Public Hearing in the Matter of Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Changing the Grades of Northern Avenue, from Chittenden Avenue to a Point About 25 Feet North of West 190th Street; of West 187th Street and West 190th Street, from Northern Avenue to Fort Washington Avenue, and of Fort Washington Avenue at and in the Vicinity of Its Intersections with West 187th Street and West 190th Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 2).

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

The following report of the Chief Engineer was then presented:

Report No. 13315.

November 10, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on November 6 a resolution was adopted at the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, fixing December 4 as the date for a public hearing concerning a change proposed in the grade of the following streets: Northern avenue, from Chittenden avenue to a point about 25 feet north of West 190th street; West 187th street, from Northern avenue to Fort Washington avenue; West 190th street, from Northern

avenue to Fort Washington avenue; Fort Washington avenue, at and in the vicinity of its intersections with West 187th street and West 190th street.

On July 10, 1913, a public hearing was given concerning a change proposed in the grade of these streets, at which time it was planned to lower the elevation of Northern avenue about three feet at its intersection with West 187th street and to adjust platform elevations through the remaining area affected by the plan, the former change being desired for the purpose of securing an adequate slope for the removal of surface drainage. At this time an objection was presented by the property owners on the ground that it would involve a large amount of work in reregulating and regrading Northern avenue, which work has just been completed as an assessable improvement. To permit of further investigation of the matter the plan was then withdrawn by the Borough President.

The plan now submitted provides for securing a suitable slope by the insertion of a depression in the grade of Northern avenue at a point about 83 feet north of West 187th street and a summit at a point about 101 feet south of West 190th street, the effect of which change will be to fix the legal grade in much closer conformity with that to which the street has been improved, and at the same time to give its surface a suitable slope. I am informed that the owners of property in the vicinity concur in the change, and that they are prepared to carry out the physical work involved to make the street conform with the grades now proposed, which work is essential to the laying of a pavement for which authorization was given in 1912, and which it is understood has been made the subject of a contract.

The remaining changes shown on the map provide for adjusting the platforms at the various intersections affected by it.

I see no reason why the map should not be approved, and would recommend such action. Respectfully,

After hearing Messrs. George C. Wheeler and G. B. Clover, who appeared in favor of the proposed change, and no one else appearing the hearing was closed.

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 6th day of November, 1913, a resolution was adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to change the grades of Northern avenue, between Chittenden avenue and a point about 25 feet north of West 190th street; of West 187th street, between Northern avenue and Fort Washington avenue; of West 190th street, between Northern avenue and Fort Washington avenue; and of Fort Washington avenue at and in the vicinity of its intersections with West 187th street and West 190th street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 4th day of December, 1913, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 4th day of December, 1913; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolution and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 4th day of December, 1913; and

Whereas, All persons interested in such proposed change were afforded an opportunity to be heard thereon, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and of one Commissioner of Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title as herein determined, wherever the same has not heretofore been acquired, for the use of the public for the same purpose, to the lands, tenements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Great Kills road, from Amboy road to Southside boulevard, in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, upon the receipt by him of a rule map, damage map and profile, certified as having been approved by this Board;

Resolved, That no portion of the cost and expense of said proceedings, incurred by reason of the provisions of title 4, chapter 17 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but that the whole of such cost and expense, including the expense of the Bureau of Street Openings, the cost and expense incurred by the President of the Borough of Richmond, in the preparation of rule, damage, benefit and profile maps, for the use thereof; and of the awards, if any, for damages caused by intended regulation and all other expenses and disbursements authorized by section 997 of said title, as amended, shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that due notice was given therein that at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings herein to acquire title to the lands required for this improvement that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would consider a proposed area of assessment as therein described and would give a public hearing thereon upon the 4th day of December, 1913; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons interested in such proposed area of assessment who appeared, and such proposed area of assessment was duly considered by this Board;

Resolved, That the area of assessment for benefit in these proceedings be and is hereby fixed and determined to be as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southeasterly line of Southside boulevard, midway between Villa road and Great Kills road, and running thence northwestwardly and parallel with Great Kills road and its prolongation as this street is laid out where it adjoins Southside boulevard on the north to a point distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southeasterly line of Ocean road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Ocean road; thence northeastwardly and always distant 100 feet southeasterly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of Ocean road to a point distant 100 feet southwesterly from the southwesterly line of Great Kills road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Great Kills road; thence generally northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Great Kills road to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Great Kills road as this street adjoins Amboy road on the north, the said distance being measured at right angles to Great Kills road; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with



Great Kills road and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Amboy road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Amboy road; thence eastwardly and always distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Amboy road to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Great Kills road as this street adjoins Amboy road on the north, the said distance being measured at right angles to Great Kills road; thence southwardly along the said line parallel with Great Kills road to the intersection with the northerly line of Amboy road; thence southeastwardly in a straight line to a point on the southerly line of Amboy road distant 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of Great Kills road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Great Kills road; thence generally southwardly and always distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Great Kills road to a point distant 100 feet southeastwardly from the southeasterly line of Ocean road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Ocean road; thence northeastwardly and always distant 100 feet southeastwardly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of Ocean road to the intersection with a line distant 200 feet northeastwardly from and parallel with the northeasterly line of Great Kills road, as this street is laid out where it adjoins Southside boulevard on the north, the said distance being measured at right angles to Great Kills road; thence southeastwardly along the said line parallel with Great Kills road and along the prolongation of the said line to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southeastwardly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of Southside boulevard, as this street adjoins Great Kills road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Southside boulevard; thence southwestwardly along the said line parallel with Southside boulevard to the intersection with a line at right angles to Southside boulevard, and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwestwardly along the said line at right angles to Southside boulevard to the point or place of beginning.

(The lines of streets hereinbefore referred to which have not been incorporated upon the City plan are intended to be those as in use and commonly recognized.)

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in conformity with the provisions of section 994 of the Charter, that the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to enter into agreements relative to the acceptance of deeds of cession to land lying within the lines of the street to which these proceedings relate, and comprising one-half or more of the street width, at a date subsequent to that on which the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment may have been appointed in these proceedings, provided that the title of the grantor be established to his satisfaction and that the sum of one dollar be accepted as an award for the land so ceded, the said agreement being also conditioned upon the release of all of the remaining abutting land owned by the grantor, extending to the centre line of the block and occupying a position approximately at right angles to the land ceded, from any assessment in the proceedings, except its proportionate share of any and all awards that may be made for the taking of buildings acquired, or awards for damages to buildings affected in and by the said proceedings, and its proportionate share of the expenses incurred in said proceedings to the date when the deed is accepted.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

*Public Hearing on the Proposed Enlargement of the Area of Assessment in the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Amboy Road from a Point 250 Feet Northeastwardly from the Staten Island Railway to a Point 325 Feet Southwestwardly from the Staten Island Railway, Borough of Richmond (Cal. No. 28).*

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been duly advertised.

(At the meeting of the Board on September 25, 1913, a petition for relief from assessment in this proceeding, which was authorized by resolution adopted by the Board on June 1, 1911, and amended on July 11, 1912, was referred to a committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Chief Engineer of the Board. The report of the Committee was presented at the meeting of the Board on November 13, 1913, and December 4, 1913, was set as the date for a public hearing on the area of assessment as recommended in the report.)

Messrs. Walter H. Martin and C. A. Gulowsen appeared in support of the proposed area, but requested further relief. No one else appearing, the hearing was closed.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, after a public hearing held by said Board on December 4, 1913, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby enlarges the area of assessment in the proceeding authorized by the said Board under resolutions adopted on June 1, 1911, and July 11, 1912, for acquiring title to Amboy road between a line at right angles to the centre line of the said Amboy road, passing through a point distant 325 feet southwestwardly from the intersection of the said centre line of Amboy road with the centre line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, the said distance being measured along the said centre line of Amboy road and a line passing through a point at right angles to the centre line of the Amboy road distant 250 feet northeastwardly from the intersection of the said centre line of the said Amboy road with the centre line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, the said distance being measured along the centre line of the Amboy road, Borough of Richmond, so as to comprise the following area:

Beginning at a point on the centre line of Amboy road distant 2,325 feet southwestwardly from the intersection of the centre line of Amboy road with the centre line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, the said distance being measured along the centre line of Amboy road, and running thence northwardly along a line always parallel with Posters road to the intersection with a line always distant 1,000 feet northwardly from and parallel with the northwardly line of Amboy road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Amboy road; thence northeastwardly along the said line parallel with Amboy road to the intersection with a line at right angles to Amboy road and passing through a point on its centre line distant 1,100 feet northeastwardly from its intersection with the northeasterly line of Huguenot avenue, the said distance being measured along the centre line of Amboy road; thence southeastwardly along the said line at right angles to Amboy road to the intersection with a line always distant 1,000 feet southeastwardly from and parallel with the southeasterly line of Amboy road, the said distance being measured at right angles to Amboy road; thence southwestwardly along the said line parallel with Amboy road to the intersection with a line always parallel with Seguin avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwestwardly along the said line parallel with Seguin avenue to the point or place of beginning.

(The lines of streets herein referred to which are not incorporated upon the City map are intended to be those as in use and as commonly recognized.)

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

*Laying Out a Public Park to Comprise the Triangular Plot Bounded by Broadway, West 174th Street and Wadsworth Avenue, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 29).*

(At the meeting of the Board on October 30, 1913, this matter was laid over for two weeks, and the Comptroller was requested to endeavor in the meantime to secure an upset price on the property. On November 13, 1913, the matter was laid over for one week, and on November 20, 1913, it was laid over for two weeks.)

Mr. H. De Forest Baldwin appeared in opposition to, and Mr. John Geis, Mr. W. J. Campbell, Hon. Wm. S. Bennet and Mr. Reginald Pelham Bolton appeared in favor of the proposed park.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan moved that the Board direct that 50 per cent. of the cost of acquiring title to the proposed park be placed upon The City of New York, which motion was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—The President of the Borough of Manhattan—2.

Negative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—14.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan then offered the following, and moved that it be adopted with the understanding that the entire cost of acquiring title to the proposed park will be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 26th day of June, 1913, a resolution was adopted proposing to change the map or plan of The City of New York so as to lay out a public park in the area bounded by Broadway, West 174th street and Wadsworth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and appointing a hearing at a meeting of this Board to be held on the 25th day of September, 1913, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., at which meeting such proposed action would be considered by this Board, and requesting a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed action would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 25th day of September, 1913; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolution and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 25th day of September, 1913; and

Whereas, All persons interested in such proposed change were afforded an opportunity to be heard thereon, and such proposed change was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest to change the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out a public park in the area bounded by Broadway, West 174th street and Wadsworth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, does hereby favor the same so as to make the aforesaid change in accordance with a map or plan bearing the signature of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and dated February 18, 1913.

The resolution was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

*Playground Facilities in the District Bounded by 8th Avenue, 149th Street, the Harlem River and 130th Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 30).*

(A petition for the establishment of a playground in this district was referred to the Public Recreation Commission by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1913.)

The Secretary presented the following:

Public Recreation Commission of The City of New York, 51 Chambers Street, Room 1001, New York, November 26, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—We have received a communication from Mr. Joseph Haag, Secretary of your Board, under date of October 31, 1913, transmitting copy of a communication from Mr. Eugene Kinckle Jones, Associate Director National League on Urban Conditions among Negroes, requesting the establishment of a playground in the district bounded by 125th street, 145th street, 8th avenue and the Harlem River, Borough of Manhattan, which was referred to the Public Recreation Commission by your Board on October 30, 1913.

In June, 1912, your Honorable Body referred to us a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting acquisition of property north of 136th street and east of Lenox avenue for a recreation centre.

We made an investigation into the neighborhood and submitted a report to you under date of June 25, 1912, recommending and stating that a playground was badly needed in this district, and that the best and most suitable location is the property located east of 5th avenue, between 138th and 139th streets, subject to removal of the dump and other matters as therein stated. We would respectfully refer you to such report, copy of which is herein enclosed. Respectfully,

Public Recreation Commission of The City of New York, 51 Chambers Street, Room 1001, New York, June 25, 1912.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—In response to the reference by your Honorable Body of a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting the immediate acquisition by the City of property north of 136th street and east of Lenox avenue, Borough of Manhattan, for a recreation centre, I am authorized by the Public Recreation Commission to submit the following report:

An investigation of the locality in question discloses that there is at present no public playground or park nearer than Mount Morris Park, located at 124th street and 5th avenue on the south, St. Nicholas Park and Jasper Oval on the west and McCombs Dam Park on the north. These parks are too far away, and in some cases separated by such natural boundary lines as the river on the north and the bluff on the west as to be practically inaccessible to any but the largest children. Furthermore, these parks are already inadequate to provide facilities for the population immediately surrounding it.

It is estimated that the population within the district described in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen is approximately 100,000. This population is largely colored, and is living for the most part in tenement houses from five to seven stories in height. Public School No. 100, located near the corner of 138th street and 5th avenue, is within the district, and has an average attendance of somewhat over 3,000 children. There is also an elementary school located just outside the district at Lenox avenue and 134th street, with an average daily attendance of 1,678. Please find enclosed a diagram of the district in question with the schools shown thereon.

It is the judgment of the Public Recreation Commission that a playground is badly needed for this district, and that the best and most suitable location for such a playground is the property located east of 5th avenue, between 138th and 139th streets, subject, however, to three conditions, namely (1) that the dump at the foot of 139th street be removed elsewhere; (2) that 139th street be closed and used as part of the playground; (3) that forty feet of the bridge approach, now owned by the City and marked as section "G" on the plan submitted herewith as exhibit "B," be included within the proposed playground.

This would make available a plot 200 feet in width, 310 feet in length on its northern border, and 385 feet in length on its southern border.

The dump in question should be moved in any event, as the wagons are required to pass the public school and the dump itself is a menace to the health and sanitation of the entire neighborhood. East 139th street is not now used, and will serve no useful purpose hereafter particularly if the dump is removed. The forty-foot strip of the bridge approach lies north of the bridge abutment, and is not necessary to the approach as ample room remains. (See exhibit "B" attached hereto).

The owner of that part of the tract described above lying between the southern line of 139th street and the northern line of the bridge approach has submitted through his representative an offer which is enclosed herewith and marked exhibit "C." The total price asked is \$239,300, and compares favorably, as shown in Mr. Minzie's letter, with the records of prices paid by the City for lands in the immediate vicinity.

The private tract alone is hardly large enough for a playground, but when the two City tracts are added thereto a plot will be obtained which can be developed and equipped as a useful recreation centre. Furthermore, the approach to the bridge, the waterfront and the entire neighborhood can be improved from an unsightly and unsanitary spot to one of beauty and usefulness, and at the same time the City will gain valuable waterfront rights.

On motion the matter was referred to the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

*Changing the Map or Plan of The City of New York by Widening Fulton Street, from the Flatbush Avenue Extension to Ashland Place; and Ashland Place, from Fulton Street to a point About 91 Feet North of Lafayette Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 31).*

(At the meeting of the Board on November 6, 1913, the Secretary was directed to request the Public Service Commission to take no steps regarding the leasing or dis-



posal of the property acquired in connection with the construction of the rapid transit railroad, required for this proposed widening, pending further conference with the Transit Conference Committee of this Board (consisting of the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond), in reference thereto, and until that committee has made its report in the matter to this Board.)

(At the meeting of the Board on November 20, 1913, the matter was laid over until December 4, 1913.)

The Secretary presented a communication from the Prespect Heights Taxpayers' Association favoring the widening of Flatbush avenue as proposed.

On motion of the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn the matter was again laid over; pending the presentation of the report of the Transit Conference Committee.

*Changing the Lines of Newkirk Avenue, Between Coney Island Avenue and 1st Street, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 32).*

The Secretary presented the following resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, and report of the Chief Engineer:

*In the Local Board of the Flatbush District.*

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement, to wit: Changing width of Newkirk avenue, between Coney Island avenue and 1st street, from 60 feet to 50 feet, has been received by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Flatbush District, hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an alteration in the map or plan of The City of New York by reducing the width from 60 feet to 50 feet, and by providing for a 30-foot roadway for Newkirk avenue from Coney Island avenue to 1st street.

