

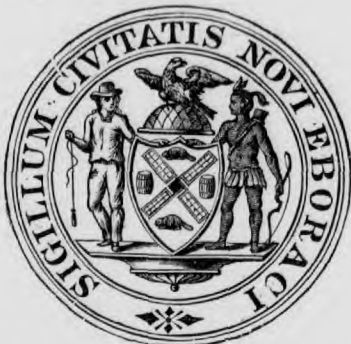

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor :

SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516, Laws of 1884, we transmit herewith financial statements resulting from an examination of the Chamberlain's office for the first quarter of 1889.

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on March 30, 1889, was \$9,101,071.97, which agrees with the balance as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

The statements inclosed are as follows :

"A"—Receipts and Payments—Special and Trust Accounts.

"B"—Receipts and Payments—Appropriation, General Fund and Taxes.

"C"—Receipts and Payments—Sinking Fund, Redemption Accounts.

## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held May 9, 1889.  
Present—Commissioners Post, Matthews and Silliman.  
The minutes of the meetings held May 2 and 3, 1889, were read and approved.  
The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, laid on the table:  
From Rev. E. O. Tree and Edward Myers—Complaining about the bridge erected on the Bronx river, at West Farms.  
From Ciancimino's Towing and Transportation Company—Requesting the privilege of mooring scows at the bulkhead between Piers 13 and 14, East river, for the purpose of receiving cellar dirt.  
From the Engineer-in-Chief—Respecting Pier foot of West Fifty-ninth street, North river.  
Referred to the President and Commissioner Matthews.  
The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:  
From Department of Public Works—In reference to and renewing request for the designation of a berth for a free floating bath at the foot of Stanton street, East river. The action of the Secretary in replying thereto was approved.  
From Counsel to the Corporation—In relation to suit against the Fort Lee Ferry Company for rent of bulkhead, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river. The action of Commissioner Matthews in stating that the said rent has been paid in full was approved.  
From Police Department—Reporting hole in bulkhead in front of Pier, new 28, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.  
From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company:  
1st. Requesting permission to re-erect and restore grain elevator, known as Elevator A, between Sixtieth and Sixty-second streets, North river.  
2d. Requesting permission to rebuild Pier "D," at the foot of Sixty-fourth street, North river.  
3d. Requesting permission to rebuild upon the stone foundation piers of Elevator B, at the foot of West Sixty-third street, North river; all as shown on plans submitted.  
The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.  
From Rapp & Johnson Lumber Company—Requesting permission to drive piles on the Harlem river (east side), three hundred feet north of Madison Avenue Bridge. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.  
From John A. Bouker—Requesting permission to locate Scow No. 3, with a dumping platform thereon, on the upper side or end of Pier at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street, East river, to be used in removing cellar dirt, and enclosing consent of Joseph V. Brown, lessee. The action of Commissioner Matthews in issuing a permit, to remain during the will of the Board, was approved.  
From Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company—Requesting permission to remove cable box and cables from their present location to a point one hundred feet further west on East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, in accordance with diagram submitted. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.  
From Providence and Stonington Steamship Company—Requesting permission to drive eight new fender-piles on the end of Pier, old 29, North river, and place new planking from the street to the gates. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.  
From Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, lessees of Pier at Thirty-seventh street, East river—Consenting to Michael Kane constructing a bulkhead and filling-in on the north side of said pier, and agreeing not to make any claim against this Department or the Corporation of the City of New York for any loss of wharfage during the term of their lease of said pier by reason of the construction of the aforesaid bulkhead or filling-in.  
From G. E. P. Howard—In relation to executing lease for land under water adjoining Pier 36, East river. Referred to Commissioner Matthews.  
From Roberts & King—Requesting renewal of permit for tally-house on Pier 11, East river. Permit granted.  
From Citizens' Steamboat Company of Troy, New York—In relation to the approach to Pier, new 46, North river.  
From Homer Ramsdell, lessee Pier, new 24, North river—Requesting the Board to issue permits for tally-houses on said pier to the following, viz.: Poughkeepsie Line, Hudson Line, Ramsdell Line, Yonkers Line.  
On motion, permits were granted.  
From Charles McCarthy—Requesting renewal of permit for tally-house on Pier 11, East river. Permit granted.  
From Suburban Rapid Transit Company—Requesting permission to repair pier fenders to the Harlem River Bridge in accordance with plans and specifications submitted. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.  
From Orson P. Raymond—Requesting permission to replace about six piles on the west side of the Harlem river near Lexington avenue. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.  
From John H. Starin—Requesting permission to remove planking and strengthen the uprights to shed on bulkhead, between Piers 18 and 19, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be kept within existing lines, was approved.  
From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting repairs required to deck of Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, where necessary, was approved.  
From Dock Protective Association of the Nineteenth Ward—Stating that the dumping-board has been removed from foot of Sixtieth street, East river, but the premises cannot be used until the earth left thereat is removed. The action of the Secretary in notifying T. E. Crimmins to remove said earth was approved.  
From Lehigh Valley Railroad Company—Requesting permission to make repairs at Pier 2, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.  
From Engineer-in-Chief:  
1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.  
2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending 4th May, 1889.  
3d. Respecting the condition of and repairs required to Pier, old 27, North river, and recommending that the owner and lessee be notified that unless sufficient work is done to remove the dangerous portion of the pier within five days the Department will secure said premises against accidents and charge the same to them.  
On motion, his recommendation was adopted.  
4th. Reporting that he had directed that Laborer Acting Watchman George Rafferty be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchman and recommending that his action be approved.  
On motion, his action was approved.  
5th. Reporting that the filling-in behind the bulkhead or river-wall on the Franklin and North Moore Streets Sections was completed on Tuesday, the 7th instant, and the dump thereat closed. The Secretary directed to notify the Dock Master to collect wharfage from all vessels using the bulkhead between Piers, new 24 and 25, North river.  
6th. Reporting repairs required to flag-pole on Pier, new 46, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to shorten said flag-pole, as recommended in his report, at a cost of about \$10.  
7th. Reporting completion of repairs to outer end of Pier, new 43, North river, under contract No. 292, and recommending that the time to finish said work be extended to 3d May, 1889.  
On motion, the time to complete said work was extended to 3d May, 1889, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.  
8th. Report on Secretary's Orders No. 8441, as to the condition of the approach to Pier foot of Eighty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President and Commissioner Matthews in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to pave said approach, as recommended in his report, was approved.  
9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9006, in relation to the application of the Metropolitan

