

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Third, and Fourth District Prisons, from July 1 to September 30, 1881, by prison labor, and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

First District Prison.—Repaired water-pipes with 81 feet galvanized iron pipe, new faucets, etc., etc.; painted roof male ten-day house, 66 feet long by 26 feet wide, also four skylights: painted a space at entrance to Warden's office, 50 feet long by 8 feet wide, also an iron gate; also roof of Magdalen, 76 feet long by 54 feet wide, and ten skylights; also roof of new prison, 76 feet long by 54 feet wide, and fourteen skylights; also roof of female prison, 86 feet long by 26 feet wide, and four skylights; also repaired and painted skylights on male prison; inclosed soil-pipes with brick in four cells; built a brick water-closet in yard of male prison; reset flags, etc., in yard male ten-day house, 34 feet long by 18 feet wide; built a brick pillar, 6 feet high, in hospital cell; also built three large windows in hospital cells and placed iron bars in the same; plastered ceiling of female ten-day house; repaired brick floor in kitchen and built two chimneys on boys' prison; placed a new roof on tank in new prison and covered it with 50 sheets of tm. roof on tank in new prison and covered it with 50 sheets of tm.

Third District Prison.—Built a casing around window in office, repaired pump, repaired furnace,

repaired gas-pipe.

Fourth District Prison.—Built a brick cesspool in hall, built a bunk, 21 feet long by 6 feet wide, for cells; built two doors and blinds to separate male and female prisoners.

SIR—Annexed I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending September 30, 1881, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 100 and repaired 25 iron bedsteads; made 23 pickaxes, 33 window bars, 2 carving knives, I steel window guard, 8 large and 4 small window guards, 6 window screens, 15 cot frames, 4 keys, 47 stonecutters' chisels, 100 points, 58 drills, 246 plugs and feathers, 18 pitching tools, 24 stone-breakers' hammers, I ten-pound scalping hammer, 72 bucket handles, 148 standards, 120 braces, 200 straps, 200 ears, 836 bolts and nuts, 53 barrow wheels, and 30 hods ironed; repaired 20 cell locks, 55 cot frames; 30 tires reset; also repairs to wagons, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—Made 125 quart cups, 6 wash basins, I,119 mess pans, 4 dippers, 3 meat pans, 2 soup boilers, 3 coffee kettles, 2 dust pans, 2 bake pans, 13 galvanized iron registers, 300 feet galvanized leader, 7 six-inch elbows; 3 ice boxes lined; also all necessary repairs to tinware.

Carpenters—Made 1,275 coffins, 37 doors, 8 ice boxes, 46 wheelbarrows, 6 handbarrows, 13 transom bars, I,105 feet base, 99 patient seats, 13 fan-lights, 17 tubs, 12 pails, 34 hods, 742 clothes pins, 283 tallies, 400 bed blocks; repaired 64 buckets, 43 barrels recoopered, 10 wagons, 24 carts, 24 wheelbarrows, 15 stools, 7 chairs, etc., etc.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 175 pairs pants, 325 pairs mits, 6 citizens' suits, 1 dozen straight jackets, 111 cot bottoms; repaired 404 woolen jackets, 482 pairs pants, 165 vests, 211 caps, 246 cot bottoms.

Shoemakers-Made 898 pairs men's and 965 pairs women's shoes; repaired 1,495 pairs men's

Sewing-room—The female prisoners have made 550 dresses, 200 aprons, 150 petticoats, 100 hoods, 356 men's pants, 543 men's shirts, 50 spreads, 50 roller towels, 100 pillow cases; 1,019 pairs women's shoes bound; repaired 2,257 men's shirts, 2,714 pairs summer pants, 86 women's dresses, 125 petticoats, 315 chemises, 133 pairs stockings, 328 pillow ticks, 15 sheets, 10 bed ticks.