Adopted by the Local Board of the Flatbush District February 14, 1913, Commissioner Pounds and Aldermen Bosse and Morrison voting in favor thereof.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on February 14, 1913, recommending a change in the City Plan by decreasing the width of Newkirk avenue in the block between Coney Island avenue and 1st street from 60 feet to 50 feet, and also recommending that the roadway width in this block be fixed at 30 feet.

In 1905 provision was made for increasing the width of Newkirk avenue as previously recognized in the section east of Coney Island avenue to 60 feet, and for extending the street westwardly with the same width two blocks to Ocean parkway. Proceedings for acquiring title to the street were authorized on October 22, 1909, and the rule and damage maps were approved on October 3, 1912. Under the terms of resolutions subsequently adopted, provision was made for the construction of a sewer and for paving this block of the street, the Corporation Counsel having advised that it had been dedicated to public use. The abutting property is now almost wholly improved, and the work as carried out has been made to conform with the City Plan. An old one-story frame office building located at the Coney Island avenue intersection appears to encroach upon the street lines.

At the meeting of May 15, 1913, a report was presented concerning a similar narrowing desired by the property owners in the block between 1st street and Ocean parkway, at which time it was pointed out that the case was one which had been fully covered by the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 6, 1913, under which it was provided that 60 feet should be the minimum width for a street having a length of over 1,500 feet, excepting where the damage to buildings would warrant recognition of a lesser width. Action on this map was deferred at the request of the Borough President.

The resolution now presented is accompanied by a petition in favor of the narrowing and also by a communication which appears to have been signed by a large number of the property owners, whose names appear upon the petition, requesting that their signatures be withdrawn from it.

In view of the fact that the dedication of the street has been established, it would appear that if the street width is decreased the expense to which the property owners will be subjected would be identical with that which they would be called upon to bear if the full street width were to be retained, and that by reason of the policy heretofore fixed by the Board the map change could not properly be favored.

I would therefore recommend that the resolution be referred back to the Local Board without approval.

*Closing and Discontinuing Old Eldert Lane, from Glenmore Avenue to Old South Road, and Old South Road, from Old Eldert Lane to Eldert Lane, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 33).*

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and report of the Chief Engineer:

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Brooklyn, July 14, 1913.

Mr. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—A petition, signed by W. R. Russell, Greene, N. Y., and George U. Forbell, No. 561 Grant avenue, this Borough, dated January 6, 1913, was received in this department for the closing of Eldert lane within the block bounded by Glenmore avenue, Pitkin avenue, Grant avenue and Enfield street, copy of which I herewith enclose. A request was made to close also Old South road, lying within the district aforesaid.

These are parts of old roads in use for many years. At present very little used on account of the development of other streets as laid out on the City map. Our Local Boards, during the latter part of 1909, adopted a resolution to close these old roads, but same was not approved by the Board of Estimate at the time this matter came up for consideration, December 17, 1909, owing to an opinion from the Corporation Counsel to the effect that streets not included in the City plan when originally adopted were therefore discontinued and that the discontinuance would become effective as soon as streets forming the boundary of the block which they traversed were thrown open to the public.

Action was withheld on the petition to close Old South road until such time as Eldert lane, now Enfield street, should be acquired by the City through condemnation proceedings, or by deed of cession, for the purpose of obtaining a street to substitute for Old South road, and that there could be no question of access to property that might be cut off by the closing of old road.

The Corporation Counsel has accepted deeds of cession to Eldert lane, from Glenmore avenue to Pitkin avenue, which will remove any objection to closing the old roads in question. This cession of the lands in Eldert lane from Glenmore to Pitkin avenues provides a way over lands acquired for street purposes to property formerly requiring old Eldert lane and Old South road as means of access.

I now forward map, showing proposed changes, and entitled "Map or Plan, showing the closing and discontinuing of Eldert lane from Glenmore avenue to the Old South road; and the Old South road, from Eldert lane to Eldert lane, in the 26th Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York."

I would ask early consideration of the above mentioned matter. Yours very truly,

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, bearing date of July 14, 1913, requesting the approval of a map showing the closing and discontinuing of Old Eldert lane from Glenmore avenue to the Old South road, and of the Old South road from Old Eldert lane to Eldert lane.

In this communication the Borough President advises that the streets to be discontinued were old roads which have been in use for many years, neither of which

has been incorporated within the street system of the Borough. On December 17, 1909, similar resolutions of the Local Board were disapproved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the ground that the streets could not be discontinued, inasmuch as they were not shown upon the street plan of this territory when it was originally adopted. Since this date the Street Opening Law has been amended in such a way as to admit of considering cases of this character for which provision had not heretofore been made, and it is understood that the approval of the plan would release such title as the City may now have in the area to be discontinued from highway use, it being assumed that this title is limited to an easement. I have suggested to the President of the Borough that in case the ownership of the fee has been lost, as might easily be the case in view of the ancient character of the streets, no benefit could result through the extinguishment of the easement title, which it was also assumed might have some substantial value, and it was also noted that the abandonment of such title as the City had in the property without compensation would very likely result in its use for such purposes as might reasonably be expected in cases where an imperfect title exists. It was suggested that if the title to the fee had not been lost, the City might reasonably exact from its owner some compensation for the rights to be conveyed through the adoption of the plan, such compensation to include loss of taxes by reason of exemption which may have been extended, as well as assessments which may have been imposed but not paid. He was therefore asked to advise the Board whether information could be presented to show that title could be established in the adjoining owners if the plan was favored, and whether they were willing to enter into negotiations relative to the terms to be fixed for the closing and with the understanding that this adjustment would be made by the Department of Finance. In response to this request the Acting Commissioner of Public Works states that the suggested investigation of ownership would involve a search of the records, for which no force is available, and he suggests that this matter might more properly be made the subject of an arrangement with a title company, or that the map be approved with the understanding that the Mayor would withhold his signature until satisfactory arrangements had been made with the adjoining property owners.

In my judgment it would be inadvisable to commit the City in any way to the plan until more definite information is available relative to the ownership of the property affected by it, and I would recommend that the map be disapproved, but with the understanding that it might be again submitted whenever the information is presented to show that the owner or owners of the fee can be located and that they are prepared to pay to the City such amount as may be deemed to represent the value of the City's interest in the area affected by it.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of October 31, 1913, requesting the approval of a map showing a change proposed in the grade of the street system within the territory bounded by Thedford avenue, Kimball avenue, Freedom avenue, Roanoke avenue, Rockaway boulevard, Peconic avenue, Sutter avenue, Ocean avenue and Dalrymple avenue.

This plan provides for adjusting the grade of Liberty avenue and of Rockaway boulevard at their intersection with the right of way of the Rockaway Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad in such a way as to here make the street grade coincide with that of the railroad, the effect of the change being to retain the existing grade crossing and at the same time harmonize with the grade to which improvements have been made on Liberty avenue. In each case the grade is to be raised from 4 to 5 feet, the treatment being identical with that already adopted by the Board for the adjoining section on the north, it being understood that steps would be taken to make a corresponding modification in the plan heretofore proposed for elevating the railroad when grade crossings are eliminated.

As a result of these changes it has been found necessary to insert summits in the block of Ocean avenue, between Kimball avenue and Liberty avenue, and also in the block between Liberty avenue and Rockaway boulevard, in order to secure surface drainage. Advantage is taken of the opportunity to make a similar adjustment in the grade of the block of Lawn avenue and of Freedom avenue, between Liberty avenue and Roanoke avenue, through the insertion of a summit approximately in the middle of the block. A number of buildings have been erected upon the abutting property on Ocean avenue, between Kimball avenue and Liberty avenue, a few of which will probably be damaged as a result of the grade now proposed. This damage appears unavoidable inasmuch as the grade to which the street has been improved made no provision for the removal of surface water.

I see no reason why the map should not be approved, and would recommend such action after a public hearing.

I would also suggest that a copy of the plan be sent to the Public Service Commission, in order that the Liberty avenue change may be recognized in the preparation of plans for the elevated railroad to be built in this street, and that the change in the grade of this street and of Rockaway boulevard may also be given recognition when action is taken in the matter of separating the grade of these streets from that of the Long Island railroad. Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held on November 20, 1913, a hearing was given concerning a district of assessment suggested by your Engineer in the matter of a proceeding proposed for acquiring title to the widening of Fulton avenue from Mills street to Welling street, and of Main street from Grand avenue to Van Alst avenue, Borough of Queens. At this time it was pointed out that the proposed widening formed a part of a plan which had been adopted by the Board, with the understanding that when opening proceedings were instituted they would include all of the streets affected by it in order to avoid a double allowance for going parcels and for damaging buildings. It was also noted that a map had been submitted by the Borough President showing further modifications in the lines of Fulton avenue, action upon which should precede the institution of the opening proceeding. Action in the matter was therefore delayed pending the consideration of the map changes.

The readjustment of the street plan of this locality has been made the subject of consideration by the Board at frequent intervals since the close of 1906. An objection to the original plan was raised by your Engineer on the ground that the proposed widening of Fulton avenue should be limited at the west by Mills street instead of at the water-front as then proposed, and that it should include provision for increasing the width of Main street between Taylor street and Grand avenue from 50 feet to 65 feet, to conform with the width fixed for the adjoining portion of this street. This recommendation was concurred in by a select committee, the report of which was approved by the Board on January 12, 1911. In accordance with the recommendations then made, a plan was subsequently prepared by the Borough President, and on March 14, 1912, was adopted by the Board, thus carrying out the original plan, modified along the lines indicated, and also making provision for extending Grand avenue westwardly to Stevens street, the changes in street layout as thus approved including not only the widening of Fulton avenue and Main street between the limits to which the opening proceeding was intended to relate, but also making provision for widening Stevens street, for extending Grand avenue, and for widening Taylor street.

Under date of May 21, 1913, the Secretary to the President forwarded a plan showing a change in the lines of Fulton avenue through the three blocks between the Boulevard and Mills street, as well as the further widening of Grand avenue and Stevens street at their junction, and the laying out of a public park to include the block bounded by Fulton avenue, Main street, Grand avenue and Stevens street. The Fulton avenue changes are all of a minor character, and are stated to be desired in order to avoid damage to buildings on the northerly side of the street. The public park shown on the plan comprises an area of about 0.4 of an acre. It is occupied by a large number of buildings, all of which will be practically destroyed in carrying out the proposed widening of Fulton avenue and of Main street. The land is valued at about \$33,000.

The acquisition of title to the widening of Fulton avenue and Main street was considered by the Board on November 21, 1912, and was at that time referred to a select committee. The report of this committee was presented at the Board meeting of October 23, 1913, and in it the Board was advised that the expense of carrying out the proceeding was deemed too great to be borne by a local area, and that the improvement was considered as one of more than local benefit.

When the change was originally determined upon the Astoria Ferry served as an important factor in the transportation facilities of the Astoria section of the borough. Since that date the opening of the Queensboro Bridge and the plan now being carried out for a subway in Debevoise avenue must be recognized as ultimately having to a large extent the effect of depriving this ferry of its importance, and I believe that it may be safely stated that the need of traffic arteries in this section will be less pronounced with the lapse of time, and particularly in Fulton avenue. From an examination of the tax books, it would appear that the building damage involved in increasing the width of this street from 66 feet to 80 feet in the section between Main street and the Boulevard, and to 100 feet between the Boulevard and Mills street; as proposed by the plan, would amount to about \$36,000, of which amount about \$10,000 represents the value of buildings which would be affected by the Main street widening.

In my judgment, and in recognition of the objections raised by the property owners to the expense involved in carrying out the plan, the reasonable needs of this locality could be fully met through the widening of Main street as shown upon the plans heretofore adopted, and the acquisition of Taylor street, as originally mapped. I would therefore suggest that unless the property owners within the area of assessment as heretofore proposed are prepared to assume the entire expense of carrying out the plan as heretofore adopted, with the amendments now under consideration, the entire matter be referred back to the Borough President, with the suggestion that a new map be prepared making provision for retaining the Main street widening, for restoring the lines of Fulton avenue to conform with those now in use, for discontinuing the Taylor street widening, and for discontinuing Grand avenue from Main street to Stevens street, as well as Stevens street between Fulton avenue and Main street. In this case the proposed proceeding would relate only to the Main street widening and to the extension of Taylor street to Main street, the carrying out of which would involve damage to buildings having an aggregate assessed valuation of about \$59,000, of which \$7,000 relate to buildings affected by the Taylor street proceeding. All of these buildings, it might be noted, are also included in the proceeding which would have to be carried out under the plan as heretofore adopted.

In the belief that the attitude of the property owners relative to the improvements now under consideration should largely govern the action of the Board, I would recommend that the plan be made the subject of a public hearing, but that it be not approved except with the distinct understanding that the entire expense of carrying it out will be met through a local assessment.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Secretary to the President of the Borough of Queens, bearing date of October 27, 1913, requesting the approval of a tentative plan showing the street system proposed for the territory bounded approximately by the City line, the main line of the Long Island Railroad, Springfield boulevard (Springfield road), 94th avenue (Langdon street), 217th street (Inglewood road), 91st avenue (Hultz avenue), 215th street, Hillside avenue, 214th place, Whitehall terrace, Hollis Court boulevard (Queens road), Union turnpike, Rosedale boulevard, 73d avenue (Black Stump road), 195th street, 67th avenue, 192d street, North Hempstead turnpike, Utopia parkway, Hope avenue (Lawrence road), Wheaton lane, Hilbert avenue, Cemetery lane (Anburndale road), Jackson avenue (Broadway), Beechhurst avenue (Whitestone road), Crocheron avenue, Bell boulevard (Bell avenue), Bayside avenue (Bradish avenue) and Little Neck Bay, comprising an area of about 8,300 acres. It includes the Broadway-Flushing, Bayside, Douglaston, Little Neck and Creedmoor sections of the borough, together with a portion of the Village of Queens, and a large intervening undeveloped area which is traversed by old highways generally having a width of 50 feet. The northerly portion of the territory is crossed by the Northside Division of the Long Island Railroad, while the Main Line Division forms a part of the southerly boundary. It is also traversed by the Motor parkway route, and by the abandoned Stewart Railroad leading from Floral Park on the main line to the Northside Division at Flushing.

#### Treatment of Existing Developments.

An effort has been made in the plan to fully recognize improvements already made in developed sections, with provision, however, for making a necessary increase in the width of streets occupying the position of traffic arteries, and for fixing a minimum width of 60 feet in all cases excepting in the Douglaston section.

The treatment contemplated for the Douglaston peninsula will locate the principal approaches along the line of the street bordering the water-front, for which a width of 70 feet is proposed. Practically all of the remaining streets have been improved at a width of 50 feet, and, in view of the isolation of the section as well as of its residential character, it would appear that an adequate street width for the future needs will be insured, notwithstanding that some of the narrow streets will have a length greater than that fixed by the Board in its resolution governing the matter of minimum street width.

In the Bayside section it is planned to increase the width of Crocheron avenue, 29th avenue (Ashburton avenue) and 221st street (Bayside boulevard) to 70 feet through sections now having a lesser width. These streets form portions of a trolley railroad route and the widening appears to have been occasioned partly as a result of this use, and partly because of the position which they occupy in the plan. A similar widening is proposed for Wainscott avenue (Warburton avenue), which street forms a part of the route proposed for the extension of a subway line to Bayside. North of Jackson avenue it is planned to increase the width of Bell avenue from 60 feet to 80 feet, while to the south the width is to be made 100 feet, the street here forming a part of an important north and south traffic artery.

In the Broadway-Flushing section provision is made for widening Crocheron avenue, Ashburton avenue and Warburton avenue to conform with the treatment proposed in the Bayside section, and also for widening Lonsdale avenue (Gardiner street and Stewart avenue) and 204th street (Highland street and Highland avenue) from 60 feet to 80 feet.

In the Queens section the width of Springfield boulevard (Lincoln avenue), Winchester boulevard (Springfield road) and Gettysburg street (Hamilton avenue) is, in each case, to be increased from 60 feet to 80 feet, while that of Braddock avenue (Rocky Hill road) is to be increased from 50 feet to 80 feet. Provision is also made for widening Jamaica avenue (Jericho turnpike) from 60 feet to 100 feet; this street through the greater portion of the length covered by the plan forms a part of the boundary line of the City, and while the proposed widening falls partly within the limits of Nassau County, the greater portion of it is within the City limits.