Telephone and Telegraph Company for permission to remove cable-house and cables from present location, foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, to a point one hundred feet further west. The action of the President in issuing a permit was approved.

10th. Reports on Secretary's Order Nos. 9010, 9011 and 9012, in reference to the application of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for permission to re-erect and restore the grain elevator on the bulkhead between West Sixtieth and West Sixty-first streets, to rebuild stone foundations of Pier at the foot of West Sixty-third street, and to build a new timber pier upon the same, and to extend said pier, and also to rebuild the Pier at the foot of West Sixty-fourth street, North river. The action of the President and Commissioner Matthews in issuing permits to do all of said work, in accordance with the plans submitted, was approved.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 8935, that he had directed and superintended the repairs to pavement on bulkhead between Piers, old 5 and 6, North river.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 8936, that he had directed and superintended the repairing of the pavement on bulkhead between Piers, old 27 and 28, North river.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 8970, that he had repaired deck of Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 8971, that he had prepared the deck scows ("F and L") with stanchions, life-lines and seats and placed them on the southerly side of Pier "A," North river, on the morning of the Naval Parade, April 29, 1889, and removed them the same night to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Report on Secretary's Order No. 8979, that he had superintended and directed the driving, fastening and chocking of four white oak fender-piles at outer end of Pier between One Hundred and Seventeenth and One Hundred and Eighteenth streets, Harlem river.

Upon reading and filing the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 8961, to which reference is hereby made, the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Post, Matthews and Silliman:

On motion, the following was adopted:  
Resolved, That Mr. Simon Stevens as said representative, be informed that this Board sees no reason to change or modify its resolution of June 22, 1888, in relation to the repairs directed to be made to the bulkhead between East Seventeenth and East Eighteenth streets.

Also, on motion, the following preamble and resolution was adopted:  
Whereas, The owners and representatives of said property have neglected to make the repairs directed by said resolution of June 22d, 1888; be it

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department be directed, as soon as he can make the proper arrangements therefor, to proceed to make said above-mentioned repairs at the cost and expense of the owners of said bulkhead.

as requested by the Health Department.

Upon reading and filing the communications from the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to said dredging, to which reference is hereby made, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Board of Health has reported to this department in relation to the premises under Pier 1 (old), North river, and the platform adjoining on the north side; that the "bottom is covered with quantities of sewage and black decomposing mud in a very offensive condition, and requested this Department to cause said premises to be thoroughly cleaned of all decomposing sewage, filthy mud or material of whatever kind of an offensive and dangerous character now lying upon the bottom;" and

Whereas, By sections 711, 717, 721 and 882 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Department is given full power and authority in the premises; now, therefore, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes and laws in such cases made and provided, and the rules and regulations of this Department, be it

