BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

The Board of City Record met in the Mayor's Office, Friday, April 2, 1875.

Present—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A communication was received from the Department of Public Parks, asking for authority to print the minutes of the Board of said Department.

Whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, by concurrent vote under the power conferred upon this Board, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks have authority to print the minutes of the Board of said Department for the year 1875, on such terms and conditions as shall reasonably insure the proper performance of the work at the lowest cost, to be ascertained by advertisement for bids or otherwise, as said Commissioners may find practicable, to be paid for out of the appropriation for "Printing and Stationery."

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with such resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, and Commissioner of Public Works.

A communication was received from the Comptroller relative to printing and stationery, which was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, for the week ending March 27, 1875.

All work of construction was suspended on account of the funds for said work being exhausted.

The official titles of the following were changed:

John Bogart, Engineer, to "Superintending Engineer."
Howard A. Martin, Clerk, to "Chief Clerk."

Both in the office of Design and Superintendence.

The Civil and Topographical Engineer was directed to prepare and submit to the Board plans for an approach to the suspension bridge over the Harlem river, at One Hundred and Eighty-first street, directly from Tenth avenue, on the west side of said river, and from streets on the same grade as said avenue, on the east side of said river.

Five disabled and broken-down horses were ordered to be sold by auction.

In relation to the suspension of all construction work, the Board directed that the following statement be published:

The dismissal or suspension by this Department of 127 men on the 24th of March, who were employed in construction, in consequence of the exhaustion of the moneys appropriated for construction purposes, has been the occasion of a charge of a misapplication of the appropriation of the Department to other purposes than those for which they were made.

There is and has been no foundation for such a statement. All the moneys of the Department have been held and strictly used for the purposes to which they belonged, and none other.

The reason why the dismissal was sudden was that the moneys were not supposed to be exhausted. This arose from a clerical error. The error was not in the books of the Department, but in a statement made from the record book, which is not one of the regular books of account, but a special book derived from them kept by the book-keeper and assumed to contain a correct statement of the balances remaining on hand of the several appropriations.

In 1872, and for years previously, the moneys appropriated to the Department by the Legislature were paid in round sums to it by the Comptroller, deposited in its own banks, and this Department made its own disbursements. Going back to 1872, a period anterior to this clerical error, the accounts stood as follows:

STATEMENT OF THE ACCOUNTS.

By chapter 739, Laws of 1872, the Legislature appropriated to this Department for construction..... \$750,000

On April 30, 1873, the system was changed under charter of 1873. The Comptroller retained the moneys and paid the bills of this Department. The following appropriations were made:

But this is not an actual excess, for there is still a small surplus of appropriation, because some of the contracts are charged at amounts which are greater than the sums actually due on them. This account is taken from the books of this Department, and on comparison with the books in the Department of Finance, taking into account the bills audited here, and held in suspense in that Department, will agree therewith; so that, in fact, that there is no discrepancy or irregularity whatever.

HOW THE ERROR OCCURRED.

This error occurred in the manner of making up the statements from the record book.

Section 29 of the Charter of 1873 empowered the Comptroller to prescribe the forms of keeping books, etc. Under his direction the record book was opened for the purpose of showing independently the expenditures and the liabilities. It was no part of the system of account books. The book-keeper, in January, 1874, used the record book to show the sums charged against the \$1,000,000 appropriation of 1873 only, and not against that \$1,000,000 and the \$70,000 of appropriation standing over from 1872 taken together.

On the 1st of June, 1874, another clerk took charge of the books. He made his statements from the record book, showing the money charged against the appropriation of 1873, \$1,000,000, including the balance from 1872, \$70,000. Total, \$1,070,000.

In doing this he made an error; he added \$70,000 to the balance stated in the record book, that is, on the 24th of November, 1874. The balance available was \$90,498.76, which was correct; he added \$70,000 to it, carrying forward \$160,498.76. And this sum of \$160,498.76, including the sum of \$70,000, was carried down from week to week, on these statements alone, to the 24th of March, 1875.
