To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 29, 1913, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested amendment of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 15, 1912, authorizing an issue of corporate stock for the erection of an addition to the Storehouse at Kings County Hospital. In connection therewith we report as follows:

On July 15, 1912, corporate stock to the amount of \$14,500 was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the erection of an addition to the Storehouse at Kings County Hospital. The request is that the resolution be amended to provide not only for the cost of construction, but also for the purchase of equipment for the addition, and for additional equipment for the present Storehouse.

A contract for construction, calling for an expenditure of \$5,770, has been awarded, leaving a balance of \$8,730. The estimated cost of equipment is \$7,000, as follows:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—A resolution authorizing an issue of corporate stock in the amount of \$100,000, adopted by your Board on April 10, 1913, and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on April 22, 1913, for the purpose of providing means for completing the repaving of West drive in Central Park, was so restricted in language that it did not include the necessary connection with the Plaza entrance at 5th avenue and West 59th street.

The most important part of the work of completing the work already done in the West drive is the connection between the Webster Monument and the Plaza. This is the section by which the heavy automobile traffic of 5th avenue reaches the completed portion of the West drive. Technically, the short link is not a part of West drive proper, but belongs partly to the Middle drive and partly to the East drive.

To make the resolution technically correct, it should read "to provide means for the repaving of West drive and those portions of the Middle drive and East drive lying between Webster Monument and 59th street and 5th avenue in Central Park."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution which provides the necessary correction. Respectfully,

Gentlemen—On April 1, 1913, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting special revenue bonds to the amount of \$1,200 for the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The Commissioner requested the appropriation for the purpose of properly cataloguing and indexing certain maps, original drawings and tracings, now in the possession of his department.

It appears that the majority of the maps, drawings and tracings are fairly well indexed; the main objection to the present system is that it takes a little time to find the map, drawing or tracing needed.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Queens:

No. 3573.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, April 28, 1913.

To the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Gentlemen—Request is hereby respectfully made for an issue of special revenue bonds amounting to \$1,300 to provide for the repair of a floating bath and for \$630, the estimated cost of maintenance during 1913.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan has made available for the use of this department, a floating bath, which he no longer requires in his department. A mooring on City property has been secured at Whitestone by consent of the Department of Docks and Ferries.

The bath is at present out of use and moored at 25th street basin in the Borough of Brooklyn. In order to make the bath available for use, it will be necessary to do some repair work; an estimate has been prepared and is as follows:

Taking out, repairing, caulk and re-blocking in place eight (8) pontoons at \$38 each, \$304; taking down and replacing five alley ends at \$6 each, \$30; repairing and splicing planking, \$25; towing bath from Brooklyn to berth, \$50; two diaphragm suction pumps 12 feet, \$60; 100 fathoms of hawser, \$34; rope for guy lines, etc., \$25; street water connections, \$150; lighting connections, \$100; stair and bridgework, \$100; painting interior and exterior, \$300; contingencies, \$122. Total, \$1,300.

It is my intention to keep the bath open for use from 5 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily and on Sundays from 5 a. m. to noon for a period of 90 days from June 15 to September 15, and designating the use on alternate days for men and women, thereby requiring a force of 2 Female Attendants, 2 Male Attendants and 1 Watchman. The rates proposed for Female Attendants is \$2; Male Attendants, \$2.50, and the Watchman \$2.50 per diem. The cost for wages would, therefore, be \$630 on the basis of 90 days operation. The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13-21 Park Row, New York, May 2, 1913.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHELL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The Water Register reports that in spite of his most earnest efforts, the present force are unable to keep up at all times with the work. This condition is in part due to the new law (chapter 108 of the Laws of 1912), which necessitates additional work in connection with the making out of meter bills. In order to get out bills promptly, it has been necessary to retain a number of the force to work evenings, and the expense therefor for the first three months of this year amounted to \$2,600.

It would be more economical if the force were increased, and I respectfully ask that your honorable board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize special revenue bonds in the amount of \$3,675, which will be sufficient to employ three Clerks at a salary of \$1,200 each per annum, and three Bookkeepers at a salary of \$1,200 each per annum, from June 1 to the end of the year. The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Commissioner's Office, 13-21 Park Row, New York, May 5, 1913.
Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York.

Dear Sir—In submitting the department's estimate for funds required for the year 1913, no provision was made for restoring pavement of roads or lawns of Park Department property. It was presumed that on account of the ruling of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the previous year, transferring to the control and jurisdiction of the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx the money appropriated to this department to meet the expense of restoring pavements disturbed by our employees in repairing mains and hydrants, due allowance would be made to the President of the Borough of The Bronx for restoring the pavement of roads or lawns of Park Department property in that borough.

I understand that the President of the Borough of Manhattan attends to the replacement of pavement, etc., of Park Department property disturbed by our repair companies in this borough.

In appropriating the money for this purpose to the Borough of The Bronx, no account was taken of the possible opening of Park Department property by the repair companies, so that the Borough President has no funds against which the expense could be properly chargeable. The Commissioner of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, has notified me that he will hereafter issue no permits to this department for the opening of any of the roadways or lawns under his control for the purpose of laying or repairing water mains unless he is guaranteed in some way that they will be restored to their original condition.

As I have stated, this department does not receive money for the above mentioned purpose, and as it will be necessary to enter upon Park Department property for the maintenance of the distribution system, I am making this application in behalf of the Commissioner of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$1,000, this being the estimated cost of replacement of pavements and restoration of walks and lawns which this department has already disturbed and other work to be done during the year. REPORTS:

These departmental requests for special revenue bond appropriations amount to the large total of \$724,074.50, and comprise everything in this nature now in the Finance Committee. The Committee is impelled to this drastic and sweeping action by the coincidence of a dangerous situation in the Board's special revenue bond account and the plentiful supply of moneys available for transfer from the 1913 Budget. If there were no other resource, these applications could not all in justice be turned away, but they have their remedy in the co-ordinate Board of the City government, unfettered by law or ordinance. The Committee wishes it understood that these applications are not in any sense rejected nor disposed of upon their individual merits, but are simply forwarded to the Board that has the money from the Board that has not the money. It is suggested to the Departments concerned that they apply immediately to the Board of Estimate for relief for their wants by transfer of available 1913 budgetary moneys.

The strained situation is, briefly, that while subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter places a limitation of \$2,000,000 within any one year upon the issuance of these bonds, we find ourselves confronted by an issuance for the first four months of this year of \$900,239.78 worth of revenue bonds already gone. In addition, \$867,834.19 worth of bonds have been duly authorized by both Boards, and the greater part of these authorizations will be realized into bonds issued before the end of the year. That leaves a possible emergency fund for all the rest of the year of only \$200,000, and against this we have the figure of \$645,374.43 of these bonds already recommended by the Board of Aldermen but not yet ratified by the Board of Estimate. A great portion of this latter figure must be ratified by the Board of Estimate because the expenditures are necessary; therefore, it would seem that the chances are fairly good that the whole of the \$2,000,000 limitation will be needed to take care of authorizations already made. With the cupboard prospectively bare, it seems to the Committee the part of not only prudence but of rigorous necessity that no further drains upon this fund be entertained as long as there are moneys which may be obtained elsewhere. That the money may be obtained from the Board of Estimate by transfer is evident from the fact that that Board, by resolution of May 1, transferred \$4,023,298.06 of old unencumbered balances from various previous special revenue bond issues and from the 1912 Budget. Of this, the surprising amount of \$3,227,425.47 was picked up from the 1912 Budget alone. This results, of course, from the excellent practice now in use of scheduling the Budget, so that salary accruals and other moneys not needed may not be diverted to other and unintended purposes during the year. All the Board of Estimate has to do to satisfy these applications, so far as they may be justified on their merits, is to begin picking up the 1913 budgetary surpluses in the middle of 1913, instead of waiting to gather them all in a lump and place them in the general fund for the reduction of taxation for 1914. This will result, furthermore, in 1913 departmental expenses being paid for out of the 1913 tax levy instead of being shifted to the tax burden of the succeeding year. It seems manifest that the best financing so far as possible is to pay 1913 bills with 1913 money, and your Committee is convinced that this is quite possible to do.

