WEDNESDAY, December 18, 1878.

The Board of Education held a regular session on Wednesday, at 4 P. M., at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets.

Absent—Commissioner Vermilye—1.

Commissioner Vermilye was excused for absence.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several Wards:

From the Third, Fourth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, and Twenty-first Wards, relative to absences of teachers, etc. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Seventh, Ninth, and Fourteenth Wards, asking for a suspension of the By-Laws, and the payment of sundry bills. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Election, and Qualifications.

From the Ninth Ward, asking that sections 46, 50, and 51 of the By-Laws be modified. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, Election, and Qualifications.

From the Ninth Ward, for an appropriation for an iron stairway for Grammar School No. 3. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From John S. Hulin, relative to ventilating the Hall of the Board. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

From L. R. Satterlee, J. D. West, H. Law, H. A. Gouge & Co., P. H. & F. M. Root, and L. T. Houghton, relative to their several systems of ventilation, etc. Referred to the Committee on Warming and Ventilation.

From John McChristie, a bill for extra work, etc. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

Commissioner Watson moved that when the Board adjourn, it adjourns to meet on Thursday, December 26, at four o'clock P. M. Adopted.

Commissioner Beardslee offered a resolution to suspend the schools on Friday, January 3, 1879. Referred to the Committee on By-laws to report at this session.

The report of the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to the consolidation of the Committees on Buildings, Sites, and New Schools, and Warming and Ventilation. Report not adopted.

The report of the Committee on By-laws, etc., relative to the payment of the maximum salary for fourteen years' service to the Principals in the Eighth District (Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards). Adopted.

The report of the Committee on By-laws, etc., relative to sundry bills of the Seventh and Thirteenth Wards. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The report of the Committee on Teachers, nominating Miss E. M. Jackman for Principal of Female Department Grammar School No. 36. Adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee, recommending payment of sundry bills for repairs, etc., from several wards. Adopted.

Commissioner Jelliffe called up his resolution relative to placing Brown's First Lines of Grammar on the list of supplies. The President put the question whether the Board would adopt said motion, and it was decided in the negative. The remainder of the list of books named in the resolution were laid on the table.