One of the most important widenings of existing streets is the one relating to Jackson avenue (Broadway), which, as now in use and improved, has a width of about 50 feet. A map providing for increasing its width to 100 feet through its entire length east of Flushing was considered by the Board at its meeting of April 18, 1912, and after a public hearing was referred to a Select Committee, objections to the plan having been made by the property owners on the ground that the existing width was adequate for the requirements. The plan now submitted ratifies the treatment indicated on the plan heretofore submitted other than by making a few adjustments in grade.

From an inspection of the ground it is believed that the changes proposed in the treatment of the developed sections can be effected with but little damage to buildings, excepting in the cases of Broadway and Bell avenue at Bayside. The important positions which these streets occupy on the plan would appear to justify the treatment proposed for them.

#### Grand Central Parkway.

Provision is made for continuing the Grand Central parkway, as shown under the tentative plan for the Hollis section, across the central portion of the area now under consideration with a width of 150 feet. The street here occupies a position approximately coinciding with the backbone of the island, traversing the most elevated section of the ridge. It is understood that in planning the adjoining sections to the west steps will be taken to secure a connection between this street and Queens boulevard



approximately at the intersection of the latter with Union turnpike, in which case an important and attractive boulevard will be afforded for pleasure traffic toward Nassau County, although no provision appears to have yet been made for extending the street beyond the City line as required to secure an adequate outlet. The latter criticism applies to a number of other traffic arteries shown upon the plan, the carrying out of which will require the co-operation of the authorities in the adjoining county.

#### Treatment of Old Country Roads.

The area is crossed by Little Neck road, Clinton avenue, Rocky Hill road, Queens road, Alley road and Black Stump road, all of which have been merged into the street plan, although in several instances their tortuous character has made it necessary to break them up into a series of independent streets of varying widths. In most instances, however, the old street is to be made into an important artery of adequate width and continuing along the same general line. In a few instances it has been found necessary to omit old roads from the street system, but from such information as is available it would appear reasonable to assume that title to the fee in these discontinued sections can be established by the abutting owners, and that the proposed closing can be effected without deprivation of frontage or damage to buildings.

Many of the traffic arteries shown on the plan form continuations of streets laid out on tentative maps for adjoining areas on the south and west, while it is understood that still other important extensions will be provided for in the map now being prepared for what is known as the Black Stump section forming a portion of the westerly boundary.

For the more elevated areas adjoining the City line a curvilinear street system is proposed, this evidently being based on a study of the topography and an adjustment suited to the slopes traversed.

#### Street Names.

Following the same procedure as was observed in preparing the tentative plan for what is known as the Hollis section, it is proposed to assign numerical names to the streets and avenues, the former generally having a northerly and southerly direction, while the latter occupy a position at right angles thereto. The avenues extend from what is designated as 22d avenue to 96th avenue, while the streets include numbers from 184 to 271. Proper names are assigned to a few of the more important arteries, as well as to the curvilinear streets and others having diagonal positions. The Board is informed that this system is based on the assignment of No. 1 to the most extreme westerly street and to the most northerly avenue of the Borough. Pending the preparation of final maps and the development of the sparsely settled sections, the nomenclature proposed is, in my judgment, commendable, but in view of the lack of continuity of what must be the general plan for the borough, as well as the desirability of retaining distinctive names for identifying the various localities, I do not believe that the system should be permanently adhered to.

#### Railroads.

Under orders heretofore issued by the Public Service Commission, provision has been made for the elimination of the existing grade crossings at Springfield boulevard (Creed avenue) and at 222d street (Madison avenue) on the main line of the Long Island Railroad. The plan now submitted ratifies the treatment prescribed by the Public Service Commission, as well as that indicated upon final maps heretofore adopted by the Board for these crossings.

The elimination of grade crossings along the Northside Division of the Long Island Railroad in the section west of the Broadway crossing is now being effected in conformity with other determinations made by the Public Service Commission. Between this point and Beechhurst avenue (Whitestone road), the relationship proposed between the railroad and intersected streets is indicated on the tentative plan for the Whitestone section, which was adopted by the Board on July 11, 1912, this being based on elevating the railroad and depressing the streets. It is now proposed to depress the railroad from Whitestone road eastwardly to 221st street (10th street), from which point it is to be elevated as far as the Douglaston station, east of which approximately the present grade is to be retained. Grade crossings are now in use at Beechhurst avenue (Whitestone road), Bell boulevard (Bell avenue), 216th street (4th street), Main avenue and 250th street (Old House Landing road), while a highway bridge has been constructed at 221st street (10th street). Under the proposed plan provision is made for the separation of street and railroad grades through the construction of eight over-crossings and five under-crossings, together with one tunnel for pedestrian traffic; these crossings are intended to replace those now in use and at the same time provide such additional crossings as are needed to secure adequate communication between territories on opposite sides of the railroad.

The area occupied by and adjoining the old Stewart Railroad leading from Flushing to Floral Park has been treated similarly to that which would be accorded to it if it were in railroad use, the route being flanked on each side by a parallel street, thereby decreasing the number of crossings which would otherwise be required. This recognition appears, however, to have been limited to the fixing of lines, no recognition having been given to grades other than to fix elevations for the streets to conform with the topography. From such information as is available it would appear that the Railroad Company was incorporated in 1871, and that in 1879 the portion of it between Creedmoor and Floral Park was acquired by the Long Island Railroad Company, at which time the adjoining section to the west was abandoned for railroad purposes. Up to about two years ago the former section was used to provide access to the State Rifle Range at Creedmoor, since which time this branch appears to have been used by the railroad only for storage purposes. In preparing the map it appears to have been assumed that the treatment proposed for the streets in the vicinity of the old railroad could be effected without recognition of railroad rights or the application of the Railroad Law, but I am informed that the retention of the route is due to a belief that at some future time it will be found necessary in order to afford adequate transportation facilities.

Before the development is carried out along the lines proposed and before further mapping is undertaken in the vicinity of the railroad, it would seem desirable to secure from the Corporation Counsel an opinion concerning the power of the City to lay out and acquire streets across the abandoned railroad land.

#### Motor Parkway.

A strip of land has been acquired for the Motor Parkway across the entire area affected by the plan, and the parkway has been built in the section east of Springfield Boulevard (Rocky Hill road). Crossings, having a width of about 50 feet, have been constructed to carry the parkway over Little Neck road, Commonwealth avenue (Clinton avenue) and Winchester boulevard (Alley road), with adequate clearance. It is now proposed to widen these crossings to conform with the width to be assigned to the streets, and at the same time to lay out fifteen additional crossings within the limits of the area included in the plan, the street grades, in each case, being fixed to conform with the topography, it being assumed that the grades of the parkway, if separated from those fixed for the streets, would give way to such extent as might be required. Provision has been made for a marginal street on each side of the parkway with an intervening area between the street and the parkway lands which will admit of suitable development.

#### Parks.

The Alley Pond Park comprises the most important reservation of this character shown on the plan. It includes the territory bounded approximately by Springfield boulevard, 46th avenue, Harnay lane, Jackson avenue (Broadway), 225th street, 46th avenue, Easthampton road, Jackson avenue (Broadway), 230th street, 46th avenue, Hanford parkway (Forest drive and Alley road), Easthampton road, Amador road, Cloverdale boulevard, Garland street (Hampton court), and 56th avenue (Oakland avenue), having an area of about 317 acres. The park includes the Alley Pond, together with the valley of Alley creek, and a tributary from the west, as well as the most precipitous portions of the adjoining slopes. The Bayside pumping station of the Department of Water Supply, including the Oakland Lake, falls within the limits of the westerly arm of the park, the City ownership here comprising about eighteen acres, while in the main valley there is located the driven well station of the Citizens' Water Supply Company, occupying an area of about 16 acres. The westerly extension appears to have been designed in order to absorb the City's holdings, these immediately adjoining the Oakland Golf Club property, the subdivision of which into a street system is understood to be in harmony with the lines proposed prior to its use for golf purposes. The park comprises a picturesque area of irregular topography, partly wooded, and partly occupied by Alley pond and the lake already referred to, and by a tidal estuary. The site is an admirable one for park purposes, and the acquisition of the property could, in my judgment, be made in part a City and in part a Borough charge, it being understood that the property owners in the locality would also be called upon to assume a portion of the expense.

It is also planned to include in the park system the irregular area between the

marginal street and the high water mark of Little Neck Bay at Douglaston, this comprising a total of about 4.8 acres.

On March 3, 1911, the Local Board of the Jamaica District adopted a resolution requesting that proceedings be instituted for acquiring for park purposes a parcel of property north of Lamartine avenue, extending from Bell avenue to Little Neck Bay, with an area of about 57 acres, but owing to the failure to submit a plan making provision for incorporating this park upon the City map, the matter has not yet been considered by the Board. In the tentative map now under discussion it is proposed to locate the westerly boundary at 214th place (Franklin avenue) and the southerly boundary near Crocheron avenue, these limits comprising an area of about 30 acres. The westerly portion of the property is occupied by a number of buildings, and a parcel within its limits has been acquired for school purposes. While the area appears to be in part adapted to park use, it could, in my judgment, be replaced by one more remote from the developed sections where equal advantages could be secured with a substantial decrease in expense. In view of the purely local character of this park it would appear reasonable to insist that if it be retained in the map, it be with the understanding that the expense of acquiring it will be wholly assumed by an area in its immediate vicinity.

Eight parks are planned along the line of the Grand Central parkway, these being located at its intersections with Hollis Court boulevard, Spencer avenue, Springfield boulevard, Union turnpike, Southern parkway and Gurley lane, comprising a total area of 20.5 acres. In most instances these parks appear to be intended to absorb slopes too precipitous to be traversed by streets or to admit of development. Three of the parks at Gurley lane include Payne's Hill, with an elevation of 267 feet, comprise the most elevated land within the limits of the Borough.

Provision is also made in the plan for laying out 31 parks, having an aggregate area of about 2.7 acres, these generally comprising small triangles formed at the intersections of important arteries.

About 200 acres in the section north of Creedmoor are owned by the State of New York, having originally been acquired for use as a rifle range. No attempt has been made to subdivide this area other than by three streets which are needed to open up adequate means of communication, and it is apparently assumed that the City will eventually obtain the rights now owned by the State and will assign the property to park use.

#### Water-front.

Aside from an extension of the bulkhead line along the westerly side of Little Neck Bay as far north as Crocheron avenue, and the laying out of a proposed basin at the head of Little Neck Bay between Bayside and Douglaston and of a small basin between Douglaston and Little Neck, no provision has been made for a commercial water-front development, it being evidently assumed that the remaining area will always be of a residential character and free from the invasion of commerce.

In my judgment the plan is a commendable one, and I would recommend its approval after an informal hearing. I would also suggest that a copy of the communication from the Engineer of the Franchise Bureau relative to the history of the old Stewart Railroad be sent to the Corporation Counsel, with the request that he advise the Board whether any rights for the operation of this railroad are still in existence. Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York, Bureau of Franchises, November 7, 1913.

Mr. ARTHUR S. TUTTLE, Deputy Chief Engineer:

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 5th inst, requesting information as to the status of the old Stewart Branch of the Long Island Railroad extending from the main line at Floral Park westwardly through Creedmoor to a point near Flushing Cemetery. In your absence to-day I have had Mr. O. W. Hill of your office in consultation regarding this matter, and as I stated to him at the time, there is a mass of information in this office which has never been worked into shape, a brief outline of which is as follows:

The Central Railroad Company of Long Island (Stewart Railroad) filed articles of association in the Secretary of State's office March 4, 1871, pursuant to the Railroad Law (chapter 140 of the Laws of 1850). The road intended to be constructed, maintained and operated by this company commenced in or near the

—Village of Flushing in the County of Queens at a point on the line of the Flushing and North Side Railroad east of the Flushing Creek drawbridge and runs from thence to a point on the western boundary line of the lands of A. T. Stewart in the Town of Hempstead, running thence eastward to a point in or near Farmingdale, and thence to Bethpage with a branch from the main line in the Village of Hempstead to be located as to form a practical junction with such main line; also with a branch from the main line from a point near Flushing Creek to a point in the Town of Newtown, near the head of Flushing Bay and near where Flushing Creek enters into such bay. The proposed road from Flushing to Bethpage is 25 miles in length or thereabouts and the proposed branch to the Village of Hempstead is one mile in length or thereabouts, making a total length of road 27 miles or thereabouts.

The Central Railroad was constructed and operated on or about January 1, 1873. Pursuant to chapter 917 of the Laws of 1869, the Central Railroad Company, with other companies, consolidated on June 19, 1874, to form the Flushing, North Shore and Central Railroad Company. Mortgage foreclosure proceedings were instituted against the company and in 1879 the title passed to E. P. Fabbri, who, in October, 1879, conveyed to the Long Island Railroad Company a piece of railroad between Creedmoor and the crossing of the main line of the Long Island Railroad, thus giving the Long Island a spur from Creedmoor to Floral Park. A piece in the Village of Flushing was later conveyed to the Long Island City and Flushing Railroad Company (Railroad Report, 1880, page 474).

The Flushing, North Shore and Central Railroad Company, on May 1, 1876, leased to the Long Island Railroad Company its property (Railroad Report, 1876, page 604).

On June 1, 1892, the heirs of A. T. Stewart conveyed to the Long Island Railroad (which was then operating as lessee) the road from Floral Park to Farmingdale and Bethpage, with branch from Garden City to Hempstead, this portion of the railroad being wholly outside the City limits.

In February, 1879, the legal representatives of Stewart instituted proceedings because of non-payment of rent to repossess themselves of 15.3 miles of road, which was held under lease for fifty years from A. T. Stewart. The possession of the road was awarded them by the court.

From the information available, the railroad to the west of Creedmoor was apparently abandoned in or about the year 1879, and the road since that year has not been operated, excepting a small portion to the east of Flushing Creek, which apparently is that part conveyed to the Long Island Railroad, as mentioned above. The portion of the railroad known as the Creedmoor Branch and lying at or near the intersection of the City line, running east and crossing the main line of the Long Island Railroad east of Hinsdale station, was apparently operated up to two years ago by the Railroad Company for the purpose of reaching the National Rifle Range Association's ground. Since the abandonment of that ground as a rifle range by the State military authorities, this branch has been used for the purpose of storing freight cars.

The various atlases, tax maps and lists in this office show the continuation of the line to the west of Creedmoor as an abandoned roadbed of the Central Railroad.

In your communication you request my views as to whether the rights of the company in the territory west of Creedmoor should be respected in planning streets in such territory. It is my personal opinion that the exact status of the property lying within the old right of way from Flushing to Creedmoor should first be determined and whether or not the property was acquired in fee or the railroad easements obtained from the abutting owners and in that event the City could proceed to the opening of streets across the right of way as is usual in such cases. If the Railroad Company, however, owns the old right of way in fee, it would seem best in my mind before the tentative plan for a street system is adopted to refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether or not The City of New York could proceed to condemn this property without consideration being given to the fact that it had been acquired for railroad purposes and abandoned for twenty-five years, no certificate of abandonment having been filed by the railroad company or its successors.

The following are the maps affecting the route of the Central Railroad of Long Island, filed in the County Clerk's office, Queens County, at Jamaica, up to August 31, 1905:

The Secretary was then directed to request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to whether or not any rights for the operation of the Stewart Railroad are still in existence.

Mr. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith copy of a report made by the Chief Engineer of the Bureau of Sewers relative to the necessity for vesting title in certain lands for which Condemnation Commissioners have been appointed for the construction of a drainage canal in this borough, described as follows:

In the storm water outlet between West 10th and West 11th streets, from the Coney Island Drainage Canal to a line 200 feet south of and parallel with Avenue V, and in the Coney Island Drainage Canal, from the easterly line of the storm water outlet to the westerly line of West 15th street.

As will appear from the Engineer's report, it is important that a resolution be adopted as soon as possible vesting in the City title to these lands in question, and I would respectfully ask that this matter be placed on the calendar of the Board for consideration at the next public improvement meeting so that action may be taken to adopt the necessary resolution.