The present condition of the Board of Aldermen's special revenue bond account arises from two causes. The first is the annual failure of the Board of Estimate to include in the Budget items of great size that belong there and nowhere else. A sample of such work is the failure to include in either the 1912 or the 1913 Budget a single dollar of appropriation for hose for the Fire Department, with the result that the special revenue bond account for the two years has been burdened in advance to the extent of almost \$200,000, which amount could easily have been foreseen, computed and included in the Budget, where it belongs. This Board's special revenue bond account is not designed by the Charter as a postscript to the Budget. It is meant for emergency, unforeseen and extraordinary expenses arising since the adoption of the Budget, and should be used accordingly. Your Committee deplores the Board of Estimate's practice of postponing the evil day by rejecting every year a great flood of matters to be taken care of by special revenue bonds, which should be faced honestly and included in the Budget, whatever the effect upon the tax rate.

As an instance of your Committee's effort toward economy, even in the face of these unwarranted burdens, it may be noted that the applications to this present Board of Aldermen for the sixteen months ending May 1, 1913, have totaled \$7,348,188.80, out of which the Committee, after careful study, has rejected a total of \$2,962,576.07; in other words, despite the pressing character of most of the applications, the Committee has rejected about three out of the seven millions asked for, a running proportion of about 40 per cent.

The second cause of the forcing of this Board's revenue bond account into this corner is the great mass of ancient authorizations which have been made use of by the Departments only within the last year. It is to be remembered that the Charter limitation is upon the issuance, so that when, as in the case of last year, only approximately \$1,700,000 of the bonds were used, the City saved permanently the other \$300,000, because the issuance account begins anew at the beginning of every year. This \$300,000 saved by the Board last year can never be spent; the books are closed and the money is saved. The authorizations, however, are subject to no such limitation of time and amount. A revenue bond issue may be authorized in 1906 and yet the money may not be spent by the Department until 1912. Thus the possible extravagance of previous administrations may be visited upon the third and fourth generations of Boards of Aldermen, and we have ever hanging over us this sword of Damocles of former authorizations, which, for unaccountable reasons, the Departments allow to lie idle for five or six years and then suddenly burst into expenditures, and add that ancient burden to a modern and current situation. When this present administration began, there were approximately \$2,400,000 of such old authorizations on the books, and your Committee has put in a great deal of time and hard work in co-operation with the Comptroller in securing the cancellation by the Departments of such of these authorizations as might not now or in the future be needed. The result is that we began the year 1913 with only approximately \$1,200,000 of these old matters, instead of the \$2,400,000 of the year before; that is to say, we cut it in half. Most of the overhanging balances that we began this year with were created in 1912, and the Committee's practice of fastening a date upon the appropriation before which the money must be spent, has resulted in the authorizations turning quickly into bonds issued. That is to say, the accounts nowadays are active, not dormant. This is as it should be in the interest of honest City finance, but that is a contributory easement from former days to which our present day management of the account is unavoidably subjected.

REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

The Special Committee appointed to investigate the subject of push-carts and markets, makes the following report and recommendations, and submits the following ordinances for adoption:

This Special Committee was appointed by the Rules Committee, pursuant to a resolution introduced in the Board of Aldermen, on the 9th day of July, 1912.

Pursuant to the terms of said resolution this Committee was appointed to investigate the subject of push-carts and public markets, but in making this their report, they are dealing only with the subject of push-carts, for the reason that on the appointment of the committee and after conferences among its members, the Committee decided that immediate steps should be taken to investigate and report with their recommendations, first on the subject of push-carts, for the reason that it seemed in the judgment of this Committee that the push-cart problem was the one that required immediate attention and on account of the conditions under which push-carts were operated, some immediate relief should be afforded.

Your Committee believes that a comprehensive system of public markets should be established as soon as possible, throughout the greater City, in sections most convenient to the public and adjacent to a railway or water route, so that supplies could be delivered directly to these markets by the farmers and truck gardeners in the immediate vicinity of New York. Your Committee will make a further report in regard to markets, within a short time.

In approaching the solution of the so-called push-cart problem, three facts must be borne in mind:

First—That the push-cart is an economic necessity and tends greatly to reduce the high cost of living for the people living in the sections of the greater City, where the push-cart has become an established factor in trade.

Second—That the push-cart business is a legitimate one, and the people engaged in this business are self-respecting merchants carrying on a legitimate business, and should be treated as such, and should be accorded proper facilities under which to carry on their business.

Third—That the push-cart is as much a necessity to certain sections of New York City as are large department stores and shops in other sections. That the quality of food and merchandise sold from these push-carts is in the main of as good a quality as can be bought anywhere else in the City, and much cheaper.

This Committee has made their investigation without the aid of any appropriation, and have given their time and consideration to the solution of this very important problem. As near as your Committee can judge, there are between five and six thousand push-carts in the greater City, about three thousand of these are on the lower East Side, probably fifteen hundred on the upper East Side, and the rest scattered. About 50 per cent. of these, as near as your Committee can judge, have licenses.

Subsequent to the appointment of this Committee by the Rules Committee the Committee made a thorough investigation of the Greater City in regard to pushcarts, and they found that the principal pushcart sections in the City were at follows:

The section from 106th to 116th sts., lying between 5th ave. and East River, known as "Little Italy."

The section along 1st ave., from 6th to 14th st.

The section on the lower east side, lying between the Bowery and the East River, North and South sts.

In Brooklyn the pushcart sections are known as the Siegel, Moore st. and Graham ave. Districts and the Brownsville District.

The pushcart, at the present time, does not seem to be a problem in The Bronx, Richmond or Queens.

In this investigation that the Committee made their purpose was to afford some immediate relief to these sections where the Committee found the pushcart problem, and the Committee felt that if they waited until permanent pushcart markets could be established, owing to the length of time it would take to acquire property and to erect buildings, that the term of the present Board of Aldermen would have had long since expired before these markets would be established. Therefore, in this investigation, it was the purpose of the Committee to find, if possible, open spaces in the City where it would be practicable to segregate the pushcarts, thus relieving the sanitary and congested conditions of the City streets in these sections, and at the same time placing the pushcart peddler in a market where he would have a permanent stand and could work up an established trade and not be required, as now, under the present ordinances, to move every twenty minutes. With that end in view, the first spaces which your Committee discovered as suitable space for the establishment of pushcart markets were the spaces under the Williamsburg and Manhattan bridges, the old Essex Market Court House, between Ludlow and Essex sts.; the blind alley, between the court house and the abandoned school, and the abandoned school and the available portion of the old Union Market.

From its investigation your Committee believes that the entire pushcart problem of the lower east side could be solved by the placing of these pushcarts in the spaces under the bridges, the Essex Market House, this blind alley and the abandoned school and the old Union Market. The president of the Borough of Manhattan has offered the use of the Essex Market Court House for a pushcart market. Your Committee has endeavored to obtain the use of the school house from the Board of Education for this purpose, but up to the present time has been unsuccessful.

In utilizing the spaces under the Manhattan and Williamsburgh Bridges, in order to make the market a success, the streets adjacent would have to be closed to pushcart peddlers, otherwise the market would be a failure.

At the present time there are a good many pushcart peddlers under the Williamsburgh Bridge who pay a dollar a week to the City for the privilege of standing under this bridge. But many complaints, and justly so, are received by the Comptroller's office, for the reason that at the present time a peddler is allowed to stand in all the streets adjacent, many times without even obtaining a license and without paying any revenue to the City, and sell his wares, thus taking away the business of the peddler who is under the bridge.

At the present time there are probably about 200 peddlers under the Williamsburgh Bridge. From this small amount the City derives a revenue of about \$12,000 a year, and the total expenses are about \$3,000, making a clear profit to the City of about \$9,000 from City property which, unless rented for this purpose, would otherwise be useless as a revenue producer. If all the pushcart peddlers on the lower east side were placed under these bridges and in the Essex Market Court House there would be an additional revenue to the City of about fifteen thousand dollars at very little additional expense. The Essex Market Court House and the old Union Market, with very little expenditure, could be placed in immediate condition for occupancy by the peddlers. The bridge spaces are immediately available and would require no outlay of expense whatever. As to feasible spaces for the pushcarts along 1st ave., from 6th to 14th sts., and from 106th to 116th st., from 5th ave. to the East River, your Committee has not been able at the present time to find suitable spaces. The section lying under the New York Central tracks from 106th to 116th st. would be, in the opinion of your Committee, a suitable place for a pushcart market, and it will be recalled that some years ago the peddlers were segregated in this place under the tracks, but your Committee has been advised by the Corporation Counsel that at the present time, under section 50 of the Charter, the Board of Aldermen has no power to preempt a public highway or any part thereof for a market, and the only way in which this space could be utilized for market purposes would be by application to the Legislature to amend the Charter. It necessarily follows that this opinion would apply equally to the space under the elevated tracks from 6th to 14th st. on 1st ave.

