#### LOCAL BOARD.

FIFTH DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Meeting in Room 11, Borough Hall, at 10.30 A. M., Friday, September 14, 1900.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names:

Edward M. Grout, President, in the chair; Councilman Doyle and Alderman Kenney.

The President of the borough stated that the purpose of the meeting was to consider the proposition of acquiring land as a highway along the ocean front of Coney Island from the Concourse lands to Beach Thirty-seventh street, and also other propositions for the improvement of conditions at Coney Island.

(No. 208.)

The President submitted the following report:

BROOKLYN, N. Y., September 4, 1900.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with instructions from you to prepare a tentative plan, with estimate of cost, of a board walk along the ocean front at Coney Island, I report as follows:

The City can, by condemning land one hundred feet inland from high-water mark and parallel with the shore from West Fitth street, adjoining the Concourse lands, to Beach Thirty-seventh street, procure sufficient land on which to construct a substantial board walk 50 feet wide and about 8,000 feet long, leaving a beach of 50 feet at high tide, and at low tide a beach varying from 100 to 200 feet. ing from 100 to 200 feet.

The apportioned estimated value of the land required, based on the assumption that the assessed valuation is only 60 per cent. of the real or market value, would be about \$190,000.

I have had considerable experience in the Apportionment Department in the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes in New York and Queens Counties, and have apportioned values in more than a thousand cases. The above estimate is therefore not guesswork, but based on rules and

figures now in force.

The value of buildings and other obstructions now erected on the strip of land referred to would not, in my judgment exceed \$110,000. They are for the most part frame structures, unpretentious and cheap, used principally for bathing-houses and open pavilions.

The cost of removing the obstructions would be very trifling; in fact, they could be sold for old lumber or other purposes and removed by the purchasers at once.

The land between high and low water has been, in some cases, sold by the State to the owners of the adjoining uplands.

In the event of this proposition being put into effect it might be advisable to acquire these riparian rights. They could be bought, probably, for very little more than the amount paid to the State.

In any event, even if the City did not acquire these rights, it would in no way affect the carrying out of this plan as the deed from the State specifically requires that the right of way be open to the public the same as if the grant had not been made, and in no case shall the owners tence off their land under water.

The walk itself would require four hundred thousand square feet of yellow pine flooring two and one-half inches thick, making one million feet board measure of lumber at \$35 per one thousand feet—\$35,000.

Thirty-five thousand running feet of six by eight inch yellow pine stringers, making one hundred and forty thousand feet of lumber at \$35 per one thousand feet—\$4,900.

The labor and nails would be sixty per cent. of cost of material, making \$23,940. To be substantially built and in keeping with the heavy flooring, piles should be driven fifteen feet apart each way, running and crossways. This would require two thousand one hundred and thirty-two piles at \$3.50 each, furnished and driven, costing \$7,462; fifteen thousand feet of railing at twenty cents a foot in position, \$3,000, making a total of \$74,302 for a board walk fifty feet wide and eight thousand feet long, which should prove with proper care invulnerable against the elements.

This board walk when complete would more than any plan yet proposed, in my opinion, meet the requirements of Coney Island. It would do to a great extent for Coney Island what the somewhat similar board walk has done for Atlantic City.

As this board walk would directly benefit the abutting property-owners, they should be assessed a portion of the cost of the improvement.

This board walk would also increase greatly the value of land, thereby assuring the City an increase in taxes, which in a few years would repay the outlay.

The total estimated cost of improvement would be as follows:

And be it further Resolved, That the Local Board requests that the matter of the details of such highway and of building a board walk theron and improving and protecting the beach at Coney Island be referred to the Topographical Bureau for an early report; and it is hereby suggested to the Board of Public Improvements that the Local Board, after hearing those having property interests at Coney Island, and others who are interested in improving conditions there, believes that there should be a board walk ten teet high constructed on such highway, similar to that at Atlantic City and under similar regulations, especially that on such highway no business should be transacted and no structures erected, no railroad ever constructed thereon, and that, in case of the beach making out beyond the present high-water line to the extent of one hundred and fifty feet, the highway should be moved out so that the present property-owners should not lose their present right to the accretion; and that the entire cost of acquiring the highway be paid by the City.