*Authorizing the Corporation Counsel to Proceed with the Matter of Acquiring Title to East 12th Street, from Avenue H to Avenue T; East 13th Street, from Avenue H to Avenue T, and from Gravesend Neck Road to Neptune Avenue; East 14th Street, from Avenue D to Foster Avenue, from Avenue H to Kings Highway, and from Avenue V to Gravesend Neck Road; East 15th Street, from Avenue H to Kings Highway, and from Avenue V to Emmons Avenue, Excluding from Each Street the Lands Occupied by the Long Island Railroad, and Also from East 13th Street and East 15th Street the Land Occupied by the Tracks of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad, but to Take No Action Relative to the Block of East 15th Street, Between Elm Avenue and Locust Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 39).*

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Brooklyn, November 29, 1913.

Mr. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—Under date of October 24, 1912, your Board adopted a resolution requesting the Corporation Counsel "to refrain from incurring further expense" in the proceeding for opening East 12th street, from Avenue H to Avenue T; East 13th street, from Avenue H to Avenue T, and from Gravesend Neck road to Neptune avenue; East 14th street, from Avenue D to Foster avenue, from Avenue H to Kings highway, and from Avenue V to Gravesend Neck road; East 15th street, from Avenue H to Kings highway, and from Avenue V to Emmons avenue, excluding from each street the land occupied by the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, and also from East 13th street and East 15th street the land occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Brighton Beach Railroad.

In regard to this proceeding, I desire to say that further conferences have been held with the property owners in this section and it is determined to submit a new map change at the meeting of the Board on next Thursday, and under this proposed map change the opening proceeding in East 12th, 13th and 14th streets is to proceed along the lines for which Commissioners are now appointed, and East 15th street, with the exception of the block between Elm and Locust avenues.

I would therefore respectfully ask that you kindly have a resolution prepared for consideration of the Board at its meeting next Thursday which will allow the Corporation Counsel to proceed with this street opening proceeding with the exception of the block above noted on East 15th street.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, deeming it for the public interest so to do, proposes to change the map or plan of The City of New York, by changing the lines and grades of the street system within the territory bounded by Avenue L, East 16th street, Avenue N and Coney Island avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, which proposed change is more particularly shown upon a map or plan bearing the signature of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and dated December 3, 1913.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed change at a meeting of the

Board to be held in the City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, on the 24th day of December, 1913, at 10.30 o'clock a. m.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby that the proposed change will be considered at a meeting of the Board, to be held at the aforesaid time and place, to be published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 24th day of December, 1913.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

*Deeds of Cession to Land in East 33d Street and East 34th Street, Borough of Brooklyn (Cal. No. 40).*

The Secretary presented the following:

Westminster Heights Co., 59 Wall Street, New York, November 10, 1913.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At your meeting on Thursday, October 9, 1913, a petition was presented in behalf of the Westminster Heights Company of The City of New York, Borough of Brooklyn, petitioning your Honorable Board to adopt a resolution granting permission to the Corporation Counsel to accept the five deeds (then enclosed) in East 33d street, between Avenues I and J, and in East 34th street, between Avenues I and N, covering street parcels in blocks 7597, 7615, 7616, 7633, 7669, as drawn, where they extend obliquely across the street area. Your Board, on the recommendation of Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer, passed a resolution granting that the deeds shall be accepted for those portions, but only extending at right angles to the centre line of the streets, which is no more than could have been done originally under the provisions of section 992 without reference to your Board on section 994. In fact, the action taken by your Board has innocently placed a further hardship on this company in that if the five deeds had originally been amended to the right angles demanded at the time of rejection they would have dated from May 8, 1913, previous to the appointment of Commissioners, whereas now the Assistant Corporation Counsel decides that they must date from the date of your resolution, October 9, 1913, and thus force on us all expenses of the Commissioners up to that date.

If you will now permit us, we will prove the injustice, first, of the Assistant Corporation Counsel and of the Bureau of Street Openings in rejecting the five deeds because drawn on oblique lines to the centre of the street instead of at right angles, and, secondly, of the Chief Engineer recommending the resolution adopted by your Board. Both were done on "general principles" without investigation of controlling conditions, and thus both actions were under misapprehension.

With your permission we will now give you facts regarding these five deeds of cession which have been ignored, but which can be verified by the Corporation Counsel and the Chief Engineer, and conditioned on such verification we respectfully ask for a reconsideration of your resolution of October 9, 1913, and that the amended resolution should be a direction to the Corporation Counsel to accept the five deeds of cession in East 33d and East 34th streets as drawn and offered on the oblique lines to the centre of the streets and also of the date of May 8, 1913, because they were unfairly rejected at that time, and not of the date of October 9, 1913, which imposes an unfair charge for expenses.

1st. The form of the deed of cession stipulates: "It being the intention of the grantor to convey all land in said street and all the estate therein that it may own." It says "all," not all at right angles to the centre of the street, and when we attempt to give "all" the deed is rejected. Is it consistent to want a deed in intention and not in fact?

2d. The two deeds to parcels in East 33d and East 34th streets, fronting property in block 7597, were offered May 8, 1913, and rejected July 28, 1913, and given to the Hon. Lewis H. Pounds for consideration by your Board on July 29, 1913. They were rejected for being drawn on oblique lines to the centre of the streets, thus conveying "all land in said street" that the grantor owned. You will find further that in December, 1912, the owners of adjoining land north of this oblique line ceded to the City on just this identical line to the centre of both East 33d and East 34th streets, and that these deeds were accepted by the City; and now, when the Westminster Heights Company offer on May 8, 1913 (before any Commissioners were appointed), to cede and square everything to the centre line, without any examination of the previous cession a rejection is made on "general principles" that all cessions must be made at right angles. The Street Bureau now admits that these two deeds should not have been thrown out and would not have been had it been aware of the previous accepted cessions.

3d. The deed to parcel in East 34th street, fronting property in blocks 7615, 7616, was offered May 8, 1913, and rejected July 28, 1913, and given to the Hon. Lewis H. Pounds for consideration by your Board on July 29, 1913. It was rejected for the same reason, and should not have been rejected for the same reason. The owner of adjoining land south of the oblique line has ceded to the City on just this identical line to the centre of the street, and this deed has been accepted by the City, and our deed coming in to square it and complete the perfect cession to the centre should not have been refused, and the continuation of this oblique line from the centre of East 34th street to the east side of that street, giving more in the street than this company owns in block 7616, to be covered at right angles, should not have been refused in connection with the first mentioned half of the street to its centre line.

4th. The Westminster Heights Company first bought the Ryder farm west of the line running through block 7633, northwest to southeast, and its second purchase took the property northeast of that line, completing block 7633. The description of the northeast triangular purchase was described by street lines, with a subsequent clause conveying all right, title, etc., to, in, etc., to the centre of East 34th street in front of the property, and which therefore meant that from a point in the centre of East 34th street or the south side of Avenue K, running south on that centre line to the farm line of division of the two purchases made by the Westminster Heights Company and thus making a complete and correct cession in full of the 800 feet at right angles to the centre of East 34th street. It certainly was never intended by the Bergen heirs, who ceded to Dames, and Dames to the Westminster Heights Company, to reserve this small triangular piece. We have this from the attorney and trustee of the Bergen Estate, who is now obtaining a deed from the Bergen heirs to positively confirm this, but he states that it is unnecessary, for that the previous deed intended it and was considered to fully cover this: that part (the red-lined triangle) in East 34th street being in front of the property inasmuch as it is in front of one of the boundary lines of the described property which runs southeasterly to the centre of East 34th street. The grantor of the same property to the Westminster Heights Company, who is an expert with the Title Guarantee and Trust Company, also states that any Court would uphold that this gore piece was conveyed in the title. This deed, therefore, should not have been rejected.

5th. The deed to parcel in East 34th street, fronting property in block 7669, was offered May 8, 1913, and rejected July 28, 1913, and given to the Hon. Lewis H. Pounds for consideration by your Board on July 29, 1913. It was rejected for the same reason, and should not have been rejected for the same reason. The Westminster Heights Company's property extended south 163.99 feet from the intersection of south side of Avenue M and the west side of East 34th street. The widening of Kings highway (now before Commissioners) has taken 53.99 feet of this 163.99 feet on the west side of East 34th street, but for which the Westminster Heights Company could have given at right angles to the centre of the street to cover the 110 feet as a street line front. The City condemned and took what would have covered at right angles, and besides there is no adjoining property to make joint cession to the centre. It is, or is to be, Kings highway, immediately south of what is ceded, and therefore it would seem to us to be a perfect cession in itself and also comes under the clause put in by the City itself in its deed of cession: "It being the intention of the grantor to convey all land in said street and all the estate therein that it may own." We have done this in every one of the five deeds, and in addition have given perfectly valid reasons in each case why the deeds should never have been rejected; reasons that can be verified if the Street Opening Bureau and the Corporation Counsel will give the proper examination, which they should have given before the rule of thumb rejection on the "right angle" theory.

In conclusion, we respectfully beg that your Honorable Board will reconsider the matter, rescinding your resolution of October 9, 1913, as applying to these five deeds of cession, and we request that, if consistent, you instruct the Corporation



Counsel to accept them all as drawn on the oblique lines and as of the date when they were so offered to the Bureau of Street Openings, that is, May 8, 1913, and thus remove a penalty of unknown expenses which should not be imposed upon us as a date subsequent to the appointment of Commissioners would do. We feel that we are fully entitled to this and we know that you will want to be just in the matter.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Westminster Heights Company, bearing date of November 10, 1913, requesting the reconsideration of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 9, 1913, under which the Corporation Counsel was authorized, pursuant to the provisions of section 994 of the Charter, to enter into an agreement to accept deeds to five parcels of land within the lines of East 33d street and East 34th street, Borough of Brooklyn, subject to the usual conditions imposed by the Board, excepting that immunity from assessment was not to be extended to abutting property owned by the grantors other than through portions of the street length where the cessions extended to the centre line.

Objection to this treatment is raised by the grantor on the ground that the consent failed to include areas which did not extend fully to the centre line of the various streets, and a claim is set up that the permission given by the Board is in no way different from that conferred upon the property owners under section 992 of the Charter. Request is therefore made that the resolution of October 9, 1913, be rescinded, and that the Corporation Counsel be instructed to accept the deeds as originally presented and as of May 8, 1913, the latter date preceding that of the appointment of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

It is evident that the petitioners have misconstrued the resolution of the Board, and that the permission given is sufficiently broad to include their entire ownership within the street lines.

I would therefore recommend that the application now made be denied.

*Acquiring Title to Riverdale Avenue, from Its Junction with Spuyten Duyvil Road at a Point Near West 231st Street to the Northerly Boundary Line of The City of New York, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 41).*

(At the meeting of the Board held on November 20, 1913, this matter was laid over for two weeks and referred to a committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Chief Engineer of the Board.)

The Secretary presented the following Committee report:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, New York City, December 2, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on November 20, 1913, the matter of the proposed acquisition of title to Riverdale avenue from its junction with Spuyten Duyvil road at a point near West 231st street to the northerly boundary of The City of New York was referred to a committee consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of The Bronx and the Chief Engineer of the Board.

On October 20, 1913, the Local Board of the Van Courtlandt District adopted a resolution providing for the acquisition of title to Riverdale avenue between the limits above named. In reporting upon this resolution the Chief Engineer of the Board submitted a proposed area of assessment extending about 2½ blocks on each side of Riverdale avenue and from a line midway between West 230th and West 231st streets, on the south, to the City line, on the north, with the recommendation that the entire cost of the proceeding be assessed upon this area of benefit. At the same meeting at which this report was presented, Mr. John Ross Delafield, on behalf of the owners of about 16,000 feet of frontage, presented a petition requesting that the City assume 50 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding for the reason that the abutting and contiguous property had already been assessed for acquiring title to the street as already opened to a width of 66 feet.

The proceeding referred to was carried out in 1866, and under the proceeding now proposed an additional width of 34 feet would be acquired. Owing to the fact that there will be very little building damage, the acquisition of this additional width should not involve very great expense, but the petitioners lay emphasis upon the fact that Riverdale avenue is one of but three north and south arteries of traffic which pass entirely through this portion of The Bronx, affording direct connections between the Borough of Manhattan and the towns and highways of Westchester County, the other two thoroughfares being Broadway and Jerome avenue. They further maintain that the 66-foot street they now have is amply sufficient for local needs, and that the widening to 100 feet is only required to accommodate through traffic and to permit the utilization of this route for surface railway transportation.

Your committee has given a hearing, at which the interested property owners repeated these arguments. Your committee suggested that, in view of the very slight building damage and of the fact that the widening is quite generally to be secured by taking a strip on each side of the existing road, it would be in the interest of the property owners to cede the land required for the wider street and avoid the expense of condemnation except as to those parcels where there are buildings. To this they replied that, although land is taken from each side of the street, the width of the strips so taken varies greatly, nearly all of the 34 feet in some places being taken from one side and very little from the other, so that it would be obviously unfair to ask the owners of property on one side of the street to cede, say, 30 feet, while the owner on the opposite side would cede but 4 feet. Your committee is convinced, therefore, that it would be impracticable to secure deeds of cession. We are also impressed by the argument that this street, which follows approximately the summit of the ridge lying between Broadway and the Hudson River, is one of a very limited number of north and south arteries of traffic which will be of general as well as local benefit, and we believe that, while this benefit will extend to the entire Borough of The Bronx, it will also extend to the Borough of Manhattan, but will not cover the City as a whole.

In view of these facts the committee recommends that 75 per cent. of the cost of the proceeding be assessed upon the area of benefit suggested by the Chief Engineer of the Board in his report submitted on November 20 last, and that of the remaining cost and expense, less any portion of the building damage which may be placed upon The City of New York by the commission, two-thirds be placed upon the Borough of The Bronx and one-third upon the Borough of Manhattan, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911, generally known as the Gerhardt Bill.

We would further recommend that a public hearing, as required by the statute, be given upon this proposed distribution of expense. Respectfully submitted,

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is authorized and required at the time of the adoption of the resolution directing the institution of proceedings to acquire title to the lands required for the foregoing improvement to fix and determine upon an area or areas of assessment for benefit for said proceedings;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby gives notice that it proposes to place 75 per cent. of the entire cost and expense of the proceeding on the following area:

Beginning at a point on the northerly boundary line of The City of New York where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line midway between Liebig avenue and Tyndall avenue as these streets are laid out between West 260th street and West 261st street, and running thence southwardly along the said line midway between Liebig avenue and Tyndall avenue and along the prolongations of the said line to the intersection with the northerly line of West 259th street; thence southwardly in a straight line to a point on the southeasterly line of West 259th street where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line distant 90 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Liebig avenue as this street is laid out where it adjoins West 259th street on the south, the said distance being measured at right angles to Liebig avenue; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Johnson avenue to a point distant 260 feet northerly from the northerly line of West 236th street, the said distance being measured along the said line parallel with Johnson avenue; thence northwestwardly in a straight line to a point on the northwesterly line of Spuyten Duyvil Parkway where it is intersected by the prolongation of a line midway between Blackstone avenue and Arlington avenue as these streets are laid out where they adjoin West 239th street on the south; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Blackstone avenue and Arlington avenue and along the prolongations of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Arlington avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Arlington avenue; thence generally northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Arlington avenue and with its northerly prolongation as laid out in the first tangent north of West 256th street to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Arlington avenue as this street is laid out where it meets Independence avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Arlington avenue; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Arlington avenue and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Independence avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Independence avenue; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Independence avenue, to the intersection with the southerly line of West 261st street; thence northwardly and parallel with Riverdale avenue to the intersection with the northerly boundary line of The City of New York; thence eastwardly along the said boundary line to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby gives notice that it proposes to place two-thirds of the remainder of the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, less any portion of the building damage which may be placed upon The City of New York, upon the Borough of The Bronx, and one-third of such remainder of the entire cost and expense, less any portion of the building damage which may be placed upon The City of New York, upon the Borough of Manhattan; the amounts so placed upon the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx to be levied and collected with the taxes upon the real property in said boroughs becoming due and payable in the year in which such cost and expense shall have been fixed and determined, provided that such cost and expense be ascertained in time to be included with the taxes on the real property of said boroughs in the same year; and if not determined in time, the same shall be levied and collected with the taxes of the succeeding year.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed area of assessment and apportionment of cost and expense at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 24th day of December, 1913, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 24th day of December, 1913.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Acting President of the Board of Aldermen, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the Acting President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond—16.

