SIRS—I have to report that on the 20th day of October, 1889, at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, at the City Hall, in the City of New York, I have caused to be delivered to the Clerk of said Board, and left with him copies of resolutions adopted by this Board on the 18th day of October, 1889, copies of said resolution being hereto annexed. They provide for the altering of the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out, widening and extending of College place and Greenwich street, from Chambers street to Dey street. I do also report that I caused to be published in the City Record the notice required by law, a copy of which, together with the proof of the publication thereof, is hereto annexed.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, held on October 18, 1889, the following resolutions were adopted by said Board:

To the Honorable the Board of Street Opening and Improvement :

Gentlemen—The undersigned, to whom was referred the petition of P. V. Murray and others for the opening of Wales avenue, from Kelly to St. Joseph street, would state that he has fully investigated the matter and reports, as follows:

The avenue is designated as a street of the first class and is about 4,100 feet in length, and is so located and improvements in the vicinity are of such a character that for the benefit of the public it should undoubtedly be opened. The present application, however, is to open but a portion of the street, namely, from Kelly to St. Joseph street, a distance of some 2,300 feet. The street as laid down on the map extends beyond St. Joseph street to the Southern Boulevard, a distance of about 1,000 feet, which portion of the street is now enclosed and occupied by the owners, and a large house is standing on the premises immediately facing Wales avenue as at present used. The portion of the street which it is proposed to open has, I am informed, been used by the public as a highway for more than twenty years and the owners thereon (who are the petitioners in this matter) highway for more than twenty years and the owners thereon (who are the petitioners in this matter) are of the opinion that in justice to themselves only that portion of the street should now be opened are of the opinion that in justice to themselves only that portion of the street should now be opened which has been so used by the public, as the award to them as owners would be a merely nominal one. That portion of the proposed avenue from St. Joseph street to the Southern Boulevard would be very difficult and expensive to construct, which work is apt to closely follow upon the legal opening. Considerable rock cutting would have to be done and heavy grades filled which would impose undoubtedly a large assessment upon the property on the whole line should it be opened at one time. It is therefore a question whether this burden under the circumstances should be at this time imposed upon the owners whose property has been thus used as a public highway for years past.

First—As to Ogden avenue. This avenue is designated as a street of the first class from Jerome avenue to "Orchard street," a distance of 4,150 feet; and of the third class from "Orchard street" to Aqueduct avenue, a distance of 1,500 feet. The entire length, including both classes, is 5,650 feet. No petition has been presented for opening any portion of the avenue. I forward a resolution to open the first-class portion from Jerome avenue to "Orchard street," which includes the portion referred to in the resolution of the Board of Education and which is required to be opened for the very urgent reasons stated in the preamble. As to whether any portion of the damages and expenses

As to whether any portion of the damages and expenses of opening any section of a street which has been divided into different classes must be borne by the City, I enclose an opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on that subject, dated April 24, 1886.

Whereas, This Board is desirous of securing for the people of the City the public advantage to be derived from such facilities as will thereby be secured, especially in view of the action of said applicants in compine before the local authorities for their opinion of the terms upon which such

Resolved, That as a settlement of the differences arising under the legislation aforesaid, the consent of the local authorities be and it is hereby given to the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company, the South Ferry Railroad Company and the successors to the franchises formerly of the Broadway Surface Railroad Company, and to their successors and assigns respectively, for the use of the cable power in the operation of the street surface railroads, owned or operated by them respectively, from the Central Park by the way of Seventh avenue, Broadway, Whitehall and State streets and Battery place to the South Ferry, and for the making of any changes in the construction of said roads or roadbeds, which shall be necessary for the use of such motive power, upon the following terms and conditions, that is to say:

First—That in making the necessary changes in construction the existing centre-bearing rails upon the said line shall be removed and new rails of improved form, to be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works, be substituted therefor upon the said line.

Second—That any and all changes in location of tracks or of water-pipes, sewers, gas-mains or other underground structures rendered necessary by the construction of the conduit for said cable power, shall be by agreement with the Commissioner of Public Works, who, wherever the construction of said conduit shall interfere with existing underground structures of any kind, shall approve of the method of construction of said conduit, prior to the adoption thereof by said company, and that all such changes or removals shall be done by the Department of Public Works or under its supervision, at the expense of said company.

Third—That said company shall pay the expense of the repavement of the said street between

the rails of its tracks and for a space two feet in width, outside of and adjoining the outside rails of

the rails of its tracks and for a space two feet in width, outside of and adjoining the outside rails of said tracks, and the repairs of such pavement from time to time, such repairement and repairs to be made by or under the supervision of the Department of Public Works.

Fifth—That the Broadway and Seventh Avenue Railroad Company shall, within thirty days from the passing of this resolution and in consideration of the consent of the local authorities hereby given, execute and deliver to the Comptroller of the city, its corporate bond under seal, in a penalty of \$500,000, conditioned that from the time when such cable railroad shall be in operation and so long as no other railroad than those now existing shall be constructed upon, over or under the said of \$500,000, conditioned that from the time when such cable railroad shall be in operation and so long as no other railroad than those now existing shall be constructed upon, over or under the said routes in Broadway or any part thereof, the percentages upon gross receipts paid into the City Treasury under existing provisions of law for the use of Broadway for railroad purposes, together with the rental of \$40,000 also paid for such use under such provisions, shall amount to the annual sum of at least \$150,000, which the said company shall agree shall be the minimum amount to be paid annually for such percentages and rental. PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 350 Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed lune 9, 1885 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellinghouses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one doilar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and theywill be charged at rates faxed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and misculaneous rates sha be as follows, to wit:

BAKERES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three doilars per annum.

RARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum each in public houses, boardinghouses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each in public houses, boardinghouses, and bathing establishments. HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per-

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a ficense or permit taken out for that purpose. Al licenses or permit must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urmals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will oecome a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates. By order,

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

N UMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore even to all householders that in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notined that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed (or any portion of one year.