At the stone shed the prisoners are daily employed cutting building stone, window, door, and sill jambs, lintels, quoin stone, etc., etc.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 641, employed as

### LABOR REPORT-THIRD QUARTER.

Carpenters.—Pavilion I—Repaired two settees, dining-room benches, step-ladder, water-closets, flooring, roof, and doors; refitted two windows, and put in sash cord and one spindle screw. Pavilion II—Made clothes racks for attendants' rooms, and coal box; put in sash cord in dining-room windows, and rehung door; repaired water-closets, and overhauled and repaired roof. Pavilion III—Made two ladders and one step-ladder, one window brush pole, bracket for fire extinguisher, and rollers for towels; fitted keys, repaired locks, and overhauled and refitted doors; made handles for pails, and hung brackets for lamps, fire hooks and staples with blocks put on doors, and 14 feet zinc put around heaters.

Pavilion D—Made towel rollers, and sewer-box for water-closet; repaired stoops, side door, and scraper, water-closets, window-frames, closet-doors, and ventilators; repaired flooring and rehung doors.

Pavilion E—Made towel rollers, and sewer-box for water-closet; repaired water-closets, stoop,

Pavilion E—Made towel rollers, and sewer-box for water-closet; repaired water-closets, stoop, benches, flooring, and rocking chairs.

Wash-house—Repaired doors, windows, and flooring, and wash-house taps; repaired and glued ironing tables, and floor of women's dormitory.

Engine-house—Put in new floor, 18 x 12 feet; built reel house for fire hose, 10 feet high, 8 feet wide, and 7 feet deep, with saddle roof; cover put on valve for salt-water pipe and put in brackets.

General Work—Two clothes closets made and put up in men's dormitory; windows repaired and fasteners put on; refitted doors and windows of Matrons' rooms; repaired awning; put bars on two windows of store-room; letter-box repaired and put up in office; cover made for cauldron in kitchen; flooring taken up and repaired in kitchen; cleaned chimney and put up new piece of pipe; sixty panes glass put in: forty keys fitted and twenty locks repaired.

Assistant Physician's Room—Made and put up mosquito frames for windows, and repaired

Painters—Painted Matron's rooms, men's dormitory, water-closets in the several pavilions, window guards, and fifty bedsteads in Pavilion III, heater and pipe in Pavilion D, fifteen cot frames, bars of store-room windows, access hall and doors in Pavilion II, coal boxes Pavilion E, stoops of Pavilions D and E, coal boxes Pavilions II, III, meat barrels, handcart, house house, and painted and grained benches in Pavilion III, and Matron's store-room.

Engineer—Repaired hot-water tanks in Pavilion II, and put on tell-tales on cold-water tank; took off ball-cocks, and put on tell-tales on tanks in Pavilion III; took sixty-gallon cauldron out of kitchen and put in ninety-gallon cauldron; repaired stop valves; repaired main pump and put in new valve and rod; repaired pump in Pavilion E, and stop-cocks on bath-tubs; made alterations in pipes for steam pump; repaired hot and cold water tanks in Pavilion III; put in two stop-cocks in Pavilion D; repaired water-closet stoppers in Pavilions D and E; laid 400 feet 3-inch galvanized pipe for salt-water connection with steam pump, and repaired tinware in kitchen; blowed off steam boiler twice and cleaned boiler and flues; tarnished steam pump, boiler pipes, and smoke stack, and examined water valves. examined water valves.

Male Help—Have removed stoves from New Pavilion, and stored them under Pavilion II; took down stove-pipe and stored it; cleaned and whitewashed stoves; cleaned out and repaired sewer pipes in Pavilions I, D and E; blackened stove-pipes and repaired platforms of stoves; plastered the Matron's rooms, store-room, and men's dormitory; dug and filled in trench for laying salt-water pipe; put up tents for sick; laid 40 feet 6-inch pipe in Pavilions E and II; laid 12 feet 4-inch pipe for kitchen; laid brick floor in engine-house and kitchen; whitewashed Pavilion E and lower part of Pavilion II; repaired plastering in Pavilion III; repaired chimneys and ventilators in Pavilions D and E, and Assistant Physician's room; tarred water barrels, D and E; patched ceiling in Pavilion II; repaired stove-pipe in wash-house; whitewashed vegetable room; kept grounds, roads, and walks in good order, and performed much other necessary work, such as removing stones and coal from dock, piling coal, taking clothes to and from laundry to the different Pavilions, pumping water, etc.