*Reapportioning the Cost and Expense of the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Buck Street, from Zerega Avenue to Seddon Street; Lyvere Street, from Zerega Avenue to West Farms Road; Fuller Street, from Zerega Avenue to Seddon Street; MacLay Avenue, from Parker Street to West Farms Road; Stearns Street, from Glover Street to Parker Street, and Dorsey Street, from Zerega Avenue to Seddon Street, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 42).*

(At the meeting of the Board of November 20, 1913, a public hearing was held



in this matter, and at the close thereof it was laid over for one week. On November 26, 1913, the matter was again laid over for one week.)

The President of the Borough of The Bronx offered the following resolution:

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Van Courtlandt District, Borough of The Bronx, adopted on November 10, 1913, initiating proceedings for acquiring title to West 239th street from Broadway to Review place.

This resolution affects one block or about 200 feet of West 239th street, which has recently been laid out upon the City Map to have a width of 60 feet. The street is not in use and the abutting property is entirely unimproved.

When this street was laid out it was shown that it would result in an extravagant proportion of street area to block area, subjecting owners of property in the vicinity to what would appear to be an unnecessary expense. The amendment of the street plan was approved after the property owners had expressed themselves as prepared to fully assume the entire expense of the acquisition of the necessary land.

A proceeding for acquiring title to West 239th street from Review place to Putnam Avenue West, together with the widening of West 238th street from Broadway to Albany road, excluding the right of way of the New York and Putnam Railroad, was instituted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 1, 1913, but up to the present time the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment have not been appointed, although I am advised that this is imminent.

The owners of property abutting on the section of the street which is the subject of the resolution now under consideration have expressed a desire to have the same set of Commissioners appointed in the new proceeding, who will take testimony in the proceeding affecting the adjoining section on the east, and I can see no reason why this should not be done, although the proceeding now in progress has advanced too far to permit of securing such a result through its amendment.

With the suggestion that the Corporation Counsel be asked to draw the attention of the Court to the desirability of designating the Commissioners to be appointed for the adjoining section of West 239th street to serve in this case also, I would recommend the adoption of a resolution for acquiring title to West 239th street from Broadway to Review place.

I would also recommend that title to the land be acquired in fee; that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding, including any damages allowed for intended regulating, be assessed upon the property benefited, and that a district of assessment be laid out to comprise the following area:

Bounded on the north by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of West 239th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to West 239th street; on the east by a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Review place, the said distance being measured at right angles to Review place; on the south by a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of West 239th street, the said distance being measured at right angles to West 239th street; and on the west by the easterly line of Broadway.

Dear Sir—Property owners in the vicinity of East 162d street, between Jerome avenue and the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, are very desirous of having this street graded and improved. Title to East 162d street, between Jerome avenue and Walton avenue, was acquired by the City on July 8, 1898.

Between River avenue and Walton avenue the lines of East 162d street have since been changed. It is proposed to effect an exchange of lands acquired, and now abandoned for street purposes, for lands within the limits of the present filed street lines.

In a letter dated October 2, 1913, Mr. Charles A. Peabody, No. 2 Wall street, representing the Astor Estate, owners of most of the land affected, states that the Astor Estate will be entirely agreeable to such a proceeding. *Extending the Area of Assessment Fixed in the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to Cotton Street from Arrietta Street to Griffin Street, Borough of Richmond* (Cal. No. 47).

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on November 6, a hearing was given concerning a proposed extension of the area of assessment fixed in the matter of the proceeding for acquiring title to Cotton street, from Arrietta street to Griffin street, Borough of Richmond. In the report then submitted by your Engineer it was pointed out that property owners in the vicinity had made various requests for an enlargement of the area of assessment as laid out on June 15, 1911, when opening proceedings were instituted. In the first request the Board was asked to place 30 per cent. of the cost upon the Borough and 70 per cent. upon The City of New York, the denial of which was followed by the suggestion that the area of assessment be extended to include a much larger local area. The rejection by the Board of the latter request was followed by another petition in which the proposed extension was limited to a smaller area, although considerably larger than that fixed by the Board. It was believed by your Engineer that in the last suggestion a considerable territory was included which would receive only a very indirect benefit from the improvement, but it was admitted that an area outside of that previously fixed might be included in the assessment district asked for by the property owners, although it was believed that by reason of the land being under water the assessment to be imposed would not materially affect the expense to which the remaining owners would be called upon to bear.

At the hearing which was given concerning the extension of the assessment district as proposed by this office, to include the area under water, the property owners renewed their last request, and the matter was referred back to the Engineer with directions to prepare a technical description of the amended district as suggested by them, this including an additional area south of Arrietta street, and west of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad, the amended description being as follows:

Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Cotton street as this street is laid out immediately easterly from and adjoining Griffin street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Cotton street, distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Griffin street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Griffin street, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Cotton street, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Griffin street and Cotton street as these streets are laid out immediately southerly from and adjoining Arrietta street; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Griffin street and Cotton street, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with the centre line of Arrietta street; thence eastwardly along the centre line of Arrietta street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Stuyvesant place as this street is laid out where it meets Arrietta street on the north, the said distance being measured at right angles to Stuyvesant place; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Stuyvesant place and the prolongation thereof, to the intersection with the southerly property line of the United States Government Light House Reservation; thence eastwardly along the said property line and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the United States bulkhead line of New York Bay; thence southwardly along the said bulkhead line to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 1,000 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Arrietta street as this street is laid out where it adjoins Cotton street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Arrietta street; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Arrietta street and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Bay street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bay street; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Bay street to the intersection with the southerly line of Hannah street; thence northwardly in a straight line to a point on the northerly side of Hannah street where it is intersected by a line parallel with Griffin street and passing through the



point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Griffin street to the point or place of beginning. Respectfully,

Beginning at a point on the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Cotton street as this street is laid out immediately easterly from and adjoining Griffin street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Cotton street, distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Griffin street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Griffin street, and running thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Cotton street, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with a line midway between Griffin street and Cotton street as these streets are laid out immediately southerly from and adjoining Arrietta street; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Griffin street and Cotton street, and along the prolongation of the said line, to the intersection with the centre line of Arrietta street; thence eastwardly along the centre line of Arrietta street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Stuyvesant place as this street is laid out where it meets Arrietta street on the north, the said distance being measured at right angles to Stuyvesant place; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet easterly from and parallel with the easterly line of Stuyvesant place and the prolongation thereof, to the intersection with the southerly property line of the United States Government Light House Reservation; thence eastwardly along the said property line and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the United States bulkhead line of New York Bay; thence southwardly along the said bulkhead line to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 1,000 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Arrietta street as this street is laid out where it adjoins Cotton street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Arrietta street; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Arrietta street and along the prolongation of the said line, to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of Bay street, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bay street; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Bay street to the intersection with the southerly line of Hannah street; thence northwestwardly in a straight line to a point on the northerly side of Hannah street where it is intersected by a line parallel with Griffin street and passing through the point of beginning; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Griffin street to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed amended area of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 24th day of December, 1913, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

This plan relates to the territory bounded approximately by the City line, Alonzo place, Virginia street, Bolton place, Beach 9th street, Dinsmore street, Townly avenue, Cornaga avenue, Beach 22d street, Far Rockaway boulevard, Mott avenue, Elsmere street and Hassock place, in the Far Rockaway section of the Borough, comprising an area of about 200 acres. At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 10, 1913, a communication was presented from the Engineer for the Village of Lawrence, requesting that provision be made in the drainage system for the adjoining area within the City limits, this forming a part of the plan now under consideration, for receiving the drainage from an area of about 22 acres within the limits of the Village of Lawrence and adjoining Far Rockaway boulevard (Central avenue), a portion of which naturally drained across the County line and into territory within the City limits. At this time the matter was referred to the Borough President, with the request that he either take steps to provide a modification in the street grades at the City line in such a way as to exclude drainage from Nassau County or that he take up with the Village authorities the matter of apportioning the expense which would be involved in making provision for the additional capacity otherwise required for the drainage of the area outside of the City limits.

It would therefore appear that this plan should be referred back to the Borough President in order that the questions raised by the Village authorities may be adjusted before the design is finally determined upon. It would also seem proper at this time to call attention to the undesirability of attempting to plan storm water sewers prior to or independent of the design of the sanitary system which must be adjusted to it, owing to the difficulty which would otherwise be involved in securing a harmonious plan. As an illustration of the need of such consideration, it might be pointed out that the storm water sewer as shown for Redfern avenue is indicated as having an elevation which would deprive the property owners on one side of the street from a connection with the sanitary sewer, the construction of which has recently been authorized. Most of the territory affected by the plan is of a low elevation, necessitating flat grades and scant covering for a substantial proportion of the sewers, and in some instances the grades proposed would indicate that an insufficient allowance has been made for covering to permit of securing catch basin connections and that an increased elevation is here required for the street or a depression will have to be made in the sewer grade. It also appears that the elevations planned for lateral sewers are such in a number of cases as to result in surcharging them when the outlet is flowing full, and that in order to relieve the City from liability for damage under such conditions a note should be appended to the plan setting forth the conditions under which it has been prepared.

I would recommend that the map be returned to the Borough President in order that the various points herein named may be given further consideration by him.

The water main has been provided only as far east as Whittier street; the gas main is lacking, and no sewer has been constructed in the block east of Edgewater road.

In a communication bearing date of November 19 last, the Borough President advises that arrangements have been made with the Department of Water Supply for completing its main at an early date, and also that it is probable that no sewer will ever be needed in the short block between Edgewater road and the Bronx River. It appears that the street is frequently used by the Fire Department in responding to alarms at the Seneca avenue fire house, and it is requested that the paving resolution be presented for the consideration of the Board at an early date. In view of the fact that the way has been cleared for providing the remaining necessary subsurface structures, it would appear unnecessary to defer the preliminary authorization of the improvement.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At its meeting of July 29, 1913, the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted resolutions initiating proceedings for regulating and grading Clifton avenue, from Borden avenue to Clinton avenue, and DeBevoise avenue, from Jones avenue to Clinton avenue.

These resolutions are accompanied by a copy of a communication addressed to the Borough President by the Acting Corporation Counsel under date of September 29, 1913, in which he is advised that both of the streets have been dedicated to public use. The Corporation Counsel's opinion appears, in each case, to be based upon the presentation of two affidavits and a report from the Engineer in Charge of the Topographical Bureau, setting forth certain evidences to establish that maps have been filed by property owners showing the street lines in conformity with those laid out upon the City plan, that improvements have been made by the property owners for the benefit of the public, and that the dedication to public use has been recognized by the City through a maintenance of the streets.

An examination of the ground shows that north of Halle avenue both of these streets have been approximately graded and that the gas mains and water mains have here been laid, although the abutting property is only slightly improved. South of Halle avenue flagging has been laid on the easterly side of Clifton avenue, and there is some evidence to show that the street was once graded, although it has now lost its shape and is impassible, while DeBevoise avenue is not in use, and there is no indication of the street here ever having been improved.

In view of the total absence of any evidence on the ground to show that in the sections south of Halle avenue the property owners have expressed an intention to dedicate DeBevoise avenue, and of the failure to complete such evidences in the case of Clifton avenue, or that the City has in any way recognized such dedication, I would recommend that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel, with the request that he advise the Board whether, under these conditions, the dedications can properly be accepted as warranting the carrying out of assessable improvements.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, November 17, 1913.

*The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, No. 277 Broadway, New York City:*

Sirs—I am in receipt of a letter addressed to my Assistant in Charge of the Bureau of Street Openings by Arthur S. Tuttle, Deputy Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate, dated October 28, 1913, referring to a proceeding for the regulating and grading of Junction avenue, between Burnside avenue and Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, which was initiated by a resolution of the Local Board of Newtown District adopted May 10, 1912. This resolution refers to a report of the Engineer in charge of the Topographical Bureau, stating that affidavits would not be sufficient evidence to show dedication, as section 21 of the Final Maps provides for an 80-foot street, while the street in use on the ground is 60 feet in width, and therefore a street opening proceeding for a widening on the westerly side of said street would be necessary.

It appears that thereafter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment referred the matter back to the Borough President with the statement that the improvement could not be favorably reported until title to the widened street had been acquired. Thereafter the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was advised that an opinion rendered to Borough President Connolly by the Acting Corporation Counsel under date of September 5, 1913, held that Junction avenue, between Burnside avenue and Jackson avenue, had been legally dedicated.

The Deputy Chief Engineer calls attention to the fact that the report of Mr. Clifford B. Moore, Topographical Engineer of the Borough of Queens, states that the street is in use at a width of about 62 feet at Jackson avenue and about 70 feet at Burnside avenue, which has been shown by the field inspection to be correct. The Deputy Chief Engineer adds that it has been assumed that grading improvements are intended to relate to the entire width of the street as mapped, unless the initiating resolution clearly excepts a specified portion thereof, and that it has also been assumed that a dedication opinion could be similarly construed. The Deputy Chief Engineer submits these facts in order that before a report is submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment concerning the physical improvement all question as to the propriety of carrying out the improvement as described shall be removed.

In reply, I would state that in the letter to the Borough President of Queens, dated September 5, 1913, I did not intend to advise that Junction avenue was dedicated to the public to a greater width than that shown to be actually in use by the affidavits and the reports of Mr. Clifford B. Moore, dated respectively July 23, 1913, and January 30, 1913. Mr. Moore in his report of January 30, 1913, states that:

"The lines of the avenue are approximately straight, with a width at Jackson avenue of about 62 feet, which width greatly increases until on Burnside avenue it is 70 feet in width. There is no pavement except between and adjacent to the car tracks where cobble pavement has been installed. There are no other improvements. \* \* \* Front fences encroach upon the easterly side less than five feet."

"The easterly line of the avenue is identical as in use upon the ground and as shown upon the final map, and the westerly line as in use upon the ground lies within that shown upon the final maps."

I therefore advise you that Junction avenue, between Burnside avenue and Jackson avenue, is dedicated to the public at the widths it is in use as stated in the report of Mr. Moore. Yours respectfully,

## Report No. 13384.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on May 10, 1912, initiating proceedings for grading, curbing and flagging Junction avenue, from Burnside avenue to Jackson avenue.

This resolution is accompanied by a copy of a communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel bearing date of September 5, 1913, advising that Junction avenue, between the limits named, has been dedicated to public use. From this communication it appears that an adverse opinion had previously been rendered concerning the dedication, but that further evidences had been presented to him to sustain the contention of the property owners in this respect.

From the report of the Engineer in Charge of the Highway Bureau concerning this improvement, it would appear that the street as now in use by the public is only 60 feet wide, while the adopted street plan contemplates a width of 80 feet, making it evident that an opening proceeding would be necessary before the improvement could be carried out. This condition is approximately verified by the report of the Engineer of the Topographical Bureau, which shows that the old road is 62 feet wide at Jackson avenue and about 70 feet wide at Burnside avenue, as well as by an inspection of the ground made by this office. In order to remove any question concerning the nature of the dedication the matter was again laid before the Corporation Counsel by your Engineer, and in the accompanying communication bearing date of November 17, 1913, he advises that his opinion concerning the dedication of the street was intended to relate to the area between the lines to which it is in use.

The carrying out of the Local Board resolution would necessitate the occupancy of the entire width of the street, and from the facts now presented it would appear that a strip on the westerly side, having a width ranging from about 10 feet to 18 feet, is still in private ownership. Under these conditions it is recommended that the resolution be referred back to the Local Board to be withheld until after title to the entire street width has been established.

In this connection attention might also be called to the inconsistency between the description given for the improvement and the street system as now shown upon the final map, inasmuch as under the legal plan Junction avenue terminates at 37th street instead of at Burnside avenue. It might also be noted that on May 2, 1912, a public hearing was given concerning a proceeding proposed by the Local Board for the acquisition of title to Junction avenue, from 37th street to Queens boulevard, but that at the request of the Borough President the matter was referred back to him and has not since been again submitted for consideration. Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, Borough of Queens, adopted on September 29, 1913, initiating proceedings for grading and curbing Newtown road, from Grand avenue to Jamaica avenue.

