The Board of Health met this day.
281 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.
The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 32 cases.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized to communicate with Captains Ward and Washburn of the Police Department, in respect to the transportation of offal in their precincts.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized and directed to communicate with Captain Gunner of the Street Cleaning Bureau, in respect to the deposit of street dirt, garbage, etc., at

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized to issue a temporary permit to Richard Stoker to render fat at One Hundred and Sixty-third street and Washington avenue.

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby authorized and directed to employ the necessary men for the purpose of disinfecting street gutters, privies, etc., as per list, this day approved by the Board, the work to commence on the 15th day of May.

Resolved, That the President and Commissioner Janeway be and are hereby appointed a committee, with power, on erection of the necessary additional pavilions at Blackwell's Island for the proper care of contagious diseases.

Resolved, That, upon the report of the Sanitary Superintendent to the effect that the Original Scavenger Company has performed its work in a satisfactory manner, this Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor a renewal of the license as scavenger for one year, from February 1, 1877.

Resolved, That in the opinion of the Board of Health, the apparatus submitted to the Sanitary Superintendent by the applicants for licenses as scavengers, viz., Peter Dusser and Charles Froman, does not comply with the requirements of the Sanitary Code, and is insufficient for the purpose, and that it is not advisable to grant licenses to persons proposing to use such apparatus for the removal of night soil.

Resolved, That the usual vacation of two weeks be granted to each of the officers and clerks of this Board, and that the Secretary, Sanitary Superintendent and Attorney be and are hereby authorized and directed to so arrange the vacations of the subordinates, respectively, that the business of this Department shall in nowise be interrupted or its efficiency impaired by such leaves of absence.

Resolved, That the excuse of Dr. McElroy, charged with violation of the Sanitary Code in not reporting cases of contagious diseases, be and is hereby accepted.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the two weeks ending May 5, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,573, as follows, viz.: 1 public buildings, 685 tenement houses, 181 private dwellings, 15 other dwellings, 17 manufactorys and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 41 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 6 manure dumps, 4 public sewers, 57 milk inspections, 1 quarry, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dyeing establishment, 1 coal yard, 1 bone-cleaning establishment, 27 yards, courts, and areas, 65 cellars and basements, 164 waste-pipes and drains, 119 privies and water-closets, 31 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 7 dangerous chimneys, 2 cesspools, 10 other nuisances, together with 34 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 499.

During the past week 111 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 77 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

140 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 66 premises, where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 63 houses, 63 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of small-pox and 1 case of scarlet fever were removed to the Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, May 5, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 472 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 44 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 472 deaths, 156 marriages, 460 births, 44 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 68 returns from coroners. There were 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 22 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—472 deaths were reported during the week ending Saturday, May 5, 1877, which is a decrease of 8 as compared with the preceding week, and 84 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending April 28, was 496, which is 61 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,074,504.

There was a decrease during the past compared with the preceding week of 1 death from small-pox, 7 from scarlatina, 11 from diphtheria, 8 from whooping cough, from typhoid fever, 2 from cerebro-spinal fever, 1 from puerperal diseases, 7 from rheumatism and gout, 2 from diseases of the heart, 5 from marasmus and scrofula, 14 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1 from enteritis, peritonitis, and gastritis, and 4 from suicide; and an increase of 3 deaths from measles, 1 from croup, 1 from erysipelas, 2 from malarial fevers, 9 from diarrhoea diseases, 4 from inanition, want of breast milk, etc., 15 from phthisis pulmonalis, bronchitis 3 pneumonia 14, hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis 8, Bright's disease and nephritis 10, cyanosis 1, and deaths by drowning 4.

Of the total number of deaths for the week, 86 were in institutions, 251 in tenement houses, 117 in houses containing 3 families and less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, boats, streets, etc. 6 were on the basement floor, 101 on the first, 127 on the second, 84 on the third, 46 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth, and 1 on the top. 404 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-residents. 50 were reported as single, 109 married, 63 widowed, and the condition of 250 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 516 deaths and still-births, or 90.50 per cent. of the total reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish) 9, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 170, City (pauper burial ground) undenominational 72, Greenwood (undenominational) 40, Lutheran (undenominational) 80, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 19, Evergreen (undenominational) 31, Woodlawn (undenominational) 16, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 4, Union (Methodist Protestant) 6, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 6, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 4, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 4, Washington (undenominational) 6.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending April 28, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, —; Third, 5; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 8; Sixth, 7; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 37; Twelfth, 39; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 14; Fifteenth, 13; Sixteenth, 14; Seventeenth, 25; Eighteenth, 25; Nineteenth, 82; Twentieth, 32; Twenty-first, 35; Twenty-second, 36; Twenty-third, 7, and Twenty-fourth, 4.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 5, was 51.1 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 56, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.729 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,427, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.73 inches.
