Present—President Haffen, Councilmen Hottenroth and Murray, and Aldermen McGrath and Geiger.

Minutes of meeting of January 5, 1899, read and adopted.

## HEARINGS.

Canal Place, Opening, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street.

The following petition was read:

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President of the Borough of The Bronx:

SIR—The undersigned respectfully request that proceedings be initiated at once to open, regulate and grade the street designated on the final map of this section as Canal place, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, believing it to be for the public interest so to do, because:

1. This private slip is a public nuisance, the continued existence of which, after its official condemnation, is a disgrace to a great municipality like ours, and it is
2. A menace to health, having been condemned by the Board of Health of this city.
3. A depreciator of rental and property values, and
4. A drawback to the development of an important section of this borough.

A communication from George W. Raymond (without date), received on the 5th instant, was also read:

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN and Board of Public Improvements:

GENTLEMEN—I hand you copy of petition against filling Mott Haven canal, filed with former Department of Street Improvements, and wish you to know if the canal is filled, it will destroy the value of my property and my business.

I also herein hand you copy of petition of property-owners (representing nearly all the property fronting on the canal north of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street) against closing the canal and building the useless street to run up against the wall at One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, or be graded up to said street, and thereby leave the lots adjoining in a hole. Much damage must be collected against the city if this uncalled-for street is constructed. The public have no use for it, and the property-owners interested and who would be assessed for it are opposed to it. Two young men not taxpayers and not living in the neighborhood of the canal are the agitators for closing the canal. Ex-Mayor Gilroy said during his Mayoralty: "It is one canal, all bad or all good, and who can draw a line at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, making a distinction?"

President Haffen announced that while the petition called for the opening, regulating and grading of Canal place, the hearing would be confined to the legal opening, as that would, of course, have to be accomplished before the regulating and grading could be considered.

Mr. Edward A. Maher, Jr., representing the North River Electric Light and Power Company, spoke first in opposition to the petition for closing the canal. He stated that Mr. Albert E. Davis, the first signer of the petition, and who had evinced considerable interest in the agitation, had no financial interest in the question; that he was irresponsible, and that he represented nobody but himself. He [Mr. Davis] professed to have the North Side at heart, but he [Mr. Maher] questioned whether he [Mr. Davis] really enjoyed the privilege of representing the people. Regarding the reasons for not closing the canal, Mr. Maher said that the water-front was very essential to the business of the company that he represented. When it was about starting, it looked around for a suitable location, but it could not get one elsewhere at all so reasonable as on the canal.

The decadence of the commercial interests of The City of New York had been discussed recently, he remarked, and the North Side Board of Trade had urged the city authorities to do something in the matter. Here, he said, was nearly half a mile of water-front which could be made more desirable and useful. It was unfair to suggest the closing of the canal from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street north, and he saw no reason why a line should be drawn at this point. He was unable to understand why the nuisance should be said to begin at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street. He admitted that the canal was unsightly, but it could be fixed up and charged to those immediately interested. The lower part was docked up, and why not the upper part? He thought it a great injustice that the persons who would suffer by the closing of the canal would have to pay for it. One million dollars of capital, he thought, should not be jeopardized to give Mr. Marx a corner lot. Mr. Maher further remarked: "We do not care what the expense is of beautifying the canal if it shall be decided that that

course shall be taken. The closing of the canal would cost us \$30 additional each day for hauling coal, not to speak of the extra cost for water." The company is now using the canal water for certain purposes, and it is also using the city water, for which it pays. A conservative estimate of the damages, Mr. Maher said, that the company would suffer by the closing of the canal would be half a million of dollars, and it would be contested, if necessary, in every court, including the United States Supreme Court.

Councilman Murray inquired what effect a permanent bridge would have at One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and Mr. Maher answered that that would solve the whole difficulty.

Mr. J. C. Styles also opposed the petition, stating that he had bought property along the canal, but had decided not to utilize it, as he had intended, owing to the closing agitation.

Mr. Ferd. V. Morrison also opposed the petition, stating that the Board of Health had power to abate the nuisance if it wanted to.

Mr. John Dalton, coal-dealer, said he had bought property on the canal ten years ago, and had spent \$2,500 for docking purposes. If the canal were to be closed his business would be ruined and his damages would amount to \$25,000.

Mr. L. A. Marks appeared in favor of petition. He stated that the estate he represented had 150 feet frontage along the canal and 210 feet frontage on One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and that he would not consider a trade of this property for the property of the North River Electric-light and Power Company. He had as much private interest at stake, he thought, as the North River Electric-light and Power Company. He read extracts from an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, dated December 8, 1898, in regard to the closing of the canal, and also read extracts from other official documents in relation to the subject. He stated that the objection of Mr. Styles should not be considered, for the reason that Mr. Styles had made an affidavit in another proceeding that his business had been affected, not by the canal question, but by the change of grade of Railroad avenue.

As to the question of health as affected by the odors arising from the canal, he said that an old gentleman facetiously known as "Exhibit A," had been presented before another official body as an illustration of the life-preserving qualities of the canal. It had been discovered, however, that "Exhibit A" was a minstrel of some renown who traveled nine months in the year and went to Europe every summer for the benefit of his health, notwithstanding the salubrity of his home surroundings.

Mr. Marks thought that the claim of \$500,000 damages of the North River Electric-light and Power Company was excessive in view of the fact that it had bought three lots for \$16,000. He dwelt upon the condemnation of the canal north of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street by the Board of Health, and cited the fact that in an area of twelve square blocks only four opponents appeared, and one of them had no right to be present. Mr. Marks referred to a petition of the Doctors' Club, in favor of closing the canal, signed by twenty-five physicians. They urged that the canal be closed on account of its detriment to health.

The petition to the old Board of Street Opening and Improvement was also referred to. Mr. Marks stated that all the city officials, for some years past, who had anything to do with the canal question, were in favor of closing it.

He contended that the Dock Department had no right to dredge the canal. Councilman Murray wanted to know if any of the signers of the petition had property along the canal. Mr. Anderson, one of the petitioners, answered in the negative.

President Haffen said it was not necessary that the petitioners should own property fronting on the canal. Any person likely to be assessed had a right to petition.

Councilman Hottenroth remarked that legally speaking there was no canal, as the filed maps showed a street in place of the canal.

Mr. Albert E. Davis, a signer of the petition, said that being an "irresponsible person," as he was referred to, he was rather surprised to find himself present advocating the closing of the canal, which had been approved by every Board. The interest of the community, he said, demanded its closing.

Mr. Anderson said that he had had business near the canal for nearly thirty years and he knew that property had depreciated in consequence of its existence nearly fifty per cent., and that he represented a large number of property-owners in the vicinity who desired the canal closed.

Councilman Hottenroth moved that the matter be referred to a committee for report.

Alderman McGrath moved to amend that the Board go into executive session on the matter. Councilman Hottenroth withdrew his proposed motion and seconded the motion of Alderman McGrath. Which was carried unanimously with the understanding that parties interested would have weeks time to submit papers in support of their respective views.

East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Street Macadamizing, from Simpson (Barretto) Street to Westchester Avenue.

Petition of the estate of Mary L. Tiffany by George Fox Tiffany, agent, and others was read. On motion of Councilman Murray the matter was referred to the Deputy Commissioner of Highways with recommendation.