This resolution affects three blocks or about 1,200 feet of Newtown road. Title to the street has not been acquired under formal opening proceedings, but with the papers is presented a communication from the Acting Corporation Counsel bearing date of September 5, 1913, in which the President of the Borough is advised that "between the points named and within the boundaries actually used, that it is an old public road and therefore has been dedicated to the use of the public." From Grand avenue to a point about 50 feet northwesterly from 11th avenue Newtown road is shown on the Commissioners' Map of Long Island City as having a width of 50 feet, but in the remaining portion of the distance to Jamaica avenue the width is decreased to 46 feet.

It seems probable that the irregularity in street width has been occasioned as the result of an attempt to include all of the old highway within the street lines, but no evidence is at hand to show that this has been accomplished, as would appear to be essential to the carrying out of the proposed improvement which is intended to relate to the entire street width.

An inspection of the ground shows that the street is roughly graded through the entire distance affected, with a small amount of stone curb and dirt paths on each side. A number of buildings have been erected upon the abutting property but no information has been submitted to establish their relation to the mapped lines of the street.

Before considering the authorization of the improvement it would seem advisable to remove any question as to the City's ownership of the land which it will be necessary to enter upon.

I would therefore recommend that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise the Board whether his opinion as to ownership by the City is intended to relate to the street as now laid out upon the City map.

**LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS—BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.**  
(Final Authorization.)

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with.

1. Grading, curbing and flagging Lenox road, from Albany avenue to East 45th street, and from Schenectady avenue to Utica avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$6,400. The Borough President

states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is forty days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$94.66.

The work to be done comprises the following: 1,090 cubic yards excavation, 3,560 linear feet cement curbing, 16,180 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$4,900.

2. Grading, curbing and flagging Bay 10th street, from Bath avenue to Cropsey avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$54.15.

The work to be done comprises the following: 2,340 cubic yards excavation, 1,190 linear feet cement curbing, 5,740 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,500.

3. Grading, curbing and flagging Willoughby avenue, from St. Nicholas avenue to Cypress avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 9, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is fifty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$53.62.

The work to be done comprises the following: 5,050 cubic yards excavation, 850 linear feet cement curbing, 3,910 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,400.

4. Grading, curbing and flagging East 9th street, from Avenue L to Avenue M.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,600. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$57.44. The work to be done comprises the following: 620 cubic yards filling, 1,610 linear feet cement curbing, 7,390 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,400.

5. Grading, curbing and flagging East 35th street, from Newkirk avenue to Foster avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is twenty-five days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$38.68. The work to be done comprises the following: 200 cubic yards excavation, 230 cubic yards filling, 920 linear feet cement curbing, 4,550 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$1,500.

6. Grading, curbing and flagging West 29th street, from Neptune avenue to Surf avenue, excepting the right of way of the New York and Coney Island Railroad.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$10,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is seventy days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$103.91. The work to be done comprises the following: 6,050 cubic yards filling, 3,280 linear feet cement curbing, 16,140 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$10,700.

7. Grading, curbing and flagging 59th street, from 15th avenue to 16th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is twenty-five days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$42.25.

The work to be done comprises the following: 340 cubic yards excavation, 1,450 linear feet cement curbing, 6,500 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,000.

8. Grading, curbing, flagging and paving with granite block (permanent pavement) 2d avenue, from 6th street to Gowanus Canal.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$11,000. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$53.36. The work to be done comprises the following: 1,000 cubic yards excavation, 920 linear feet curbing, 4,600 square feet cement sidewalk, 2,180 square yards granite block pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$10,800.

9. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Carroll street, from Franklin avenue to Bedford avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$4,700. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$5.98.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,115 square yards of asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$4,600.

10. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) 74th street, from 11th avenue to 13th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$12,200. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is thirty days and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$5.63.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 5,380 square yards of asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$11,700.

11. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) 67th street from 11th avenue to 13th avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$11,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$5.59.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 5,115 square yards of asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$11,100.

12. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Avenue F from Gravesend avenue to West street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,400. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 25 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$4.17.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 1,055 square yards of asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,300.

13. Sewer in East 23d street from Avenue I to the Long Island Railroad.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$1,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$33.32.

The work to be done comprises the following: 43 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer; 405 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer; 5 manholes. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$1,600.

14. Grading, curbing and flagging Crown street from Bedford avenue to Rogers avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$8,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 90 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$87.43.

The work to be done comprises the following: 10,560 cubic yards excavation,



1,570 linear feet cement curbing and 7,630 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$8,500.

15. Grading and curbing and paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Stephens court from Flatbush avenue to East 23d street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 25 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$34.97.

The work to be done comprises the following: 200 cubic yards excavation, 910 linear feet curbing and 1,207 square yards asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$3,600.

16. Paving with asphalt (preliminary pavement) Howard avenue from Blake avenue to East 98th street (excluding between Blake avenue and Livonia avenue a space ten feet wide, centrally located, which is to be utilized for malls); and curbing from Blake avenue to East 98th street, including the curbing needed along the center of the street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$14,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 35 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$37.69.

The work to be done comprises the following: 5,230 square yards asphalt pavement and 1,950 linear feet cement curbing. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$12,600.

17. Paving with asphalt (permanent pavement) 15th avenue from 38th street to 40th street.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$5,100. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 30 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$9.71.

The work to be done comprises the laying of 2,350 square yards of asphalt pavement. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$5,300.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized and would recommend such action.

*Regulating and Grading Lenox Road from Albany Avenue to East 45th Street, and from Schenectady Avenue to Utica Avenue, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 88).*

The following was offered:

A copy of a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, duly adopted by said Board on the 19th day of December, 1912, and approved by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn on the 22d day of January, 1913, having been transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as follows, to wit:

"Resolved, That the Local Board of the Flatbush District hereby initiates proceedings to regulate, grade, set cement curb and lay cement sidewalks on Lenox road, from Albany avenue to East 45th street, and from Schenectady avenue to Utica avenue."

The Secretary presented the following report of the Chief Engineer:

Report No. 13397. December 1, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, advising that all of the conditions which it is the practice of the Board to impose prior to the final authorization of local improvements have been complied with in the matter of grading, curbing and flagging West 37th street, from Neptune avenue to a point about 260 feet south of Surf avenue, excepting the right of way of the New York and Coney Island Railroad.

A report recommending the preliminary authorization of this improvement has already been prepared and is now before the Board for consideration. Assuming that it will meet with approval, there seems to be no reason to prevent the final authorization now requested.

The Borough President states that there have been no charges made against the Street Improvement Fund, and that it is proposed to allow the contractor 50 days in which to carry out the improvement.

The work to be done comprises the following: 2,170 cubic yards excavation, 1,350 cubic yards filling, 3,030 linear feet cement curbing, 14,630 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is estimated to be \$6,200.

I would also recommend that title be vested in the City on January 2, 1914, to West 37th street, from Surf avenue to the mean high water line of the Atlantic Ocean.

#### LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS—BOROUGH OF THE BRONX. (Final Authorization.)

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith are transmitted communications from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvements have been complied with.

1. Grading, curbing and flagging East 217th street, from White Plains avenue to Oakley avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 23, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$35,300. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 140 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$98.74.

The work to be done comprises the following: 5,850 cubic yards earth and rock excavation, 20,000 cubic yards filling, 6,200 linear feet curbing, 30,400 square feet cement sidewalk. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$31,200.

2. Sewers in the following streets: Randall avenue, from Metcalf avenue to Bronx River avenue; Bronx River avenue, from Randall avenue to Damis avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 3, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$135,500. The Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 300 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$341.83.

The work to be done comprises the following: 514 linear feet 6-foot 9-inch by 6-foot concrete sewer, 557 linear feet 6-foot 6-inch by 6-foot concrete sewer, 312 linear feet 5-foot 9-inch by 6-foot concrete sewer, 312 linear feet 5-foot 6-inch by 6-foot concrete sewer, 1,516 linear feet 5-foot 3-inch by 6-foot concrete sewer, 78 linear feet 20-inch pipe sewer, 38 linear feet 18-inch pipe sewer, 38 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 294 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 35 manholes. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$118,000.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out these improvements should not be authorized and would recommend such action.

I would also recommend that title be vested in the City on January 2, 1914, to Bronx River avenue, from Lafayette avenue to Randall avenue.

Application for an Extension of Time in Which to Comply with the Order Directing the Relocation of Tracks of the New York Railways Company on Central Park West, Between 59th Street and 110th Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 109).

Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, 277 Broadway, New York, N. Y.:

Dear Sirs—Referring to the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted August 28, 1913, directing that the New York Railways Company relocate its tracks on Central Park West, between 59th street and 110th street, "so as to employ the present southbound track as the future northbound track, and to provide a track on the easterly side of the present southbound track, at standard distance therefrom, to be used in the future as a new southbound track, removing from the said 'street the present northbound track; \* \* \* and directing that this Company commence the work of relocation therein ordered within ninety days and have the same completed within six months, I beg to apply on behalf of the New York Railways Company, for an extension of five months within which the New York Railways Company shall notify the City whether it will undertake to relocate the tracks referred to at its own expense.

The Company is constrained to ask for this extension of time because it has not given up the hope that a solution may be found whereby sufficient roadway will



be provided for vehicular traffic east of the present northbound track without disturbing the present tracks. The work ordered by the City is of such magnitude that the directors are unwilling to assume the responsibility of accepting the order of the City until every alternative has been exhausted.

Even were the Company to accept the order embodied in the resolution of August 28, 1913, it would be impossible to do the work during the next four or five winter months. To tear up the streets at this time of the year would work a hardship not only on the persons compelled to use the roadway but also on the residents of the west side of the street. It is thus apparent that no public benefit would accrue from an acceptance of an order at this date which could not be physically carried out within the time limit set in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I therefore respectfully ask that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment extend the time within which the New York Railways Company shall notify your Honorable Board whether or not it will accept the order embodied in the resolution of August 28, 1913, directing it to relocate its tracks on Central Park West, for a period of five months, or until April 26, 1914. Dear Sir—In reply to your communication on November 7, 1913, transmitting a copy of the Engineer's Financial Statement and Report for the Quarter Ending September 30, 1913, and calling attention to his recommendations and suggestions relative to certain improvements in the Borough of The Bronx, I beg to state, for the information of the Board, that the contract for regulating and grading Cromwell avenue, from 150th street to Jerome avenue, is practically completed, and is held at this time in the Borough President's Office pending the adjustment of overtime.

The regulating and grading of Hunts Point road, from Southern boulevard to the East River, has been threatened to be declared abandoned on a number of occasions but such action was deferred on the promise on the part of the executors of the contractors' estate, that they would complete the work. Notices have again been served upon the sureties and the executors to proceed at once with the completion of the work. Upon their failure to comply, the contract will be declared abandoned and another one will be let for the completion of the work.

The Chief Engineer also calls attention to the delay in returning the assessment lists for regulating and grading Kingsbridge road, from Bailey avenue to the boundary line between The Bronx and Manhattan. The final certificate of the completion of this work was made on December 28, 1912. About this time the Board of Assessors enlarged the area of assessment and directed that another contract be included with this one for the purpose of assessing. The work, therefore, had to be done over a second time, but the lists for the combined contracts have now been forwarded to the Board of Assessors. Yours truly,

*Sewer and Appurtenances in Spuyten Duyvil Road, Between West 230th Street and West 240th Street, and in West 240th Street, Between Spuyten Duyvil Road and the Easterly Side of Broadway at Van Courtlandt Park, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 113).*

The Secretary presented the following communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx:

City of New York, President of the Borough of The Bronx, 3d Avenue and 177th Street, Office of the President, November 29, 1913.

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Dear Sir—On November 6, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment granted preliminary authorization for the construction of a sewer and appurtenances

in Spuyten Duyvil road, between West 230th street and West 240th street, and in West 240th street, between Spuyten Duyvil road and the easterly side of Broadway at Van Courtlandt Park, at a total estimated cost of \$108,796.

This sewer will be constructed primarily to care for the drainage of about 60 acres of park property, together with the overflow from the Tibbetts Brook watershed at the dam in Van Courtlandt Park. In order to provide for this flow, the sewer will have to be constructed under the Broadway sewer and will be about 40 feet below the filed elevation of the surface at 240th street and Spuyten Duyvil road, and will be of a much larger size from 240th street and Broadway to 231st street and Spuyten Duyvil road than would be necessary to drain the abutting property.

All of the property which will drain into the Spuyten Duyvil road and 240th street sewer above its intersection with Riverdale avenue has already been assessed indirectly for the Broadway sewer, and in justice, should be assessed in the future for direct frontage benefit only. The additional depth and additional size are required entirely for the purpose of draining Van Courtlandt Park. It would seem unjust, therefore, to again assess this property for a trunk sewer, and I would recommend that the Board consider the matter of having the City assume the additional cost of constructing this sewer over and above what would be required for the needs of the area outside of Van Courtlandt Park, and that it set a date for a hearing on the matter, in accordance with chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911.

It has been estimated that the cost of a system of lateral sewers which would serve the needs of the abutting property would be \$36,419. The cost of the additional depth and size of the sewer, or \$72,377, should therefore be borne by the City. The approximate ratio is that the property within the drainage area should pay one-third and the City two-thirds of the entire cost of the sewer.

If the City assumes this part of the expense of constructing the sewer, no part of Van Courtlandt Park should be included within the area of assessment, but the total proportion of \$36,419 should be assessed upon the territory lying west of Broadway.

I would request that this matter be put upon the Calendar of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration. Yours truly,

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is empowered at the time of the authorization of a local improvement to determine in what manner the cost thereof shall be paid; and

Whereas, The Board is considering the advisability of granting final authorization for the proposed improvement, and of placing one-third of the entire cost thereof upon certain property within the drainage area, and the remaining two-thirds of such cost upon The City of New York, with the understanding that no part of Van Courtlandt Park, or other property owned by the City and lying within the area of assessment is to be assessed for said proposed improvement, but that the total proportion of one-third of such cost shall be assessed upon property in private ownership within the limits of the drainage district.

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn, advising that all of the conditions imposed by the Board prior to the authorization of the following local improvement have been complied with: Sewer in Carroll street, from Bedford avenue to Rogers avenue.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 20, 1913, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$2,900. The Acting Borough President states that the time to be allowed for the completion of the improvement is 40 days, and that the expense incurred for the preliminary work amounts to \$43.38.

The work to be done comprises the following: 93 linear feet 15-inch pipe sewer, 676 linear feet 12-inch pipe sewer, 7 manholes. The cost of the improvement is now estimated to be \$2,900.

I see no reason why the construction work required to carry out this improvement should not be authorized, and would recommend such action. Respectfully,

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted a resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted on June 2, 1913, initiating proceedings for constructing sewers in the following streets: Avenue M, from Ocean avenue to East 19th street; East 19th street, from Avenue L to Avenue N.

Title to Avenue M, and to East 19th street, from Avenue L to Avenue M, has been legally acquired.

An opening proceeding relating to East 19th street, from the southerly line of Avenue M to a point about 560 feet north of Avenue P, together with a number of other streets, was instituted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 7, 1912. The oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were filed on August 9 following, and title to the land can be vested in the City at any time.

The resolution now presented affects one short block of Avenue M and two long blocks of East 19th street, aggregating about 1,800 feet. With the exception of East 19th street for a distance of about 400 feet adjoining Avenue M on the south, the streets are in use and the abutting property in each case is partially improved. The outlet sewer is built.

The work is estimated to cost about \$6,800, and the assessed valuation of the property to be benefited is \$204,750.

In my judgment the resolution is a proper one, and I would recommend that the Borough President be authorized to have the work performed which is required prior to placing the improvement under contract. Respectfully,

Miller and Ernest Roeder for a franchise to operate stages and omnibuses from Belden Point, City Island Avenue, City Island, along said City Island Avenue and through Pelham Bay Parkway to the City Island Station of the Harlem Division of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad; thence along the Eastern Boulevard to Pelham Road, Borough of The Bronx.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

The following Franchise matter, not on the calendar for this day, was considered by unanimous consent:

*Westchester Lighting Company; Northern Union Gas Company; Central Union Gas Company.* (No. 3).