It would seem from the result of the Committee's investigation as to the pushcart problem in the Borough of Brooklyn that the only solution of the problem, in so far as it relates to this particular Borough, would be the erection or establishment of pushcart markets, as there are no available spaces in that Borough, similar to those in Manhattan, where pushcarts could be segregated and still be conveniently located to the people who do their marketing from these carts.

In Brownsville there is now what is termed the "Peddlers' Market," which consists of a one-story building leased, as your Committee is advised, by certain peddlers in that neighborhood who have joined themselves into an association in order to better their condition, but the result of that market is practically the same as the one at present under the Williamsburg Bridge; for as soon as the peddlers segregated themselves in this market in Brownsville and took their carts off the streets adjacent thereto other peddlers came and occupied the streets abandoned by the peddlers who went into the market, thus making it really of no advantage for the peddlers to remain in the market, on account of loss of trade and in order to protect themselves the peddlers who remained in the market were forced to place their carts on the street again. The condition of this peddlers' market is not of the best, and the food stuffs sold are not, in the opinion of your Committee, of as good a grade as were found elsewhere, and the conditions, if anything, under which food stuffs were sold, were more unsanitary. The Committee would recommend that the City, through its proper officials, should take steps as soon as practical, to acquire this market or erect one similar thereto in this section, which would be under the supervision and regulation of the Borough President and the Comptroller, and be frequently inspected by the Board of Health.

Other locations in Brooklyn suitable for pushcart markets and recommended by your Committee are the following:

The block bounded by Siegel st., Graham ave., Moore st. and Manhattan ave., 100 feet frontage on Siegel and Moore sts., running through the entire block. In Brownsville the block bounded by Sutter ave., Osborne st., Blake ave. and Thatford ave., 100 feet frontage on Sutter and Blake ayes. This latter location is only a short distance away from the peddlers' market heretofore mentioned in Brownsville, and your Committee was informed at the public hearing which was held in Brooklyn in regard to pushcart locations, that these two locations could be obtained by the City for market purposes at a very small outlay.

As to the conditions under which the push-carts operate at the present time, the Committee find them most deplorable, both from a point of danger to life and limb and on account of their congestion in the streets, and also from a sanitary standpoint.

Your Committee found that during certain times of the day, between the hours of 9:30 and frequently as late as 6 or 7 o'clock, the streets, on account of the large number of push-carts, were impassable for any sort of vehicle, and it was with difficulty that your Committee were able to make their way through this congestion in order to make an inspection of the wares offered for sale. Your Committee found that frequently foodstuffs offered for sale were often placed on top of garbage cans which were filled with garbage; that half-clothed children were frequently found playing among the fruits and vegetables and other foodstuffs offered for sale; that the drippings from the carts caused stagnant pools to form under the carts; that the refuse from the push-carts were thrown indiscriminately in the streets, there to lie and decay until such time as the Street Cleaning Department could come along and remove the same. On account of these conditions, the condition of the streets were necessarily indescribably filthy, and whole blocks were so congested from this pushcart traffic that it would have been impossible, in case of fire, for the Fire Department to make their way through, and it is the opinion of your Committee that, unless these conditions are alleviated immediately, sooner or later there will be a frightful loss of life, either by people being trampled upon or on account of the Fire Department not being able to reach their destination with sufficient speed, owing to this congestion.

In approaching the solution of this problem, as before stated, the Committee have endeavored to act in a spirit of fairness to all interested in the solving of this problem, and, after the Committee had made this investigation, a public hearing was called during the month of July, which was widely advertised and at which appeared a large number of advocates of the segregation of peddlers, taking them from the streets and finding some convenient and suitable places in which they could ply their trade. A great many of the push-cart peddlers appeared also, either individually or by proxy or by the representatives of their organization.

The Committee have found that push-cart men, particularly in Manhattan, are well organized, and they are anxious to better their condition, and that at the hearing the peddlers appeared to be unanimous for the proposition to take them off the streets and give them suitable places to ply their trade, subjecting them to regulation, provided they could be placed in sections which would be convenient to the people who depend upon push-carts to do their trading. Your Committee has talked to a great many individual peddlers and to their organization representatives, and the Committee is informed and believes that the push-cart peddlers are now ready and willing to occupy these spaces under the bridges and Essex Market Court House, and such other places as could be found for them, provided ordinances could be passed to protect them in their trade when once they have submitted themselves to regulation.

As near as your Committee can ascertain, not more than 50 per cent. of the push-cart peddlers to-day have licenses, and the reason for the large discrepancy between the total number of push-carts and total number of licenses is that it has been the policy of the Bureau of Licenses, for some time past, to refuse to issue new push-cart licenses, on the ground of the great congestion which they created in the streets, and only renewal licenses were issued, and the natural result was that peddlers, finding they could not get a license, got a cart and commenced to peddle without one. The City authorities have tried to handle the push-cart problem along the lines of least resistance, until some solution of the problem could be found. Under the present ordinances, push-cart peddlers are supposed to move on every twenty minutes, but in the situation in which the push-cart problem is to-day, it would require practically the whole police force to make them obey this ordinance, leaving the police time for little else.

What better method of reducing the high cost of living than to establish pushcart markets, where the push-cart peddlers buy direct and sell direct, at the least possible cost? The segregation of the push-cart peddler would give to his business a permanency of character which it now necessarily lacks, and would guarantee him a permanent place of business to build up his trade, and would do away with his constant moving from place to place.

It is not the desire of the Committee to make a voluminous report, but to try and point out as briefly as possible what, in their opinion, would be the immediate solution of the push-cart problem. Your Committee would, therefore, recommend that the following locations be designated by the Board of Aldermen for market purposes, and that the same shall be declared by the Board of Aldermen as public markets, and shall be set aside as a market for such purposes during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen, subject to such rules and regulations concerning fixtures, the order of doing business and the general management of said markets, as may be made by the Comptroller of The City of New York; that the moneys received by the City for market spaces under the bridges be received by the Comptroller and be applied toward the maintenance of said bridges; that section 6 of article 1 of chapter 1 of part 2 of the Code of Ordinances be amended so as to prohibit push-cart peddling in the following streets and highways of The City of New York, and providing for a penalty for failure to obey this ordinance.

Proposed ordinances, in accordance with this report, are hereto annexed, and resolutions calling upon the Health Department, Police Department, Bridge Department and the Street Cleaning Department to co-operate with the Board of Aldermen in placing the peddlers in these spaces:

1. The Essex Market Court House.
2. Blind alley, lying between Ludlow and Essex sts., between the old Essex Market Court House and the school.
3. So much of the premises at the junction of E. 2d st. and E. Houston st., bounded on the westerly side by Sheriff st., heretofore known and used as the Union Market, as may be available.
4. The spaces under the Manhattan Bridge, as follows:

(a) Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Cherry st. and the westerly line of the Manhattan Bridge approach; thence easterly to and around the anchorage of said bridge to the easterly point of intersection of the Manhattan Bridge and Cherry st.; thence northerly along the line of the said bridge approach to its intersection with Monroe st.; thence westerly to its intersection with Monroe st.; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; same being parcel 1.

(b) Beginning at a point at the intersection of the westerly side of the Man-

hattan Bridge approach and the northerly side of Monroe st.; thence easterly to the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach on the east; thence northerly to its easterly intersection with Madison st.; thence westerly to its westerly intersection with Madison st.; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel 11.

(c) Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Madison st. at its intersection with the Manhattan Bridge approach; thence easterly to its intersection with Madison st. on the east; thence northerly to its intersection with Henry st. on the east; thence westerly to its intersection with Henry st. on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel III.