Sewing and Mending—Patients have made 150 sheets, 295 chemises, 259 pillow cases, 110 petticoats, 230 dresses, 44 spreads, 214 pairs stockings, 65 pairs socks, 143 aprons. Mended 1,356 sheets, 186 shirts, 2,285 chemises, 1,645 pillow cases, 40 nightgowns, 1,149 petticoats, 2,307 dresses, 682 pairs drawers, 422 spreads, 2,049 bed ticks, 1,210 pairs stockings, 270 pairs socks, 60 aprons, 893 pillow ticks, 130 hats, 86 pairs pants, 14 pieces table linen, and 25 towels.

SIR—The following detailed statement of the amount and description of mechanical and miscellaneous labor performed by inmates of Branch Workhouse for the various institutions situated on this island, during the quarter ending September 30, 1881, is respectfully submitted for the inspection of your Honorable Board.

### FOR BRANCH WORKHOUSE.

Carpenters—Repaired one building 105 feet by 21 feet, the repairs consisting of new sidings, window frames and sash, strengthening sill plates, and studding, and constructing I new stoop for same; made 6 benches, each 10 feet long; I baker's peel, I cistern platform; repaired 2 stoops, I guard boat, 2 wheelbarrows, 2 dirt carts, I ox cart, I rocking chair, and handles in 4 hammers;

Blacksmiths—Made 59 wedges, 68 bolts, 117 nuts, 2 pairs pipe tongs, 21 pipe hooks, 4 staples, 2 box handles, 1 soldering iron, 22 rivets, 1 wrench, 50 feathers, 65 points, 1 grindstone handle, 1 door button, 1 pair compasses, 1 pair hinges, 1 boat hook, 6 chimney anchors; repaired 1 cart, 1 pair ice tongs, 1 pump, 1 cot frame, 6 tubs, 1 pail, 1 hay cutter, 5 wheelbarrows, 2 pairs pipe tongs, 1 set boat irons, 3 scythes, 1 vise, 1 handcart, 1 hoe; dressed and sharpened 544 drills, points, picks, and crowbars; put 7 sets of shores on horses.

Tinsmiths—Laid 36 square feet tin roofing; repaired 71 pieces tinware, 5 roofs, 4 pumps, 2 ranges, 1 coffee mill, 8 lamps.

Painters—Painted 2 buildings, outside; 7 cells, 15 window sashes, 24 window frames, 3 ventilators, 2 chairs, 1 box, 6,100 square feet of tin roofing, 7 benches, 3 watering pots, 1 guard boat, 44 cot frames; glazed 29 lights, glass; whitewashed interior of 2 buildings; yellowwashed 1 build-

Bricklayers—Built I brick chimney; repaired I stoop; constructed I cistern 8 feet diameter 9

Miscellaneous Work—490 cubic feet ground filled in and sodded, 900 square yards ground graded, 7,760 square feet roadway repaired, 4,296 square feet tarred walk made.

Tailors-Repaired 1,263 pairs men's pants, 667 men's jackets.

Shoemakers—Made 59 pairs men's shoes; repaired 590 pairs men's and 183 pairs women's shoes.

In Sewing Room—Made 12 pillow cases; repaired 23 pillow cases, 43 sheets, 98 dresses, 80 chemises, 89 pairs stockings, 1,372 shirts, 107 undershirts, 132 pairs socks.

In Laundry—15,323 pieces clothing and bedding washed.

Bakers-Made 97,164 pounds bread.

FOR CITY CEMETERY.

All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lie of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated tor the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing aws.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head "of department may abolish and consolidate offices and "bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same "department."

Second—The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "the Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
