### Report for Quarter Ending March 31, 1902.

New York, October 6, 1902.

Honorable SETH LOW, Mayor, New York City:

Sir-Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending March 31, 1902.

### Report.

On the 31st day of March, 1902, the number of the Force, of all grades (including those on probation), was 7,628.

### Sick Time.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received for the quarter and the details thereof will be found in schedule annexed marked "A", from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 22,178½ days; the sick time paid 11,089¼ days, and sick time unpaid 11,089¼ days. Total days' time of the Force was 677,999 days. Per cent of sick to full time, 3.27; for receding quarter 261. preceding quarter, 2.61.

The total number of arrests by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 26,206; females, 5,804—total, 32,010. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,669; number discharged without trial, 871; number acquitted, 282; number convicted, 413; number sent to other authorities, 102; number died, 9; number pending, 992.

### Lost Children.

Males, 217; females, 109—total, 326. Restored to parents or guardians, 305; other dispositions, 21. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 214. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

Note—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the stationhouses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time of arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, it no other person be so interested it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank

or estimates in addition to inserting the figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application, therefor at the office of the department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