(d) Beginning at a point at the intersection of the Manhattan Bridge approach and Henry street on the west; thence easterly to its intersection with Henry st. on the east; thence northerly to its intersection at the southerly side of East Broadway; thence westerly to its intersection with East Broadway on the west; thence southerly to the point and place of beginning; the same being parcel IV.

4. Space under the Williamsburg Bridge.

Bounded on the north by the northerly side of the Williamsburg Bridge approach at the intersection of Ridge and Delancey streets; running thence easterly to the line of the Williamsburg Bridge at the intersection of Cannon and Delancey sts.; thence west along the line of the Williamsburg Bridge to its intersection at Ridge st.; thence northerly to the point or the place of beginning.

Gentlemen—Your approval is requested for the issue of special revenue bonds amounting to \$5,600 to provide for the recopying of the records prior to consolidation of the old municipalities now in the Borough of Queens and included in Greater New York.

One of the most necessary and important duties of the Topographical Bureau is the search of the records of streets and data relating to them prior to consolidation. It involves a search of old village records, town highway commissioners' records and other books kept by the former municipalities now in the custody of the Bureau of Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance in accordance with statutory provision.

The information in these books is of great value and is the original and official record which is essential in proceedings relating to old roads and streets. The books also contain the record of the improvement of streets paid for from county or other funds prior to consolidation.

Much work has been done by this Department in setting up such a record from the originals, but the volume of detail is great and the force of employees limited.

It is my judgment that the work can be greatly economized by copying on a large scale and thereby dispose of the work quickly and efficiently. A force of five or six typewriting copyists could be employed under the direction of a competent person in this Department who is familiar with the requirements and complete the work in a year at an estimated cost for salaries of \$3,250, in addition to which the rent of typewriting machines is estimated at \$216 and \$134 for ribbons and miscellaneous supplies other than typewriting paper, requisition for which will be made upon the City Record if the requested funds are made available. In the tuberculosis infirmary with nearly one thousand (1,000) patients, the only person having more than \$600 is the Second Assistant Superintendent. There is no Night Supervising Nurse and we are obliged to get along at night with \$600 positions. For this reason we are unable to retain our best Nurses in responsible positions at \$600, with the result that we have very frequent changes and many trying situations which could be avoided if the salaries paid were commensurate with responsibilities. Much of the time of our Superintendent of the Training School and Assistant Superintendents, which ought to go into bigger things, is spent going over the old routine with the constantly changing Nurses. The Commissioner requests that as rapidly as the work upon any floor is completed, this Department assume its maintenance and operation, subject to such regulation as the Corporation Counsel may deem necessary or advisable due to pending contracts and other legal requirements or obligations. The labor schedule has been prepared after a careful study of the forces employed in the buildings and offices now under my jurisdiction and those utilized in several of the large office buildings of the city. The aim has been to provide a force adequate to maintain and operate this building as becomes its dignity and importance and yet at a cost that will compare favorably with privately operated buildings in the city.

We are of the opinion that the detention pens attached to our courts are identical with the "district prisons" that are referred to in the "Inferior Criminal Courts Law" (see section 112), and which prisons are made subject to your control.

I now write, pursuant to a resolution of our Board, to inquire as to whether you can hold out an early prospect of providing each of our district prisons with the necessary number of attendants to take charge of the prisoners, so as to relieve us of the unlawful work that our force is now obliged to perform in that respect. Dear Sir—In the current Budget for this department there is an appropriation of \$15,000 for the purchase of motor trucks. This sum is a considerable reduction from the amount asked for by me, and in the discussion with the Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the result of which was the substitution of this amount for the amount asked, the prevailing sentiment was that there was not sufficient data as to the availability of motor trucks for the service of this department upon which to predicate the larger amount. It was therefore decided that an appropriation of \$15,000 for the purchase of three different types of motors and the use of these in the Borough of Brooklyn would be for the best interests of the City. I desire to make this purchase at this time in the open market, without competition, so that I may at once commence accumulating the necessary data upon which to found a request for the Budget of 1914. I feel that for the purpose for which this money was appropriated the purchase of a standard gasoline truck, a standard electric truck, and a standard tractor, all of five ton capacity, would give us the basis upon which to predicate a specification for future use. I believe that by purchasing in the open market of the best type known at present, with a specification only showing the exact requirement of the department service, and without entering too much in detail as to the mechanical construction and equipment, but leaving the matter so that the motor truck manufacturers must of necessity present the highest type as a sample, will bring out the best results. I find that but few manufacturers to-day are putting out a truck which can meet our requirements, but from these few I can choose the one which now meets the necessary details of construction to suit the necessities of our work. As to the tractor, I ask that I be permitted to have this one in order to find if there is virtue in the claim that it may be substituted on various vehicles used

in the department work for horse traction, so as to make it available for more than one vehicle and more than one service. I would therefore request your Honorable body to grant me the power to purchase one gasoline truck, one electric truck, and one tractor in the open market for the purpose here stated, at a cost not to exceed, for the three, \$15,000. Gentlemen—I respectfully request that your honorable Board, pursuant to the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, give authority to enter into a contract, without public letting, for the purchase of material and the necessary labor for enlarging the storage battery used in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in Central Park.

The present battery boxes are located in the wing now completed, and were built large enough to accommodate the additional wings that were anticipated. These buildings are now completed, and the request is made necessary so that the wiring may be connected with the battery.

The additional power is needed for Addition "H," the boiler house and the old buildings, and the estimated cost is \$2,460.

This matter has been gone into in detail, and it is found that it will be impossible to get competitive bidding for the reason that the material needed can only be furnished by the manufacturer of the batteries, namely, the Electric Storage Battery Company, with offices at 100 Broadway.

If further information is required when this matter comes before the Committee on Finance I will be pleased to furnish same.

Your immediate action on this matter is requested for the reason that the contractors are now at work, and we desire to have the wiring finished before they leave.

No. 436—Int. Nos. 3226, 3227 and 3228.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred on March 25, 1913 (Minutes, page 1266), the annexed ordinances providing for the regulation of moving picture theatres, respectively

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, it believes the proposed legislation to be necessary.

The Board being entirely familiar with the ordinance, as introduced by Alderman Folks, it therefore recommends that the said ordinances be adopted.

AN AMENDMENT TO LICENSE MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 305, ARTICLE 1, TITLE 2, CHAPTER 7, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

305. The following businesses must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely, public cartmen, truckmen, hackmen, cabmen, expressmen, drivers, junk dealers, dealers in second-hand articles, hawkers, peddlers, venders, ticket speculators, coal scalpers, common shows, motion picture theatres, open air motion picture theatres, shooting galleries, bowling alleys, billiard tables, dirt carts, exterior hoists and stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of the elevated station.

NOTE—New matter in *italics*.

AN AMENDMENT PROVIDING LICENSE FEES FOR MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK AS FOLLOWS: SECTION 308, ARTICLE 2, TITLE 2, CHAPTER 7, OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:

308. The annual license fees shall be as below enumerated: For each public cart or truck \$2; for each public hack coach, \$3; for each public hack cab, \$2; for each special hack coach, \$5; for each special hack cab, \$3; for each express wagon, \$5; for each junk shop dealer, \$20; for each dealer in second-hand articles, \$25; for each junk cart or boat, \$5; for each peddler using horse and wagon, \$8; for each peddler using push cart, \$4; for each peddler carrying merchandise, \$2; for each ticket speculator, \$50; for each coal scoper, \$25; for each common show, \$25; for each open air motion picture theatre, \$50; for each motion picture theatre, \$100; for each public shooting gallery, \$5; for each public bowling alley, \$5; for each public billiard table, \$3; for each dirt cart, \$1; for each general hoisting, \$25; for each special hoisting, \$1; for each fruit or soda water stand, or booth, \$10; for each newspaper or periodical stand, or booth, \$15; for each movable newspaper stand, \$1; for each newspaper and periodical stand, or booth, \$5; for each chair of a booth/black stand, \$5; for each stand under elevated railroad stations, \$10; for each driver of any licensed vehicle, 50 cents.

NOTE—New matter in *italics*.

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK AS FOLLOWS: CHAPTER 7, TITLE 2, ARTICLE 3, SECTION 352—MOTION PICTURES AND MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

352A.