In the matter of the franchise rights of the Westchester Lighting Company, the Northern Union Gas Company, and the Central Union Gas Company, in the Borough of The Bronx.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

Dear Sirs—I request that the salary schedule of this Department be revised as specified below. There is a vacancy at present in the position of Clerk at an annual salary of \$3,600 caused by the death of Mr. A. T. Campbell and the subsequent promotions of John H. Greener, John R. Salmon and Samuel K. Probasco.

It is my desire to create out of the \$3,600 vacancy a position of Clerk at an annual salary of \$2,400 and to use the remaining \$1,200 to increase the salaries of Charles J. Bradshaw, Gerald G. P. Jackson and David F. Dennehy.



Charles J. Bradshaw is a Junior Assistant assigned to the Division of Real Estate. He has charge of all actions to which the City is a party to foreclose mortgages, of which there are several hundred commenced each year. He also has charge of all actions to which the City is a party defendant to foreclose tax liens and all actions brought by the City to foreclose tax liens. He entered the service of the City on February 1, 1912, at an annual salary of \$1,500 and has had no increase. Before his appointment in this Department he had many years' experience with one of the large title companies. In view of the importance of his work I recommend that his salary be increased from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum.

Gerald G. P. Jackson is Chief Clerk of the Tenement House Branch Office of this Department. He is an attorney and counsellor-at-law and has charge of a force of about 25 Clerks, Stenographers, Process Servers and other subordinates. He entered the City service on February 1, 1897, and received his last increase in salary on December 31, 1908. When the Tenement House Branch Office of this Department was organized in 1902 he was selected as Chief Clerk of that office. The office has grown in importance and I recommend that his salary be increased from \$2,400 to \$3,000 per annum.

David F. Dennehy entered the City service on July 24, 1899, and received his last promotion on December 31, 1908. He has charge of the Clerks in the Main Office who are assigned to the work of keeping the Registers, Journals, Diaries, Calendars and other official records. He is personally responsible for the office diary and carelessness or incompetence in that work would result in defaults in taking appeals which could not be opened by the Courts. In view of the responsibility of his position I recommend that his salary be increased from \$2,100 to \$2,400 per annum.

To carry into effect these recommendations I therefore request that the salary schedule of this Department be revised by striking therefrom the following lines:

**Department of Public Charities—Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 30).**

(On November 26, 1913, a communication from the Chairman, Memorial Committee, G. A. R., Borough of Manhattan, urging action on the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for the transfer of \$9,000 to provide for a deficiency in the account, "Donations to Grand Army Veterans," as well as a report of the Comptroller recommending the transfer were presented to the Board and withdrawn by the Comptroller.)

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller of The City of New York:

Dear Sir—The funds provided for the use of this Department for the current year will have been exhausted when existing obligations have been met, and the distribution of funds among the several code headings of appropriations has been adjusted and readjusted by transfers of funds between supply, material and equipment accounts. It happens that by reason of the failure to fill the positions, certain funds appropriated for salaries will not be used. While it is understood there is objection to the transfer of funds for payment of salaries to other accounts, a situation has arisen which compels me to request a transfer of this kind.

It will be necessary to secure the sum of nine thousand dollars under Code 1100 to reimburse several Post Commanders, Grand Army of the Republic, for funds advanced to veterans in pursuance of chapter 102, Laws of 1910, amending chapter 46, Laws of 1909, known as the Poor Law, constituting chapter 42 of the Consolidated Laws, as per statements held in this office showing the amount of relief heretofore furnished.

It will further be necessary to secure the sum of an additional six thousand dollars under Code 1045, to pay for clothing, including shoes, underclothing and overcoats for inmates of institutions on Blackwells and Randalls Islands, the funds appropriated for this purpose having been entirely exhausted. It has been necessary to purchase, largely from State institutions, additional apparel to the value of the sum named, a part of which has been delivered to the Department on informal requests.

If the funds which cannot be used for the purpose intended cannot be transferred and made available for these purposes, it is requested that this letter shall be deemed a request for the issuance of revenue bonds in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000), and that these funds be made available at the earliest opportunity, else distress and discomfort must follow.

**To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:**

Gentlemen—On November 18 the Commissioner of Charities requested \$9,000 to reimburse Post Commanders of the Grand Army of the Republic for funds advanced to veterans in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 102 of the Laws of 1910, chapter 594 of the Laws of 1913 amending chapter 46 of the Laws of 1909, known as the Poor Law and constituting chapter 42 of the Consolidated Laws.

Section 80 provides in effect that no poor or indigent soldier, sailor or marine who has served in the military or naval service of the United States, nor his family, shall be sent to any almshouse, but shall be relieved and provided for at their homes in the city or town where they may reside, and the proper auditing board of such city or town or county is directed to provide such sum or sums as may be necessary to provide the relief.

Section 81 provides the manner in which the funds shall be disbursed. It says in part:

" \* \* \* In cities of the first class the said notice and said detailed statement shall be filed with the Comptroller of said city, and said undertaking shall be approved by him, and provided further that in any city of the first class which is now or may hereafter be divided into boroughs, a duplicate of such notice and of such detailed statement shall be filed with the Commissioner of Charities for the borough in which the headquarters of such post or camp is situated, and it shall be the duty of such Commissioner to annually include in his estimate of the amount necessary for the support of his department such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to carry into effect the provisions of sections 80, 81, 83, 84 and 85 of this chapter, and the proper officers charged with the duty of making the budget of any such city shall annually include therein such sum or sums as may be necessary for that purpose, provided, further, that in The City of New York, the relief shall be paid direct to the beneficiaries by the Commissioner of Public Charities on the recommendation signed by the relief committee, the Commander and the Quartermaster of such post or camp."

The appropriation made in the budget of 1913 has proved insufficient to meet the demands of this statute. There are no funds which can be transferred without conflicting with the rules of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment covering transfers. As this is a mandatory charge it is necessary to meet it by issuing special revenue bonds, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter. The Comptroller will provide for the payment by the issue of special revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of that subdivision.

(On October 16, 1913, the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities for an additional appropriation for the construction and equipment of a Dormitory, by rescinding the unencumbered balance in the corporate stock authorization for the construction of an addition to the East Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital, was referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee.)

The Secretary presented the following:  
Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, Foot of East 26th Street, October 9, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:  
Gentlemen—The contract for the construction of this building was awarded to the Richard Carvel Company, of 401 West 59th street, on August 2, 1912, for \$47,700. Later there was an allowance for some work omitted amounting to five hundred dollars (\$500). The Architect's fees were \$2,270.96, leaving a balance in the appropriation of \$50,000 of \$529.04. In the specifications, under heading "Responsibility," additional work is specified as follows:

"After the excavation has been made to the levels shown on plans, should there be found to exist soft earth, holes, fill, previous excavations or other obstacles to the securing of a good solid foundation, the Architect shall be notified forthwith in writing, and he will cause an examination to be made of the conditions as they exist. Should he decide that there is necessity for greater width, depth or extent of foundation work than is provided for by the plans and specifications, he shall so notify the Contractor in writing, indicating to what extent and under what conditions such additional work shall be performed.

"The Contractor shall forthwith proceed with the performance of the work, which shall be done under the conditions governing the same or similar work as contained in the specifications, plans and contract.

"As compensation in full for the performance of such additional work, the Contractor shall receive payment upon the following basis: For excavation and removal of earth, one dollar and twenty-five cents per cubic yard; for excavation and removal of rock, two dollars per cubic yard. (No material shall be considered as rock that can be removed by pick or bar, and without the use of explosive to displace same prior to removal; and no boulder shall be considered as rock unless it shall contain twenty-seven cubic feet or more.) For plain stone concrete placed in position, twenty-five cents per cubic foot. For reinforced concrete (including reinforcement) placed in position, thirty-five cents per cubic foot. No additional compensation will be made for sheet piling, bracing, shoring, underpinning, pumping or removal of water, or for any other purposes or labor or material in connection with the additional work as above provided for, the prices as so fixed being inclusive.

"Should the Architect determine that said foundations shall be started at a higher level than shown on plans, there shall be deducted from the contract a sum equal to the quantity of work so omitted, computed at the prices for the various items as herein fixed and determined upon for greater depths."

The facts are that when we got the foundation and cellar dug on this building we found bad bottom. The foundations had to be carried lower than were called for on our plans, in some spots four feet, others nine feet, eleven feet, seventeen feet and six inches; the piers under the columns, five feet, nine feet and six inches, and twelve feet. The additional excavating required on this work was 745.18 cubic yards; the additional stone concrete was 13,036 cubic feet; the additional reinforced concrete was 5,128 cubic feet, at the prices figured in the specifications, \$1.25 per cubic yard for excavation, 25 cents for plain stone concrete, per cubic foot, and 35 cents per cubic foot for reinforced concrete. All of these prices are away below what it actually cost the contractor to do this work. According to his specifications and contract, he is allowed nothing for sheet piling, shoring, nor pumping, and all of this had to be done so that he could get in this work for the foundation. I am sending you a diagram showing plainly what extra work was performed on this additional contract.

The Contractor has forwarded a bill for this work amounting to \$5,985.27, which has the Architect's approval, but we cannot forward it to the Department of Finance for audit and payment for the reason that there is not sufficient unencumbered funds in this corporate stock appropriation, known as C. C. H.—35A, to meet this bill. As the work was absolutely necessary, and has been actually done, I would respectfully request that the sum of \$6,000 be transferred from Corporate Stock Appropriation C. C. H.—33J to this C. C. H.—35A.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:  
Gentlemen—On October 9, 1913, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested the amendment of two resolutions approving the issue of corporate stock for the construction of two buildings on Blackwells Island. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

On July 17, 1911, corporate stock to the amount of \$50,000 was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the construction and equipment of a dormitory for female employees at City Hospital, Blackwells Island. The contract award for the construction of the building called for an expenditure of \$47,200; the architects' fees were \$2,270.96, leaving an unencumbered balance of \$529.04. The plans and specifications on which the contract was awarded contained the following provisions:

"After the excavation has been made to the levels shown on plans, should there be found to exist soft earth, holes, fill, previous excavations or other obstacles to the securing of a good solid foundation, the Architect shall be notified forthwith in writing, and he will cause an examination to be made of the conditions as they exist. Should he decide that there is necessity for greater width, depth or extent of foundation work than is provided for by the plans and specifications, he shall so notify the contractor in writing. \* \* \* The contractor shall forthwith proceed with the performance of the work, which shall be done under the conditions governing the same or similar work as contained in the specifications, plans and contract."

The specifications also provide that such additional work shall be paid for at stated prices per cubic foot or yard for excavating and concrete work.

After the work of construction had been started, it was found that, because of bad foundation conditions, the foundation would have to be carried from four to seventeen feet, and the piers for columns from five to twelve feet, lower than called for in the original plans and specifications. The cost of this additional work was \$5,985.27, and a bill for that amount has been approved by the architect. To provide funds for the increased cost, the Commissioner requests that \$6,000 be transferred from corporate stock authorized for the construction of an addition to East Tuberculosis Infirmary, Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island. Gentlemen—At a meeting of your Board held June 12, 1913, a resolution was adopted authorizing the issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$480,000 to provide means for the acquisition of school sites in the various Boroughs of the City of New York, which amount provided for a site in the vicinity of Ferry street, Ocean View and Woodland avenues, Woodhaven, Borough of Queens. This resolution was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on July 15, 1913, and approved by his Honor the Mayor on August 20, 1913.

At a meeting of the Board of Education held September 24, 1913, a resolution was adopted selecting and determining as a site for school purposes a plot of ground having a frontage on Ferry street of about 220 feet, with a rear depth on the southerly side of the plot of 190 feet, and a depth along Shipley street of 200 feet, with a width of about 219 feet.

The premises are in different ownerships, and I am prepared to recommend the purchase of two of the parcels of property included within the plot selected.

Parcel No. 1 consists of a plot of ground 100 by 100, at the southwesterly corner of Ferry and Shipley streets. The original price demanded by the owners for these premises was \$7,000, but after negotiation by the Comptroller the same may be secured for the sum of \$5,800.

Parcel No. 2 consists of two lots, one 20 by 120 and another 20 by 140. After negotiation by the Comptroller these two lots may be secured for the sum of \$2,400.

The price being reasonable and just, I respectfully recommend that your Board approve of the purchase of the following described premises for use of the Department of Education:

These credits arose out of the fact that the respective judgment accounts were charged for refunds of assessments which properly should have been charged to the

Street Improvement Fund (S. A-5). This condition was disclosed by an analysis of the latter account.

2. The unencumbered balances of appropriations for the years 1885 to 1912, inclusive, aggregating three hundred and nine thousand seven hundred and seventy-six dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$309,776.68), which the Departments having jurisdiction thereover report as no longer needed and available for transfer to the general fund of the City for the reduction of taxation, pursuant to chapter 237 of the Greater New York Charter.

2. The amount it is desired to retransfer from the general fund of the City for the reduction of taxation to cover deficits in the various accounts stated, necessitated by reconciliation work and by the receipt of vouchers from the various Departments and claims settled subsequent to the transfer to the general fund of the balances in the accounts chargeable. These deficits aggregate forty-seven thousand four hundred and ninety-eight dollars and forty-one cents (\$47,498.41).

In all instances there have been previously transferred to the general fund for the reduction of taxation from similar accounts of the same year or from the same revenue bond fund sums sufficient to cover the retransfers it is sought to effect by the resolution herewith.

The statement subjoined shows by Departments the amounts recommended herein to be transferred to the general fund. Respectfully submitted.

Dear Sir—On October 2, 1913, you addressed a letter to Mr. Thomas W. Churchill, President of the Board of Education, as follows:

"I have received a resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Normal College on September 24, 1913, requesting transfer of \$1,477.17 from 'No. 3372—Personal Service, Salaries Regular Employees, Instruction, Teaching Force' to 'No. 3384—Contract or Open Order Service, Janitorial Service.'"

"The rules adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the administration of this budget prohibit transfers from schedules of Salaries Regular Employees, to any other appropriation or schedule than Salaries Regular Employees."

"I understand that a new building of the Normal College is ready for service and two Elevators are needed. I suggest that you apply to the Board of Aldermen for special revenue bonds and I will be glad to recommend the issue."

This letter was referred to the Executive Committee of the Normal College, and, in accordance with your suggestion, a preamble and resolution was adopted on October 17, 1913, a copy of which is enclosed. The request for special revenue bonds was forwarded to the Board of Aldermen and was referred to the Committee on Finance. Under date of November 18, 1913, the Chairman of that Committee addressed a letter to the Secretary of the Board of Trustees reading as follows:

"Referring to your application (Introductory No. 4806) for a special revenue bond appropriation to pay the salary of a Janitor and Elevatorman, the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen is advised by the Comptroller that, in so far as your application may be favored by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, sufficient moneys are available for this use by transfer from the budgetary appropriations of other departments, under the direction of this Board. Owing to the strained condition of the revenue bond account, your application has been placed on file here and this recourse is suggested to you as the best means of obtaining the funds. If you will communicate with the Comptroller, that will be the quickest way of securing a determination of the matter."

Kindly advise us immediately as to the steps which should be taken to secure the necessary funds to the amount of \$1,477.17 for the payment of additional compensation to the Janitor of the Normal College and the compensation for the services of an Elevator Attendant to be employed. Gentlemen—On November 15, 1913, the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requested modification of five salary schedules for the year 1913, supporting request of October 29, 1913, for the transfer of \$5,300 within appropriations for 1913. In connection therewith I report as follows:

In No. 364, Bellevue Hospital, Operation of Hospital, a Trained Nurse, at \$800 per annum, is to be added for special service among typhoid convalescents, etc., and three Trained Nurses, at \$720 per annum, are added. A Laundress at \$600 is dropped.

In No. 366, Nurses' Residence, Operation, the rate of pay for a Cook is to be increased from \$720 to \$840 per annum, in order to retain the services of the present incumbent.

Six Trained Nurses, at \$600 per annum, are dropped in No. 367, Gouverneur Hospital, Operation of Hospital.

The other changes requested are to meet current conditions in the temporary force in the hospitals.

