

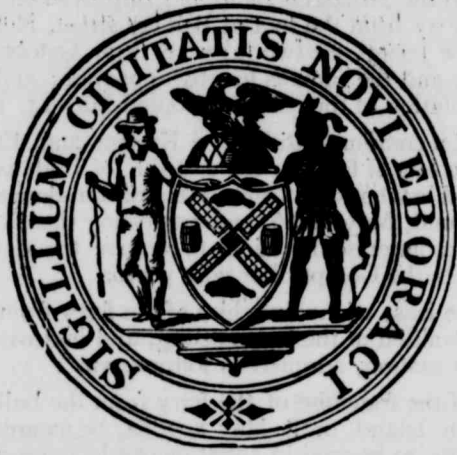

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,
NEW YORK, March 21, 1876.

The Board of Health met this day.

Orders.

380 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

Suits for Penalties.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 54 cases.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps.

From Riverside Hospital: On School building No. 57; on certain street pavements and aqueduct; on filling in bulkhead at One Hundred and Eighteenth street, East river; on filling vacant lot north side One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, 200 feet east of Morrisania.

Hearing.

L. Hoffman and others, undertakers, appeared before the Board to explain certain alterations in burial permits. Further consideration of the subject was postponed.

Resolutions.

That a copy of the report of the Committee of Conference, appointed by this Board February 29, be forwarded to the Board of Police.

That the application of the Police Department for permission to fill in bulkhead on East river, between One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets with street sweepings and ashes, be and is hereby granted.

That permission be granted to the Police Department to fill vacant lot on the north side of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street 200 feet east of Morris avenue, and extending 25 feet easterly, with street sweepings and ashes.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 18, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,487, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 905 tenement houses, 72 private dwellings, 111 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 6 stores and warehouses, 35 stables, 94 slaughter-houses, 4 tripe establishments, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 1 brewery, 1 aqueduct, 1 mill, 5 other nuisances, 8 sunken and vacant lots, 27 yards, courts, and areas, 45 cellars and basements, 212 waste-pipes and drains, 53 privies and water-closets, 10 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, 61 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 522. During the past week 39 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report. 28 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 59 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 56 houses where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 6 dwellings, 46 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 36 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital, and — dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

643 cans and 38 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending March 18, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers during the week ending March 18, 1876: cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 83 carcasses; sheep, 3 carcasses; veal, 270 pounds; poultry, 396 pounds; and fish, 10,325 pounds.

During the week ending Saturday, March 18, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 619 burial permits for city deaths, 29 for bodies in transitu, and 50 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 619 deaths, 119 marriages, 457 births, 50 still-births, 29 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from Coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 4 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this bureau.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, MARCH 21, 1876.

To the Board of Health:

At a meeting of this Board held February 29, the undersigned were appointed a Committee of Conference in response to the following resolution of the Board of Police:

“Resolved, That the Board of Health be and is hereby most respectfully requested to vacate, on or before the 15th of March, prox., the rooms now occupied by them on the first and second floors of the Central Office of the Police Department Building, 301 Mott street, the same being required for the necessary uses and purposes of the Police Department.”

Your Committee has had several interviews with the members of the Board of Police, and has carefully considered the subject involved in the resolution. Waiving all legal questions as to the authority of the present Board of Police over the premises occupied by the Board of Health, a part of which was assigned to the Health Department, under an act of the Legislature in 1866, and a part of which was constructed and especially adapted for the purposes of the Health Department in 1868, and have been since that time in the undisturbed possession of the successive Health Departments of the city, your Committee proceeded to ascertain what could be done to enable the Health Department to accede to the request of the Board of Police. It is clear that the rooms asked for cannot be vacated except by a complete removal of the Board of Health from the Mott street building, as the rooms now occupied are in no case unnecessary, but in the Bureau of Vital Statistics are even now inadequate, owing to the large number of clerks who are compelled to write in very restricted quarters. There is no reason why this Board should wish to remove from its present location other than its desire to accede to the wishes of a co-ordinate Department of the city government in every matter

not vital to the important interests committed to its care. Assuming this willingness to move from the Mott street building to be the general feeling of the Board, your Committee has carefully considered the possibility of such removal.