Motion pictures shall be deemed a display on a screen or other device whereby pictures are displayed of characters or objects in motion, whether or not accompanied by music, lecture, recitation or song.

352B.

A motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public hall or room in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600, and in which there is no stage or scenery.

An open air motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public place or space in the open air in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, and in which there is no stage or scenery.

The Mayor shall appoint such inspectors as shall be necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance. They shall be known as "Motion Picture Theatre Inspectors" and shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by the Board of Aldermen on recommendations of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

352C.

The Bureau of Licenses shall issue all motion picture licenses granted by the Mayor, and, by the authority of the Mayor, shall regulate and control all motion picture theatres provided.

1. Applicants for motion picture theatre licenses shall file plans and specifications of the motion picture theatre with the Bureau of Buildings of the borough in which the motion picture theatre is to be situated, and must file a copy of such plans and specifications, duly approved by the Superintendent of Buildings, with the application for the license, which application shall be made to the Bureau of Licenses on blanks furnished by it for that purpose.

2. The Bureau of Licenses shall, without delay upon the request of an applicant, pass upon the location of the motion picture theatre and upon the character of the applicant requesting the license.

3. The Bureau of Licenses shall request the Fire Department, Bureau of Buildings, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and Department of Health to inspect said theatres, and the said departments shall file in the Bureau of Licenses, within ten days, detailed written reports, which shall include a statement of any violations of law, ordinances, rules and regulations, and any dangerous conditions. Upon the failure of any of said departments (excepting the Fire Department) to file detailed written reports in reply to the request of the Bureau of Licenses, the said bureau may disregard said department and in its discretion may issue a license.

4. Until the provisions of this ordinance shall have been complied with, no license shall be issued.

352D.

1. Plans—Before the erection, construction or alteration of a building, or part thereof, to be used as a motion picture theatre, there must be filed with the Superintendent of Buildings complete plans and detailed statement as set forth in section 4 of the Building Code. The plans must show clearly and fully the location and width of all exits, passageways, stairs, fire escapes, aisles, etc.; arrangement of seats, size of floor beams, walls, supports, etc.; the location and construction of the inclosure for the motion picture light and machinery, and for other similar apparatus; a diagram of the lot or 'plot, showing outlets from all exits, and also such other statements, plans or details as may be required by the Superintendent of Buildings.

2. Prohibition—Motion picture theatres shall not be constructed in frame buildings within the fire limits, nor in hotels, tenement houses or lodging houses, nor in factories or workshops, except where the theatre is separated from the rest of the building by unpierced fireproof walls and floors, and in no case shall they be constructed or operated above or below the ground floor of any building.

3. Exits and Courts—All such buildings must be provided on the main floor of the theatre with at least two separate exits, one of which shall be in the front and the other in the rear, both leading to unobstructed outlets on the street. Where the main floor of the theatre accommodates more than 300 people there shall be at least three such exits, the aggregate width in feet of such exits shall not be less than one-twentieth of the number of persons to be accommodated thereby. No exits shall be less than 5 feet in width, and there shall be a main exit not less than 10 feet in total width.

In all such buildings to be erected or to be altered so as to be used for a motion picture theatre, if unobstructed exit to a street cannot be provided at the rear of such buildings, as herein specified, either an open court or a fireproof passage or corridor must be provided from rear exit to the street front of at least the following width: 4 feet in the clear for theatres accommodating 100 persons or less; for every additional 100 persons the width to be increased 8 inches. Such passage must be constructed of fireproof material and must be at least 10 feet high in the clear. The walls forming such passage must be at least 8 inches thick, of brick or other approved fireproof material, and if there be a basement the wall on the auditorium side should either run 1 foot below the cellar bottom or may be carried in the cellar on iron columns and girders properly fireproofed according to sections 106 and 107 of the Building Code.

The ceiling of said passage, and if there be a basement, the flooring must be constructed according to section 106 of the Building Code.

If unobstructed rear exit or exits to a street are provided, the said exit or exits must be of the same total width required for the court or passage above mentioned.

Said passages and exits to the street, as above, must be used for no other purposes except for exit and entrance and must be kept free and clear.

The level of the open court or passage at the front of building shall not be greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk, and the grade shall not be more than 1 foot in 10, with no perpendicular rises.

All exit doors must be unlocked when building is open to the public. They must be fireproof and made to open outwardly and so arranged as not to obstruct the required width of exit or court when opened. All doors leading to fire escapes must be not less than 40 inches wide in the clear, and shall be located at the opposite side or end of the gallery from other exit doors.

4. Galleries and Stairs—A gallery may be permitted, but it shall not include more than 25 per cent. of the total seating capacity of the theatre. Entrance to and exit from said gallery shall in no case lead to the main floor of the theatre, and the gallery shall be provided with a stair or stairs equipped with handrails on both sides. Stairs over 7 feet wide shall be provided with centre handrail. The risers of the stairs shall not exceed 7 1/4 inches, and the treads, excluding nosings, shall not be less than 9 1/2 inches. There shall be no circular or winding staircases.

The total width of the stairs shall not be less than 8 feet in the clear where the gallery accommodates 150 people; for every 50 people less than 150 which the gallery accommodates said width may be reduced 1 foot.

Stairs shall be constructed of fireproof material, and such material and the bearing capacity of such stairs shall be approved by the Bureau of Buildings.

Galleries must also be provided with at least one line of fire escapes leading to an open court, fireproof passage or street without re-entering the same or any other building.

If the fire escape leads to a point in the court nearer the street than any exit, there must be a width of not less than 4 feet in the clear between the outer edge of the fire escape and the outer wall of the court.

5. Fire Escapes—All fire escapes must have balconies not less than 3 feet 4 inches in width in the clear and not less than 4 feet 6 inches long, and from said balconies there shall be staircases extending to the ground level with a rise of not over 7 1/4 inches and a step of not less than 9 1/2 inches, and the width of the stairs must not be less than 3 feet 4 inches.

6. Auditorium and Other Rooms—If the walls of the auditorium contain wood studs they shall be covered with either expanded metal lath or wire mesh and plastered with three coats of first class plaster, or may be covered with metal on one-half inch plaster boards. The joints shall be properly filled with mortar.

The ceilings of all such rooms shall be plastered with three coats of first class plaster on wire mesh or metal lath, or covered with one-half inch plaster boards, and plastered or covered with metal.

If there be a basement or cellar, the ceiling under the auditorium floor must be plastered with three coats of first class plaster on wire mesh or expanded metal lath or may be covered with metal on one-half inch plaster boards.

The basement or cellar under the auditorium shall be kept free and clear, except the space used for the heating apparatus, for machinery connected with the theatre and for coal.

7. Construction of Booths—Apparatus for projecting motion pictures shall be enclosed in a booth or enclosure constructed so as to be fireproof, in accordance with the specifications of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1911. The booth shall be equipped with a vent flue as prescribed in section 352C, paragraph 2, of this ordinance. Booths shall contain an approved fireproof box for the storage of films not on the projecting machine. Films shall not be stored in any other place on the premises; they shall be rewound and repaired either in the booth or in some other approved fireproof enclosure.

Where miniature motion picture machines are employed in connection with private exhibitions the requirements of the above paragraph may be so modified as to permit, instead of the regulation booth, an approved fireproof box, unventilated, and of a size only sufficient to properly enclose the machine.

8. Gradients—To overcome any difference of level in and between corridors, lobbies and aisles, gradients of not over 1 foot in 10 feet, or steps having a rise not over 8 inches and a width of not less than 10 inches must be used.

9. Aisles—All aisles in the auditorium and gallery must not be less than 3 feet

wide in the clear. No aisle, passageway or space in the rear of the auditorium shall be obstructed by any camp stool, chair, sofa or settee, nor shall any person be permitted to stand or sit therein.

10. Chairs—All chairs in the auditorium except those contained in the boxes, must not be less than 32 inches from back to back and must be firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than seven seats intervening between it and an aisle. The space occupied by each person shall be separated from the adjoining space by means of an arm or other suitable device.

11. Signs Over Exits—Over every exit there must be painted on the inside in letters not less than 6 inches high, the word "Exit" in legible type, and one red light or illuminated sign must be placed inside over each exit, and illuminated while the audience is present.

