DEPARTMENT OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS, TWENTY-THIRD AND TWENTY-FOURTH WARDS.

Report for the Three Months Ending September 30, 1891.

CITY OF NEW YORK—COMMISSIONER OF STREET IMPROVEMENTS,

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor :

SIR—In compliance with the provisions of section 49 of the Laws of 1882, and chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards hereby submits the following statement of the transactions of this office during the three months ending September 30, 1891.

During the quarter there were sixty-two contracts in progress, eight contracts completed and twenty-seven new contracts made.

During the quarter 5,610 27-100 lineal feet of sewers have been constructed, 583 spurs have been laid, 50 manholes and 15 receiving-basins have been built, 21,086 square yards of pavement have been laid, 34,688 lineal feet of new curb have been set, 115,240 square feet of new flagging have been laid, 11,334 square feet of bridge stone have been laid, 9,540 cubic yards of rock and 14,087 cubic yards of earth have been excavated; 90,522 cubic yards of filling have been done.

Under the Maintenance Bureau, during the said quarter, sixty-five different earth roads, wholly or in part, have been repaired and improved, comprising 1,384,822 square feet.

129,545 square feet of material were used in constructing new and in repairing old macadam roads; 16,764 square feet of pavement have been taken up and relaid; 1,856 lineal feet of new and old crosswalks have been relaid; 1,006 lineal feet of old curb-stone have been taken up and reset; over 32 miles of gutters have been opened and cleaned; 801 lineal feet of new gutters have been paved; 1,156 lineal feet of new and old stone drains have been built and repaired; 436 lineal feet of box drains have been constructed and laid; 221 receiving-basins have been cleaned; 3,025 lineal feet of sewers have been cleaned; 95 trees have been cut down and removed, and 136 trees have been pruned.

Twelve bridges over the Bronx river, Cromwell's and other creeks, have been repaired and painted.

"B."—Final Maps.

Studies and examination for the street systems of Sections 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 have been made, which comprise the territory bounded by Third avenue, Westchester avenue, Southern Boulevard, Hunt's Point road and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad. All the calculations for the side lines, angles, grades, etc., of avenues and streets of Section 1, also duplicate copies of

maps or plans and profiles were completed during the quarter. The changes of streets on Section 1, from previously filed maps, and the necessity of producing a plan which conforms and completes the maps filed by the Commissioners of Morrisania under chapter 841 of the Laws of 1868, rendered it necessary to bestow more labor on the work than was expected on account of discrepancies in former maps. The calculations and surveys of Section 2 are well under way, and will be completed before the end of the year; also, the necessary maps and plans and profiles will be ready for presentation to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement. Sections 3, 4 and 5 are in preparation in the draughting-room, but the calculations cannot be commenced until the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards and the Board of Street Opening and Improvement approve the street system.
