DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, ROOM 19, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, December 23, 1880.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR-At the time when the departmental estimate of the Department of Public Works for 1881 was prepared and submitted to your Board, proceedings were pending in the Supreme Court to determine the question whether the Fulton Market building, which had been condemned as unsafe, should be taken down or repaired. The Court having recently decided and ordered that the building be repaired, I respectfully submit an estimate of the amount required to repair and reconstruct it in such manner as to render it entirely and permanently safe, as required by the order of the Court; to have as little interference as possible with the market business during the progress of the work, and to provide the most suitable and convenient accommodations for such business on the completion of the work.

provide the most suitable and convenient accommodations for such business on the completion of the work.

The present market is in two distinct portions—the old market proper, two stories high, facing on Fulton, Front, and Beekman streets—and the inner and more recent portion, on a different level, facing on South street. The older portion is in much more need of repair than the latter.

It is proposed to rebuild the walls of the older portion in sections, the standholders to be removed in turns to a temporary shed to be erected in Burling slip; the floor to be on a level with the present floor of the inner portion; the building to be one story high, except on the corners and in the centre of the part facing on Front street, where a second story is to be added for offices, closets, and wash-rooms; the walls to be of such design as to afford complete light and ventilation, and of sufficient strength to carry upper stories, if desired to be added in the future, or an iron and glass roof over the central portion; the roof to be of such construction as to insure a more equable temperature than at present; the present roof over the central part, which was recently repaired, to be retained; a suitable drain to be laid under the floor in place of the present surface drainage; an iron shed on brackets to be built around the market over the sidewalks in place of the present sheds; the exterior to be without unnecessary ornamentation, but of a dignified and attractive design; the whole improvement to be of a permanent character, and to include necessary repairs to the inner market. This plan abolishes the cellar shops on Fulton, Front, and Beekman streets. The expense is estimated at \$100,000.

I therefore respectfully ask that this amount be included in the final estimate for 1881, and set apart for this purpose for the use of this Department. I transmit herewith a plan of the improvement, and will be glad to furnish further details in reference thereto, if desired.

Bidders will distinctly write out in their bids, both in figures and in words, the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

Should the lowest bidder or bidders neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight (48) hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or estimate, or if, after acceptance, he or they shall refuse or neglect to execute the contract and give the proper security for forty-eight (48) hours after notice that the same is ready for execution, he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation; and the contract will be re-advertised and re-let, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

An ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 75, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpoid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-inie shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.
