

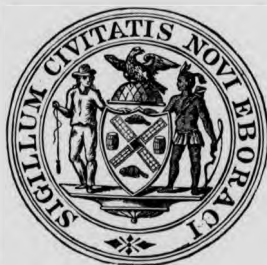

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Sarah O'Connor to retain the stand for the sale of fruit, now in front of No. 542 East Fourteenth street, the work done at own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 28, 1884.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, August 4, 1884, with his objections thereto.

In Board of Aldermen, August 18, 1884, taken up, reconsidered, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That Wednesday, the 10th day of September, 1884, at 11 o'clock A. M., and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen be and are designated as the time and place when and where the application of the Bleeker Street and Fulton Ferry Railroad Company for the consent and permission of the Common Council that said Bleeker Street and Fulton Ferry Railroad Company may construct, maintain, operate and use an extension or branch of its railroad in and through Mail street, from Park Row to Broadway, connecting with the present tracks of said company in Park Row and with any railroad track that may be laid and constructed in Broadway, will first be considered, and also all other applications from other companies for like privileges presented at this meeting of the Board, and that public notice be given by the Clerk of this Board by publishing the same daily for fourteen days, Sundays excepted, in two newspapers published in the City of New York, to be designated by his Honor the Mayor, according to the provisions of chapter 252 of the Laws of 1884; such advertising to be at the expense of the petitioners.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, August 18, 1884.

Approved by the Mayor, August 19, 1884, and the "New York Star" and the "New York Daily Commercial Bulletin" were designated as the newspapers referred to.

Resolved, That the grade of Ninety-first street, between Third and Fourth avenues, be and the same is hereby changed so as to conform to the red line and figures as shown on accompanying profile or diagram, more than two-thirds of the owners in lineal feet fronting upon the street having duly petitioned therefor, as required by law; and that the Commissioner of Public Works be and is hereby authorized to take such proceedings as may be legally required to carry into effect this resolution.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSION.

NEW YORK, August 2, 1884.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held August 2, 1884, at 3 P. M., at Mayor's office, all the members being present.

After an examination of the maps showing the location of the sites which had been offered to the Board, the members proceeded to make a personal inspection of the various plots, embracing about twenty different locations on the West Side of the city, and an equal number on the East Side. While en route, an inspection was made of the locations of a number of armories now occupied, and subsequently a very full and careful inspection was made of the Seventh Regiment Armory and its appliances, after which the Board adjourned to meet upon the call of the President.

NEW YORK, August 19, 1884.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held at the office of the President, his Honor the Mayor, City Hall, this date, all the members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A letter from Messrs. F. H. Cossitt and Joseph H. Godwin, offering for sale the plot of ground bounded by Ninth avenue, Boulevard, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, was read by the Secretary, received and ordered to be placed on file.

A letter from Mr. F. Yoran, offering for sale the plot of ground bounded by Fourth and Madison avenues, Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, was read by the Secretary, received and ordered to be placed on file.

The Secretary reported, that for the purpose of obtaining the fullest information in regard to the value of lots in the vicinity of the plots offered for sale he had addressed a letter, asking the opinion of a number of well-known real estate dealers as to the value of lots in the vicinity, and submitted written replies from Messrs. W. J. Barnes, Hall J. How, J. F. B. Smythe, S. De Walltears, V. K. Stevenson, Jr., and S. V. R. Cruger, which were read and ordered to be placed on file.

Letters from George B. Post, on his own behalf, and from Rev. Thomas S. Hastings, on behalf of his son, asking recognition as architects in connection with plans for armories, were received and ordered to be placed on file.

After discussion of the needs and requirements of different organizations, and the probable cost of ground and buildings, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary is hereby directed to prepare an estimate of the probable cost of ground and buildings for armories of the several organizations whose applications have been received and approved by this Board, in compliance with the conditions prescribed in the resolution of the Sinking Fund Commission, passed July 28, 1884, authorizing sale of bonds and expenditure of \$2,000,000 for this purpose.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending August 2, 1884, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending July 26, 1884.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 726 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 2, 1884, which is a decrease of 162, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 15 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending July 26, 1884, was 825, which is 40.8 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 31.53 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,360,612.