It appears on inquiry that there are no buildings or leased property belonging to the city which can be used for the Board of Health, and that there is no appropriation which can be employed by this Board to hire or fit up a suitable building. With regard to the proposition of the Board of Police to assign to this Board the Station-house in East Twenty-ninth street, between Madison and Fourth avenues, your Committee report that, on inspecting the building, they have found—

1. That it is not adapted to the wants of this Department, being too small and badly planned for our purposes.

2. To enable this Board to occupy it at all, would involve an expenditure of from \$5,000 to \$10,000 for the construction of fire-proof vaults for the preservation of records which have accumulated since 1806, are in the care of this Department, and must be constantly accessible in response to daily calls for transcripts and for other purposes, and for roofing the yard, to provide space for the Clerks of the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

3. That, on account of its location, it would inflict great hardship upon citizens who are compelled to come daily to the Sanitary Bureau, Bureau of Vital Statistics, and to the other offices, specially the undertakers, to the number of nearly one hundred daily, the scavengers, and the owners of vessels, all of whom are obliged to procure permits; also those bringing complaints, and those against whom orders of the Board have been issued.

4. That the residents of Twenty-ninth street, which is almost entirely occupied by private families, would be greatly annoyed by the presence of the small-pox ambulance and coupe and the disinfecting wagons of this Department, as well as by the wagons of undertakers, which would be constantly at its doors.

It appears, therefore, that this Department cannot vacate its present offices until provision is made for it elsewhere by competent authority. But further conference and mutual accommodation between the two Departments may determine the possibility of some provisional arrangement by which the Vaccinating Bureau may be removed, thus vacating three rooms on the first floor, and one or more rooms can be given up on the third floor.

To W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register :

SIR—There were 619 deaths reported in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 18, 1876, against 679 reported, and 663 which actually occurred, the week previous, showing an annual death-rate of 32.62 to the 1,000 persons living in the city, the population estimated at 1,056,789. This diminution occurred in the following classes of diseases: Zymotic, 4; constitutional, 19; local diseases, 39, and violence, 4. The most prominent diseases which contributed towards this decrease were: Small-pox and diphtheria, 4 each; membranous croup, 5; whooping-cough, 6; typhoid fever, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; pneumonia, 25; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17, and 16 deaths less of children under 5 years of age. An increase of 6 deaths from developmental diseases, 5 of measles, 9 of scarlatina, 1 of typhus fever, 2 of puerperal diseases, 2 of diarrhoeal diseases, 5 of cancer, 4 of bronchitis, 16 of diseases of the heart, 1 of Bright's disease and nephritis, and 1 death in institutions took place during the week. The deaths from phthisis pulmonalis and pneumonia numbered 83, respectively, and bronchitis 42, being 33.60 per cent., and the deaths of children under five years of age numbered 274, or 44.26 per cent.; thus, the mortality from these three diseases and of children under five years of age furnished 77.86 per cent. of the total mortality reported for the week. 40 of the 55 deaths reported from diphtheria, 22 of the 28 deaths from scarlatina, 7 of the 10 deaths from membranous croup, 4 of the 7 deaths from cerebro-spinal fever, occurred in houses containing over three families. The average age of those who died of diphtheria was 3 years, 3 months, 18 days; scarlatina, 3 years, 3 months, 10 days; membranous croup, 2 years, 10 months, 26 days, and cerebro-spinal fever, 8 years, 5 months, 16 days.

The mean temperature of the week was 29.9 degrees Fahr., with a range of 36 degrees, and the mean humidity 79.100 of total saturation, as reported by D. Draper, Director Central Park Meteorological Observatory.

From the most recent returns the annual rate of mortality per 1,000 persons living, according to the estimated or enumerated population of Washington was 33.16; Boston, 24.78; Baltimore, 27.81; Brooklyn, 29.40; Chicago, 18.27; Cincinnati, 30.78; Philadelphia, 29.01; Nashville, 30.15; Mobile, 26.97; San Francisco, 31.07; Memphis, 20.88; Buffalo, 15.09; London, 25.3; Edinburgh, 25; Glasgow, 31; Dublin, 37; Liverpool, 36; Calcutta, 30; Bombay, 27.3; Paris, 31.3; Brussels, 27.7; Amsterdam, 30; Rotterdam, 37; The Hague, 27.1; Copenhagen, 25.5; Christiania, 25.7; Berlin, 25.5; Hamburg, 25.4; Munich, 37.5; Vienna, 30.6; Rome, 43.9; Naples, 42.5; Turin, 25.9; Alexandria, 38.4.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held March 18, 1876.

Present—Hon. William H. Wickham, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; John Reilly, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolutions, which, on motion, were adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to lease at public auction on appraisal, in accordance with the Charter of 1873, for the term of five years from May 1, 1876, the following premises belonging to the City of New York:

No. 49 Beekman street.

No. 118 Sullivan street, for four years and nine months from August 1, 1876.

Old Schoolhouse, corner of Avenue C and Second street, South Fordham.

HAMILTON SQUARE MAP.

Nos. 2 to 8, west side Third avenue, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.

Nos. 9, 11 to 16, south side Sixty-eighth street, Third and Lexington avenues.