The General Medical Superintendent stated as follows:

"An increase in the nursing force and helpers at Bellevue Hospital is required, owing to the epidemic of typhoid fever which has prevailed for several months, and to increased activities. Patients suffering from typhoid need much greater care than the average of patients received in the hospital. The increase in



census of patients in Bellevue for 1913 has been about five per cent. over the year 1912.

Department of Street Cleaning—Modification of Schedules and Transfer of Appropriation (Cal. No. 71).

The Secretary presented the following:  
Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, 13-21 Park Row, New York, November 20, 1913.

Hon. ARDOLPH L. KLINE, Mayor, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:  
Sir—I have to request that a further revision of schedules and transfer, amount-



ing to the sum of \$21,120, be made within the appropriations allowed this Department for the year 1913, as per attached resolutions.

The reason for the above request is that the appropriations allowed for regular and temporary Drivers in the Borough of The Bronx is insufficient, and will become depleted before December 31, 1913. This condition is due to the increased population and additional mileage of streets, causing additional output of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish.

The number of Drivers allowed for the Borough of The Bronx is, therefore, below the actual number necessary for the proper collection each day.

City of New York, Department of Finance, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, December 3, 1913.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On November 20, 1913, the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning requested modification of four wage schedules in his office for the year 1913. Request was also made for the transfer of \$21,120 within appropriations. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The request is in Wages, Regular Employees, Carting and Stables, 1220, Manhattan; Carting and Stables, 1222, The Bronx; Wages, Temporary Employees, Sweeping and Cleaning, 1226, Manhattan; and Carting and Stables, 1231, The Bronx. In account No. 1220, it is proposed to decrease the number of Drivers from 759 at \$800 to 744 at \$800, and to increase the number of Stablemen from 109 at \$760 to 110 at \$760, and also to add a line, Balance unassigned, \$120. The schedule decrease in this account amounting to \$11,120, is to be transferred to No. 1122 for the purpose of increasing the number of Drivers from 135 at \$800 to 145 at \$800; Hostlers from 18 at \$800 to 20 at \$800 and Stablemen from 17 at \$760 to 19 at \$760.

In Wages, Temporary Employees, Sweeping and Cleaning, No. 1226, Manhattan, it is proposed to decrease the line Sweeper at \$2 per day, from 46,950 days to 26,950 days; Sweeper, Sunday at 25 cents per hour, from 200,000 hours to 172,000 hours; Section Station Keeper, Sunday pay at 25 cents per hour, from 7,200 hours to 5,200 hours, and to increase the lines Machine and Sprinkling Cart Driver at \$2 per day from 6,260 days to 24,760 days; Custodian of Yards, Sunday pay at 25 cents per hour, from 1,248 hours to 3,248 hours.

In Wages, Temporary Employees, Carting and Stables, 1231, The Bronx, it is proposed to decrease the line Driver, Sunday pay at 25 cents per hour, from 15,328 hours to 9,328 hours, and to increase the lines Driver, at \$2 per day, from 16,528 days to 21,528 days, and Hostler, at \$2 per day, from 1,839 days to 2,589 days. This proposed change in Wages, Temporary Employees, involves a transfer of \$10,000 from No. 1226 to 1231.

Owing to the increased population and the large increase in the mileage of streets in the Borough of The Bronx the Department of Street Cleaning was compelled early in the year to put on a large temporary force to supplement the regular force so that the increased output of garbage, ashes and rubbish might be properly and expeditiously handled and, in consequence, the appropriation for temporary Drivers, Hostlers and Stablemen carried in Wages, Temporary Employees, Carting and Stables, 1231, The Bronx, was exhausted by August 15, 1913. It is proposed to transfer the sum of \$10,000 from Wages, Temporary Employees, Sweeping and Cleaning, 1226, Manhattan, to Wages, Temporary Employees, Carting and Stables, 1231, The Bronx, in order that the present temporary force may be carried to the end of the year. The modifications affecting these two accounts are to permit of the transfer and to meet existing conditions. I recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions authorizing the transfer of \$10,000 referred to and revising the two wage schedules affected.

It is also proposed to transfer \$11,120 from Wages, Regular Employees, Carting and Stables, 1220, Manhattan, to Wages, Regular Employees, Carting and Stables, 1222, The Bronx. During the year the Department of Street Cleaning did not charge the wages of substitutes for regular employees to the regular employees' account, but aid them from temporary employees' accounts, which procedure unduly increased the accrued balances in the regular employees' account. As there seemed no probability of receiving special revenue bonds at the present time, the Department now requests the transfer of these accruals to the amount of \$11,120, which is in variance with the Budget rules, and I, therefore, recommend that the request be denied.

2. Taxes all bills of costs.
3. Signs subpoenas, commissions and writs.
4. Receives confessions of judgments.

Fee for filing judgments, 50 cents each.

*Four Record Clerks at \$1,000.*

Whose duties will be to place on file in their proper places all papers received each day, accept requisitions from the public for them, and return to their proper places.

*Four Messengers and Custodians at \$720.*

The County Clerk is required to produce on subpoena papers filed in this office before other Courts or Referees, and it will be the duty of these men to act in this capacity in addition to their duties in the office.

*Two Laborers at \$720.*

From the fact that the Bronx Court House is still unfinished, there will be a great deal of moving of furniture, cleaning, etc., and the services of these men will be required.

*One Telephone Operator at \$720.*

Under the present assignment of rooms to the County Clerk, he will have two rooms on the ground floor—one located in each corner of the building; and two rooms on the second floor, so it can be readily seen that an interior system of telephone service will have to be established.

*Two Marriage Bureau Clerks at \$1,200.*

Up to November 1, 1913, there were filed in the office of the City Clerk 4,137 marriage licenses, Bronx County, for the year 1913. The total amount for the year will be at least 5,000. These licenses, and all accompanying affidavits, have to be recorded in books by the County Clerk; and then an extra duplicate copy made of each to be forwarded to the Secretary of State. An examination of this branch will show how reasonable the County Clerk is in his request.

*One Confidential Stenographer at \$1,200.*

There are a very large number of communications received in every Clerk's office, requesting information concerning papers on file, and it is the duty of the County Clerk to answer these.

*One Searcher at \$2,100.*

The County Clerk is required to make and certify all searches requested, and it will be the duty of this Clerk to make and verify same.

*Two Clerks at \$300.*

*One Bookbinder at \$1,200.*

There are a great many papers filed in the County Clerk's Office, which, at the completion of the month are bound both for convenience and safety. Repairs will have to be made to books, lettering, etc., and for these reasons it is essential that this position should be granted.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:  
Gentlemen—I have the honor, as the Surrogate-elect of Bronx County, to present to you, for your consideration:

A list of positions and salaries provided for in the Bronx County Act, and a further list of positions and salaries necessary for the transaction of the business of the Surrogate's Office of Bronx County.

This list is designed to show the working force necessary to be provided for the new Surrogate's office of Bronx County by January 1, 1914, in addition to that provided in the Act, so that my office may be ready to begin business at once.

As you will note, the only positions provided in the Act are those of Probate Clerk, Administration Clerk, Chief Clerk and Cashier. No provision is made for ordinary clerical and other positions that, in my opinion, are absolutely necessary in order that the work of the Surrogate's office may be properly conducted. I am satisfied that I am asking for the creation of only such positions as are absolutely necessary to carry on business, and I respectfully recommend that in the several cases to which I will call attention the duties usually performed by separate individuals be, for the present, combined in one person, until it shall appear that the business of my office requires a separation of the duties of such positions.

I therefore suggest that instead of the appointment of a Clerk of the Court, these duties be added to those of Chief Clerk; that the duties of both offices be, for the present, performed by the same individual, and that the salary for this position be made \$3,000. I also recommend that to the duties of the Cashier provided in the Act there be added those of Accounting Clerk and Custodian of Records, for the reason that in the beginning of my administration of the office, at any rate, the duties of the Cashier and Accounting Clerk will be very light.

In order properly to administer my office, and attend to my duties as Surrogate, it will be necessary that I be provided with one Law Assistant, who shall also, for the present, perform the duties of a Clerk to the Surrogate, and that the salary for this position be made \$3,500. This is a position that will require not only a competent and experienced lawyer, but also a man of executive and administrative ability, whose responsibilities will be great, and whose position will be confidential.

I suggest the combination of the duties as above set forth, on the ground of economy. While I am satisfied that the volume of business of the Surrogate's Court will be large, yet, on the ground of economy, I would prefer the combinations suggested until it is demonstrated that the volume of business is so great that it will be necessary to separate the duties.

As to the other positions and salaries mentioned in the list, I am satisfied that I am not asking for the creation of any more positions than will be absolutely essential to properly begin the administration of my office in an efficient and economical manner. I have limited my requests to the minimum requirements of the office. I therefore respectfully ask and urge that the requests and recommendations I make be granted and adopted, and that the Board make an appropriation for the expenses necessary to carry out the same.

I would also request that, in view of the short time remaining before the 1st of January next, the matters I have submitted to you herein be taken up and disposed of as expeditiously as the business of the Board will permit.

## As to the Foregoing Memorandum.

The statistics, in round numbers as to population, used are from the Municipal Year Book for 1913, page 170. Amounts are stated in round numbers.

This memorandum apparently shows: That where the population is densest the expense will be greatest. An obvious explanation is that intercommunication is easier in a densely population section than in a sparsely settled one. It is easier to do business and volume of business is greater.

That the per capita expense for Bronx (\$0.0602) would be less than that for Queens (\$0.683), although Bronx has 584,000 population in 41 square miles (density, 2,014) and Queens 360,000 in 129 square miles (density, 4).

That the expense of the Surrogate's Court for the County of The Bronx would be proportionally less on the basis of the positions and salaries asked, in the pending application, than in New York or Queens, and about the same as in Kings. Excluding Surrogates' salaries the expense in Kings would be greater and in Queens a little less.

### Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held December 9, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary

Code be and the same is hereby amended to take effect January 1, 1914, so as to read as follows:

Section 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure in front of any building and not upon the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly banded, packed or otherwise secured.

Any receptacle containing garbage or liquid substances, which shall be placed outside of a building in the area or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure shall be covered and kept covered until such removal, as aforesaid.

The foregoing provisions are applicable throughout The City of New York, except that in the Borough of Richmond ashes from house furnaces shall be kept in a receptacle separate and apart from the remainder of the household waste, and no material other than furnace ashes shall be placed in said receptacle. Other household waste materials, including garbage, kitchen ashes, sweepings, soiled paper or rubbish shall be placed in a separate metal or metal lined receptacle, which when placed outside of a building for removal shall be covered and kept covered with a tight fitting cover.

No receptacle shall when filled contain more than two cubic feet of material nor weigh more than one hundred pounds, and a sufficient number of receptacles shall be provided by the owner, lessee or occupant of a building to hold whatever ashes or other waste materials may accumulate thereat during sixty hours next preceding the removal thereof.

Newspapers, wrapping paper and other light rubbish likely to be blown or scattered about the street shall be securely banded, tied or packed before being placed for removal. Yard sweepings, hedge cuttings, grass, leaves, earth, stone bricks or trade waste shall not be mixed with household waste.

Accumulations of household refuse resulting from failure to take advantage of the regular collection service shall be removed at the expense of the person or persons concerned.

Whereas, Bichloride of mercury, otherwise corrosive sublimate, a poison, has frequently been taken by mistake and loss of life has resulted therefrom, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended by the adoption of an additional section to be known as section sixty-seven (a), to take effect March 1, 1914, and to read as follows:

Section 67a. Bichloride of mercury, otherwise known as corrosive sublimate, shall not be held, kept, sold or offered for sale at retail in the dry form except in colored tablets individually wrapped, the wrapper to have the word "Poison" in plain letters conspicuously placed, and dispensed in sealed containers of glass, conspicuously labeled with the word "Poison" in red letters.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of 1913, by and between The City of New York, (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Desbrosses, Vestry, Washington, Greenwich and Canal streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, to and across the Manhattan Bridge, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, was amended by



extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated September 25, 1913, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated July 10, 1912, to wit:

First—By substituting for that portion of the route authorized by said contract of July 10, 1912, upon and along Rockwell place, Flatbush ave. from Rockwell place to 4th ave., 4th, Atlantic and 3d aves., in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following routes:

(a) An additional single track upon and along Fulton st. from Flatbush Avenue Extension to Rockwell place; thence by double track upon and along Fulton st. and Ashland place from Rockwell place to Hanson place.

(b) A single track upon and along Lafayette ave. and Flatbush ave. from the above described route on Ashland place to and connecting with the existing route of the Company in Flatbush ave. between 3d ave. and Livingston st.

Second—By amending Section 2, sixth of said contract of July 10, 1912, by permitting the use of overhead electric power upon the Manhattan Bridge, its terminals and approaches.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, to certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of July 10, 1912, to wit: said modifications and amendments to be as follows:

1. So much of section 1, first (2) of said contract dated July 10, 1912, reading as follows:—"thence by single track in and upon Fulton street to Rockwell place, thence by single track in and upon Rockwell place to Flatbush avenue, thence by single track in and upon Flatbush avenue to 4th avenue, thence by single track in and upon 4th avenue to Atlantic avenue, thence by single track in and upon Atlantic avenue to 3d avenue, thence by single track in and upon 3d avenue to Flatbush avenue."—is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"thence by double track in and upon Fulton street to Ashland place, thence by double track in and upon Ashland place to the northerly side of Hanson place. Also a branch beginning at and connecting with the above described route at the intersection of Ashland place and Lafayette avenue; thence by single track in and upon Lafayette avenue to Flatbush avenue."

2. By adding at the end of Section 1-First of said contract of July 10, 1912, a new paragraph reading as follows:

"The said substituted routes with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled: 'Map Showing Proposed Substitute Route of the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York,' to accompany petition to Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 25, 1913, and signed by Frederick W. Rowe, President, and J. C. Brackenridge, Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, it to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board."

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms, provisions and conditions contained in said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated July 10, 1912, to wit:

1913, excepting those which are herein amended or modified, shall remain unchanged, and shall apply to the route herein described in Section 1 of this contract, with the same force and effect as when they applied to the route described in said contract dated July 10, 1912, and as though the route herein described had been specifically described in said contract.

Second—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on the routes herein described in and upon Fulton street, Ashland place, Lafayette avenue and Flatbush avenue, to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the company shall, within said six (6) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Third—The Company shall within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of section 184 of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of the route granted by said contract dated July 10, 1912, shown in yellow upon the map attached hereto, and more particularly described as follows:

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 6 of Routes 4 and 38, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows: Section No. 6—Beginning at a point under 7th ave., in the Borough of Manhattan, about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly building line of W. 30th st., and extending thence northerly under 7th ave. to a point about one hundred (100) feet south of the southerly building line of W. 43d st.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four and five tracks. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast, nor to do station finish work.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections along or off the route of the railroad; also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, including underpinning or the maintaining, protecting and securing, where necessary, of all buildings, monuments, surface and subsurface railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures of any kind, etc., affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work; also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

The method of construction will be by trench excavation under cover, unless otherwise permitted by the Commission, as set forth in the form of contract.

Bidders must examine the form of contract and the specifications, maps and plans; must visit the location of the work and inform themselves of the present conditions along the line thereof and make their own estimates of the facilities and difficulties attending the execution of the proposed work.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth, and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated, in the printed form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. The printed form of contract and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of discharging part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per centum of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. The contractor is to accept the obligation of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to make payments to the amount and in the manner provided in the contract, and is to agree not to look to the City except to the extent that the amounts earned under the contract may exceed the amount for which the Interborough Rapid Transit Company is liable.

The Commission is informed by the Department of Docks and Ferries that docks and bulkheads along the East River or along the North River may be available for dumping purposes. Information in regard thereto may be obtained by any intending bidder upon inquiry at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries with whom all arrangements must be made with respect to utilizing such docks and bulkheads as may be available.

Partial payments to the contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds, as provided in the form of contract.

The contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable and within a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of the delivery of the contract.

The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids, and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The unit prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

Fourth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, our final report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 6th day of February, 1914, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Fifth—In case, however, objections are filed to any of said abstracts of estimate and assessment, the notice of motion to confirm our final report herein will stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified, and of which notice will be given to all those who have theretofore appeared in this proceeding, as well as by publication in the City Record, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

##### TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
