissioner Post in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From S. A. Frost—Requesting permission to repair Pier 28, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Harlem and Morrisania Transportation Line—Requesting permission to place a temporary fence on Pier foot of East One Hundred and Thirtieth street. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

From Knickerbocker Ice Company :

1st. Respecting condition of pavement foot of Ninety-third street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Requesting permit to drive spring piles at the bulkhead, between West Eleventh and Bank streets, at the foot of West Twentieth and West Forty-third streets, North river. Permit granted under usual conditions.

From James Brand—Requesting test of cement. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to make a test of said cement was approved.

From Joseph V. Brown, lessee—Respecting the repairs ordered to approach to Pier foot of Twenty-fifth street, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Receiver Fort Lee Ferry Company :

1st. Requesting permission to repair ferry racks at foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. The Secretary directed to advise that they must be more definite and state in detail what they desire to do.

2d. Requesting that the time to show cause why lease should not be cancelled be adjourned for two weeks from June 14, 1888. Extension of time granted as requested.

From Thomas F. White, official contractor—Requesting permission to erect awning posts on Pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

From Alexander Bird—Tendering resignation. Resignation accepted.

From Scott & Co.—Requesting permit to place a scale in the sidewalk, alongside of office corner of Thirty-fourth street and Twelfth avenue. Permit granted under the usual conditions.

From John Everson—Requesting permission to use dumping-board at West Thirty-seventh street, North river. Application denied.

From Daniel Robinson—In reference to executing lease for bulkhead foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river.

From Atlas Steamship Company, lessees—Requesting the Department to cause the lessees of Piers, new 54 and 56, North river, to dredge at said piers at the same time that dredging is done by them in the slips adjoining Pier, new 55, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Hoboken Land and Improvement Co.—Requesting permission to strengthen ferry-racks foot of West Fourteenth street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From Daniel Delaney—Requesting permit to erect a small frame house, about twenty feet square, on the North river, between Ninetieth and Ninety-fifth streets. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following reports were received from Dock Masters :

From George A. Dearborn—Reporting that the sill on bulkhead at Sixty-first street, East river, is in need of repairs. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From E. Abeel—Reporting repairs required Piers 18 and 19, East river.

From P. Curley :

1st. Reporting that two cleats have been misplaced on the bulkhead between Piers, new 42 and 43, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved.

2d. Reporting that a portion of the approach to Pier, new 47, North river, is in need of sheathing. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From C. H. Pendergast :

1st. Reporting damage to Pier 55, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting that bulkhead between Piers 47 and 48, East river, cannot be cleaned until the condemned platform derrick, owned by John Cunningham, is removed.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to remove the said derrick and clean the bulkhead thereat.

From Charles B. Husted—Reporting that Brown & Fleming are in arrears for use of berth at dumping-board foot West Nineteenth street. The Secretary directed to notify Brown & Fleming to at once show cause why said amount has not been paid.

From Engineer-in-Chief :

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of material excavated by the Union Dredging Company with Department dredges during the month of May, 1888. The Treasurer authorized to collect amount from the Union Dredging Company.

3d. Reporting that he had directed that Laborer Acting Watchman, Martin Griffin, be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchman, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

4th. Reporting completion of platform by the Maine Steamship Company, adjoining Pier 38, East river, and stating that the amount of land under water for which said company agree to pay twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, is 1,594 square feet. The Secretary directed to notify the Chief Clerk.

5th. Reporting damage to Blue Print apparatus at Pier "A," North river, and recommending that \$3.50 be accepted as payment in full for said damage.

On motion, recommendation was adopted.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7797, repairs required to pavement adjoining Pier, new 37, North river. The Secretary directed to advise C. P. Huntington, lessee, to make the repairs required.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7912, in reference to the application of Nesmith & Sons for permission to construct a private sewer, from No. 28 South street to and through bulkhead between Piers 9 and 10, East river, and recommending that permit be granted.

On motion, recommendation was adopted.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7929, in reference to the application of S. A. Frost, agent, for permission to repair Pier 28, East river. The action of the President in granting a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7854, as to the condition of the bulkhead in front of Pier, new 39, North river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7822, that he had repaired dumping-board at Canal street, North river, occupied by the Department of Street Cleaning.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7889, that he had directed and superintended repairing pavement on bulkhead in front of Pier 6, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7855, that he had directed and superintended repairing surface of bulkhead foot of Cherry street, East river.

13th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 7705 and 7806, that he had made requisition for dredging in front of the bulkhead north of Pier, new 1, North river, and at the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and south side of Pier at One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, and superintended the work thereat.

Commissioner Matthews reported that he had renewed insurance on furniture in offices on Pier A, North river, to the extent of \$5,000, for three years from June 12, 1888, to June 12, 1891.

On motion, his action was approved.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to prepare the necessary forms and papers for the Board of Assessors for estimating and assessing the expense of dredging at the northerly half of the bulkhead between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets, North river, done under the order of the Board, in pursuance of section 721 of the Consolidation Act.

On motion, the resolution adopted May 24, 1888, giving John A. Bouker permission to build a crib-dump between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, was amended to read as follows :

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to John A. Bouker to build a crib-work dump on or inside of the established bulkhead line between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, with an approach from said East Seventy-first street ; all of the said work to be and remain thereat during the pleasure of the Board, and to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department ; provided that the said John A. Bouker shall first agree, in writing, to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water to be covered by the said crib-work, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, payable monthly, at the end of each month, to the Dock Master of the District, commencing from the date that the Engineer-in-Chief reports the said dump is ready for occupancy ; and further provided, that the said John A. Bouker shall file in this office, within ten days after receipt hereof, a written agreement to vacate the said crib-work, and remove the dump and approach thereto, within thirty days after receipt of notice so to do from this Department.

The following preamble and resolution were,

On motion, adopted :

Whereas, A written opinion has been received from the Counsel to the Corporation that Mr. Harrison E. Gawtry is subject to the obligation of building a bulkhead at foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Harlem river, be it

Resolved, That Mr. Harrison E. Gawtry, owner of part of that certain piece or parcel of land and land under water, situated, lying and being in the City of New York, between East One Hundred and Nineteenth and East One Hundred and Twentieth streets, on the Harlem river, which was granted and conveyed to Jacob Weidenfeld by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, by indenture bearing date the second day of November, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, be and he is hereby requested and required, in conformity with the terms, obligations and conditions of said indenture, to build and complete (within three months after receiving a copy of this resolution), a bulkhead in front of the southerly half of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, on the bulkhead line, as designated on the "new plan for the improvement of Harlem river," under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

## APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 4, 1887, and approved by the Mayor, October 11, 1887, reading as follows:

"Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William C. Schermerhorn to pave the carriageway of Sixty-seventh street, from Second avenue to Avenue A, with trap-block pavement, and that crosswalks of three courses of blue stone be laid at the intersecting and terminating avenues, where not already done, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works."

—be and the same is hereby amended by striking out the word "trap-block" and inserting the word "granite-block" in place thereof, before the word "pavement."

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to S. A. Ludin to connect his premises, No. 602 West Thirty-eighth street, by a three-inch iron pipe, with the waters of the North river, at the foot of said West Thirty-eighth street, for the purpose of supplying salt water to be used on said premises for cleansing purposes, and in case of fire; provided the said S. A. Ludin shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from loss or damage to any gas or water pipe or sewer, or from any other cause, that may occur during the progress or subsequent to the laying of such pipe that may be caused by the use of the privilege hereby given, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott Street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same, or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, and kept in such condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. No person shall any such person rent, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive

gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sub-dwelling apartment.