12. Floor Loads—The flooring of that portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public must be of sufficient strength to bear safely a live load of 90 pounds per square foot.

13. Toilets—Toilets separate for sexes must be provided.

14. Fire Apparatus—Portable fire apparatus shall be provided of the following kind and number: Ten-quart capacity buckets, painted red with the word "Fire" in black, the letters 4 inches high, to the number of 6 for places seating less than 300 without a gallery, and two additional if there be a gallery; to the number of ten in places seating over 300 persons, and four additional if there be a gallery. There shall be two buckets containing dry sand kept in the operating booth; approved fire extinguishers of 2 1/2-gallon capacity of the regulation Fire Department pattern, of which 2 shall be on the main floor and 2 in the gallery, if there be one, and 1 in the operating booth; 4 pound flat head axes, 2 of which shall be on the main floor and 2 in the gallery, if there be one.

352E.

1. Lighting—Every portion of a moving picture theatre, including exits, courts and corridors devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, shall be so lighted by electric light during all exhibitions and until the entire audience has left the premises that a person with normal eyesight should be able to read the Snellen standard test type 40 at a distance of 20 feet and type 30 at a distance of 10 feet; normal eyesight meaning ability to read type 20 at a distance of 20 feet in daylight. Cards showing types 20, 30 and 40 shall be displayed on the side walls, together with a copy of this paragraph of the ordinance.

2. Heating—When the temperature of the outdoor air is below 60 degrees F. the air in the theatre, while an audience is present, shall be maintained at a temperature not lower than 62 degrees F. nor higher than 70 degrees F.

If gas stoves, oil stoves or other apparatus throwing off products of combustion are used to heat motion picture theatres, said products of combustion must be carried to the outside air by means of a fireproof flue or flues.

No radiator shall be placed in the aisles so as to lessen the width below the minimum requirement.

3. Ventilation—Motion picture theatres having less than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or motion picture theatres in which the outside window and door area is less than one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation which shall supply during the time the audience is present at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person.

Motion picture theatres having more than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or which have outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation, which shall be in operation when the outside temperature requires the windows to be kept closed, and which shall supply, during the time the audience is present, at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person. When the artificial ventilation is not in operation, ventilation by means of open doors and windows shall be sufficient to provide each person with 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour.

Motion picture theatres having more than 1,000 cubic feet of air space for each person and having outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the total floor area, shall not be required to have artificial means of ventilation, provided the air is thoroughly changed by freely opening doors and windows immediately before the admission of the audience, and at least every 4 hours thereafter.

No part of the fresh air supply required by any of the above paragraphs of this section shall be taken from any source containing vitiated air.

The area of outside doors and windows shall mean the area capable of being freely opened to the outside air for ventilation purposes.

When fresh air is supplied by means of ventilating openings, at least one inlet shall be situated at one end of the room, and at least one outlet at the other end of the room. Where exhaust or inlet fans are necessary, at least one of such fan shall be placed in an outlet opening. The inlet opening or openings shall be placed in the floor or within 2 feet from the floor, and the outlet opening or openings in the ceiling or within 2 feet of the ceiling. The inlet openings and their surroundings shall be kept free from dust so that the incoming air shall not convey dust nor stir up dust as it enters.

During the time the audience is present, the air in the theatre shall be kept continuously in motion by means of fans to the number of at least 1 to every 150 persons. Such fans shall be placed in positions remote from the inlet and outlet openings. No person shall be exposed to any direct draft from any air inlet.

The booth in which the picture machine is operated shall be provided with an opening in its roof or upper part of its side walls, leading to the outdoor air. The vent flue shall have a minimum cross sectional area of 50 square inches and shall be fireproof. When the booth is in use, there shall be a constant current of air passing outward through said opening or vent flue, at the rate of not less than 30 cubic feet per minute.

The specifications of the above paragraph shall apply to portable booths and booths in open air theatres.

352F.

Motion picture theatres must be kept clean and free from dust.

The floors, where covered with wood, tiles, stone, concrete, linoleum, or other washable material, shall be mopped or scrubbed with water or swept with moisture or by some other dustless method, at least once daily, and shall be scrubbed with water and soap, or water and some other solvent substance at least once weekly.

Carpets, rugs and other fabric floor coverings shall be cleaned at least once daily by means of suction cleaning, beating or dustless sweeping. Curtains and draperies shall be cleaned at least once monthly by suction cleaning, beating or washing. Cornices, walls and other dust-holding places shall be kept free from dust by washing or moist wiping. The wood and metal parts of all seats shall be kept clean. Fabric upholstering of seats and railings and other fixed fabrics shall be cleaned by suction cleaning, or other dustless method, at least once monthly.

352G.

Through its Motion Picture Inspectors, as provided in subsection 352b of this ordinance, the Bureau of Licenses shall inspect, subject to the authority of the Mayor, the character of exhibitions in motion picture theatres and shall report to the Mayor any offense against morality, decency or public welfare contained in said exhibitions.

352H.

All the provisions contained in this ordinance shall apply to existing places of entertainment, where motion pictures are exhibited under a common show license, in case the seating capacity be increased; and in case the seating capacity be not increased, all the provisions of this ordinance shall apply, except those provisions of subsection 352d, designated as numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, but the Bureau of Licenses shall have power in its discretion to enforce the provisions of said paragraph 3 of Section 352d as to exits and courts.

But if such existing place of entertainment discontinue all other form of entertainment except the exhibition of motion pictures, it may be licensed in accordance with the provisions of subsection 352H.

352I.

With the exception of paragraph 7 of subsection 352D, subsections "352A" to "352F" inclusive, and subsections "352H," "352I," "352K" and "352L" of this ordinance shall not apply to motion picture exhibitions with or without charge for admission, conducted under the direct management of educational or religious institutions, nor to motion picture exhibitions without charge for admission given or held not

more than once a week in private residences or bona fide social, scientific, political or athletic clubs. Before motion pictures shall be exhibited in any of the places above mentioned, there shall be obtained from the Bureau of Licenses a permit for such exhibition. Before granting such permit, the Bureau of Licenses shall cause to be inspected the premises where such proposed exhibition will be held, and shall grant the permit if in its judgment the safety of the public be properly guarded, and provided that for an audience of more than 75 people all chairs or seats shall be securely fastened to the floor or fastened together in rows.

352K.

The Bureau of Licenses, at its discretion, shall specify the seating capacity for each open air motion picture theatre. Aisles must be 4 feet wide, or wider, in the discretion of the Bureau of Licenses. At least two separate exits, remote from each other, shall be provided, and no exit shall be less than 5 feet in width; for every 25 persons to be accommodated in excess of 300, the total width of exits shall be increased 1 foot. All exits must be indicated by signs and red lights, and the doors must open outwardly. Seats must be stationary, with backs 32 inches apart, and so arranged that no seat shall have more than 7 seats intervening between it and an aisle. The floor must be constructed either of wood or sleepers or concrete, and must extend at least five feet from the seats on all sides, provided, however, that in the discretion of the Bureau of Licenses, a gravel floor may be substituted for wood or concrete. Chairs must be either securely fastened to wood or concrete floor, or all chairs in a row must be fastened together, and at least 4 rows must be securely fastened to one frame, except that where refreshments are served, tables and unattached chairs or benches used with them may be permitted.

352L.

Only subsections "352A," "352B," "352C," "352D," paragraphs 7 and 13; "352G," "352J" and "352K" of this ordinance shall apply to open air motion picture theatres.

352M.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor. All other rules, regulations and ordinances inconsistent herewith and affecting buildings and places to be occupied as herein defined are hereby revoked.

