

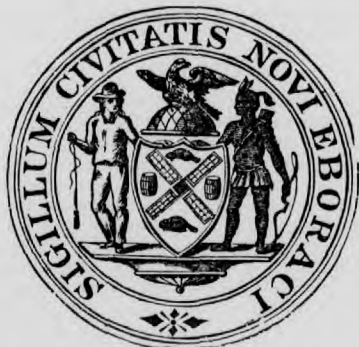

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor during the quarter ending June 30, 1898, to wit:

Carpenters' work—At Third District Prison: Putting up hanging table to wall, Male Prison; material used, 2 pieces 1 inch by 16 inches clear pine, 46 feet, and 3 pieces 3/4-inch by 5 inches clear pine, 20 feet, 6-12 dozen pairs of butts, 3-inch, 2 gross screws (1 gross 1-inch and 1 gross 1 1/4-inch), 3 pounds cut nails, 6, 8 and 10 penny. At Seventh District Prison: Erecting scaffold for painting walls, using 6 pieces 2 by 9 by 12 feet scaffold planks; putting in 1/2-dozen panes glass, 18 inches by 22 1/2 inches, in Male Prison and 1/2-dozen panes of glass, 14 by 18 inches, in Female Prison, utensils, 1 glass cutter, 3 pounds putty.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing—At Second District Prison: Repair on elevator belt, 1 pound belt cement, 1 dozen rivets. At Fifth District Prison: Repair of leak on steam pipe in kitchen and laundry, 1 right and left nipple, 3 hours' work Plumber and Helper. At Fourth District Prison, by unpaid labor: Repair of water-closets; material used, 5 Mott water-closet valves, 3 dozen large size rubber washers, 3 dozen small size rubber washers; utensils, 1 monkey wrench, 1 Stillson wrench, 1 pair of gas pliers, 10-inch; repair of two locks on cells on second tier, also putting on a new faucet in cell on second tier. At Fifth District Prison: Putting in a new grate and a set of firebricks on a Mott's "Defiance" No. 9, 1 new padlock and key for Storeroom, refitting 2 desk keys; putting on new lock on Warden's desk. At Sixth District Prison: Making to order a new key for Prison gate. At Fifth District Prison, unpaid labor: Repairing 3 faucets in laundry, also repairing tank on lavatory, Male Prison (10-day house), cleaning out sewer in yard and cesspool in kitchen, repairing Croton water pipe in back of laundry tubs. At Third District Prison: Cleaning out kitchen range and repairing same, connecting pipes with chimney; repair of roof in Matron's house in rear of Prison, all work done by paid labor. At Seventh District Prison: Putting in a new set of grate bars, 1 centre square with rings and covers on a Boynton-Richardson "Perfect" Range, No. 14. At Second District Prison, engine room: Testing 2 boilers registered as No. 2341 by Police Department, tightening valves, 2 1/2 pounds 3/8-inch rubber packing, 1 12-inch round file; putting in a new grate and 1 set of rings on a Duparquet range, 6 feet. At Seventh District Prison: Putting in a new electric bell, utensils, 1 electric bell and fixtures complete.

Miscellaneous Work—At Fifth District Prison: Repair on harness for horses driving the Prison van. Material used, 2 sheepskins, 2 turnbacks, 2 new breeching straps, new terret to hames. Work done by paid labor. The Prisons were entirely cleaned out of roaches, waterbugs, ants, etc., by the services rendered of "Brown's Insecticide."

Painters' Work—At Second District Prison: Painting of interior of Prison, Male and Female Department, and iron gates; material used, 100 pounds color, 20 gallons of oils, 5 pounds patent driers, 10 gallons asphaltum. Third District Prison: Painting gates on Male and Female Prison; material used, 15 gallons oil, 1/2 gallon liquid drier, 50 pounds color. At Fourth District Prison: Painting interior of Prisons, also window-screens and storeroom in yard, 65 pounds color, 25 gallons oils. At Fifth District Prison: Painting interior of Prison, Male Department; painting gates of Male and Female Prison, 10 gallons asphaltum, 50 pounds color and 10 gallons of oils, 5 gallons liquid driers and 3 gallons varnish. At Seventh District Prison: Painting interior of Prison, Male and Female Department; painting of gates to cells in Male and Female Departments; material used, 10 gallons asphaltum, 30 pounds color, 10 gallons of oil. The usual amount of whitewashing, calcimining and cleaning up in general done by Prison labor in all the Prisons.

Laundrying and cooking for the inmates of the Institutions, work done by Prison labor, in all Prisons.
