

REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending December 3, 1887, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending November 26, 1887.

Col. EMMONS CLARK, Secretary Board of Health :

Six—There were 658 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 3, 1887, which is an increase of 33, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 122 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending November 26, 1887, was 632, which is 1.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.91 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,499,786.