AN AMENDMENT Providing License Fees for Motion Picture Theatres.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 308, article 2, title 2, chapter 7, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

308. The annual license fees shall be as below enumerated: For each public cart or truck, \$2; for each public hack coach, \$3; for each hack cab, \$2; for each special hack coach, \$5; for each special hack cab, \$3; for each express wagon, \$5; for each junk shop dealer, \$20; for each dealer in second-hand articles, \$25; for each junk cart or boat, \$5; for each peddler using horse and wagon, \$8; for each peddler using pushcart, \$4; for each peddler carrying merchandise, \$2; for each ticket speculator, \$50; for each coal scalper, \$250; for each common show, \$25; for each open air motion picture theatre, \$50; for each motion picture theatre, \$100; for each public shooting gallery, \$5; for each public bowling alley, \$5; for each public billiard table, \$3; for each dirt cart, \$1; for each general hoisting, \$25; for each special hoisting, \$1; for each fruit or soda water stand, or booth, \$10; for each newspaper or periodical stand, or booth, and in addition also a fruit or soda water stand, or booth, \$15; for each movable newspaper stand, \$1; for each newspaper and periodical stand, or booth, \$5; for each chair of a booth/black stand, \$5; for each stand under the elevated railroad stations, \$10; for each driver of any licensed vehicle, 50 cents.

AN AMENDMENT to License Motion Picture Theatres.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 305, article 1, title 2, chapter 7, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

305. The following businesses must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely: Public cartmen, truckmen, hackmen, cabmen, expressmen, drivers, junk dealers, dealers in second-hand articles, hawkers, peddlers, vendors, ticket speculators, coal scalpers, common shows, motion picture theatres, open air motion picture theatres, shooting galleries, bowling alleys, billiard tables, dirt carts, exterior hoists, and stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of the elevated stations.

AN ORDINANCE Relative to Motion Picture Theatres.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Chapter 7, Title 2, Article 3, Section 352—Motion Pictures and Motion Picture Theatres.

352a.

Motion pictures shall be deemed a display on a screen or other device whereby pictures are displayed of characters or objects in motion, whether or not accompanied by music, lecture, recitation or song.

352b.

A motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public hall or room in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600, and in which there is no stage or scenery.

An open air motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public place or space in the open air in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, and in which there is no stage or scenery.

The Mayor shall appoint such Inspectors as shall be necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance. They shall be known as "Motion Picture Theatre Inspectors," and shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by the Board of Aldermen on recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

352c.

The Bureau of Licenses shall issue all motion picture licenses granted by the Mayor, and by authority of the Mayor shall regulate and control all motion picture theatres, provided:

1. Applicants for motion picture theatre licenses shall file plans and specifications of the motion picture theatre with the Bureau of Buildings of the borough in which the motion picture theatre is to be situated, and must file a copy of such plans and specifications duly approved by the Superintendent of Buildings with the application for the license, which application shall be made to the Bureau of Licenses on blanks furnished by it for that purpose.

2. The Bureau of Licenses shall, without delay, upon the request of an applicant, pass upon the location of the motion picture theatre and upon the character of the applicant requesting the license.

3. The Bureau of Licenses shall request the Fire Department, Bureau of Buildings, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and Department of Health to inspect said theatres, and the said departments shall file in the Bureau of Licenses, within ten days, detailed written reports, which shall include a statement of any violations of law, ordinances, rules and regulations, and any dangerous conditions. Upon the failure of any of said departments (excepting the Fire Department) to file detailed written reports in reply to the request of the Bureau of Licenses, the said Bureau may disregard said department, and, in its discretion, may issue a license.

4. Until the provisions of this ordinance shall have been complied with, no license shall be issued.

352d.

1. Plans—Before the erection, construction or alteration of a building, or part thereof, to be used as a motion picture theatre, there must be filed with the Superintendent of Buildings complete plans and detailed statement as set forth in section 4 of the Building Code. The plans must show clearly and fully the location and width of all exits, passageways, aisles, etc.; arrangement of seats, size of floor beams, walls, supports, etc.; the location and construction of the enclosure for the motion picture light and machinery, and for other similar apparatus; a diagram of the lot or plot, showing outlets from all exits, and

also such other statements, plans or details as may be required by the Superintendent of Buildings.

2. Prohibition—Motion picture theatres shall not be constructed in frame buildings within the fire limits nor in hotels, tenement houses or lodging houses; nor in factories or workshops, except where the theatre is separated from the rest of the building by unpierced fireproof walls and floors; and in no case shall they be constructed or operated above or below the ground floor of any building.

3. Exits and Courts—All such buildings must be provided on the main floor of the theatre with at least two separate exits, one of which shall be in the front and the other in the rear, both leading to unobstructed outlets on the street. Where the main floor of the theatre accommodates more than 300 people there shall be at least 3 exits. The aggregate width in feet of such exits shall not be less than one-twentieth of the number of persons to be accommodated thereby. No exit shall be less than 5 feet in width, and there shall be a main exit not less than 10 feet in total width.

In all such buildings to be erected or to be altered so as to be used for a motion picture theatre, if unobstructed exit to a street cannot be provided at the rear of such buildings, as herein specified, either an open court or a fireproof passage or corridor must be provided from rear exit to the street front, of at least the following width: 4 feet in the clear for theatres accommodating 100 persons or less; for each additional 100 persons the width to be increased 8 inches. Such passage must be constructed of fireproof material and must be at least 10 feet high in the clear. The walls forming such passage must be at least 8 inches thick, of brick or other approved fireproof material, and if there be a basement the wall on the auditorium side should either run one foot below the cellar bottom or may be carried in the cellar on iron columns and girders properly fireproofed according to sections 106 and 107 of the Building Code.

The ceiling of said passage, and if there be a basement the flooring, must be constructed according to section 106 of the Building Code.

If unobstructed rear exit or exits to a street are provided, the said exit or exits must be of the same total width required for the court or passage above mentioned.

Said passages and exits to the street as above must be used for no other purposes except for exit and entrance, and must be kept free and clear.

The level of the open court or passage at the front of the building shall not be greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk, and the grade shall not be more than one foot in ten, with no perpendicular rises.

All exit doors must be unlocked when building is open to the public. They must be fireproof and made to open outwardly, and so arranged as not to obstruct the required width of exit or court when open.

4. Galleries—A gallery shall not be permitted.

5. Auditorium and Other Rooms—If the walls of the auditorium contain wood studs they shall be covered with either expanded metal lath or wire mesh and plastered with three coats of first class plaster or may be covered with metal on one-half inch plaster boards. The joints shall be properly filled with mortar.

The ceilings of all such rooms shall be plastered with three coats of first class plaster on wire mesh or metal lath, or covered with one-half inch plaster boards and plastered or covered with metal.

If there be a basement or cellar, the ceiling under the auditorium must be plastered with three coats of first class plaster on wire mesh or expanded metal lath, or may be covered with metal on one-half inch plaster boards.

The basement or cellar under the auditorium shall be kept free and clear except the space used for the heating apparatus for machinery connected with the theatre, and for coal.

6. Construction of Booths—Apparatus for projecting motion pictures shall be enclosed in a booth or enclosure constructed so as to be fireproof, in accordance with the specifications of Chapter 756 of the Laws of 1911. The booths shall be equipped with a vent flue, as prescribed in section 352e, paragraph 2 of this ordinance. Booths shall contain an approved fireproof box for the storage of films not on the projecting machine. Films shall not be stored in any other place on the premises; they shall be re-wound and repaired either in the booth or in some other approved fireproof enclosure.

Where miniature motion picture machines are employed in connection with private exhibitions the requirements of the above paragraph may be so modified as to permit instead of the regulation booth, an approved fireproof box, unventilated, and of a size only sufficient to properly enclose the machine.

7. Gradients—To overcome any difference of level in and between corridors, lobbies and aisles, gradients of not over 1 foot in 10 feet, or steps having a rise not over 8 inches and a width of not less than 10 inches must be used.

8. Aisles—All aisles must be not less than 3 feet wide in the clear.

No aisle, passageway or space in the auditorium shall be obstructed by any camp stool, chair, sofa or settee, nor shall any person be permitted to stand or sit therein.

9. Chairs—All chairs in the auditorium, except those contained in the boxes, must not be less than 32 inches from back to back, and must be firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than 7 seats intervening between it and an aisle. The space occupied by each person shall be separated from the adjoining space by means of an arm or other suitable device.

10. Signs Over Exits—Over every exit there must be painted on the inside in letters not less than 6 inches high the word "Exit" in legible type, and 1 red light or illuminated sign must be placed inside over each exit, and illuminated while the audience is present.

11. Floor Loads—The flooring of that portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public must be of sufficient strength to bear safely a live load of 90 pounds per square foot.