Resolved, That the owners, occupants and lessees, or licensees of Pier, old number 1, North river, and of the platform adjoining on the north side, be and are hereby ordered and directed to dredge, excavate and remove all dirt, mud, filth and sewage from under said pier and platform back to the line of the existing bulkhead, and from the slip adjoining the same, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; said dredging and removing to be completed within twenty days after the receipt of a copy of this resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Health has reported to this Department in relation to the premises on the south side of Pier 9, North river, that "in the angle formed by the bulkhead, the offensive odors is very strong from the decomposed sewage-saturated mud deposited thereat," and requested this Department to cause said premises "to be thoroughly cleaned of all decomposing sewage, filthy mud or material of whatever kind of an offensive and dangerous character now lying upon the bottom;" and

Whereas, By sections 711, 717, 721 and 882 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Department is given full power and authority in the premises; now, therefore, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes and laws in such cases made and provided, and the rules and regulations of this Department, be it

Resolved, That the owners, occupants and lessees or licensees of the bulkhead and of the platform in front of the same, between Piers, old Nos. 8 and 9, North river, be and are hereby ordered and directed to dredge, excavate and remove all dirt, filth and sewage from under said platform back to the line of the existing bulkhead, and from the slip in front of the same, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. Said dredging and removing to be completed within twenty days after receipt of a copy of this resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Health has reported to this Department in relation to the slip in front of the bulkhead between Piers 12 and 14, North river, that the "bottom out for about twenty feet is covered with a soft, sewage mud, very foul and offensive," and requested this Department to cause said premises "to be thoroughly cleaned of all decomposing sewage, filthy mud or material of whatever kind of an offensive and dangerous character now lying upon the bottom;" and,

Whereas, By sections 711, 717, 721 and 882 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, this Department is given full power and authority in the premises; now, therefore, by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes and laws, in such cases made and provided, and the rules and regulations of this Department, be it

Resolved, That the owners, occupants and lessees or licensees of the bulkheads and of the platforms in front of the same, between Piers, old Numbers 12 and 14, North river, be and are hereby ordered and directed to dredge, excavate and remove all dirt, filth and sewage from under said platforms back to the line of the existing bulkheads, and from the slips in front of the same, to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. Said dredging and removing to be completed within twenty days after the receipt of a copy of this resolution.

## NOTICE TO ARCHITECTS.

In the examination and judgment of plans the Board will be assisted by a Committee to be appointed by the Mayor, consisting of not more than three competent architects and a civil engineer.

All plans submitted for competition, for which premiums are awarded, shall become the property of the city, and all plans must be filed with the Comptroller on or before the date mentioned. Each plan submitted shall be marked with such assumed designation as the architect may select, provided there shall be filed with the Mayor a sealed envelope, giving the real name of the author of the plans so designated, which shall be opened by the Mayor in the presence of the Board, after the premiums shall have been awarded.

Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the preliminary security required, and in the proposals stated, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to approval by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

The amount of security required upon the execution of the contract will be in each case fifty per cent. of the estimated cost of the articles awarded to each contractor; the amount of preliminary security to be given until each award, and in which the sureties shall justify, shall be FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS.

Should the person to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, and that the adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered has been approved by the Comptroller, or if he accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be re-advertised and relet, as provided by law.

No estimates will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation, and no estimates will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person not having at the time of making his estimate full, suitable and sufficient facilities for performing the work specified in his estimate.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National or State banks of the City of New York, drawn

to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of fifty per centum of the amount of the preliminary security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the Secretary of the Board of the City Record, who has charge of the estimate-box; and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said Secretary and found to be correct. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, August 2, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 270. In every public hospital and dispensary in the City of New York there shall be provided and maintained a suitable room or rooms and place for the temporary isolation of persons infected with contagious disease, who shall immediately be separated from the other persons and other patients at such dispensary or hospital. It shall be the duty of the physician or physicians, of the officers, managers and of every one in charge of a hospital or dispensary, and of every one who has any duty or office in respect to patients in the course of treatment, or persons who apply for treatment or care at a dispensary or hospital, to see that a report is immediately made to the Health Department of the City of New York of every person infected with a contagious disease who comes to their knowledge, and that such person or persons so infected are properly isolated and kept separate from other persons and patients.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, No. 301 MOTT STREET,  
NEW YORK, JANUARY 31, 1888.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 301 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said buildings or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

## REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows:

"The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. \* \* \* \* \*

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bathtub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

## METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates. By order,

## PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 352 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1881, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.

## GRANTS OF LANDS UNDER WATER.

THE OWNERS OF LANDS IN THE CITY OF New York, which were formerly under water, and which were granted by the City of New York, are notified that nearly all of the grants of such lands contain covenants, on the part of the grantees, and their successors and assigns, to maintain and keep in repair the adjacent streets. The condition of many of these streets is such as to make it necessary that they should be repaired and repaved, and that the obligation resting upon the present owners of adjacent lots to do this work should now be enforced. Many of such owners have requested that such covenants be commuted, and wholly released, upon the payment by them of a certain sum per lot.

The matter will shortly be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and the adjustment of the basis of commutation, and application for releases should therefore be made at once.