Nos. 22 to 25, east side Lexington avenue, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.

Nos. 26 to 30, 31 and 32, north side Sixty-seventh street, Lexington and Third avenues.

HARLEM MARKET MAP.

No. 4, north side One Hundred and Twentieth street, near Third avenue.

Nos. 13 to 15, south side One Hundred and Twenty-first street, near Third avenue.

FORT GANSEVOORT MAP.

No. 8, north side Gansevoort street.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby approve of the appraisal of valuation of the property, to be leased at public auction, as made by Samuel C. Holmes, herewith, and fix the terms of sale as follows:

TERMS OF SALE.

Twenty per cent. on the yearly rent bid for each parcel to be paid to the Collector of City Revenue at the time and place of sale; and the successful bidder will be required, at the same time, to have an obligation executed by two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, for carrying into effect the terms of sale.

Twenty per cent., when paid, will be credited on the first quarter's rent; or forfeited, if the lessee does not execute the lease and bond within fifteen days after the sale; and the Comptroller shall be authorized, at his option, to resell the premises bid off by those failing to comply with the terms as above; and the party so failing to comply to be liable for any deficiency that may result from such resale.

No person will be received as lessee or surety who is delinquent on any former lease from the Corporation. No bid will be accepted from any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation. (Sec. 99 of Charter of 1873.)

The leases will contain the usual covenants and conditions, reserving to the Corporation the right to cancel the lease whenever the premises may be required by them for public purposes.

All repairs will be made at the expense of the lessees, and no deduction whatever will be allowed for damage by reason of any sickness or epidemic that may prevail in the city during the continuance of the lease.

The lessees will be required to give a bond for double the amount of the annual rent, with two sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of the rent quarter-yearly, and the fulfillment on their part of the covenants of the lease.

The Comptroller submitted leases, prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, of the following ferries, viz.:

From the foot of Tenth street, East river, New York, to Greenpoint, L. I., and

From foot of Barclay street, North river, New York, to Hoboken, N. J.;

—whereupon the following resolutions, submitted by the Comptroller, were adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the lease to Shepherd Knapp and Edward S. Knapp, of the City of New York, for the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island, for five (5) years, from November 1, 1875, as prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, be and the same is hereby approved; and that the Comptroller execute the same, as provided for by resolution of this Board, adopted May 14, 1875.

Resolved, That the lease to the Hoboken Land and Improvement Company of the State of New Jersey, for the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Barclay street, North river, in the City and State of New York, to Hoboken, New Jersey, for two (2) years from October 1, 1875, as prepared by the Counsel to the Corporation, be and the same is hereby approved; and that the Comptroller execute the same as provided for by resolution of this Board, adopted May 14, 1875.

The Comptroller submitted a communication from Kissam and Embury, attorneys for August Pettier, in relation to title to two lots of land on the east side of Fifth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets (included in what was formerly Hamilton square), sold at public auction by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, May, 1866, and requesting this Board to approve of an act, to be submitted to the Legislature at its present session, to remove the defect in the title to said lots; which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller with power.

The resolution awarding the lease of the franchise of the ferry from the foot of Whitehall street, New York, to Staten Island, submitted at the last meeting, and laid over for consideration, was taken up for action, amended, and, on motion, adopted as follows, viz.:

Resolved, That the lease of the franchise of the ferry from the bulkhead at the foot of Whitehall street, New York City, to Staten Island, until May 1, 1884, be awarded to John H. Starin, at fifty (50) per cent. of the gross receipts, to be paid in equal quarterly payments, on condition that he executes the lease therefor, which shall be approved by this Board; and that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare a lease for the same, to be submitted to this Board for its approval.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Under and by virtue of the authority conferred upon this Board by section 111, chapter 335, and section 19 of chapter 757 of the Laws of 1873, and section 1 of chapter 631 of the Laws of 1875, and by authority of the resolution adopted by the Board of City Record, at a meeting held May 6, 1874, the Department of Public Works incurred liabilities for supplies of printing, stationery, and blank books, furnished between the first and fourth days of January, 1876, to the various Departments, Courts, and Offices of the City of New York; and be it

Resolved, That the indebtedness incurred by the Department of Public Works, on account of the appropriation for "printing, stationery, and blank books," for 1876, prior to the 4th of January, 1876, and now remaining unpaid, as enumerated in the annexed schedule, amounting to the aggregate sum of \$7,102 33, is hereby approved and accepted, and the bills therefor are directed to be transmitted by the Department of Public Works to the Finance Department for payment, and the Commissioner of Public Works is requested to certify to the fact that a proper certificate of the necessity of the expenditure was made and filed in the Department of Public Works before the indebtedness was incurred.

SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