12. Toilets—Toilets separate for sexes must be provided.

13. Fire Apparatus—Portable fire apparatus shall be provided of the following kind and number: Ten quarts capacity, buckets painted red, with the word "Fire" in black, the letters 4 inches high, to the number of 6, for places seating less than 300; to the number of 10 in places seating over 300 persons. There shall be 2 buckets containing dry sand kept in the operating booth; approved fire extinguishers of 2½-gallon capacity, of the regulation Fire Department pattern, of which 2 shall be on the main floor and 1 in the operating booth; 4-pound flathead axes, 2 of which shall be on the main floor.

352e.

1. Lighting—Every portion of a motion picture theatre, including exit courts and corridors, devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, shall be so lighted by electric light during all exhibitions and until the entire audience has left the premises, that a person with normal eyesight should be able to read the Snellen standard test type 40 at a distance of 20 feet, and type 30 at a distance of 10 feet; normal eyesight meaning ability to read type 20 at a distance of 20 feet in daylight. Cards showing types 20, 30 and 40 shall be displayed on the side walls, together with a copy of this paragraph of the ordinance.

2. Heating—When the temperature of the outdoor air is below 60 degree F. the air in the theatre, while an audience is present, shall be maintained at a temperature not lower than 62 degrees F., nor higher than 70 degrees F.

If gas stoves, oil stoves or other apparatus throwing off products of combustion are used to heat motion picture theatres said products of combustion must be carried to the outside air by means of a fireproof flue or flues.

No radiator shall be placed in the aisles so as to lessen the width below minimum requirements.

3. Ventilation—Motion picture theatres having less than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or motion picture theatres in which the outside window and door area is less than one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation which shall supply, during the time the audience is present, at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person.

Motion picture theatres having more than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or which have outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation, which shall be in operation when the outside temperature requires the windows to be kept closed, and which shall supply during the time the audience is present at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person. When the artificial ventilation is not in operation, ventilation by means of open doors and windows shall be sufficient to provide each person with 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour.

Motion picture theatres having more than 1,000 cubic feet of air space for each person and having outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the total floor area, shall not be required to have artificial means of ventilation, provided the air is thoroughly changed by freely opening doors and windows immediately before the admission of the audience and at least every four hours thereafter.

No part of the fresh air supply required by any of the above paragraphs of this section shall be taken from any source containing vitiated air.

The area of outside doors and windows shall mean the area capable of being freely opened to the outside for ventilation purposes.

When fresh air is supplied by means of ventilating openings, at least one inlet shall be situated at one end of the room and at least one outlet at the other end of the room. Where exhaust or inlet fans are necessary at least one of such fans shall be placed in an outlet opening. That having carefully examined the subject, it believes the proposed legislation to be necessary.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the exposure of empty milk cans on the public streets in The City of New York.

Be It Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person to place or keep upon the sidewalk of any public thoroughfare in The City of New York any empty milk can which has been or which is to be used for the transportation of milk or any dairy product.

Section 2. Any person violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, by any City Magistrate, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, be fined a sum not more than \$5 for each and every offense, and in default of payment of such fine shall be committed to prison by any City Magistrate until the same be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed five (5) days.

Section 3. This ordinance to take effect immediately.

Section 3. This ordinance to take effect immediately.

Gentlemen—There was transmitted to this office by the Clerk of your Board, on January 22, 1913, a certified copy of an ordinance duly adopted by your Board on January 6, 1913, and approved by the Mayor on January 21, 1913, selecting as a site for municipal purposes, in the care and under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, of the President of the Borough of Richmond, the following described property in the Borough of Richmond:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Tompkins ave., said point of beginning being the northeasterly corner of land occupied by the Clifton Refuse Destructor, which was conveyed to The City of New York October 4, 1907.

1. Thence in a northwesterly direction 101.92 feet along the westerly side of Tompkins ave. to the right of way of the Staten Island Railway.

2. Thence deflecting to the left 92 degrees 53 minutes 40 seconds in a southwest direction along said railroad right of way 12 feet.

The oaths of the Commissioners in the above proceeding were filed on December 26, 1912, and I am informed by my assistant in charge of said proceeding that the title to the property to be acquired will vest in The City of New York six months after the date of the filing of said oaths.

The damage may in said street opening proceeding shows that the following described portion of the property selected by your Board for street cleaning purposes, as above set forth, constitutes Damage Parcel No. 9 in said proceedings.

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Tompkins ave. adjoining the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, running thence southwesterly at an angle of 92 degrees 53 minutes 40 seconds, a distance of 12 feet, to the westerly side of Rosebank ave. as laid out, running thence southerly along the westerly side of Rosebank ave. 101.81 feet, running thence easterly at right angles to the westerly side of Tompkins ave. 19.72 feet to the westerly side of Tompkins ave., running thence northerly along the westerly side of Tompkins ave. 101.92 feet to the point or place of beginning.

As such portion of the property selected by your Board as is comprised in Damage Parcel No. 9 in said street opening proceeding has been designated for street purposes, it should not be selected for another and inconsistent public use.

Hon. HENRY H. CURRAN, Chairman of Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting to-day adopted four resolutions relating to issues of corporate stock for the uses of this Department. Three of the resolutions rescind from funds known as C-DB-1A, C-DB-7C and C-DB-50 a total of \$35,000, and the fourth resolution authorizes an increase of this amount in the fund known as C-DB-42A. This additional money is needed in the fund C-DB-42A for the purpose of completing the strengthening of the Williamsburg Bridge to permit of the running of subway trains thereon in connection with rapid transit improvements. A contract was let for the strengthening of the end spans of the bridge on June 16, 1911, and this contract is approximately 90 per cent. completed.

The work of strengthening the main span of the bridge is now under way, the Department using its own labor on this portion of the work. The balance in the fund for this work on this date is only \$807, which amount will carry the force only to April 23. It would be unwise at this time to stop work, but this will have to be done unless the amount requested, \$35,000, is authorized. All of the material for this work has been purchased under contract and is practically all delivered at the site.

The cessation of the work at this time would mean the postponement of the operation of subway trains across this bridge into the Center street loop. Such operation has already been authorized by the Public Service Commission, and those concerned in this operation state that they will be ready within two months to run cars through this subway, and it is important that the work of strengthening the main span be not interfered with.

When this matter of authorizing the \$35,000 additional comes before your Committee for action, I beg to request that you do everything in your power to hasten early favorable action on the four resolutions mentioned above. Yours truly,

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the sale and use of "wood alcohol" in The City of New York.

Be It Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Any substance known as wood alcohol, in its crude or deodorized form, having the chemical composition known professionally as CH₃OH, is hereby prohibited from being sold under any other name than "wood poison," nor shall it be lawful to use said chemical composition in any medical or toilet preparation. Said chemical composition, when sold as such shall be labeled with a regulation poison label, with the following words added: "This fluid taken internally, inhaled or used externally, is likely to produce blindness." Said words shall be printed in type not less in size than eight point, as known to the trade, in red letters, on a white field.

Sec. 2. Any person guilty of a violation of this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall, upon conviction thereof before a City Magistrate, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars, and in default of payment of any fine so imposed, shall be committed to the City Prison for a term of ten days, each day of imprisonment to be taken as a liquidation of each dollar of such fine.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

Operations of the Steam Boiler Inspection and Engineers' Bureau for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1913.

The Steam Boiler Inspection Bureau is empowered by law to inspect and subject all steam boilers carrying over ten pounds of steam to the square inch to a hydrostatic test once a year, and to examine and qualify Engineers and Firemen to operate them.

The force of the Bureau consists of 11 members of the uniformed force, two Deputy Clerks and one Stenographer, two civilian Boiler Inspectors and four civilian Drivers, under command of a Lieutenant.

Two members of the uniformed force who are practical Engineers are assigned to examine applicants for Engineers' and Firemen's certificates and to hear and determine charges preferred against Engineers and Firemen for neglect of duty. There are nine Boiler Inspectors, seven are members of the uniformed force and two are civilians.

Engineers—Certificates renewed, 2,370; certificates transferred, 507; new applicants, 261; total number of examinations, 3,138; incompetent, certificate refused, 129; total number of certificates granted, 3,009; certificates of first class granted, 348; certificates of second class granted, 594; certificates of third class granted, 1,951; Fire Department (special), granted, 116.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
