AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, November 3, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway and Fish.

Also, Chief Engineer Church and Consulting Engineer Fteley; and Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the meeting of October 27 were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 2108 to 2134, inclusive, amounting to \$4,088.72; and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the President, the Chairman of the Committee on Construction and the Chief Engineer, or either of them, are hereby authorized to issue permits to visit and inspect the work on the New Aqueduct, or any part thereof, to persons requesting the same, whose applications are approved by them or either of them.

On motion of Commissioner Ridgway, the same was adopted.

The Committee on Real Estate presented the following report:

The Committee on Real Estate make the following report and recommendation concerning the additional lands to be obtained at the Pocantico Open Cut No. 8, and at the Ravensdale road for Shaft No. 15½.

At the Pocantico Cut there are six additional parcels of land to be acquired. These lands belong to four different owners, all of whom have been conferred with, and it is apparent that no agreement with them, as to compensation, can be reached which this Committee could recommend, or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment would approve. There are also other obstacles in the house of montrages, tenancies, etc., which complicate matters and militate against an adjustment by agreement.

We therefore recommend that proceedings to condemn the property be immediately taken, and that the initiatory public hearing in the matter be given at as early day as possible.

From the conferences with the owners and their attorneys, this Committee has reason to believe that these new proceedings being once under way, all the parties will then consent to an immediate amendment of former proceedings and thus shorten the time of obtaining possession of the lands by at least one month. We recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.
