Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending December 23, 1876.

Resolved, That John C. Hickie be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Henry Goldschmidt, whose term of office has expired.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 5 of Article II., and section 1 of Article V. of "An ordinance to amend chapter XL. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, relative to Hackney Coaches and Cabs," adopted March 16, 1876.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article II. of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

Section 5. Any driver who may be licensed under section 1 of this article may drive and use any coach or cab belonging to his employer; and no owner of any hackney coach or cab shall allow any person to drive such coach or cab who is not licensed as aforesaid, under penalty of five dollars.

Sec. 2. Section 1 of Article V. of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended by inserting in the 10th and 11th subdivisions thereof, before the word "south" the word "north," so that the subdivisions, when so amended, shall read as follows:

"Stand No. 10—North, south, and west side of Union square."

"Stand No. 11—North, south, and west side of Madison square."

Also, by adding to said section 1, subdivisions 20 and 21, as follows:

"Stand No. 20—Broadway, opposite St. Paul's Church, from 5 P. M. until sunrise."

"Stand No. 21—On all street corners, from 10 P. M. until sunrise."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the sidewalk in Fifty-eighth street, from the southeast corner of Ninth avenue to house No. 344, be paved with stone flagging pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York deeply deplore the terrible calamity that has recently visited our sister city, in the almost unprecedented loss of life in the burning of the Brooklyn Theatre, on the night of the 5th instant, and particularly sympathize with the unfortunate families who, on the threshold of what probably will be an inclement winter, have been deprived of those upon whom they had in a great measure depended for their support; therefore

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and is hereby requested to call upon our citizens to contribute, by all means in their power, toward alleviating the distress which will surely grow out of this appalling visitation.

Whereas, It is apparent that the several gas-light companies in this city have entered into a combination or conspiracy, by which the expense of lighting the city lamps will be largely increased over former years, and this, too, in view of the present depression in all descriptions of business, a general shrinkage in all kinds of values, and a great reduction in the price of coal and all other commodities that enter into the production of illuminating gas; and

Whereas, It is adverse to the public interests to yield to the exactions of these gas companies, who are or should be under the control, absolutely, of the local authorities, in so far, and at least, as the cost of the gas used in lighting the streets, if not in respect to the gas consumed by private individuals; and, as it is beyond question that the power of the city authorities should be exercised to control these monopolies, or to provide, in the same manner, for furnishing light to our citizens as is now used for supplying water; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Mayor, Comptroller, and Commissioner of Public Works, who are now authorized to make arrangements with the gas companies of the city for lighting our streets, be and they are hereby respectfully requested to take into consideration the propriety of inaugurating a system for the production and supply of illuminating gas for public and private purposes, similar to that now in use for furnishing our citizens with water, and that, in order to provide, temporarily, for lighting the streets, the city officers above named be and they are hereby requested to substitute oil, or other illuminating material on the city lamp-posts now erected on the Fifth avenue, from Washington square to Fifty-ninth street, as an experiment, and in order to test the practicability of lighting the streets of this city by other means than by the use of illuminating gas, the results of the proposed experiment, and the propriety of the manufacture of gas by the city, to be reported to this Board, when deemed of public interest to do so.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, December 22, 1876, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Whereas, The recent terrible calamity which took place in Brooklyn by reason of the burning of the Brooklyn Theatre, in which over three hundred people lost their lives, makes it incumbent upon the authorities of this city to be guarded against a similar fate happening to the people of this city; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Buildings be and he is hereby directed to furnish this Board, at its next regular meeting, with a list of the theatres and other places of amusement in this city which, in his opinion, are not constructed in such a manner as to afford immediate egress from the same in case of fire.
